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A.L.J. FULLIN: First I just wanted to start by introducing myself. My name is Dan Fullin, I'm the Administrative Law Judge from the Power Siting Board that's been assigned to this case, and I was going to briefly describe the format.

If you're interested in testifying at today's hearing, then I would like it if you would -if you haven't already done so, sign up on a signup
sheet in the back, and I'll be calling the names from
the signup sheet and we'll go in the order that those
appear. At the end of that, if I run out of names on
the signup sheet, I will ask if there's anyone else
that was intending to testify that hadn't had a
chance to do so and we'll let them come forward.

So let me begin by, you know, kind of reading from the format here. The Ohio Power Siting Board has assigned for public hearing Case
No. 16-702-EL-BTX, which is the Matter of the Application of AEP Ohio Transmission Company,
Incorporated for a Certificate of Environmental
Compatibility and Public Need for the Macksburg -oh, I meant to ask someone local, how do you

pronounce the word, is it Devola?

A.L.J. FULLIN: I hope I can remember to say it right, but please forgive me. I'm not from this area.

-- has assigned for hearing that the

Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public

Transmission Project.

My name is Dan Fullin, I'm the

Administrative Law Judge assigned by the Power Siting

Board to hear the case. Also here from the Power

Siting Board is Matt Butler, he's the one in the back

that's taking the signatures on the signup sheets;

and we also have from the Board Grant Zeto, who is

also here.

I have been told that the attorney for the company is going to be arriving a little late today, but he is going to come and make an appearance here today, and I won't close the hearing until he's done so. I think he's not expected to arrive until close to 10 till 7:00, but we're -- he gave the okay, and I was probably going to anyway, proceed without him, get started without him.

The subject of today's hearing is

limited to the application, which was filed by AEP on March the 3rd of this year. The Macksburg-Devola line is a 138-kilovolt transmission line that is part of the overall southeast Ohio area improvements, connects Macksburg substation to the new Devola substation in Washington County.

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The project is designed to improve customer service, cut down on power outages, and speed service restoration when outages occur. The Macksburg-Devola line will be approximately 17 miles long depending on the route selected. The line will likely run through Adams, Aurelius, Marietta, Muskingum, and Salem Townships in Washington County.

The Power Siting Board staff filed a Staff Report in this case on September the 22nd, 2017, after conducting an investigation and review. The staff gave a recommendation to allow AEP to go forward subject to 22 conditions that it set out in its Staff Report. The Staff Report serves as a recommendation to the Board, but the Board still has the final decision, and a final decision has been made in this case.

An evidentiary hearing in this case is scheduled to occur at the Board's office in Columbus on November the 16th, 2017. AEP's application and

the staff's recommendation are available at the Power Siting's website under the case number here. If you need any assistance on finding that, you can speak to me before the -- before I leave today, I'll try to help you, or just call the Ohio Power Siting Board or look up under the Ohio Power Siting Board.

The purpose of this hearing is to receive comments from you, the public, regarding the application. It's not going to be a question-and-answer session, but an opportunity for you to let the Board know what you think about the proposal.

There is a court reporter here.

Everything that's said today will be transcribed and filed in the docket in this case. The Board will review the comments before making its final decision.

Those wishing to speak have hopefully signed the -- the signup sheet as I discussed earlier. I will call those on the sheet forward -- to come forward, then I'll swear you in and ask you to begin by giving your name, your address, and then you can proceed with your testimony. My intention would be to have you come forward and testify. You can remain standing if you want or be seated at this chair. The idea is that you'll come forward so the

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court reporter won't have any trouble hearing you, but you'll need to project so that everyone else in the room can hear.
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All right. So I think that's all I wanted to say in terms of introduction, and we'll begin then by having the first witness come forward. I believe the name is Wei Chung Sheng.

MR. SHENG: Chung Sheng.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Okay.

MR. SHENG: Do I get to stand?

A.L.J. FULLIN: Do you want to be sworn

MR. SHENG: Yeah.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Do you swear that the testimony you'll give will be the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

MR. SHENG: Yes, I do.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Thank you. Proceed as you wish. And, again, if you'll start by giving your name and address.

MR. SHENG: Okay. My name is Wei Sheng, and my address residential is 402 Hart Street, Unit 4, Marietta, Ohio 45750. We own property at 773 Arends Ridge Road, 103 acres, and there is a right-of-way of AEP's power transmission that goes across our

property.

I did submit a letter from our company called Outdoor Heaven, Inc. And the reason I'm giving a comment today is that I prefer that the transmission line will choose the alternate route, not the preferred route. I noticed that on your -- what do we call it? -- the summation, your report, that the difference in cost is probably about \$1.2 million between the preferred and the alternate.

The reason why I prefer to have the alternate is because it will go alongside I-77; so there will be less opticals, and also because we'll be using our property for a project called Ohio Outdoor Heaven. We'll have some organic farming, we'll have a lot of traffic, we'll have a lot of recreation facilities there. And also without that power transmission on our right-of-way, it will be probably more safe for the people that come into our property. So I would like to suggest that that right-of-way of AEP on our property be revoked and that AEP could use the alternate route, which is really along I-77 from Highland Ridge substation to Devola substation, and that's our -- our comment on this.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Okay. I didn't really

MR. GERBER: Frederick Gerber, 1670 Gun Club Road, Whipple, Ohio.

The reason I come up here, I wanted to know whether they was going to cross any more of my ground. They already go across a corner of it, because the transmission only goes across the corner of my property at the present, the one that's there, whether they was going to move it over any or whether they were going to use the existing.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Okay. Well --

MR. GERBER: I basically didn't want any more of my -- going into any of my ground any further.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Okay. Well, I'm not really in a position to answer questions.

MR. GERBER: Okay.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Actually I'm part of the Board that's making the decision in the case, but you might be able to speak with someone from the company and get the answer if you'd do that before you -- before you leave today, then you could provide additional comment once you have talked to them.

MR. HAMILTON: Tom Hamilton, Box 59 -- or, 1618 Highland Ridge Road, Lowell, Ohio.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Thank you.

MR. HAMILTON: We have all kinds of things keep changing out this way. They tell you it's going to be this way and then they change it. That's my big question.

Okay. Got everything on the other side of the interstate from us, whether it's the older or the original. We're in that part of the run where it gets very close to the interstate. As a matter of fact, one case runs right beside of it, and on the other case runs like maybe a half mile away from it. But we have high voltage in front of the house now, a lot higher than what it used to be, and that was the local power company deciding, oh, what the heck, we'll just up the power there and they won't say anything, they can't say anything, we're going to do it anyway. That was the approach they took.

Could that happen again where we don't have any say? I mean, if they -- they change their mind in the last minute, do we get stuck with the results? That's what I'm asking.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Okay.

1 MR. HAMILTON: You know, are these the 2 only alternatives or could they come up with some new ones? I've been on boards before and that happens. 3 A.L.J. FULLIN: Yeah. Well, again, I 4 5 don't think I'm in a position to answer your 6 question. 7 MR. HAMILTON: Would you resist it? 8 A.L.J. FULLIN: Pardon? 9 MR. HAMILTON: Would you resist it or 10 would you accept it? 11 A.L.J. FULLIN: Well, I'm here to decide 12 the case. Actually the Board will decide the case. 13 MR. HAMILTON: I know you're part of it. 14 A.L.J. FULLIN: This is a case where the 15 Board will make their decision based on the record, 16 including comments here, and then evidence that comes 17 on the evidentiary hearing which is coming up on 18 November the 16th. So I'm sure that the Board's duty 19 and expects to fulfill its duty to make its decision 20 based on the record before it. That's the only 2.1 appropriate thing for it to do is to decide the case 2.2 based on the record that it has submitted to it for 23 making its decision. 24 MR. HELDMAN: All right. That's fine.

I just -- I can't see them changing at the last

21 Billy Burkhart. Do you swear the testimony you'll

22 give today will be the truth, the whole truth, and

23 | nothing but the truth?

MR. BURKHART: Yes, sir.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Thank you.

MR. BURKHART: My name's Billy Burkhart, 50 Burkhart Road, Lowell, Ohio. The line is closer to my house right now than what I would prefer it to be at whatever kV it is right now, and jumping up, like, to 138 kV, I'm very concerned about it being that close to my house, my residence, and the health issues that that might -- you know, how I might be affected being subjected to that much electricity whenever I'm home. So I'm interested in getting it -- which I've talked to several people in previous meetings and over the phone, and I'm interested in getting it moved further away from my residence.

The alternate route would be best, but if we're going to stay with the preferred route I'd like it to be moved further south than when this crosses -- it crosses I-77 just south of my -- on my property, but it's just south of my residence. And I'd prefer it to be moved quite a bit further south, which I've talked to Joe Holman about several times. That's pretty much it.

A.L.J. FULLIN: I'm sorry, but I didn't -- I didn't follow or didn't hear what you said about the alternate route.

MR. BURKHART: I would prefer it take the alternate route.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Okay.

MR. BURKHART: But if not, if it has to go on the preferred route, I would prefer that it would cross I-77 further south than what it currently does, which would put it further away from my residence.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Okay.

MR. BURKHART: I'm just concerned about the health issues on all that power sleeping there eight hours a day after day seven days a week would be, I mean, and the noise, too. I mean, I hunt, and you walk under them lines when you're out hunting and it's weather like it is today, they're cracking. I mean, it's noisy. So I'm concerned about that, and also concerned about the health issues that I would be subjected to -- being subjected to an extended amount of time like that.

A.L.J. FULLIN: All right. Thank you.

MR. BURKHART: Yep. Thank you.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Okay. I don't have any other names on the list, but I would be willing to let anybody that wants to come forward, if you can provide other testimony, if you wanted to raise your hand and I'll call on you.

MR. MILLER: I have property on the corner of 821, and the Veteran's Road goes out to the Amvets building right there on the corner. And that's what I'm concerned about, because it looks like it's going to come over on the property there and that's where there's too many power lines already going over the property.

A.L.J. FULLIN: It's going over property that's your property?

MR. MILLER: Yeah.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Okay.

MR. MILLER: And I'd prefer for you to go to the other side or go back behind it, because --

A.L.J. FULLIN: What do you mean by -- again, I'm thinking about how this is going to look to me when I'm reading the transcript.

MR. MILLER: Yeah.

A.L.J. FULLIN: You know, can you explain what you mean by "back behind" and so forth because it won't mean anything to me?

MR. MILLER: If you're on 821.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Uh-huh.

1 MR. MILLER: When you go to the 2 Veteran's Road out there, I can't remember the name of it, but anyhow it's up above going out to Highland 3 Park there, but this goes out there to the VFW place 4 5 there, and it's right in the corner of 821 in there, 6 and there's got two buildings there, and 7 two-and-a-half or three acres, and there's already power lines going over two sets of power lines, and 8 9 that's enough for that small property, in my opinion. 10 I don't think we can take any more; so I'd prefer that they stay on 821 side going north. 11 12 A.L.J. FULLIN: Okay. Thank you. 13 MR. HELDMAN: Uh-huh. Thank you. 14 A.L.J. FULLIN: Anyone else? You had 15 your hand raised. Do you want to come forward? 16 MR. BROUGHTON: Hi. George Broughton, 17 3700 State Route 60, Marietta, Ohio. 18 A.L.J. FULLIN: You want to be sworn in? 19 MR. BROUGHTON: Yes, please. 20 A.L.J. FULLIN: Do you swear that the 2.1 testimony you'll give today will be the truth, the 22 whole truth, and nothing but the truth? 23 MR. BROUGHTON: Yes. 24 A.L.J. FULLIN: Thank you. Go ahead. 25 MR. BROUGHTON: The property I -- I

represent two different interests, the Broughton

Foundation, which we have 600 acres that goes

straight through our park, and Broughton Commercial

Properties, which is my entity. And so we have -- we basically have effectively about a mile of the preferred route.

I have to give the power company credit, they've done really an -- actually a good job communicating with me and the board. In fact, they're going to meet with our board tomorrow because we've been -- because we have a lot of concerns how it would affect the park and the environment and stuff like that, what would happen, so we wouldn't have an environmental issue.

Right now the existing transmission line goes through there now; so we were concerned about the trees, but at this point we've been satisfied.

We're going to -- he's going to meet -- or the group, we're going to meet with the board and we'll make a decision, but at this point they've been very professional. They've showed the locations where the transmission poles would be; so we kind of know where it is, and also they've worked with us so we would not have any environmental issues where we would have access. We have a trail that goes through there

right now, and they're working with us on that so we won't destroy the trail, because we want to make sure since it's open to the public for free, we don't have any safety issues.

They have addressed our issues about during the construction phase that we don't have things people getting into, get in trouble, get hurt, because the park is open and we can't really stop access to the park during daylight hours. So as I said, I give a compliment to the power company for their access. We're okay so long as they work with us on the environmental issues and the access to the park, and that's all I have to say. So basically it's basically about a mile that goes through the park.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Okay. Thank you.

Is there anyone else that would want to testify at this time? If so, raise your hand.

(No response.)

A.L.J. FULLIN: I don't see anyone's hand raised. So like I said, I think that -- I don't know for sure what I should do, but I think I will adjourn -- take a pause here till about 10 till 7:00, and allow the attorney for the company to make an appearance on the record, and then at that time after

he's entered an appearance I would open the -- like I did, I'll ask anyone that's still here at that time if they wish to testify, I'll provide another opportunity at that time. But between now and approximately 10 till, we'll be in adjournment until that time or whenever the attorney arrives, then we'll go back on the record like I've described. If at that time anybody still has a concern or wants to bring up a comment or provide testimony, I'll give them one more opportunity at that time. So until then, we'll be in adjournment. Thank you.

(Recess taken.)

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A.L.J. FULLIN: I'm going to bring the hearing back up on the record.

I'm going to allow the attorney to enter an appearance, and then I'm going to ask one more time whether or not if there's anybody that wants to provide more testimony. So if you wanted to go ahead and make an appearance on behalf of the Company.

MR. GARCIA: Thank you, Your Honor. Hector Garcia on behalf of AEP Ohio Transmission Company, Inc., the Applicant.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Okay. Thank you.

MR. GARCIA: Thank you.

A.L.J. FULLIN: Is there anyone else
