1 guess, Company Exhibit 2 marked as Easement and  
2 Company Exhibit 1, the letter.

3 A. There's 1. Is that 2?

4 Q. Yes.

5 A. Okay.

6 Q. Your letter references a volume 11 page  
7 407 in the Richland County Recorder's Office. And I  
8 see at the last page of that easement it reads,  
9 "volume 11 page 370," can you explain that  
10 difference?

11 A. Yes. There are, as we've stated before,  
12 eight properties that I needed to identify the  
13 easements on. Of those eight properties they crossed  
14 three easements and I was uncertain of -- it's very  
15 difficult to determine -- it was a typo. It's  
16 actually a mistake on my part.

17 Q. It's a typo?

18 A. It's a typo. This is the easement that's  
19 next to 407 -- volume 11 page 407 is the easement  
20 that's one door down from Mrs. Dye's house. 370 --  
21 volume 11, 370 actually encompasses her property, but  
22 the wording is the same.

23 Q. Company Exhibit 2, easement, is that the  
24 easement you requested and pulled from real estate or

1 --

2 A. Yes.

3 Q. Okay.

4 MS. MILLER: Your Honor, I would like to  
5 introduce an exhibit, but I don't have six copies of  
6 the document. Ms. Dye also filed a version, the same  
7 copy of this but a smaller scale of this document,  
8 I'd like to introduce into evidence.

9 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: So you only have  
10 one copy of that?

11 MS. MILLER: I have one copy of this size  
12 and one copy of the size Ms. Dye submitted. We can  
13 go off of that size, it's just harder to read.

14 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Let's go off the  
15 record for a minute.

16 (Recess taken.)

17 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Let's go back on  
18 the record. Ms. Miller.

19 MS. MILLER: Your Honor, I have a  
20 document captioned Westfield Square Blocks. I would  
21 like to have this document marked for identification  
22 as a Company Exhibit 4.

23 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: The document  
24 shall be so marked.

1 (EXHIBIT MARKED FOR IDENTIFICATION.)

2 MS. MILLER: May I approach the witness?

3 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Yes.

4 By Ms. Miller:

5 Q. I'm handing you a document that has just  
6 been marked as Company Exhibit 4. I'll give you an  
7 opportunity to review this document. Are you  
8 familiar with this document?

9 A. Yes, I am.

10 Q. Does this document indicate Ms. Dye's  
11 plot? Actually, I'm going to back up. What is this  
12 document?

13           A. This is a block corridor, part of a  
14 corridor section of Ontario, Ohio showing residents,  
15 properties.

16 Q. And do you see Ms. Dye's property on  
17 that?

18 A. Yes, I do.

19 Q. May the record reflect that the witness  
20 has pointed to plot 2323

21 A Yes

Q. And what does it say above that plot?

23                   A.     "Ohio Edison Company Lease V-11, page  
24                   370."

1 Q. V-11 page 370?

2 A. Correct.

3 Q. Thank you.

4 MS. MILLER: Your Honor, I am handing the  
5 witness Complainant's Exhibit 2.

6 Q. Could you -- are you aware of what trees  
7 are in Complainant's Exhibit 2 A?

8 A. Yes, I am.

9 Q. Could you state what trees those are?

10 A. I see a Birch, Arborvitae, Spruce.

11 Q. Are you aware of any other trees on  
12 Ms. Dye's property that perhaps aren't indicated on  
13 that diagram that were remove?

14 A. On the photo, or the whole thing is this?

15 Q. On her property that -- I'll rephrase the  
16 question. Are you familiar with other trees that  
17 were removed from your vegetation management process  
18 that you do not see -- that may not be present on  
19 that exhibit?

20 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Exhibit 2 A?

21 Q. Yes, Exhibit 2 A.

22 A. Oh, yes.

23 Q. And what are those trees?

24 A. There's more spruce and red maple.

1           Q. And in Exhibit 2 A those trees around the  
2 pole, is it permissible to have trees that close to  
3 the pole?

4           A. No.

5           Q. Why not?

6           A. You need to provide a safe-working  
7 environment around --

8           HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Excuse me, now  
9 we're going into expert testimony again.

10          MS. MILLER: I'll strike that.

11          HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Thank you.

12          Q. What is the company's policy regarding  
13 vegetation around the pole?

14          A. The pole needs to be clear for a  
15 safe-working environment at the base of the pole.

16          Q. And how do you know that?

17          A. Because it's the company policy that I've  
18 read and it's been communicated to me by my  
19 superiors.

20          Q. Did they explain what safety hazards  
21 exist?

22          A. Yes.

23          Q. What explanation were you given?

24          A. In the event that the pole needs to be

1 climbed, we have to get to it and anchor safely  
2 around that pole or a tower, any structure on  
3 transmission.

4 Q. Were there any other safety risks  
5 explained?

6 A. Not specifically, no.

7 Q. Nothing about a lightning arrester?

8 A. There's a lightning arrester --

9 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Ms. Miller, are  
10 you leading the witness or are you just trying to get  
11 expert testimony in here that's not necessarily  
12 appropriate? Please make sure that you ask a direct  
13 question.

14 MS. MILLER: I'm sorry.

15 By Ms. Miller:

16 Q. Were there any other safety issues asked  
17 or explained, excuse me?

18 A. Yes. In reference to the static wire on  
19 top of our 69kV pole there is a ground wire that  
20 travels down the outside of the pole and can be  
21 damaged by trees that come in contact with its  
22 covering.

23 Q. Have you seen this on the pole?

24 A. Yes.

1           Q.    So trees close to a pole, are there any  
2 height restrictions before they're removed?

3           A.    No.   The -- pole bases are cleared  
4 regardless of herbaceous or woody vegetation. It has  
5 to do with the access to the pole and the closeness  
6 of that vegetation to the pole. Therefore, if we are  
7 clearing that vegetation around the pole, we would  
8 never have a height problem.

9           Q.    You said that trees close to the pole,  
10 it's not in their height but in their proximity to  
11 the pole?

12          A.    Correct.

13          Q.    And what is that proximity?

14          A.    For this it's three feet.

15          Q.    Did you measure the distance from the  
16 pole from the trees on Ms. Dye's property?

17          A.    Yes, I did.

18          Q.    And what was that distance?

19          A.    I measured 25 feet from the center of our  
20 line.

21          Q.    Are those the ones right around the pole  
22 or the ones --

23          A.    Well, I measured the edges of the  
24 right-of-way, but --

1           Q.    Were the trees around the pole touching  
2 the pole?

3           A.    I believe there was one that was touching  
4 the pole. In this instance, the fact that I removed  
5 the trees around the pole, they actually fell into  
6 the fact that they are incompatible trees, so I  
7 accomplished two goals by removing those trees.

8 Number one, removing incompatible vegetation on the  
9 right-of-way and number two, clearing the required  
10 circumference around that pole. It just so happened  
11 that the vegetation I needed to clear for the  
12 circumference was incompatible for the right-of-way  
13 also.

14           Q.    You mentioned that Ms. Dye had a red  
15 maple on her property?

16           A.    Two.

17           Q.    Do you know how tall those trees grow?

18           A.    Those trees have the potential to reach  
19 50 to 60 feet in height at maturity.

20           Q.    You say that Ms. Dye had a Birch tree on  
21 her property?

22           A.    Yes.

23           Q.    Do you know how tall those trees grow?

24           A.    Similar to maples, yes, 65 feet tall,

1 White Birch.

2 Q. Does the width of a tree stump indicate  
3 the height of the tree?

4 A. No.

5 Q. A red maple tree, is it contained or is  
6 that a tree that spreads out with long branches?

7 A. That has a wide canopy sometimes equal to  
8 its height.

9 Q. So to clarify, a red maple could be, the  
10 width could be the same as its height?

11 A. At some stages of growth, yes.

12 Q. How fast have you seen the red maples  
13 grow?

14 A. I have seen red maples grow three feet a  
15 year.

16 Q. How about White Birch?

17 A. Similar.

18 Q. I'm going to draw your attention to the  
19 Company Exhibit 2 A.

20 MS. KOLICH: Complainant.

21 Q. I'm sorry, Complainant Exhibit 2 A.

22 Could you identify the Birch tree in this picture?

23 A. Yes. (Indicating.)

24 Q. And how tall is that?

1                   HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: For purposes of  
2 the record, him pointing to the picture doesn't do  
3 anything.

4                   MS. MILLER: Oh, I'm sorry, the witness  
5 has just identified the --

6                   MS. KOLICH: Have the witness describe  
7 which tree he's talking about.

8                   HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: That would be  
9 fine.

10                  Q. Yes.

11                  A. The Birch tree that I'm being asked about  
12 is directly in front of the front door between the  
13 pole and the front of the house.

14                  Q. Could you describe it?

15                  A. White main stem, green leaves.

16                  Q. Okay. How tall was that tree when you  
17 removed it?

18                  A. 14 to 16 feet tall.

19                  Q. We've talked about the height of the  
20 tree. Have you ever seen sag on wires?

21                  A. Yes, I have.

22                  Q. Could you please explain?

23                  A. Um, during certain times of the year our  
24 loads increase and the outside temperature is

1 increased and the conductors stretch and therefore  
2 the lines sag.

3 Q. How much have you seen the lines sag?

4 A. Different -- there's different sag  
5 footage by voltage. I've seen some sag up to 10 to  
6 12 feet on a 345kV line.

7 Q. How about a 69kV?

8 A. Three, four feet.

9 Q. Do you know whether or not a tree has to  
10 make contact with a wire to have an electrical  
11 impact?

12 A. Yes, I do know that.

13 Q. Please explain.

14 A. The tree does not have to make contact to  
15 have an electrical impact with that wire. It needs  
16 to come in -- within a certain distance of that wire.

17 Q. Do you know what that distance is?

18 A. It would be, with a 69kV, it's just over  
19 three feet.

20 MS. KOLICH: Can we have one minute? I  
21 think we might be finished.

22 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Yes.

23 (Discussion held off the record.)

24

1 By Ms. Miller:

2 Q. Okay. Just a few more questions.

3 You had mentioned that you used two  
4 contractors in connection with the work done at  
5 Ms. Dye's, Nelson Tree Company and Davey Resources?

6 A. Yes.

7 Q. And you also mentioned that one of your  
8 responsibilities is quality control?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. Did you review the work done by Nelson  
11 Tree Company and Davey Resources?

12 A. Yes, I did.

13 Q. And what did you find?

14 A. I found that in the case of the work  
15 planning because it was a refusal process, by the  
16 time I got involved with the guys from Davey who were  
17 doing the work, not all the work had been identified,  
18 so I jumped in in the middle of the process, so we  
19 completed that together, so ultimately in the end  
20 everything was done to my standard, our standard,  
21 FirstEnergy's, just by the fact that we worked  
22 together on it.

23 When it came to Nelson Tree Service, I  
24 found that the yard was picked up sufficiently, the

1 driveway was swept, the lawn was raked as best as it  
2 could have been. Due to the snow on the ground, I'm  
3 sure that there was debris once it melted. And the  
4 stumps were flush. When we remove a tree, we want  
5 that stump to be no higher than three inches and that  
6 was achieved. And then the area around the truck  
7 where the chipper was swept and we got out of there  
8 as best we could. So the quality of the job they did  
9 on Ferguson Road was up to par, yes.

10 Q. When you say up to par, was it in  
11 compliance with the FirstEnergy vegetation management  
12 policy?

13 A. Yes, it was.

14 Q. Okay. I guess one last question. You  
15 had mentioned that when you had visited Ms. Dye on  
16 the day the trees were removed that she was --

17 MS. DYE: Speak up please.

18 Q. I'll restart.

19 You remember that concessions were made  
20 to -- a concession offer was made to Ms. Dye; is that  
21 correct?

22 A. Yes.

23 Q. And are you aware of her response?

24 A. I am aware of her first response. I am

1 not aware of her second response because it was not  
2 made directly by me the second time.

3 Q. And her first response?

4 A. The concession offered was the  
5 opportunity to relocate the trees that were left on  
6 the property that we were starting to cut, the rest  
7 of the 22 trees.

8 Q. And her response?

9 A. Her response was, "Where will I put them  
10 -- where would I put them?" And that's where I said,  
11 "Outside of the right-of-way or in the back yard."  
12 And --

13 Q. So she didn't request that you stop the  
14 work so she could relocate the trees?

15 A. No, not that she could relocate the  
16 trees.

17 Q. Okay.

18 MS. MILLER: Thank you.

19 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Is that all,  
20 Ms. Miller? Are you done with your direct?

21 MS. MILLER: Yes. I'm sorry, I'm done  
22 for now.

23 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Thank you.

24 Ms. Dye, you may ask clarifying questions based on

1 the questions and the direct testimony that the  
2 witness has given.

3 MS. DYE: I can ask him --

4 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: You can ask him  
5 questions.

6 MS. DYE: Ask him questions that he  
7 proposed, right?

8 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: You can ask him  
9 questions.

10 MS. DYE: I mean ask him questions, I'm  
11 sorry.

12 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: I'll let you  
13 know if they go in the wrong direction or if they go  
14 too far.

15 MS. DYE: He did not contact me.

16 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: No. You need to  
17 ask him direct questions. You made your testimony.  
18 You're not now to like rebut what he's saying. You  
19 just ask him questioning regarding his testimony.

20 - - -

21 CROSS-EXAMINATION

22 By Ms. Dye:

23 Q. Okay. If the cycle check was done every  
24 five years, why did you wait 10 years to address it?

1                   MS. MILLER: Your Honor, facts not in  
2 evidence.

3                   MR. DYE: That's not in his statement.

4                   MS. DYE: That's his statement.

5                   HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: I'm sorry, first  
6 of all, Mr. Dye, we need to let Ms. Dye do the  
7 cross-examination. And I'll allow the question.  
8 I'll allow the witness to answer the question to the  
9 best of his abilities and his direct factual  
10 knowledge.

11                  A. In the past, our cycles have not been in  
12 some cases where they need to be, so there are lines  
13 that we've -- maybe didn't get our full completed  
14 work done for various reasons. Maybe --

15                  HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Just to make the  
16 witness aware, you only have to answer to the best of  
17 your factual knowledge and if you don't know, you can  
18 say you don't know.

19                  A. My answer will be that. I was not  
20 employed by the company five years ago, so I do not  
21 have an answer for what happened on the last cycle.  
22 I can only speak for this cycle.

23                  Q. Well, the rules still apply, don't they?

24                  MS. MILLER: Your Honor.

1                   HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Ms. Dye, you  
2 need to ask the witness direct questions not open  
3 ended questions, factual questions.

4                   MS. DYE: Okay.

5                   By Ms. Dye:

6                   Q. My next question, three-foot sag over 100  
7 yards or 200 yards, what is the distance to the next  
8 pole?

9                   A. I'm not sure I understand the question.

10                  Q. The three-foot sag in the line that you  
11 talked about.

12                  A. Yes, ma'am.

13                  Q. If there was a three-feet sag over 100  
14 yards or 200 yards, what is the distance to the next  
15 pole?

16                  MS. MILLER: Your Honor, the witness is  
17 not an expert.

18                  HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: I'm not sure I  
19 understand the question per say. Are you asking for  
20 --

21                  MS. DYE: He said there was a sag --

22                  Q. You said there was a sag in the line,  
23 right?

24                  HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Are you asking

1 factually what the distance --

2 MS. DYE: Yeah, uh-huh.

3 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: -- between two  
4 poles is?

5 MS. DYE: No. I'll repeat the question.

6 Q. Three-foot sag in the line over 100 yards  
7 or 200 yards, what is the distance to the next pole?

8 A. Um, my reference to three foot of sag is  
9 something that I have witnessed on 69kV corridors in  
10 the past and may not be particular to the span that's  
11 in your yard.

12 Q. You still didn't answer that.

13 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: I think he  
14 answered it to the best of his ability. Do you have  
15 another question that you'd like to ask?

16 MS. DYE: Okay.

17 Q. You said that you gave me an option the  
18 day that you cut my trees.

19 A. Yes, ma'am.

20 Q. You didn't, because --

21 MS. MILLER: Your Honor.

22 Q. -- I come out crying.

23 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: We can't do  
24 testimony now. You already gave your testimony, but

1 you can ask him questions about it, factually what  
2 happened that day, and if he recollects --

3 MR. DYE: You can't make a statement.

4 All you can do is ask a question.

5 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Right. Thank  
6 you.

7 Q. Didn't you have my trees cut, when I come  
8 out crying you were cutting around the pole, right?

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. And almost all of my trees were cut, you  
11 gave me no option?

12 A. That is correct.

13 Q. And you just stated that you did have  
14 part of it and you stopped the tree service?

15 A. For the remainder of the trees that were  
16 left on the property --

17 Q. (Statement stricken from the record.)

18 MS. MILLER: Your Honor.

19 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Ms. Dye, I need  
20 you to ask specific questions.

21 MS. DYE: I'm sorry.

22 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Like, if you  
23 have specific questions about where they were in the  
24 process and you want to point to the diagram or

1 something like that, you can do that, but you have to  
2 does him within his knowledge specifically. You need  
3 to be specific.

4 MS. DYE: Okay.

5 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: And you can't  
6 disagree with him. This is his testimony.

7 MS. DYE: Okay. Okay.

8 By Ms. Dye:

9 Q. The chainsaws were there -- when did you  
10 give me the option? You said you gave me an option  
11 and stopped the tree cutting service, but I was not  
12 out there until you almost had them cut?

13 A. I gave you the option when you first came  
14 out of the house.

15 Q. (Statement stricken from the record.)

16 MS. KOLICH: Objection.

17 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Yeah. We need  
18 to strike that from the record any disagreement with  
19 the witness and let him answer the question.

20 MS. DYE: I'm sorry.

21 A. Can I continue?

22 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Yes, you can  
23 continue.

24 A. The plan which I gave the option for

1 relocation was probably 60 or 70 percent of the way  
2 through the process on Mrs. Dye's property, 60 or  
3 70 percent of the trees were already removed. But  
4 that's -- at that point in our removal process is  
5 when you came out of the house and I actually got to  
6 talk to you and that is when I made the offer. So  
7 the offer was for the remaining 30 or 40 percent of  
8 the trees, not all of them, because most of them were  
9 gone.

10 Q. All of them were gone, wasn't they, when  
11 I come out crying?

12 A. No.

13 Q. They were cutting on that last pine tree,  
14 wasn't they, Blue Spruce pine tree?

15 A. Yes. They were into the western row of  
16 the spruce trees, the western side of your property.

17 Q. All of the trees, right?

18 A. The Spruces on the west side of the front  
19 yard, we were already into the batch of them. I told  
20 the men to --

21 Q. I asked you a question, wasn't they all  
22 --

23 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: No, I believe  
24 he's answering the question. I mean, he's trying to

1 answer specifically where it was.

2 A. Yes.

3 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Now, the western  
4 side, just so I know, we haven't done east and west.  
5 When you're facing west, you're talking about the  
6 right-hand side?

7 A. Yes, ma'am, the right-hand side. There  
8 was a clump of four or five closer to the house that  
9 we've talked about before and then some under the  
10 line that was smaller than the ones by the house.  
11 And I believe to the best of my knowledge that at the  
12 time that you and I had that conversation, we were  
13 just beginning to cut that clump heading towards the  
14 house. There was that four or five left to do and  
15 there may have been three.

16 Q. You -- excuse me.

17 MR. DYE: Question.

18 Q. You said that they were all cut and you  
19 stopped and told me that you would give me an option  
20 to transplant my trees. There wasn't any, was there?

21 A. Yes, there were.

22 Q. No.

23 A. At the time that I offered you the option  
24 to relocate, there were some of the trees left.

1 Q. Did you not tell me --

2 MS. MILLER: Objection, asked and  
3 answered.

4 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: I think he has  
5 answered the question as far as what trees were left.

6 MS. DYE: Yes.

7 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: So do you have  
8 any other questions that you'd like to ask the  
9 witness?

10 MS. DYE: Give me a moment, please.

11 Q. Was my White Birch trimmed in November of  
12 '06?

13 A. I do not know.

14 Q. (Statement stricken from the record.)

15 MS. MILLER: Your Honor, I object.

16 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Yes. That would  
17 be stricken from the record, her response will be  
18 stricken from the record. This is the witness's  
19 testimony. Please don't respond to his answers.

20 Okay.

21 MR. DYE: Just ask questions.

22 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Do you have any  
23 other questions, Ms. Dye?

24 Q. The things that you said on here --

1                   HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Ms. Dye, I'm  
2 sorry, do you have any other questions on what he's  
3 said today?

4 By Ms. Dye:

5                   Q. Did you say you contacted me, you didn't,  
6 did you?

7                   A. I attempted to.

8                   Q. No. And --

9                   MR. DYE: Make it a question.

10                  Q. Why was Mark Weidemyre and Dan Zeiter  
11 sent to my house instead of you with a voucher for  
12 \$450?

13                  A. I know Dan is also on the city council  
14 because I heard his name through Mark. I do not know  
15 whose decision that was to approach you, if it was  
16 yours or if it was theirs, if they thought that they  
17 could help the situation. My involvement in that  
18 situation was on the other end. I was approached by  
19 our employee in Mansfield at the Ohio Edison office  
20 on Ashland Road to see if we could still offer that  
21 concession. And I agreed to it. I said,  
22 "Absolutely, we will still offer that concession.  
23 How do we get it to Mrs. Dye? I know she really  
24 doesn't want to do business with me." So I went back

1 through the Erie manager to the city councilman and I  
2 believe that's how that came about.

3 Q. I don't quite know how to ask this. But  
4 if you didn't come back to my property and offer me  
5 the voucher -- how many times, four, did you say you  
6 contacted me?

7 A. Attempted to, yes.

8 Q. Why couldn't you come back to my property  
9 to offer me the voucher?

10 A. It's not that I couldn't. It's not that  
11 I wouldn't have. It's that the opportunity for that  
12 city councilman, that contact that I just spoke  
13 about, happened before I would have come back down to  
14 Mansfield and done that. It was that fast. They  
15 wanted to get a resolution immediately.

16 Q. Okay.

17 A. And their mention was that you were very  
18 upset and by me being there would probably have made  
19 your situation worse, so I opted to stay out of it.  
20 I would -- that's my answer.

21 Q. You said Weidemyre was with you, you did  
22 say that, didn't you?

23 A. Yes, ma'am.

24 Q. When you went around the week before the

1 cutting of my trees?

2 A. I'm not sure if it was a week, but we did  
3 travel.

4 Q. And you specifically told him what trees  
5 you were cutting on my property?

6 A. Yes, I did.

7 Q. (Statement stricken from the record.)

8 MS. MILLER: I object.

9 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Objection  
10 sustained.

11 MS. MILLER: I'm sorry.

12 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: That's okay.

13 MS. MILLER: Move to strike.

14 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Yes, it will be  
15 stricken from the record, that part that --

16 MS. DYE: Pardon?

17 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: I was just  
18 clarifying for the Court Reporter what portion would  
19 be stricken.

20 MS. DYE: Okay. Let me look at this a  
21 minute.

22 By Ms. Dye:

23 Q. Did you say that you rang my front  
24 doorbell?

1           A. Um, I cannot remember which doorbell we  
2 rang, but if we can't get a doorbell, we knock.

3           Q. You did say you knocked at the garage  
4 door?

5           A. Yes, I have knocked on that door.

6           Q. (Statement stricken from the record.)

7           HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: You need to just  
8 ask him questions. Okay.

9           MS. DYE: Okay.

10          HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: You've already  
11 given your testimony.

12          MS. MILLER: Move to strike, Your Honor.

13          HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Yes, that will  
14 be stricken from the record.

15 By Ms. Dye:

16          Q. Did you say you walked to my front door  
17 and rang the doorbell?

18          A. And I have, yes. Yes, I have walked to  
19 your front door in the past.

20          Q. Was there not snow on the front porch?  
21 There was snow out there partially when you guys cut  
22 the trees, right?

23          HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Ms. Dye, I need  
24 you to be very specific as to when you're talking

1 about.

2 MS. DYE: I'm trying.

3 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: What day are you  
4 talking about that you're asking the witness? You  
5 need to be very specific.

6 Q. The day that you cut my trees, did you  
7 come to my front door?

8 A. No, I did not, not the day.

9 Q. (Statement stricken from the record.)

10 MS. MILLER: Move to strike that last  
11 part.

12 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Yes. Ms. Dye, I  
13 think -- I'm going to say this one more time and I  
14 may have to ask you to stop your questioning if you  
15 can't follow my directive

16 MS. DYE: Okay.

17 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: I really need  
18 you to not respond to his questions. Please just ask  
19 him questions and don't respond or try to testify.  
20 You've given your testimony. The information that  
21 you're mentioning may be in your testimony. It's  
22 just this is -- it's this witness's turn to testify.

23 Do you have any more questions that you'd  
24 like to ask of him?

1 By Ms. Dye:

2 Q. Didn't you say you sent me a worksheet?

3 A. Yes, ma'am, in the letter.

4 Q. (Statement stricken from the record.)

5 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Now see there  
6 again you responded. Now we're going to have to  
7 strike that from the record because you can't say  
8 that. You can ask him a question and Mr. Failor will  
9 answer the question and then you can ask another  
10 question.

11 MS. DYE: Okay.

12 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: But you can't  
13 respond to him. I'm going to give you one more  
14 chance to ask questions or I'm going to have to ask  
15 you to stop because really the purpose of what you're  
16 doing is to clarify anything that he said. What  
17 you're really doing is just repeating what he's  
18 already testified to. So you know, if you look on  
19 your list and you find that you have things that you  
20 need to clarify, I would recommend that you ask those  
21 questions to be sure it's clear. But I wouldn't  
22 re-ask the questions that he's already answered.

23 MS. DYE: I've already asked him all I'm  
24 going to ask him.

1                   HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Okay. Thank  
2 you. Ms. Failor, I do have some clarification  
3 questions. Let's see if I can get through this list.

4                   -

## 5                   EXAMINATION

6     By Hearing Examiner Pirik:

7                   Q. Okay. Early on in your testimony you  
8 were talking about Davey Resources and the work plan  
9 guidelines and they put together the work line and  
10 you said the workers are given a line to begin on.  
11 In that situation are you talking about a  
12 transmission line?

13                  A. Yes, I am.

14                  Q. You're not talking about distribution  
15 lines?

16                  A. I am not talking about distribution.

17                  Q. Okay. I'm looking at Company Exhibit 3.  
18 It's the work plan.

19                  A. Okay.

20                  Q. There you go. I'm looking at this and it  
21 appears, and you can tell me if I'm wrong, but you  
22 mentioned that several ways that the company marks  
23 trees that are going to be taken care of. It looks  
24 like the blank before removed trees marked is

1 checked, there's a checkmark in that blank and it  
2 looks to me like there's an X in the box that said  
3 "Red X." First of all, this work plan is just for  
4 Mrs. Dye's property, right?

5 A. Right.

6 Q. So it looks like there's two boxes  
7 checked, like one that there would be a red X and  
8 also that they are all incompatible species. But yet  
9 in your testimony it seemed like there weren't red  
10 X's, so that's my question.

11 A. Yes. When you get two boxes checked like  
12 that, it could go -- on Mrs. Dye's property here's  
13 what happened. There are trees close to the edge of  
14 the right-of-way and the right-of-way edges have  
15 already been identified by the work planners, so  
16 rather than have a tree crew -- we may not have the  
17 luxury of having the work planners go back there to  
18 go over what they marked in the field. We will mark  
19 those trees close to the right-of-way with an X with  
20 a line underneath it, meaning that yes, this tree is  
21 on the right-of-way and it's close to the edge. In  
22 reference to "All incompatible species located on the  
23 right-of-way," that would be the rest of the trees in  
24 the center where we wouldn't want to spend the time

1 putting X's and lines on 20 other trees. Or a  
2 situation where the edge is very well defined, maybe  
3 a field, but there's trees in the middle of the field  
4 or a front yard with trees but the edges are well  
5 defined, there aren't any trees to decipher how close  
6 to the edge, so in this case, there were trees close  
7 to the edge, 24 feet, they got an X with a line  
8 underneath them.

9 Q. So are you personally aware, I mean, did  
10 you see trees that had X's on them, do you know for  
11 certain that there were X's on certain trees?

12 A. Yes. On that, yeah.

13 Q. It's kind of hard. I guess I need to  
14 look at one of the Complainant's exhibits, which I  
15 understand isn't to scale, but it does to an extent  
16 show where some of the trees are. It's that exhibit  
17 right on top. I don't know, Mr. Failor, if you could  
18 get that exhibit.

19 A. Most of the trees I believe on the  
20 property had X's on them.

21 Q. Are you personally aware of where these  
22 dots are on the upper diagram in Complainant's  
23 Exhibit 1, where the X's were?

24 A. Yes. All four of those trees had X's on

1 them.

2 Q. Are you referring to the four trees in  
3 the upper right-hand corner of this diagram?

4 A. Yes, I am.

5 Q. Were there any other trees that had X's  
6 on them?

7 A. I believe the spruce that was at 17 feet.

8 Q. Which one is that?

9 A. Upper left-hand corner.

10 Q. Okay.

11 A. And I couldn't say for sure about the  
12 rest of them.

13 Q. Okay. Well, then when we go back to the  
14 work plan, Company Exhibit 3, and it says "All  
15 incompatible species -- it's been a long day for all  
16 of us. I want to be sure I understand. What  
17 specifically is the Company's definition of  
18 incompatible species? Are you aware of what that  
19 definition is and that what that policy is?

20 A. Yes.

21 Q. And where do I find that, is there a  
22 document that I find that in?

23 A. We have it in our Vegetation Management  
24 Specification book.

1 MS. MILLER: I have a marked copy of that  
2 book, I mean, highlighted.

3 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Can we go off  
4 the record for a minute?

5 (Discussion held off the record.)

6 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Let's go back on  
7 the record. I had asked the witness with regard to a  
8 definition of incompatible species. My understanding  
9 in the discussion off record with the company and  
10 showing it to the Complainant is that there is a  
11 document. We only have one copy of it. I'll let  
12 Ms. Miller proceed with exactly an explanation of  
13 that.

14 MS. MILLER: Your Honor, I have document  
15 captured FirstEnergy Vegetation Management  
16 Specifications. I would like to have this document  
17 marked for identification as Company Exhibit 5.

18 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: The document is  
19 so marked.

20 (EXHIBIT MARKED FOR IDENTIFICATION.)

21 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Could you give  
22 that to the witness? I'd like the witness to have  
23 that? Because I'm specifically asking -- or is it  
24 possible for you to find the page in there where the

1 definition of incompatible species is located so that  
2 I can reference that on the record.

3 MS. MILLER: Your Honor, I could speed up  
4 the process and flip to the section.

5 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: That would be  
6 fine.

7 MS. MILLER: May I approach the witness?

8 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Yes.

9 THE WITNESS: Okay. I've found it.

10 By Hearing Examiner Pirik:

11 Q. Do you have a page number?

12 A. Page 24.

13 Q. Page 24 of Company Exhibit 5. That's  
14 really all I was looking for, so thank you. I have  
15 more questions so don't leave. Don't go anywhere.

16 A. Okay.

17 Q. I'm not sure there is a clarification,  
18 but I'm not sure what my reference is. Really early  
19 on in your testimony you said something about off  
20 pole measurement or off wire measurement and it was  
21 when -- I think it was when you were talking about  
22 what the easement -- are you talking about 50 feet  
23 from the center of the pole?

24 A. 25 feet from the center of the pole.

1           Q.    25 feet from the center of the pole?

2           A.    And basically, you would develop two  
3 lines parallel, one on each side of the line.

4           Q.    Okay. Thank you. I think that clarified  
5 your testimony. Is FirstEnergy still conducting work  
6 on Ferguson Road, are there more trees that need to  
7 be removed; do you know?

8           A.    Not at this time.

9           Q.    So just so I'm clear, and I think you  
10 clarified this, but I want to be certain, there were  
11 more than eight residents on Ferguson Road that were  
12 affected by the tree cutting. There were eight that  
13 were refusing the tree cutting and you were working  
14 with those eight?

15          A.    Correct.

16          Q.    Okay. You got into an explanation of the  
17 different types of attempts and contacts that were  
18 made with the Complainant and the two work planner  
19 attempts. The first one -- the first one you said,  
20 and you referred to Complainant's Exhibit 6, the door  
21 hanger, and you said the first one occurred on  
22 February 2nd, 2007. The date at the bottom of the  
23 hanger says, "Work is scheduled to start after  
24 February 2nd, 2007." Is that also the date that the

1 hanger was hung?

2 A. Yes, it is. And I -- yes, it is.

3 Q. And then you mentioned that the work  
4 planners went out to Ms. Dye's residence on  
5 February 9th?

6 A. Uh-huh.

7 Q. And I believe your testimony said that  
8 the work planner was successful in making contact  
9 with her. How do you know that?

10 A. Well, they were not successful on the  
11 9th. The door card made it successful. As Mrs. Dye  
12 indicated, she called the number and they had a  
13 conversation, they being Mrs. Dye and the work  
14 planner, so there was a contact there made, but it  
15 was from the door card hung on the 2nd.

16 Q. Okay. So I need to be clear about this  
17 because I believe you said that the work planners had  
18 two contacts with the Complainant, one was the door  
19 hanger, another was an on site visit on February 9th.  
20 And I might have been -- you know, I know it was on  
21 the record because I had the reporter re-read the  
22 answer, that you said that the February 9th on site  
23 contact was successful, but what you're clarifying is  
24 that -- did you mean to say something else?

1           A. I think in that line of questioning I was  
2 trying to refer to the phone call that they had, in  
3 that they had two attempts, they made two physical  
4 attempts to contact her, but the only connection was  
5 made over the phone.

6           Q. Okay. So the work planners, they made  
7 two attempts to contact her, one on February 2nd,  
8 that was unsuccessful, one on February 9th, on site  
9 was unsuccessful?

10          A. Correct.

11          Q. And -- but they had a contact with her  
12 when she called them on whatever date she called  
13 them?

14          A. That's correct.

15          Q. Do you know the date that she called  
16 them?

17          A. No, I do not.

18          Q. Don't have the date. Okay. And then you  
19 said that you had four attempts, one was on  
20 February 12th and you had the Davey planner with you  
21 and that was unsuccessful. There was no answer and  
22 you said you attempted both doors. The second  
23 contact was with the council members. Was that --

24          A. That was the second.

1           Q.    Was that successful?

2           A.    No.

3           Q.    When they were with you?

4           A.    No.

5           Q.    You did not have contact?

6           A.    We did not, no.

7           Q.    Do you know the date of that contact?

8           A.    February 19th, the morning of the 19th.

9           Q.    That was the morning of the 19th. And  
10          then you said your third contact was February 19th  
11          when the letter was sent?

12          A.    The letter was my third contact.

13          Q.    Right. Was that letter a registered or  
14          certified letter?

15          A.    No, it was not.

16          Q.    Okay. And then what was your fourth  
17          contact? I didn't quite get that.

18          A.    We didn't get to that. It was a phone  
19          call and that was on the 26th and I didn't get  
20          anywhere with that.

21          Q.    So your fourth contact was on  
22          February 26th and you attempted to call the  
23          Complainant?

24          A.    (Nods head up and down.) The day before

1 we set out to remove the trees.

2 Q. Okay. There's a question. Very early on  
3 in the Complainant's testimony we were presented with  
4 a document, Company Exhibit 1. Did you draft this  
5 letter, Company Exhibit 1, which is dated  
6 February 19th? You've mentioned it numerous times in  
7 your testimony, but I don't know if it was ever  
8 broached?

9 A. Parts of it.

10 Q. Parts of it?

11 A. Yes, parts of it.

12 Q. But you're aware of the information  
13 that's in here and what was attached to this letter?

14 A. Absolutely.

15 Q. It says the -- the last line in the first  
16 paragraph says, "General work practices and outlined  
17 on the attached work plan and enclosed brochure."

18 A. Yes.

19 Q. The work plan, is that the work plan you  
20 referenced in Company Exhibit 3?

21 A. Yes, it is.

22 Q. And what's the brochure, is there -- do  
23 we have a brochure?

24 A. I don't believe so.

1           HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: I would ask --

2           MS. KOLICH: We could submit it as a late  
3 file exhibit, if you'd like, Your Honor.

4           HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Yes, I would  
5 like the brochure that's referenced in Company  
6 Exhibit 1 to be as a late filed exhibit. I will mark  
7 it as Late Filed Company Exhibit 6.

8           if you could provide copies of that to  
9 Ms. Dye as well as the bench.

10          MS. MILLER: Your Honor, I do have copies  
11 of the brochure. I just don't have six copies of it.

12          HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Six copies?

13          MS. MILLER: Or I don't have enough  
14 copies to go around.

15          HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Can we go off  
16 the record?

17           (Discussion held off the record.)

18          HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Let's go back on  
19 the record. While we were off the record, we  
20 verified that there is one copy of the brochure. And  
21 Ms. Miller, would you like to take it from there?

22          MS. MILLER: Your Honor, I have a  
23 document captioned at the front, Maintaining Safe and  
24 Reliable Service. I would like to have this document

1 marked for identification as Company Exhibit 6, Late  
2 Filed.

3 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: The document  
4 will be marked as Late Filed Company Exhibit 6.

5 (EXHIBIT MARKED FOR IDENTIFICATION.)

6 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: And I also need  
7 to clarify that the document we marked as Company  
8 Exhibit 5 is going to be Late Filed Company Exhibit  
9 5.

10 MS. MILLER: May I approach the witness?

11 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Yes.

12 THE WITNESS: Yes, this is our brochure.

13 By Hearing Examiner Pirik:

14 Q. And is that the brochure that was  
15 attached to the letter?

16 A. Yes, it is.

17 Q. Okay. That's all I needed to know on  
18 that question. You mentioned concessions, the gift  
19 card, first of all, it was a little -- I just want to  
20 be sure I clarified. I think when Ms. Dye asked you  
21 a question she mentioned the gift card concession  
22 proposal was \$450. I think your testimony said 400.  
23 What's the correct amount so I have that?

24 A. I remember having a discussion about 400.

1 It very well could have been bumped to 450. By the  
2 time it left my hands, I don't remember.

3 Q. So it could be either?

4 A. It could be either.

5 Q. It's one of those. And what was the gift  
6 card for?

7 A. The gift cards are used primarily for  
8 Lowes, WalMart or Home Depot. Actually, a gift card  
9 is generated from this form.

10 Q. So this gift card is a generic gift card  
11 that could be used in several places?

12 A. There was a FirstEnergy form that we  
13 asked them to sign, which identifies the property  
14 owner, which identifies the line of the property, the  
15 property owner and what work we did there and if it  
16 did comply to all of our specifications. And then  
17 there's a section for a nursery because some  
18 nurseries work with us and will take that payment.  
19 Or there's a section for WalMart, Lowes or Home  
20 Depot. We actually have a person in our office  
21 physically take that form and go purchase a gift card  
22 at that location and then mail it to the property  
23 owner.

24 Q. So what was being offered to Ms. Dye was

1 the voucher and once she made her selection then  
2 there would be a gift card and once she --

3 A. Yes.

4 Q. -- took that voucher. Okay. How was the  
5 400 or 450, how was the amount of the gift card  
6 determined, because in this situation specifically  
7 are you aware of how it was determined with Ms. Dye's  
8 --

9 A. Yeah. We have -- myself and Kurt Gardner  
10 came up with the value amount and he suggested the  
11 400.

12 Q. Does the company, I guess I'm really  
13 asking.

14 A. Does the company? Yeah, the company has  
15 a rule of thumb and it is three to five trees removed  
16 \$75, so for every three to five trees removed a  
17 credit voucher can be written for \$75.

18 Q. Is that like a written policy that the  
19 company has or is that what you've been told you're  
20 allowed to offer?

21 A. That's what I've been told in my job  
22 specification handbook, is where that comes from as  
23 the guideline.

24 Q. I'm not going to ask for the handbook.

1                   Looking at Complainant's Exhibit 2, in  
2 your -- I mean, you were physically there when the  
3 trees were being cut down. Looking at the pictures  
4 in A, does A depict the size of the trees that you  
5 saw on February 27th? Or I'm not real sure how --  
6 I'm trying to understand from your perspective how  
7 tall the trees were and I'm trying to do it in  
8 reference to this picture in A.

9                   A. I think that this picture is a little  
10 deceptive because the property has a slope to it so  
11 there may be an angle at the picture, slight slope,  
12 but these trees may not appear to be the right size  
13 at the time when we removed them. But I would tend  
14 to agree with the testimony of Mr. Dye in his  
15 assessment of the trees.

16                  Q. The height of the trees?

17                  A. The height of the trees absolutely. I do  
18 agree with what he was on record as saying.

19                  Q. Okay. That answers my questions.

20                  And I just want to clarify further. When  
21 Ms. Dye was asking you questions, there was talk  
22 about a first response and a second response when it  
23 came to concessions.

24                  A. Right.

1           Q.    Is the first response referring to the  
2 offer on February 27th?

3           A.    Yes.

4           Q.    And is the second response referring to  
5 when the council members went to her home and you  
6 were not present but they went to her home?

7           A.    Yes.

8           Q.    Okay. Do you know, are trees in  
9 neighbors' yards similar to the trees in Ms. Dye's  
10 yard not trimmed, I mean, or have all of the trees  
11 along that street been trimmed similar to Ms. Dye's  
12 or are there still, in your knowledge, are there  
13 still trees?

14          A.    There are still trees on that street that  
15 have yet to have been affected that were not affected  
16 during this process that I was involved with in early  
17 2007.

18          Q.    And to your knowledge, why is that?

19          A.    Because of the distribution forester, the  
20 distribution lines that are hanging on the western  
21 side of Ferguson Road.

22          Q.    Okay. Wait, the western side of Ferguson  
23 Road?

24          A.    Okay. If you're looking at Ms. Dye's

1 house and you're looking to the left, it would be the  
2 section that I did my work at because it was just  
3 transmission. The section to the right included both  
4 and have been affected on a different cycle.

5 Q. Okay. So I'm going to look at  
6 Complainant's Exhibit 2 again, number K, letter K.

7 A. Uh-huh.

8 Q. And we're looking at again at the lines.

9 A. Yes.

10 Q. This is the pole that's in the middle of  
11 Ms. Dye's yard; is that correct?

12 A. Yes.

13 Q. Facing Ms. Dye's house?

14 A. Yes.

15 Q. The work that you were involved in and  
16 the work plans you were involved in were to the left  
17 of this pole; is that correct?

18 A. Uh-huh.

19 Q. And that's because that only involves  
20 transmission?

21 A. Yes.

22 Q. So the plans to the right of that pole  
23 are in a different work plan that someone else is  
24 working on because it involves transmission and

1 distribution?

2 A. Because it involves distribution.

3 Q. Right. Because it only involves  
4 distribution or it involves both?

5 A. Because it involves --

6 Q. Both?

7 A. Well, the circuit that -- the  
8 distribution circuit that is hanging below that  
9 transmission wire was due at the same time or shortly  
10 before that transmission was, so he got there first  
11 and therefore I wouldn't have to work that until my  
12 next cycle. I wouldn't have to do that until my next  
13 cycle, which is my responsibility.

14 Q. So, you will be responsible for what's  
15 done on the right-hand side. It's just the  
16 individual that works the distribution vegetation  
17 management did what they needed to do based upon the  
18 company's guidelines?

19 A. Yes. And subsequently, got distance that  
20 we needed away from our power lines for that cycle.  
21 The trees are far enough away on the cycle. But  
22 today, at this juncture today, he would never have  
23 gone to the left of that pole, so that falls under my  
24 responsibility and I didn't need to go to the right

1 of it. I didn't need to go passed Ms. Dye's property  
2 and we treat properties consistently. We treat a  
3 property as a whole not a part.

4 Q. Of the eight residents that were refusing  
5 to have a change or to a concession, you mentioned  
6 that seven of them, their issues were resolved. How  
7 were those issues resolved specifically?

8 A. We were able to make -- I was able to  
9 make contact with them, most of them through the  
10 letter process, which was -- they were all sent out,  
11 all eight of them were sent out on the 19th. There  
12 was a restaurant involved, there was an apartment  
13 complex involved. Part of the resolution process is  
14 the ability to have a conversation, I think, and it's  
15 very important to -- the communication process  
16 between the forester and the property owner are very  
17 important. It shows what we want to do and why we  
18 want to do it and what we can do to help you in the  
19 future. The fun part of the job actually working  
20 with somebody and saying, hey, you unfortunately have  
21 to live with this transmission line so let part of my  
22 resolution be helping you landscape your yard if  
23 you're in that situation.

24 Q. So specifically, I mean, did they receive

1 vouchers?

2 A. Yes.

3 Q. Did they receive tree stump removal?

4 A. Everyone received stump grinding.

5 Everyone but one received a credit voucher and that  
6 was the restaurant. And where the property owner  
7 wanted to do it, they were allowed to relocate by  
8 June 1st of 2007.

9 And I believe I had one property owner  
10 take me up on that offer and that was Mrs. Dye's  
11 neighbor to the left and unfortunately they couldn't  
12 get it done and I ultimately removed the trees. But  
13 in my conversation with them, in my resolution with  
14 them, they couldn't get the trees relocated. They  
15 asked me could I up my credit voucher because I was  
16 going to remove the trees and get rid of the stumps  
17 for them, I did that. So that's how we came to a  
18 resolve.

19 Q. And how many trees were there in that  
20 neighbor right to the left of her; do you recall?

21 A. I think there were --

22 Q. How many --

23 A. How many trees?

24 Q. Yeah, how many trees?

1           A. I want to say there was 19, but I may be  
2 mistaken. I may be remembering wrong. I'd have to  
3 look.

4           Q. And what was the voucher, how much was  
5 the voucher for?

6           A. I believe the voucher was for \$300.

7           Q. And to your recollection today you felt  
8 that was like 19 trees?

9           A. I believe so.

10          Q. Okay. All right. I have one more  
11 question. Looking at, I believe it's Complainant's  
12 Exhibit 8, which is the sign.

13          A. The sign?

14          Q. Yeah, underneath that one. Do you recall  
15 seeing this sign on Ms. Dye's property?

16          A. I recall seeing a sign like this, almost  
17 exactly like this. There was one on the back door,  
18 the garage door and there was one in one yard around  
19 the trees around the pole, so yes, I do. I know that  
20 when I removed the tree that the sign was in, I took  
21 the sign and this one must have been the one that was  
22 on the door.

23          Q. Okay. Even though you saw the sign, did  
24 you go on to Ms. Dye's property and try to contact

1 her?

2 A. Yeah. Even if the sign was hanging, we  
3 carried on with those contact attempts that we talked  
4 about.

5 Q. Okay.

6 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: All right. I  
7 believe that's all I have. Do you have any redirect,  
8 Ms. Miller?

9 MS. MILLER: I do a few questions.

10 - - -

11 REDIRECT EXAMINATION

12 By Ms. Miller:

13 Q. You mentioned that the neighbor's trees  
14 -- or excuse me. You mentioned that the neighbors  
15 could not relocate their trees?

16 A. Yeah.

17 Q. Do you know why?

18 A. Yes, I do know why. They did attempt to  
19 relocate the trees; however, they hired a contractor  
20 who while relocating the first tree hit their gas  
21 line and the money that they had used to repair  
22 whatever damages they had was the money they were  
23 going to use to relocate the trees. So we were able  
24 to contact each other after June 1st and come to that

1 resolution of me removing the trees.

2 Q. Did you contact them or did they contact  
3 you?

4 A. I contacted them because it was passed  
5 June 1st and I'm required to -- I'm required to check  
6 on trees that I allow to be relocated. Once that  
7 date passes, I have check on the trees to make sure  
8 they were relocated and these were not, so I had to  
9 find out why.

10 Q. You were asked why didn't you make  
11 another attempt after you removed the trees to offer  
12 Ms. Dye a concession. Were you ever threatened by  
13 Ms. Dye?

14 A. Um, yes, I was.

15 Q. Can you tell us about it.

16 A. Yeah. It was when I was cutting the  
17 trees on the neighbor's property. She heard the saws  
18 running. She came out. She said she wanted to beat  
19 me in the face with a baseball bat.

20 MS. DYE: Speak up a little louder.

21 A. Mrs. Dye said that she wanted to beat me  
22 in the face with a baseball bat.

23 MS. MILLER: No further questions.

24 MS. KOLICH: No.

1 MS. MILLER: Excuse me.

2 MS. KOLICH: You have to authenticate 5.

3 By Ms. Miller:

4 Q. I guess just for the record we are going  
5 to get an exhibit we have identified as Late Filed  
6 Company Exhibit 5. Are you familiar with this  
7 document?

8 A. Yes, I am.

9 Q. Can you tell us what this document is?

10 A. It's the FirstEnergy Vegetation  
11 Management Specification book.

12 Q. What is this used for?

13 A. This is given to our contractors. It's  
14 their specifications for working on our property,  
15 working in our forestry department.

16 MS. MILLER: No further questions.

17 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Thank you,  
18 Mr. Failor.

19 THE WITNESS: Thank you.

20 MS. MILLER: Your Honor, I'd like to move  
21 at this time for admission of the Company's exhibits.

22 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: We'll go one  
23 exhibit at a time.

24 With regard to Company Exhibit 1, you

1 move for admission?

2 MS. MILLER: I move for admission.

3 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Okay. Ms. Dye,  
4 do you have any objection to admitting the  
5 February 19th, Company Exhibit 1 to the record?

6 Considering the fact that it was --

7 MS. DYE: I do because they didn't  
8 contact me.

9 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Considering the  
10 fact that it was attached to your complaint.

11 MS. DYE: It wasn't.

12 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: It was attached  
13 to your complaint.

14 MS. DYE: Oh, okay, to my complaint.

15 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: The document  
16 will be admitted into the record.

17 MS. DYE: Okay.

18 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: With regard to  
19 Company Exhibit 2, which is the Deed of Easement.

20 MS. MILLER: The Company moves to have it  
21 entered into the record.

22 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Ms. Dye, do you  
23 have any objection to this going into the record?

24 MS. DYE: What one is that? Repeat it.

1                   HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Company Exhibit  
2 , which is the Deed of Easement. Do you have them  
3 in front of you? I believe you've been given copies  
4 of all of these documents.

5                   MS. DYE: No, I don't have any objection.

6                   HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Okay. The  
7 document will be admitted into the record.

8                   Company Exhibit 3 is the work plan for  
9 the corridor.

10                  MS. MILLER: The Company moves to have it  
11 entered into evidence.

12                  HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Ms. Dye, with  
13 regard to this work plan for the corridor, do you  
14 have any objection to it being admitted?

15                  MS. DYE: I didn't receive a work order.

16                  HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Do you have any  
17 objection to this document as this witness presented  
18 it being admitted into the record?

19                  MS. DYE: No.

20                  HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Okay. The  
21 document will be admitted.

22                  With regard to Company Exhibit 4, which  
23 is the plat that was presented. And you did have a  
24 copy, I believe you received.

1                   MS. MILLER: The Company requests to have  
2 that moved into evidence.

3                   HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Thank you.

4 Ms. Dye, do you have an objection to that plat?

5                   MS. DYE: I didn't hear. Which one?

6                   HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: It's Company  
7 Exhibit 4, which is the plat. It's that big  
8 document.

9                   MS. DYE: This?

10                  HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Yes.

11                  MS. DYE: I have no objections.

12                  HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Okay. That will  
13 be admitted into the record.

14                  Now with regard to both Late Filed  
15 Exhibits 5 and 6.

16                  MS. MILLER: The Company moves to have  
17 Exhibits 5 and 6 entered into evidence.

18                  HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Okay. Ms. Dye,  
19 do you have any objection to them, although they are  
20 exhibits that I'm requesting, because they clarify  
21 the record? We don't have copies of them. One is  
22 the book and the other one is the brochure that was  
23 attached to the letter referenced in the letter.

24                  MS. DYE: Don't matter.

1                   HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Those documents,  
2 the Company Late Filed Exhibits 5 and 6 will be  
3 admitted into the record.

4                   MS. KOLICH: For the record, we will  
5 provide Mrs. Dye with a copy via mail as well as --  
6 would you like it docketed or would you just like it  
7 sent to you directly?

8                   HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Since the Court  
9 Reporter has copies and they will be part of record  
10 in that sense and they'll be attached to the  
11 transcript, I think you can just send them to me as  
12 Examiner. It will be sufficient.

13                  We come to the point in the proceeding  
14 where typically I have two choices: I can ask for  
15 the testimony to be summarized either in closing  
16 statement or in briefs.

17                  Briefs are basically a summary of the  
18 testimony that was provided today and parties take  
19 their testimony and they explain what their testimony  
20 is and then they use their testimony to kind of say  
21 whether or not they agree with what the other party  
22 said. It's also -- briefs are also used for an  
23 opportunity to set forth arguments regarding legal  
24 issues. In this situation, it would be legal issues

1 regarding the rights of right-of-way, easements.

2 I don't believe that closing statements  
3 would be appropriate at this time. I don't think it  
4 will cover what I need, which is, I need arguments  
5 and explanations about easements and rights-of-way  
6 and those legal issues. So I am recommending that we  
7 do briefs. Let's go off the record and talk about  
8 that.

9 (Discussion held off the record.)

10 HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: Let's go back on  
11 the record. After discussions with parties and in  
12 light of the fact that there is at least one legal  
13 issue that needs to be addressed before I can give a  
14 recommendation to the Commission, I'm going to allow  
15 an opportunity for parties to file briefs. It's not  
16 required that a party files a brief; however, the  
17 dates that we have set forth will be, initial briefs  
18 will be due September 14th, 2007 with reply briefs  
19 due September 28th, 2007.

20 Specifically, I am requesting Ohio Edison  
21 to address the arguments concerning the right-of-way  
22 issue, the easement issue. I am requesting both  
23 parties to keep their comments to only those items  
24 that were mentioned on the record. No new

1 information should be put in these documents  
2 whatsoever. Since I've made that directive, I don't  
3 know that it will be necessary to file any types of  
4 motions to strike or what not, but that is totally up  
5 to the parties as to what they do or what they don't  
6 do, but I am very strictly going to adhere to that.  
7 The Commission will only consider information that  
8 was put on the record today. No new information will  
9 be considered, even though it's filed in that  
10 document.

11                 The process from here is I review the  
12 record. I'll review all the briefs, anything that's  
13 filed, anything that was said here today. I will  
14 draft a document called an Opinion and Order, a  
15 recommendation for the Commission to consider. The  
16 Commission meets once a week to consider  
17 recommendations. I don't know what the time frame on  
18 this is. Parties are free to call me and ask me, you  
19 know, where this is on my agenda.

20                 I can say I will try my hardest to get  
21 something done by the end of the year, but it's  
22 extremely busy, so I will try my hardest to do that,  
23 but feel free to give me a reasonable amount of time  
24 to try to draft something and then if you want to

1 call me, I can give you a better estimation.

2                   Once the Commission -- they typically  
3 meet a Wednesdays. Once they issue that order on  
4 that Wednesday, there is a 30-day statutory time  
5 frame for parties to file if they disagree with the  
6 Commission's opinion. It's a strict, strict time  
7 frame. The Commission does not and is not able to  
8 because it's statutory, is not able to waive that  
9 time frame. There is also an opportunity to reply.  
10 If there are any questions about process, time  
11 frames, when things are due procedurally, please call  
12 the Commission's legal department and we will put you  
13 in touch with an attorney that will be able to answer  
14 any of those questions for you on a procedural basis.

15                  MS. KOLICH: Do you have the number that  
16 should be called?

17                  HEARING EXAMINER PIRIK: The generic  
18 number of the Commission's legal department is  
19 (614)466-3016. Actually, that's the receptionist's  
20 desk on our floor. I would specifically ask -- you  
21 can specifically ask for me and I will be sure that  
22 you get to the right person, if I'm not able to  
23 answer the questions. As the Examiner on a case, I  
24 try to very strictly remove myself from that process,

1 other than to answer the questions, you know, how  
2 long it will be until the order will come out.

3 I would encourage the parties, even  
4 though we've gone through this very lengthy day, I  
5 will encourage the parties to try to settle this  
6 matter. I would encourage the parties to discuss  
7 with each other the possibility of settlement. I  
8 don't know what else to say about that, other than I  
9 strongly encourage the companies to continue to  
10 pursue settlement options in lieu of a Commission  
11 decision in this case.

12 That being said, is there anything else  
13 to come before me today? Hearing none, this case has  
14 been submitted on the record and we are adjourned.

15 (Thereupon, the proceedings concluded at  
16 7:30 p.m.)

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

**Get Help With...Safety****High-voltage transmission right-of-way restrictions**

Any encroachment will create a hazardous condition. Contact with or arcing of the energized conductors will cause property damage or serious bodily injury, including death. Other restrictions might apply for specific situations.

**Safety**

OSHA safe-working clearance from a person or any conductive object to the energized bare wires shall be maintained at all times.

500,000 volt (500-kV) lines ----- Minimum 19 feet, in any direction.

345,000 volt (345-kV) lines ----- Minimum 16 feet, in any direction.

230,000 volt (230-kV) lines ----- Minimum 13 feet, in any direction.

138,000 volt (138-kV) lines ----- Minimum 12 feet, in any direction.

115,000 volt (115-kV) lines ----- Minimum 11 feet, in any direction.

\* 23,000 volt (23-kV) to 69,000 volt (69-kV) lines --- Minimum 10 feet, in any direction.

Any driveways or parking areas near FirstEnergy structures (poles, towers, guys, etc.) shall include protective barriers. Parking within or adjacent to the right-of-way may induce an electric charge on the vehicle. Induced charges may also be imposed on objects such as fences, signs, or any other conductive object. An engineering firm should be consulted to provide a proper grounding system to prevent induced shock. Construction vehicles operating near transmission lines should also be properly grounded.

No explosive or combustible liquid, substance, or material shall be located within the right-of-way. Prohibited materials include but are not limited to: fuel, wood chips, mulch, brush, and tires.

**Vegetation**

All vegetation on or adjacent to the right-of-way shall be low-growing, compatible species (10-foot maximum mature height).

Shrubbery planted near FirstEnergy structures (poles, towers, guys, etc.) shall allow for working area at ground level. (No closer than 10 feet mature growth from the structure, in any direction).

Refer to further vegetation restrictions and guidelines in this section.

**Access**

No buildings, signs, billboards, swimming pools, decks, flag posts, sheds, barns, garages, playgrounds, fences, or other structures shall be located within the right-of-way.

Truck and equipment access to all transmission-line structures shall be provided at all times.

No septic systems or wells shall be located within the right-of-way.

**Lighting fixtures**

No lighting fixtures shall be located within the right-of-way without written approval from FirstEnergy.

**Grading/Excavation**

No excavations near Transmission structures (poles, towers, guys, etc.) shall occur without written approval from FirstEnergy.

No changes to grade elevations within the right-of-way shall be made without written approval from FirstEnergy.

**Other Activities**

Kite flying, model airplane flying, or similar activities shall be prohibited on or near FirstEnergy right-of-way.

To provide safe and reliable electric service for our customers, trees must be properly maintained and kept clear of electric power lines.


Trees are a leading cause of electrical power outages. In fact when trees and power lines touch it is a very dangerous situation and may even be deadly to anyone in close proximity.

To help maintain safe, reliable electric service, FirstEnergy's Vegetation Management Program controls trees, shrubs and brush growing around our facilities and equipment - including power lines. Every four years or so, trained, qualified line clearance experts visit your neighborhood looking for trees that may come in contact with electrical conductors.



If a tree needs pruning, the property owner is notified - either in person or through a door card - before work is started. An approximate time frame for completion of the work is noted on the card.

Immature trees and other forms of brush that potentially might come in contact with electric lines are removed as well. Vines growing on poles, guy wires or other equipment are cut near the ground. Low growing shrubs and ornamental trees are usually left undisturbed unless they hinder access to power lines or facilities.

**Why some trees are removed**

To provide adequate clearance around distribution power lines, some trees require more pruning than others. If a tree cannot be pruned effectively without significantly impacting its health or shape, it should be removed.

On transmission right-of-ways, clearing, rather than pruning, established trees from the right-of-way reflects our continuing commitment to all of our customers. So long as they do not obstruct safe access, some *slow growing* ~~old trees~~ are allowed to remain in the transmission corridor and provide a viable habitat for wildlife.



Tree care professionals under contract to FirstEnergy use "directional" pruning techniques. These techniques were developed by the National Arborist Association and are published by the American National Standards Institute (ANSI). Directional pruning is the accepted industry standard endorsed and promoted by the and the



Directional pruning removes entire branches and limbs back to the main trunk of the tree, where trees normally shed them. In this way, future tree growth is directed away from power lines and weakly attached re-growth is minimized. Directional pruning takes advantage of strong points in the tree's structure. Branches growing away from electric lines or facilities are usually left undisturbed. Directional pruning does not harm the tree's natural defense systems and other natural processes that protect the tree from decay and aggressive re-sprouting.

Before branches growing near electric lines are removed, pruning crews evaluate a tree's structure and growth patterns. Crews also consider the tree species, growth rates common to our service area, proximity to electric lines and the height and voltage of the lines.

**Benefits of directionally pruned trees**

Directionally pruned trees may look odd at first. In the long run, however, such trees are less susceptible to pest and decay problems and less likely to drop branches and cause damage during storms. In fact, compared to other methods such as topping, stubbing or pollarding, directional pruning is better for the protection of the tree's health.


Q. How will the trees be pruned?

- A. When tree pruning is prescribed a method called "Natural Directional Pruning" is used. This method is recommended by the International Society of Arboriculture and the National Arborists Association as the most desirable method. The amount pruned from the powerline depends upon the species of tree. Fast-growing trees such as maples, sycamores, willows and locusts must be pruned to achieve greater clearance distances than slower-growing species like spruce.

Based on a site inspection of the property at 2395 Ferguson Road in Mansfield, Ohio, the Ohio Edison Company has prescribed the removal of incompatible trees and brush located on our Leaside-Longview, 69kV transmission corridor in order to ensure its safe and reliable operation. As part of our Transmission Vegetation Management Program, I have instructed the Nelson Tree Company to remove this vegetation on or after February 26, 2007, according our general work practices and outlined on the attached work plan and enclosed brochure.

The prepared work plan is specific to your property and has been reviewed by a FirstEnergy Forestry Specialist to ensure that it will meet our clearance needs and is in accordance with the easement rights as recorded in volume 11 page 407 in the Richland County Recorders Office.

Even though our easements generally provide sufficient rights for the work that is planned, we want to be certain that you are aware of this work and acknowledge reviewing the work plan. Therefore, we are requesting that you sign the work plan and return it to our office by February 26, 2007. This will help us ensure that we have communicated the work plan to you. We will use the work plan to instruct our contractors, further ensuring your expectations and our expectations will be met. The Ohio Edison Company would prefer to have your signed acknowledgement prior to starting the work. 





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## **OBJECTIVE**

The objective of all work covered by these documents is to maintain safe, reliable and economical electric service, through effective line clearance and satisfactory public relations.

## **SCOPE OF SERVICES**

The right-of-way shall be free of all vegetative obstructions which interfere with the construction, operation, maintenance and repair of the electric facilities. The Contractor's work is described in detail and shall be completed in conformance with these specifications and all other provisions of the contract documents.

## **GENERAL POLICY STATEMENT**

This contract will be under the direct supervision of the contracting agency or its authorized representatives. FirstEnergy, at its sole discretion may make changes altering, adding to, or reducing the extent of the Work. Such changes shall be initiated by written order of FirstEnergy and Contractor shall submit the proposed cost or credit to FirstEnergy for any changes in the Work within 15 working days after receipt of the written order for FirstEnergy's approval. Such changes to the Work shall not proceed without FirstEnergy's approval.

The Contractor shall furnish competent supervision as required, and may designate a Supervisor as the Contractor's representative in all manners relating to the work to be performed. The Contractor shall have full responsibility for the work and good conduct of its employees. Directions and instructions shall be given to such employees by the Contractor or its representatives, and in no circumstances by FirstEnergy or its representatives.

A copy of the FirstEnergy Vegetation Management Specifications shall be given to every crew before starting work on any project and Contractor and the Contract Supervisor shall go over the FirstEnergy Vegetation Management Specification with every crew member prior to starting work under any project.

## **CONTRACTOR EMPLOYEE STAFFING**

The Contractor shall keep and be able to provide to FirstEnergy a list of employees working on FirstEnergy property including name, classification and home phone of all employees.

When projects have begun there will be sufficient personnel and equipment working on that project to maintain a presence at all times until the job is completed unless otherwise approved by the FirstEnergy Representative.

## **REPLACEMENT OF CONTRACTOR EMPLOYEES**

The Contractor shall employ personnel qualified to perform the work. If a FirstEnergy Representative determines Contractor's employee to be unsatisfactory, the Contractor shall replace this employee immediately. This does not require the Contractor to terminate the employment of any employee replaced.

## **IDENTIFICATION OF CONTRACTOR'S EMPLOYEES AND EQUIPMENT**

All Contractor personnel shall have photo identification that includes the employee name, company and the Contractor's office telephone number.

All vehicles utilized for work under this specification shall be clearly marked with Contractor's name or logo.

## **APPEARANCE OF CONTRACTOR'S EMPLOYEES AND EQUIPMENT**

It shall be Contractor's responsibility to provide employees which are neat and orderly. Contractor's equipment shall be maintained in a safe, clean and satisfactory working condition to keep downtime to a minimum. Charges shall cease for any labor and/or equipment that becomes unproductive by incapacitated equipment. Charges will resume when equipment is restored to its normal operating condition.

## **STORM EMERGENCY WORK**

Throughout the term of the contract it may become necessary for the Contractor to assist FirstEnergy in providing emergency tree clearing services. The Contractor shall provide telephone numbers in order to be reached on a 24-hour basis.

## **EMERGENCY CALL OUT**

In the event of an emergency, including but not limited to a storm, First Energy shall have the right to direct the Contractor to relocate crews working in the system to areas where they are needed, as a result of the emergency. All requests for line clearance tree crews to be released to another utility for storm work (or any other reason) shall be approved by FirstEnergy, prior to relocation of any crews.

When severe winds, ice storms, or other conditions require emergency assistance, the Contractor shall provide necessary labor and equipment within 45 minutes of receiving the call-out request from FirstEnergy. Charges for call-out work will begin when the crew reports to the FirstEnergy reporting location and will end when the crew is released by FirstEnergy. The Contractor shall maintain equipment, materials and supplies in preparedness for storm or emergency work and provide emergency assistance in the manner as set forth by FirstEnergy.

## **COMMUNICATION BETWEEN CONTRACTOR AND UTILITY**

All Contractor field supervisors shall provide a mobile communication system that will enable the FirstEnergy representative to contact them regarding both routine and emergency issues. This system shall be capable of transmitting and receiving communications.

## **CONTRACTOR COMPLIANCE**

The Contractor shall review assigned work in progress to ensure compliance with clearance requirements, work standards, planned work procedures, and efficient utilization of personnel, equipment, tools, and material. Contractor personnel shall be properly trained to perform the work proficiently and safely so as to comply with all

applicable laws, regulations, and local ordinances. Contractor shall adhere to the requirements and intent of this Specification which requires that the necessary forms and reports are properly prepared and processed.

### **COMPLAINT RESOLUTION**

The Contractor shall make every effort to contact the customer within 48 hours after a claim is turned in to FirstEnergy. The Contractor shall make every effort to satisfactorily settle, within a reasonable time any loss, damage, or liability after it arises or occurs for which the Contractor is responsible under these specifications. A written report of the claim and settlement shall be submitted within one week of settlement as directed to do so by a FirstEnergy representative. (Exhibit 1)

### **DAMAGES AND UNPLANNED OUTAGES CAUSED BY CONTRACTORS ACTIONS**

The Contractor will be billed by FirstEnergy for any unplanned outages resulting from the Contractor's actions, including the cost incurred by FirstEnergy to repair facilities that are damaged by the Contractor's negligent action.

The Contractor shall do all things necessary or expedient to properly protect any and all parallel, converging or intersecting lines, joint line poles, highways and any and all property of others from damage. In the event that damage occurs in the course of the work, the Contractor shall, at its own expense, restore any of all such damaged property immediately to as good a state as before such damage occurred. The Contractor shall report the outcome to FirstEnergy as directed to do so by a FirstEnergy representative.

In case of power line flash, interruption, or damage FirstEnergy shall be notified immediately. If a tree should contact a subtransmission or transmission line, the Contractor should not remove the tree from the conductor until directed to do so by a FirstEnergy representative.

## **DAMAGED ELECTRICAL EQUIPMENT NOT CAUSED BY CONTRACTOR'S ACTIONS**

Damaged electrical equipment (for example: broken crossarms, broken insulators, loose guy wires, leaking transformers, etc.), unusual vegetative conditions, or unsafe electrical conditions shall be reported to FirstEnergy.

## **TRAFFIC CONTROL**

The Contractor shall follow all appropriate Federal, State and Local traffic control laws and procedures while performing any work under this specification. The Contractor shall provide safe and effective work areas and warn, control, protect and expedite vehicular and pedestrian traffic.

## **GUARDS AND PROTECTIVE DEVICES**

The Contractor shall provide and keep the necessary guards and protective devices at locations where work is being performed to prevent accidents to the public or damage to the property of FirstEnergy or the Public

## **SAFETY PRECAUTIONS AND PROTECTION TO PROPERTY**

The Contractor shall plan and conduct the work to adequately safeguard all persons and property from injury.

The Contractor shall take the necessary precautions to render the Work secure in order to decrease the probability of accident from any cause and to avoid delay in completion of Work. The Contractor shall use proper safety appliances and provide first aid treatment and ambulance for emergency treatment of injuries and shall comply with all applicable Federal, State and Local Laws, rules and regulations with regard to the safe performance of the work.

## **SCHEDULING**

The Contractor shall schedule and report daily and annual work, coordinate and assign labor, equipment, tools and material required for efficient and timely completion of assigned work.

Work locations of all crews must be reported to the respective FirstEnergy office before 8:00am each day or as directed by an authorized FirstEnergy representative.

The scheduling of all projects is the Contractor's responsibility except in cases of critical need as determined by FirstEnergy. FirstEnergy may, at its discretion, require that specific sites be completed in order to maintain service reliability.

## **PROGRESSION OF WORK**

The Contractor shall work progressively along the main circuit feeder from the substation and shall complete all work in the circuit before starting work on another circuit.

## **LANDOWNER NOTIFICATION**

Except in outage situations or emergency restoration, the Contractor shall make reasonable attempts to notify all landowners or others having jurisdiction, prior to doing work, unless such notification has been attained and furnished to the Contractor in writing by FirstEnergy. Upon request the contractor shall provide proof of notification for removal and or application of a FirstEnergy approved herbicide or tree growth regulator to brush or trees that interfere or could interfere with conductors. For all work performed in Pennsylvania the Property Owner's Contact Form is to be used as proof of notification. (Exhibit 2)

## **PROCEDURE FOR REFUSALS AND SKIPS AND INTERRUPTION OF ELECTRIC SERVICE**

When work is refused or limited in such a manner as to not allow prescribed clearances in accordance with the FirstEnergy Vegetation Management Specification, the Contractor

shall not perform any work on the property until the refusal is resolved. The Contractor shall notify FirstEnergy in writing within ten working days.

FirstEnergy will attempt to resolve work refusals within 60 days or before Contractor relocates to another area (greater than 15 miles from reporting location). When work refusals are not resolved within 60 days or before Contractor relocates to another area (greater than 15 miles from reporting location) only travel time to complete refusal work will be paid on a Time and Material basis.

When consent for herbicide application is refused or when an area is intentionally skipped, the Contractor shall notify FirstEnergy promptly in writing.

The following information is to be provided for work refusals and herbicide refusals: 1) name and address of property owner refusing or owner of area skipped, 2) when and by whom the request was made including the nature of the request, 3) the reason for the refusal or skip, 4) the location of the refusal or skip in relation to FirstEnergy facilities, 5) a description of the type and amount of work which needs to be performed, 6) any other background information which may be of assistance in determining the location of the property owner, and 7) the nature of refusal or possible solutions. (Exhibit 3)

When it is necessary to interrupt electric service due to the hazardous condition of the vegetation the Contractor shall notify FirstEnergy promptly in writing. FirstEnergy will attempt to schedule the interruption of electric service within 60 days or before Contractor relocates to another area (greater than 15 miles from reporting location).

When the interruption of electric service is not scheduled within 60 days or before Contractor relocates to another area (greater than 15 miles from reporting location) only travel time to complete the work will be paid on a Time and Material basis.

#### **RECORD KEEPING**

The Contractor shall complete weekly timesheets supplied by FirstEnergy for all work completed during the previous week. The timesheets are to be submitted by the following Tuesday morning to the Regional Forestry Office. When filling out the weekly

timesheets, the Contractor shall refer to the Instructions for Filling out the FirstEnergy Weekly Timesheets. (Exhibit 4)

For recording purposes, a tree qualified for "tree pruned" status shall be defined as being a plant with a central trunk that is six inches (6") in diameter at breast height (dbh).

Breast height shall be 4.5 feet above ground level. Multiple trunks originating from the same common root crown shall be considered as one (1) tree. The trunk with the largest diameter will be considered to be the size of the tree.

### **DISTRIBUTION CLEARING ZONE**

The degree and type of tree clearance required for electric lines to function effectively is dependent on the voltage of the conductor, the type of tree, its growth rate and branching habit.

The distribution clearing zone is defined as a corridor measured at a distance of 15' (fifteen feet) on either side of the pole line or to the established large tree edge, whichever is greater in width. Emphasis is to be placed on controlling all incompatible vegetation within this clearing zone. All incompatible vegetation overhanging the clearing zone corridor shall be pruned back to the main stem. In cases where incompatible vegetation is not controlled, such as in maintained lawn areas, vegetation shall be pruned following directional pruning methods and as further defined in the current ANSI 300 Standards and Amendments. Pruning shall be done in such a manner to achieve a minimum of four years of clearance from FirstEnergy primary conductors based on tree species and growing conditions. In cases where four years of clearance is unattainable 12' (twelve feet) of clearance around primary conductors shall be achieved. (Refer to Procedure for Refusals and Skips page 9.)

Regardless of tree species, structures with fuses or disconnects must have all woody vegetation cleared within an eight foot (8') radius of the fuse/disconnect side of the structure.

When clearing vegetation for an individual circuit on a pole or structure, the

Contractor must clear for all FirstEnergy circuits on that pole or structure.

When pruning for overhang clearance, dead or structurally weak limbs which could fall or blow into the conductor shall be removed.

Priority trees located in the inspection zone, which is the area between 15' (fifteen feet) and 20' (twenty feet) from pole line, shall be maintained as directed by an authorized FirstEnergy representative, to mitigate obvious hazards to FirstEnergy facilities. Priority trees located outside the inspection zone shall be addressed as directed by the FirstEnergy representative.

### **SECONDARY VOLTAGES CLEARING ZONE**

The degree and type of tree clearance required for secondary voltages to function effectively is dependent on the construction of the conductor, the type of tree, its growth rate and branching habit.

Secondary circuits include all facilities between the transformer pole and the final pole on the line. Services are defined as the span from the last pole to the customer's service entrance.

#### Open Wire Secondary Conductors

Branches that are contacting bare open wire secondary conductors are to be pruned to achieve 4' (four feet) of clearance and/or eliminate mechanical strain, displacement or abrasion of the conductor. Parent branches and the main tree trunk may remain in the secondary clearing zone providing that the branches and the tree are structurally sound and not mechanically straining, displacing or in direct contact with the conductors.

#### Open Wire and Triplex Services and Triplex Secondary Conductors

Branches that are contacting open wire and triplex services and triplex secondary conductors that are creating mechanical strain, displacement, or abrasion shall be pruned to eliminate the strain, displacement or abrasion of the conductor. Large limbs in excess of 3-inches in diameter that are contacting the conductor and are causing mechanical strain, displacement or abrasion shall be reported in writing to the Forestry Representative.

#### Street Light Wire and Luminaries

This work is only required as directed by an authorized FirstEnergy representative. When required, branches contacting street light wires shall be pruned to provide at least one foot (1') of clearance. The clearing zone for street light luminaries extends five feet (5') from, and 360 degrees around the luminary horizontally. The area below the luminary shall be cleared in the manner of a cone with 45-degree sides.

#### **TRANSMISSION CLEARING ZONE**

The transmission clearing zone corridor will be identified and its information given to the Contractor prior to commencement of corridor maintenance activities. Emphasis is to be placed on controlling all incompatible vegetation within this clearing zone. All incompatible vegetation overhanging the clearing zone corridor shall be pruned back to the main stem. In cases where incompatible vegetation is not controlled, vegetation shall be pruned following directional pruning methods as defined in the ANSI 300 Standards and Amendments. Pruning for the transmission corridor is dependent on the voltage of the conductor and shall be done in such a manner to achieve a minimum of five years of clearance. In cases where five years of clearance is unattainable the following clearances shall apply:

- Transmission lines operating at 23kV – 69kV shall be cleared 15' (fifteen feet) from the conductor.
- Transmission lines operating at 115kV – 138kV shall be cleared 25' (twenty-five feet) from the conductor.
- Transmission lines operating above 138kV shall be cleared 30' (thirty feet) from the conductor.

#### **CLEARING ZONE CORRIDOR CLEARANCE FOR NEW DISTRIBUTION, SUBTRANSMISSION, OR TRANSMISSION CONDUCTORS**

On new construction, the clearing zone corridor shall be cleared to the width and under the conditions as stated on the detailed property and provision list furnished by FirstEnergy, or as otherwise instructed by FirstEnergy.

Trees dangerous to the conductor located on the clearing zone corridor and those adjacent to the clearing zone corridor shall be removed as directed by FirstEnergy.

All vegetation that is removed shall be cut as closely to the ground line as possible and shall not exceed a height of 3" (three inches) above the ground level unless otherwise directed by FirstEnergy.

Trees, brushwood, and slash shall be placed or disposed of as designated by the detailed property and provision list or as directed by FirstEnergy. Designated trees are to be left in lengths as long as possible, preferably whole tree lengths and shall be placed in neat piles with the tree lengths parallel to and along the edge of the clearing zone corridor and separated from other piles or wind rows.

Slash and brushwood generated from the clearing operation shall be placed in piles or windrows along the edge of the clearing zone corridor and separated from other piles unless otherwise directed by FirstEnergy. Any disposal of brush, wood, slash, logs or trees shall be in accordance with the laws and regulations of the appropriate governing authority.

### **TREE PRUNING METHODS**

All pruning, both initial and re-pruning, shall be done in accordance with modern arboriculture standards using the current ANSI 300 Standards and Amendments. Directional pruning is the preferred method of line clearance pruning. Whenever possible, the Contractor shall obtain clearance in this manner.

The drop crotch method will be used.

Pruning cuts are to be made back to the main stem; or to a lateral branch which is at least one third the diameter of the portion being removed. Limbs shall not be stubbed off at the

edge of the clearing limits. Pruning shall be done in a manner that will promote growth away from the power lines.

Dead branches and structurally weak limbs overhanging primary conductors shall be removed.

A minimum number of cuts shall be utilized to achieve required clearances.

Where practical, cuts should be primarily restricted to large diameter branches, made well within the crown. Shaping through the use of small diameter branches in the outer crown shall be avoided.

Cuts are to be made outside the branch bark ridge leaving no stub.

Precautions shall be taken to avoid stripping or tearing of bark when cutting limbs.

All severed twigs, branches and limbs shall be removed from pruned trees.

The practices known as "shearing", "stubbing", pollarding, or "rounding over" shall be avoided. Exceptions to drop crotch and directional pruning techniques shall be used only when directed to do so by the FirstEnergy representative.

### **TREE REMOVAL**

A woody plant six inches (6") in diameter at four and one-half feet (4.5') above the ground (dbh) will be considered for purposes of recording a tree. All growths less than this measurement will be considered brush.

Trees that are expected to be removed are those that are:

- Dead or defective which constitute a hazard to the conductor.
- Trees that have fast growth rates or trees that cannot be pruned for effective conductor clearance.

- Immature trees, generally classified as brush.
- Trees that are overhanging the primary conductors and are unhealthy or structurally weak.
- All priority trees located adjacent to the subtransmission and transmission clearing zone corridor that are leaning towards the conductors, are diseased, or are significantly encroaching the clearing zone corridor.
- All incompatible trees that are located within the clearing zone corridor.

All trees removed shall be cut flush with the ground line except where other treatment is designated by mutual agreement with property owners or public authorities. All live stumps (except conifers) shall be treated with a FirstEnergy approved herbicide.

#### **BRUSH REMOVAL**

Brush that is interfering with the conductor or may grow to such height that will interfere with the conductor shall be removed and or treated with a herbicide.

The Contractor shall remove all incompatible brush and shall not prune brush.

All tree and brush removals shall be cut as low as practical, no higher than three inches(3") from and parallel to the ground line.

Mowing of brush on the clearing zone corridor by use of a hydroaxe, brushhog, etc., is only permitted with prior approval of an authorized FirstEnergy representative. Mowing shall be performed as directed by FirstEnergy. Every effort shall be made, during mowing, to preserve patches of desirable vegetation.

#### **HERBICIDE BRUSH CONTROL**

The contractor shall use the proper and appropriate herbicide treatment in accordance with the FirstEnergy Guide to Vegetation Control with Herbicides. FirstEnergy expects all incompatible vegetation on the corridor be controlled, with the cut surface treatment being the minimum chosen treatment. In cases where a landowner will not allow at least

the minimum treatment, the contractor will consider this a refusal and provide the required refusal information to the FirstEnergy representative, as described in this specification.

Unless otherwise specified, the herbicides used shall be provided by FirstEnergy. All herbicides, shall be applied by the Contractor in accordance with the manufacture's label instructions.

The Contractor shall meet the following requirements when applying herbicides: Hold a current and appropriate pesticide application license from the appropriate State Department of Agriculture or its approved equivalent. Conform to all state, local and federal laws governing the herbicide used. Apply the herbicide under the direct supervision of a certified applicator and in accordance with the herbicide label instructions.

Herbicide applications are to be made in a manner assuring restriction of applied material to the target.

Areas of treated clearing zone showing evidence of incomplete coverage shall be re-treated immediately. It shall be the responsibility of the Contractor to inspect the treated clearing zone within one month of treatment and retreat those areas which have received incomplete application.

Areas requiring re-treatment will be determined by inspection during the year following the treatment and shall be done at no additional cost to FirstEnergy. Re-treatment will be with the original herbicide solution and will be applied according to the guideline in effect at the time of initial treatment. An authorized FirstEnergy representative will determine the necessity for re-treatment. The general criteria for determination of re-treatment is reduction of brush density and reduction in average height of brush.

All areas left untreated by the Contractor or that do not pass inspection shall be treated during the next treatment season at no cost to FirstEnergy.

All stems of treated brush that are within five (5') of distribution voltages and that are within fifteen feet (15') of the lines that are 23kV or above shall be cut. This shall apply to all herbicide treatments and to locations where the conductor height is less than one-hundred feet (100').

All areas that have conductor height of one-hundred feet (100') or more at center line must be approved by FirstEnergy before the area is left untreated.

In areas where conductor height is less than twenty-five feet (25'), all brush over five feet (5') must be treated and removed on 23kV and above.

The Contractor shall furnish all mixing and application equipment and shall be responsible for transporting, storing, handling, mixing and applying herbicides used in the immediate current operation. The Contractor shall supply the liquid carrier for the herbicides unless it is made available by FirstEnergy.

Empty herbicide containers shall be triple rinsed by the Contractor using the manufacturer's label instructions unless refillable/returnable storage containers are being used.

The contractor shall dispose of all empty herbicide containers by following all local, state and federal requirements.

#### **HERBICIDE APPLICATION METHODS & TREATMENT**

Herbicide application methods and treatment shall follow the guideline and be in accordance with the FirstEnergy Guide for Vegetation Control with Herbicides.

## **REGULATION OF TREE GROWTH**

Tree growth regulation shall be done in accordance with The Guide for Tree Growth Regulation found in The FirstEnergy Guide For Vegetation Control with Herbicides.

## **SPECIAL CONDITIONS**

On clearing zone corridors, a ten-foot-wide (10') access lane shall be cut and treated with herbicide, to allow travel from structure to structure, unless otherwise specified by FirstEnergy.

All brush and trees shall be cleared away from all structures at the ground line to a distance of three feet (3') unless otherwise specified by FirstEnergy.

When tree houses are observed in trees that require pruning for clearance from the conductors, the Contractor shall contact the property owner, explain the hazard, and offer to remove the tree house. If consent is given, the contractor shall remove the tree house at that time and prune the tree to the proper clearance distance or remove the tree if consent is given.

If the property owner refuses to allow the contractor to remove the tree house, the contractor shall prune the tree for line clearance at that time and notify FirstEnergy by phone. While clearing the tree from the conductor, the contractor shall obtain the property owner's name, address and phone number and reason for refusal. The contractor is also to notify the FirstEnergy representative promptly in writing, giving property owner's name, address, phone number and reason for refusal. A copy of the written notice is to be sent to the Claims Department, 76 South Main St. Akron, OH 44308.

Trees that are near conductors and show signs of being climbed or being used in children's play require special attention. The contractor observing this situation shall contact the property owner, explain the hazard, and offer to remove the tree. If the property owner consents to having the tree removed, it should be removed immediately.

If the property owner refuses to allow the tree to be removed, the contractor shall prune the tree for line clearance at that time, and notify the FirstEnergy representative by phone. While clearing the tree from the conductor, obtain the property owner's name, address and phone number, and reason for refusal. The contractor is also to notify the FirstEnergy representative promptly in writing, giving property owner's name, address, phone number, and reason for refusal. A copy of the written notice is to be sent to the Claims Department, 76 South Main Street, Akron, Ohio 44308.

Down and span guys are to be freed of weight, strain or displacement because of pressure caused by contact with tree parts, particularly from fast-growing trees. Vines growing on poles, towers, and guy wires will be cut at ground line and as high as can be safely reached from the ground. Stumps of vines will be treated using an approved cut surface treatment. Notification to the property owner shall be given prior to removing cultivated vines. All noxious vines should be removed, as directed by the designated FirstEnergy representative, from poles, towers, and guys and treated with an appropriate herbicide. If vines are entwined in electrical equipment, FirstEnergy shall be notified.

Communication conductors owned by FirstEnergy shall be maintained to the same clearance as secondary voltages, or as directed by the designated FirstEnergy representative. Allowance shall be made for wire sag and horizontal displacement due to extreme weather conditions and high winds.

Antennas, their supports or other objects attached to or in a tree such that their placement or maintenance has or would cause someone to be in close proximity to the conductor are to be reported promptly in writing to FirstEnergy.

#### **DEBRIS & WOOD DISPOSAL**

The Contractor shall leave the wood that is too large to be chipped in handling lengths for the property owner to cut into final firewood lengths. The Contractor shall communicate

this to the property owner at the time of notification. The Contractor shall document this notification as directed by FirstEnergy.

The Contractor shall satisfactorily dispose of all tree parts that are pruned or removed in a manner that is acceptable to the landowner and FirstEnergy. Accepted FirstEnergy methods of disposal include windrowing, chipping, lopping, and stacking. Lopping must be below knee height. Brush and logs must not be left in any waterway or within 15 feet of the centerline of any distribution line or more than 10 feet from the edge of a transmission line clearing zone. Debris from clearing zone areas that are adjacent to a road shall be kept on the edge of the clearing zone away from the edge of the road.

Debris that is generated from emergency work, where tree clearing is required, is to be left in a reasonably safe manner. Under these conditions an Emergency Work door card (form 441) is to be left for the property owner. Situations may occur that require debris generated by emergency work to be cleaned up, the work shall be done at the direction of FirstEnergy.

### **WORK SITE APPEARANCE UPON COMPLETION OF WORK**

Work sites shall be left in a condition equal to that which existed prior to the commencement of the Contractor's operations.

All Contractor-generated trash, including empty drinking cups, lunch papers, oil containers, cigarette butts etc. must be properly disposed of and not left on site.

### **WORK INSPECTION**

FirstEnergy has the responsibility for inspecting and approving work performed under these specifications. The exercise of this responsibility by FirstEnergy Forestry shall not lessen or relieve the Contractor from responsibility under this agreement. The purpose of this inspection is to ensure specification compliance. Payment will be withheld for areas

that cannot be satisfactorily cleared and will not be included in payment for the overall project.

An authorized FirstEnergy representative shall make a final inspection of the completed work, to insure all line clearance work has been completed in accordance with the line clearance specifications. FirstEnergy will inspect and communicate findings to the Contractor, in a form that is acceptable to both parties, within 30 days of receiving notification that work is completed.

Any work not done to FirstEnergy's satisfaction and acceptance shall be redone by the Contractor at no additional cost to FirstEnergy. All re-work done at the Contractor's expense shall not be counted as work units. The Contractor shall complete all rework within 30 days of receiving an inspection form and/or map from the FirstEnergy representative. (Exhibit 5) A penalty may be assessed for re-work that is not completed within 30 days of receiving notice from FirstEnergy.

A 10 percent penalty, calculated based on the percentage of work not completed, will be assessed to each project not completed on time.

## **DEFINITIONS**

**"As Required", "As Permitted", "Approved", Acceptable", "Satisfactory", or similar terms shall mean by or to FirstEnergy.**

**Bidder:** Party or parties submitting a proposal for the specified work.

**Brush:** Incompatible vegetation with trunk diameter less than six (6") in diameter at breast height.

**Contract:** the agreement, between FirstEnergy and Contractor, including the specification, insurance requirements, and any bond, together with any other material specifically incorporated therein.

**Contractor:** The party or parties entering into this contract with FirstEnergy for work.

**Contractor's Representative:** Contractor's employee who is directly responsible for the work.

**Control:** Means that all incompatible vegetation must be removed with a herbicide or be removed mechanically along with a herbicide application to eliminate the root system.

**Critical Tree:** Any tree identified as a cost effective candidate for removal, growing under or very near primary conductors, that will require a majority of the canopy to be affected in order to achieve four years clearance. Typically this is a cycle busting tree, which means it may interfere with the primary conductors within four years.

**Days:** Unless otherwise specified shall mean calendar days.

**FirstEnergy's Representative:** An authorized representative of the utility as specified in the Contract and in the "Terms and Conditions Labor Services-Forestry".

**Growth Regulator Application Work:** The application of chemicals used to retard the growth of trees and shrubs that may require climbing or the use of an aerial lift truck within 10 feet of energized facilities.

**Hazard Materials and Hazard Wastes:** Any material defined as such in any local, state or federal rule, regulation, law or code in the location in which the work is performed.

**Incompatible Vegetation:** Is defined as all vegetation that will grow tall enough to interfere with overhead electric facilities.

**Inspection Zone:** Is defined as area between 15' (fifteen feet) and 20'(twenty feet) from the pole line.

**Maintain:** Ensuring line reliability.

**Maintained Lawn Area:** Defined as an area where conductor(s) are located, typically residential, where the area is covered with grass that is kept closely mowed and/or areas where the landscape is being cultivated. Cultivated landscapes may include flower beds, hedge rows and landscape plantings. This does not include wooded, agricultural, industrial sites, or areas along county and state highways.

**Non-Maintained Lawn Area:** Defined as a rural setting where the area covered with grass is Not kept closely mowed and/or areas where the landscape is Not being cultivated. Includes wooded, agricultural, industrial sites and areas along county and state highways.

**Notification:** To inform and let landowners know that tree work will be performed on the property for power line clearance. Notification may take place using door card, personal contact, or other approved methods.

**Priority Tree(s):** Tree(s) located adjacent to the clearing zone corridor that are either dead, diseased, declining, severely leaning or significantly encroaching the clearing zone.

**Specification:** FirstEnergy's requirement including these general conditions, the specific conditions, and other documents specified under the contents page.

**Structurally Weak Limbs:** Is defined as limbs that have narrow angle of attachment, included bark, co-dominant stems of equal diameter or any other structural condition that may cause limbs to fail.


**Subcontractor:** The party or parties entering into a subcontract with Contractor or another subcontractor to perform a portion of the work covered by this contract.

**Work:** Labor, material, equipment, and all requirements specified.



**Figure 1. Street Light Luminaire Clearing Requirements**




**Figure 2. Natural Target Pruning**




Cut as close as possible to the branch collar. Do not injure or remove the collar. Injury or removal of the collar destroys a major defense system of the tree, and also leads to excessive sprouting. Do not leave stubs. Stubs are entry courts for rot-causing fungi. Do not paint the pruning cuts. Wound dressings do not stop rot.


**Figure 3. Removing Leader on Young Trees**



**Figure 4. No Set Angle for a Correct Cut**




**Figure 5. Primary Distribution Clearing Zone, 15 Feet**




**Figure 6a. Secondary Distribution Clearing Zone, 4 feet**



Triplex**




**Figure 7. Transmission Pruning Clearance 23 kV – 69kv, 15 feet**



**Figure 8. Transmission Pruning Clearance 115kv – 138kv, 25 feet**




**Figure 9. Transmission Pruning Clearance above 138kv, 30 feet**


**Figure 10. Example of Directional Pruning (2 diagrams)**

**Clearance Required – diagram 1**





**Appearance Of Tree Pruned For Clearance Using Directional Pruning - diagram 2**




**Figure 11. Example of Directional Pruning (2 diagrams)**



## **Vegetation Management Expertise**

**Stretching from the Ohio-Indiana border to the New Jersey shore, FirstEnergy's long-distance, high-voltage transmission lines provide electricity to distribution systems serving 4.4 million customers, and serve as vital links with neighboring utilities across the country.** A key component of maintaining safe and reliable service is keeping our transmission rights-of-way free of incompatible trees and vegetation. The removal of trees under our high-voltage lines rather than pruning serves to minimize the chance of any vegetation contact that might interfere with the transmission lines.

**Transmission rights-of-way corridor** widths vary according to the voltage of the lines and the easement rights that were negotiated with the property owners prior to the lines being constructed. The transmission line corridors are inspected twice a year. Every five years, or more frequently, if necessary, professional vegetation management crews apply vegetation management techniques to prevent trees within the rights-of-way from interfering with the transmission facilities. A variety of techniques – including power saws, EPA-approved herbicides, mechanical equipment, or a combination of methods – is evaluated and the best option is selected for each situation.

In addition, trees located beyond the edges of the rights-of-way that may potentially interfere with transmission facilities are evaluated regularly to determine whether pruning or removal is required. Trees that are unhealthy, leaning in the direction of the transmission lines, or significantly encroaching the right-of-way are pruned or removed as part of the preventative maintenance program.

**Proper vegetation management does not** always involve removal of all vegetation. Compatible vegetation that does not interfere with transmission facilities generally is not disturbed. A diverse mixture of grasses, low-growing shrubs and other ground cover preferred by birds, deer and small animals promotes a thriving wildlife habitat within many corridors. In this way, well-managed transmission rights-of-way can provide necessary food and cover for wildlife, while remaining compatible with safety and reliability concerns associated with our transmission facilities.


## Preventative Maintenance



**Transmission lines** are the electrical highways that connect North America. Keeping them in top shape is a critical part of our mission. So is accountability. We call it **Work of Integrity**.


Our **Preventative Maintenance Services** are where reliability is shown.

**Work on the lines.** Tree removal is the preferred method for maintaining mature trees taller than 10 feet.



**15 feet** is safe. taller than 10 feet within the corridor generally leads to tree limb leaning or significant structural damage to parts of the corridor.

**Electricity** is a service, not just a sale. Now, providing reliable power is more than a simple transmission corridor and voltage. It's about reliability.



**Weather** is one of the greatest enemies the reliability of transmission lines carrying 30,000 to 300,000 volts of electricity. From power plants to distribution substations throughout the country, we're always on the job.

## Low-Growth Vegetation

It's important to select the right tree or shrub before planting.

For more information on transmission

rights-of-way, you can avoid wasting time and money by calling your local utility company.

**Only shrubs that grow no taller than 10 feet at maturity should be planted within transmission rights-of-way. No trees or shrubs should be planted under or within 10 feet of utility poles or tower structures.**
