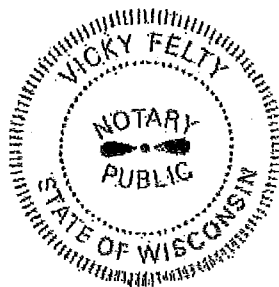

Survey on addiction gives mixed results

Just more than one out of every two Cincinnati-area residents still blames addiction on the addicted, a new social media poll shows.

But guess what? A Mercy Health psychologist who spearheaded an addiction treatment collaborative in the Cincinnati region is optimistic about the response. Because after all, it also means nearly half don't blame the addicted for their condition.

"In this day and age of polarization and tribalism, the fact that we can get 50-plus percent of people to agree on anything is simply remarkable," said Navdeep Kang, an Obama Foundation fellow who's been at the forefront of providing evidence-based treatment for people with opioid addiction in the region.

The Center for Addiction Treatment in the West End put out the true-or-false Facebook questionnaire in November and December and shared the results with The Enquirer.

The online survey drew responses from 279 people who live in neighborhoods with a Cincinnati ZIP Code.

Here's a glance at what they said:

■ 81 percent answered correctly that the American Medical Association

defines addiction as a disease.

■ 51 percent said it's false to say people with addiction shouldn't be blamed for their condition.

■ 33 percent answered true to the assertion that addiction is not a disease because it's caused by a person's choice to use drugs or alcohol.

■ 86 percent said people with addiction always should seek professional help.

■ 90 percent said they've known someone who suffered from addiction.

"It's critical that society gains a better understanding of addiction," said Mike Rosen, vice president of clinical services for the addiction treatment nonprofit. "It's the lack of knowledge about the disease that will hurt ... treatment."

But like Kang, Rosen was glad to see that most people said that the survey results showed a significant understanding of addiction.

In their responses, most said addiction needs professional treatment. They know, Rosen said, "it's not just going to go away."

Kang's impressed with the level of knowledge that shows in the responses.

"Yes, some of it is mixed," Kang said. But with 81 percent of people understanding the AMA's definition and two-thirds knowing addiction is a disease, he said, "It's astounding."

NOTICE OF PROPOSED MAJOR UTILITY FACILITY

Duke Energy Ohio, Inc., (Duke Energy Ohio) is proposing an electric transmission line project in your area. This project will allow for a 1.2 mile, 138-kilovolt (kV) transmission line from the Garver Substation, located at 3431 Cincinnati Dayton Road, in Middletown, Ohio, to the AK Steel Substation, located at 1801 Crawford Street, in Middletown, Ohio. This project will support the area's growing energy needs. A map of the project area is included below.

Construction for the new transmission line will include the installation of 22 steel transmission poles. The poles have a height of 60-to-105 feet above ground. The bases of the poles increase in diameter according to pole height, which makes the poles stronger and more reliable. The project also will include building approximately 600 feet of 7.2 kV distribution line to feed equipment at the AK Steel Substation.

Duke Energy Ohio has filed a Letter of Notification with the Ohio Power Siting Board (Board), under Case No. 19-0050-EL-BLN. This number should be included in all communications with respect to the Project. The Letter of Notification to construct, operate, and maintain this facility is now pending before the Board. Comments and/or petitions to intervene will be accepted by the Board up to 10 days following the publication date of this notice, pursuant to Ohio Administrative Code Rules 4906-2-12 and 4906-6-08. Petitions or comments should be addressed to Ohio Power Siting Board, 180 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio, 43215, and must reference Case No. 19-0050-EL-BLN.
