1	MS. STONEKING: The Public
2	Utilities Commission of Ohio has assigned for
3	public hearing at this time and place Case
4	Numbers 07-551-EL-AIR, Case 07-552-EL-ATA, Case
5	Number 07-553-EL-AAM, and Case Number
6	07-554-EL-UNC, being titled "In the Matter of
7	the Application of Ohio Edison Company, The
8	Cleveland Electric Illuminating Company and The
9	Toledo Edison Company for Authority to Increase
10	Rates for Distribution Service, Modify Certain
11	Accounting Practices and for Tariff Approvals."
12	As I mentioned before we went on the
13	record, my name is Janet Stoneking and I will be
14	conducting the hearing today. Also present
15	today from the Public Utilities Commission are
16	two representatives from the Commission's
17	Service Monitoring and Enforcement department.
18	The two gentlemen, Lee and Lawrence, standing in
19	the back. If you have any questions about your
20	utility bills other than the rate increase, you
21	may see them to ask questions.
22	We also have representatives from one
23	of the FirstEnergy companies, Ohio Edison, that
24	can address questions, other than the rate
25	increase, with us. And if you'll raise your

- 1 hands, okay, you can feel free to talk to them.
- 2 And we also have two folks from the
- 3 Office of Consumers' Counsel to also address
- 4 residential utility questions. And I believe --
- 5 are they in the room now? Yes. Over there.
- 6 (Indicating.)
- Okay. First before I explain a
- 8 little more about the case, I would like to take
- 9 appearances from the attorneys that are here
- 10 today. I'll start first with the FirstEnergy
- 11 counsel.
- 12 MR. KORKOSZ: Thank you, Your
- 13 Honor. On behalf of the Applicants, Arthur E.
- 14 Korkosz.
- MS. STONEKING: And from the Office
- of Ohio Consumers' Counsel?
- 17 MR. REESE: Thank you, Your
- 18 Honor. On behalf of the residential customers
- of the FirstEnergy companies and the Ohio
- 20 Consumers' Counsel, Janine Migden-Ostrander, I'm
- 21 Rick Reese, Assistant Consumers' Counsel.
- MS. STONEKING: Thank you. Now, in
- 23 addition to the Company and the Office of
- 24 Consumers' Counsel, there are other parties who
- 25 have intervened in the case. And just to let

- 1 you know, those interveners are the City of
- 2 Cleveland, the Citizens Coalition made up of
- 3 three groups, the Consumers for Fair Utility
- 4 Rates, the Empowerment Center of Greater
- 5 Cleveland and the Neighborhood Environmental
- 6 Coalition.
- 7 In addition, also intervening was the
- 8 Northwest Ohio Aggregation Coalition, the Kroger
- 9 Company, Constellation NewEnergy, Industrial
- 10 Energy Users-Ohio, the Ohio Energy Group, Ohio
- Home Builders, the Ohio Manufacturers'
- 12 Association, Ohio Partners for Affordable
- 13 Energy, Ohio Schools Council and Nucor Steel
- 14 Marion, Incorporated. Each of these parties
- 15 will represent their various constituents in
- 16 this distribution rate case.
- Now, the start of this rate case was
- on June 7th, 2007 when Ohio Edison Company, The
- 19 Toledo Edison Company and The Cleveland Electric
- 20 Illuminating Company, that I jointly will refer
- 21 to as FirstEnergy, filed applications with the
- 22 Public Utilities Commission to each increase
- 23 their electric distribution rates.
- Now, through each of the companies'
- 25 applications they're seeking a rate increase

- 1 that would generate the following additional
- 2 revenue for each distribution company. For
- 3 Cleveland Electric Illuminating, they're seeking
- 4 between 100 -- excuse me, approximately
- 5 \$108,598,923 of additional revenue; Ohio Edison
- 6 Company is requesting approximately \$160,762,886
- of additional revenue; and The Toledo Edison
- 8 Company is seeking approval for approximately
- 9 \$70,539,796 of additional revenue.
- Now, as part of the rate case, the
- 11 staff of the Public Utilities Commission
- inspects portions of the companies' plants and
- 13 equipment, they interviewed company personnel
- and government officials, they reviewed company
- 15 records and performed analysis of the data,
- 16 including financial information collected from
- 17 the companies.
- The Commission's staff then prepared
- 19 and filed a staff report for each of the
- 20 electric distribution utility companies on
- December 4th, 2007. The staff reports each
- 22 summarized the staffs' findings regarding each
- 23 company's financial situation and service
- 24 performance and sets forth the staffs'
- 25 recommendations in each case, which among other

- 1 things, recommends the following revenue
- 2 increase ranges for each company.
- For The Cleveland Electric
- 4 Illuminating Company, a recommendation of an
- 5 increase range between \$22,678,561 and
- 6 \$29,807,558; for the Ohio Edison Company, a
- 7 revenue increase range of between \$56,162,093
- 8 and \$64,701,390; and for The Toledo Edison
- 9 Company, an increase range between \$34,924,693
- 10 and \$37,823,225.
- Also in this case there will be 12
- 12 local public hearings. The first of which is
- 13 being held here today. The evidentiary hearing,
- 14 which is the other part of the case, began on
- 15 January 29th at the Commission offices in
- 16 Columbus. The purpose of the evidentiary
- 17 hearing was to allow the companies, the staff
- and each of the interveners to present witnesses
- 19 and evidence in support of each of their
- 20 positions in the case.
- The purpose of this afternoon's
- 22 hearing here is that the Commission wants to
- 23 hear the public comments regarding Ohio Edison's
- 24 rate increase. We won't be hearing from the
- 25 companies or the staff or the interveners this

- 1 afternoon at the hearing. This is your
- 2 opportunity to let the Commission know what you
- 3 think about the company's rate increase.
- When you arrived, you had the
- 5 opportunity to sign in at the door outside the
- 6 room. If you missed that opportunity, you can
- 7 still sign up to testify by simply approaching
- 8 one of the PUCO staff members at the back of the
- 9 room.
- 10 I will be taking witnesses in the
- order that they signed up. I will be calling
- 12 witnesses forward who wish to give statements
- 13 for the record. Now, before you begin your
- 14 statement, I will ask for your name and your
- 15 address. Your testimony will be considered a
- 16 part of the official record in this case and
- 17 will be reviewed by the Commissioners before
- 18 they make their final decisions.
- Before presenting your testimony, you
- 20 will be required to either swear or affirm that
- your testimony is the truth. And as you'll
- notice, we also have a court reporter here and
- 23 she will be recording your testimony for the
- 24 Commissioners to review.
- 25 Should you decide after we're calling

- 1 people to testify that you no longer want to
- 2 testify, then just let me know that you want to
- 3 pass. Once you've finished your testimony, or
- 4 if you're just in attendance to observe the
- 5 hearing, you may leave at any time that you
- 6 would like.
- 7 Do you have any questions about the
- 8 process that I've described? One last thing I
- 9 want to mention is if you've prepared a written
- 10 statement, it would be helpful if you could give
- 11 a copy of that written statement to the court
- 12 reporter as you finish your testimony.
- 13 The Commission appreciates you taking
- 14 the time to come today to make a public
- 15 statement. We would like for you to focus your
- 16 comments on the rate increase; and as I
- 17 mentioned before, if you have any questions
- 18 about your utility service, feel free to talk to
- 19 the Commission staff or the electric company
- staff or the OCC, they're here, about any other
- 21 issues.
- 22 At this time I will begin calling
- 23 witnesses forward. When you're called forward,
- 24 please state your name, first and last, and
- 25 spell it for the record and also provide your

- 1 address.
- 2 Robert Boxler? Yes, if you'll come
- 3 up here, please. Raise your right hand, please.
- 4 MR. BOXLER: (Witness complies
- 5 with the request.)
- 6 (Thereupon, Mr. Boxler was sworn by
- 7 Ms. Stoneking.)
- 8 MS. STONEKING: Thank you. You can
- 9 use the microphone there.
- 10 MR. BOXLER: My name is Robert
- 11 Boxler, R-o-b-e-r-t, B-o-x-l-e-r. I am here
- 12 representing the Akron Public Schools today. My
- 13 business address for the Akron Public Schools is
- 14 the Administration Building, 70 North Broadway,
- 15 Akron, Ohio 44308. I'm the program manager for
- 16 energy, environmental health and safety.
- We are appreciative of the support
- 18 FirstEnergy has provided in the past with the
- 19 Energy for Education Programs and we thank them
- 20 for their strong support. The dollars saved
- 21 from this program allowed us to keep money in
- 22 the classroom.
- I want to thank the Commission for
- 24 allowing me to explain how an electric increase
- 25 will impact the education of our children. As

- 1 you know, school funding is a major issue in our
- 2 state. Any increase in the cost of basic
- 3 services will take dollars away from other
- 4 budget items.
- In the Akron Public Schools, we've
- 6 been making budget cuts over the past six years
- 7 and have tried to make cuts that would not
- 8 impact the classroom. We are now at the point
- 9 that any budget increase will impact the
- 10 classroom. The Akron School District's average
- annual electric bill is \$3.8 million. The loss
- of the Energy for Education Program will
- 13 automatically increase our electrical cost 13.4
- 14 percent, or approximately \$509,000. Any
- 15 distribution or generation rate increase will
- 16 cost even more.
- 17 Ohio Schools Council analysis
- 18 concludes that the average distribution rate
- increase is approximately 40 to 50 percent.
- 20 This could cost our district an additional half
- 21 million dollars for a total annual increase of
- 22 \$1 million. \$1 million means the loss of 20
- 23 teachers.
- 24 Our School District cannot absorb
- 25 this level of increase. We hope the Commission

- 1 would be sympathetic towards schools and look at
- 2 us as a distinct group, worthy of the school
- 3 rates or other considerations which have been in
- 4 effect.
- 5 Thank you again for taking the time
- 6 to listen to our concerns about the rate
- 7 increase and its impact on the education of our
- 8 children.
- 9 MS. STONEKING: Thank you for your
- 10 testimony. Christopher Adams? Please raise
- 11 your right hand.
- 12 MR. ADAMS: (Witness complies
- 13 with the request.)
- 14 (Thereupon, Mr. Adams was sworn by
- Ms. Stoneking.)
- 16 MS. STONEKING: Thank you. Please
- go ahead.
- MR. ADAMS: Hello, everybody.
- 19 My name is Christopher Adams. I'm the
- 20 Treasurer/CFO of Mogadore Local School District.
- 21 The address is 1 South Cleveland Avenue,
- 22 Mogadore, Ohio 44260. I'm representing --
- 23 Akron's here representing the largest school
- 24 district in Summit County; I'm obviously
- 25 representing the smallest school district in

- 1 Summit County.
- I would like to thank the Commission,
- 3 too, for allowing me to explain the impact that
- 4 these rates are going to cause our small
- 5 district located right outside of Akron.
- As you know, school funding in Ohio
- 7 is currently in a -- is a mess, to be very
- 8 blunt. The Governor recently announced that the
- 9 Ohio Department of Education is going to have to
- 10 reduce its budget approximately a hundred
- 11 million dollars in the next few years, which
- 12 will invariably trickle down to every school
- 13 district in the State of Ohio.
- 14 The Ohio Schools Council, which
- 15 represents us, and our current electricity
- 16 program, estimates for Mogadore, which is --
- 17 Mogadore, again, is the smallest district with
- 18 approximately 900 students, it will impact us
- 19 approximately \$40,000, and this is on the low
- 20 side. I've been very conservative. \$40,000
- 21 doesn't sound like a lot, but for Mogadore that
- 22 represents curriculum books for approximately 4
- or 5 classrooms for next year.
- 24 Eighty-five percent of school budgets
- 25 represent wages and benefits. So basically

- 1 treasurers around the state can only control
- 2 approximately fifteen to twenty percent of our
- 3 budget. Everything else is contractual. So
- 4 fifteen to twenty percent of our budget, which
- 5 electric's involved in it, gas, professional
- 6 development, curriculum books, that's the
- 7 source. So we can basically control fifteen to
- 8 twenty percent of our budget. So \$40,000 for
- 9 our -- my small budget will have a dramatic
- 10 impact.
- 11 Like Akron, I do want to recognize
- the program that FirstEnergy and the school
- 13 districts have been involved in. It has been
- 14 very beneficial to all of our budgets and we
- 15 appreciate that.
- And on behalf of the Mogadore Local
- 17 School District and the taxpayers, we -- I am
- 18 requesting that -- that the Commission and
- 19 FirstEnergy look to continue the energy program
- 20 that's currently in place or to take into
- 21 consideration the funding for schools and maybe
- 22 make us a sidebar conversation so the impact
- 23 won't be so dramatic effective next year. Thank
- 24 you very much.
- 25 MS. STONEKING: Thank you for your

- 1 testimony. Effie Stewart? Would you please
- 2 raise your right hand?
- 3 MS. STEWART: (Witness complies
- 4 with the request.)
- 5 (Thereupon, Ms. Stewart was sworn by
- 6 Ms. Stoneking.)
- 7 MS. STONEKING: Thank you. Would
- 8 you please state and spell your name for the
- 9 record and then give your address?
- 10 MS. STEWART: Effic Stewart.
- 11 That's E-f-f-i-e, S-t-e-w-a-r-t. 562 Howe
- 12 Street, that's 44307 Akron.
- Good afternoon. I jotted down a few
- 14 things. As you well know what's happening in
- 15 the State of Ohio, and plus the Akron area, I'm
- 16 here to speak on behalf of the citizens; the
- ones that are able to speak and the ones that
- are not able to speak; the ones that's employed
- 19 and as well as the unemployed.
- The Akron area has one of the worst
- 21 foreclosure rates in the nation. This was
- 22 reported in the "Beacon Journal." After a 12
- 23 percent annual decline in area home sales for
- 24 all of Ohioans and due to foreclosure, I can,
- 25 too, understand why you need an increase with

- 1 the loss of the homes for utility purposes from
- 2 the electric company. Seeking a rate increase
- 3 to generate additional revenue for your company,
- 4 I can understand that, but what about the poor
- 5 and the middle class that is between a rock and
- 6 a hard place?
- 7 And I'm speaking for these families
- 8 that agree, these things have been affecting on
- 9 their guidelines that have been proposed, the
- 10 new guidelines that are stemming from two-family
- 11 incomes are the single families and single
- 12 class. That has put families in a category
- where they can't even get HEAP or to get help at
- 14 all. Some of these people are having hard times
- 15 with foreclosures and bankruptcies that's on the
- 16 rise.
- 17 People that's on Disability or Social
- 18 Security, they're having problems to decide
- 19 whether to get gas or electric or food. The
- 20 changes that have been made in the HEAP, where
- 21 you can no longer use Social Security, you have
- 22 to use that as an income, when you did get some
- 23 sort of guarantee that you wouldn't have to have
- 24 your electric cut off, now things have changed.
- Our resident population has changed.

- We've lost over 900,000 people in Akron or
- 2 Summit County and lost taxes in the city because
- 3 of foreclosures for homeowners as well. And in
- 4 the rural, metropolitan and the urban areas, we
- 5 have more people than ever going bankrupt.
- 6 Almost every other house in my
- 7 community is vacant. Police protection is slim.
- 8 Sewage and water is talking about being sold.
- 9 These are the things that we're going through in
- 10 the community and an increase at this time would
- 11 effect us drastically. Gas also is talking
- 12 about going up. The home gas, the heating.
- 13 I'm just here for you to really take
- 14 consideration of what I'm saying that how these
- 15 things are going to affect us drastically for
- 16 another increase.
- 17 FirstEnergy, you have delivered, but
- 18 right now an increase would be kind of
- 19 devastating with everything that's going on in
- Ohio. And I know you read the papers, you see
- 21 how things are going as well. So this is all I
- 22 have to say. Thank you.
- 23 MS. STONEKING: Thank you for your
- 24 testimony. Jim Iona? Would you please raise
- 25 your right hand?

1 MR. IONA: (Witness complies 2 with the request.) 3 (Thereupon, Mr. Iona was sworn by 4 Ms. Stoneking.) 5 MS. STONEKING: Thank you. Would 6 you please spell and state your name for the 7 court reporter? 8 MR. IONA: Sure. Jim Iona. 9 spelled I-o-n-a. My address is 70 West Avenue, 10 Tallmadge, Ohio 44278. I'm here today 11 representing the North Akron Chamber of 12 Commerce; the chamber of commerce that 13 represents over 285 businesses and individuals 14 in the greater Akron area. 15 And like many things, timing is 16 everything when I heard about this rate 17 proposal. In northeast Ohio we're facing a 18 recession, whether they admit it or not. 19 Money's tight. My background, I'm a real estate 20 broker. I am in individual's homes and 21 businesses on a daily basis and I hear the 22 complaints through my chamber and my business of 23 the dollar's stretched to the maximum. People 24 cannot afford an increase with utilities.

25

Business is down.

- 1 Like the lady so eloquently gave the
- 2 statistics, which I won't bore you with, but
- 3 everybody knows, foreclosure is a major problem.
- 4 The housing industry, people are overmortgaged.
- 5 Mortgages are coming due the next year with
- 6 interest only loans when these people are going
- 7 to have problems. There's going to be bailouts.
- 8 There's not a lot of money for an electric
- 9 increase at this time. I think it's pretty
- 10 clearcut and dry.
- I think they deserve one, but not in
- 12 the immediate year to year and a half like
- 13 they're asking for. But in a nutshell, my
- 14 concern is that with all the other costs, it's
- just going to put people in a deeper hole that
- we don't need to be in in northeastern Ohio.
- I don't know about other areas. All
- 18 I can speak to is this area. I'm a lifelong
- 19 resident. And with the gas company needing
- 20 increases, and like she said the sewer and water
- department and everything else, I think it's
- just going to be too much of a burden on
- 23 businesses that I'm concerned about and the
- 24 individuals.
- 25 Because if the individuals are taxed

- 1 to death and the utility cost is high, they're
- 2 not going to have money to spend at the local
- 3 businesses that we're representing. So it's a
- 4 catch 22.
- 5 I think this proposal is, like I
- 6 said, that -- we say location, location,
- 7 location in real estate when you're buying and
- 8 selling. Timing, timing, timing. This is the
- 9 wrong time for any type of an increase for
- 10 electric. Thank you.
- 11 MS. STONEKING: Thank you for your
- 12 testimony. Tom Weise?
- 13 (Thereupon, Mr. Weise was sworn by
- Ms. Stoneking.)
- MS. STONEKING: Please state and
- 16 spell your name for the record.
- 17 MR. WEISE: My name is Tom
- 18 Weise, W-e-i-s-e. I represent the Skipper Group
- 19 and various companies that it owns and operates,
- 20 specifically Tell Companies, Limited, 388 South
- 21 Main Street, here in Akron.
- The Skipper Group is a commercial
- 23 real estate developer. We own, primarily,
- office buildings in and around the Akron area,
- 25 Summit, Medina and Portage counties.

- 1 The reason I'm here today, we have
- 2 already been hit by a rate increase. We have
- 3 one significant building down the street, 388
- 4 South Main Street. It's known as the AES
- 5 building; the half-a million square foot former
- 6 BF Goodrich Tire Factory. We renovated that in
- 7 1995 into a Class A office building. It's a \$40
- 8 million asset, where at one time it was a
- 9 liability that the City of Akron could not get
- 10 rid of.
- One of the reasons that that building
- was successful is due to the fact that we took a
- 13 lot of steps to make that a green building.
- 14 Back in '95 we were ahead of the curve, so to
- speak, in terms of being environmentally
- 16 friendly; and we spent a lot of money putting in
- 17 a system, an all-electric system, to heat and
- 18 cool that building which takes advantage of a
- 19 special rate that Ohio Edison made available to
- 20 us called the Rate 22 Program.
- Essentially they sold us electricity
- 22 for four cents per kilowatt-hour for eight
- 23 months out of the year, during the heating
- 24 season. That system has been very efficient and
- 25 it's been very cost effective and Edison has

- 1 made money utilizing that system. They're
- 2 selling us power at profit during the season
- 3 which they sell less power. During the cooling
- 4 months when everybody's running their air
- 5 conditioners, we pay full price.
- 6 It was effective January 1st of '07
- 7 when Edison tripled our rate. They brought them
- 8 up to the full market rate that everyone else
- 9 pays downtown during the heating season. And
- 10 the only notice that we received, we had to go
- 11 back in the records and look, was a little blurb
- on one of our monthly invoices that said,
- 13 "Effective January 1 of '07 certain rate
- 14 programs," and it didn't specify what, but
- 15 "certain rate programs" were going to expire for
- 16 certain customers.
- Well, shame on us for not catching
- 18 that little blurb, but we didn't, and our rates
- 19 for new customers have tripled. And what I'm
- 20 specifically objecting to is how they define
- 21 "new customers." The building, which I
- 22 mentioned, is a multi-tenant building. I think
- 23 we have 15 or 16 different tenants. And Edison
- 24 considers every single tenant in that building
- 25 as a new -- as an individual customer. They do

- 1 each have their own set of meters.
- When I have a change in tenants, if a
- 3 tenant moves out -- Tenant A moves out and
- 4 Tenant B moves in, that is a new customer in
- 5 Edison's mind. And that new customer bears this
- 6 rate which is now three times higher than what
- 7 the previous tenant had.
- 8 Well, you can imagine what that does
- 9 to my ability to lease that space. That
- 10 building is unique. It has some unique
- 11 features, some of which make it attractive, some
- 12 of which make it not as attractive. And this
- 13 rate increase has made us -- put us at a
- 14 competitive disadvantage with the rest of our
- 15 peers in the downtown Akron area, and at the end
- of the day has taken a lot of equity out of our
- 17 pockets just because that money has to come
- 18 either from us or from our tenant and it makes
- 19 the building that much less attractive.
- The building has not been a stellar
- 21 financial performer. And this is -- the type of
- 22 system we have is not one we would have put in
- 23 had that rate program not been available. We
- 24 did so with the understanding that Edison would
- 25 make that available to us indefinitely and now

- 1 they are pulling that rug out from under us and
- 2 we have no recourse.
- I spent a lot of time on the phone
- 4 with their representatives, gotten absolutely
- 5 nowhere, and they say that their hands are tied.
- 6 They can't treat one customer different from
- 7 another. That may be true, but, like I say, my
- 8 only recourse or ability to protest is to come
- 9 to PUCO which I'm doing here today.
- 10 I don't know where all this fits in
- 11 with other proposed rate changes and increases
- 12 that you all here are contemplating. Edison has
- 13 told me that further changes are expected
- 14 January 1st of '09. Again, I don't know what
- 15 all that entails.
- And I should also mention that the
- 17 AES building is actually one of three that we
- have on this rate program, so we're being
- 19 affected greatly. They're creating a
- 20 disincentive for developers like us to create
- 21 green buildings, putting these systems in which
- 22 are very, very efficient, near a hundred percent
- efficient and really on the cutting edge in
- 24 terms of environmentally friendly, and I think
- 25 it's sad in a way.

- 1 The bottom line, our analysis is that
- 2 the reason we're doing this is because the price
- 3 of natural gas, as has been alluded to, has
- 4 risen so significantly, Edison doesn't have to
- 5 lower their rates to be competitive. They can
- 6 charge, what they will say is the full retail
- 7 price, the 10, 11, 12 cents per kilowatt-hour,
- 8 and know they're not going to lose customers to
- 9 Dominion East Ohio in this market.
- 10 I can't fault them. I know that
- 11 their objective is to make a profit, but at the
- same time we need to protect our financial
- interests and that of our tenants. And we're
- 14 trying to, with these couple of buildings, make
- sure that we maintain them as profitable assets.
- 16 Thank you.
- 17 **MS. STONEKING:** Thank you for your
- 18 testimony.
- 19 Is there anyone else that hasn't
- 20 signed up that would like to testify? Please
- 21 see the gentleman in the back and add your name
- 22 to the form, please. Edith Chase?
- 23 (Thereupon, Ms. Chase was sworn by
- 24 Ms. Stoneking.)
- 25 MS. STONEKING: Thank you. Please

- 1 state and then spell your name for the record
- 2 and your address.
- 3 MS. CHASE: Edith Chase,
- 4 C-h-a-s-e. 5731 Caranor Drive, that's Kent,
- 5 Ohio 44240. And I came just basically with a
- 6 question, because in the legal notice in the
- 7 newspaper the last item was "The appropriate
- 8 level of funding for customer energy efficiency
- 9 programs and demand side management programs."
- 10 And this is what I think is very
- 11 important in helping all of us control our
- 12 costs, and I would appreciate more information.
- 13 Thank you.
- 14 MS. STONEKING: Thank you.
- 15 Ms. Chase, there's someone here from the utility
- 16 company that will be able to talk to you. Okay?
- 17 MS. CHASE: Oh, good.
- 18 MS. STONEKING: Sir, did you sign
- 19 up?
- 20 MR. STEWART: Yes, I did.
- 21 MS. STONEKING: Okay. Would you
- 22 please come forward?
- 23 (Thereupon, Mr. Stewart was sworn by
- 24 Ms. Stoneking
- 25 MS. STONEKING: Thank you. Please

- state and spell your name for the record and
- 2 your address.
- 3 MR. STEWART: Thank you. Good
- 4 evening, also. My name is Larry C. Stewart,
- 5 L-a-r-r-y, C, S-t-e-w-a-r-t. I live at 562
- 6 Howe, H-o-w-e, Street, Akron 44307. I just want
- 7 to thank the utility companies that have their
- 8 representatives here to listen at the consumers'
- 9 needs and the consumers' desires.
- Now, as it's been stated before, and
- 11 I don't want to go repeating something that
- 12 somebody else has said, but, you know, sometimes
- just hearing from John Q. Public maybe corporate
- 14 America might get a better sense of what's being
- 15 said.
- I don't live on the hill. I live
- 17 under the hill. And, you know, things grow from
- 18 the bottom up, not from the top down. But
- 19 anyways, we do have a problem here in this
- 20 country. And as consumers -- now, I'm --
- 21 somebody said earlier about being disabled,
- 22 retirement -- retired, well, that fits me.
- 23 And when I -- that hit me, I was
- 24 thrown into the ranks of the unemployable, but I
- 25 am maintaining the best that I can with what

- 1 I've been given. And I hope that all the
- 2 representatives here from these various
- 3 companies, which is doing a real good job at
- 4 providing this city and county and the state,
- 5 maybe country with valuable resources, gas,
- 6 natural gas, electricity and all of the things
- 7 that we need, I really appreciate that.
- 8 And with that being said, I hope that
- 9 our concerns as citizens which -- it seems like
- 10 every day we're getting buried and there's no
- 11 resurrection for us. And I hope that what we're
- 12 saying will be taken under at least
- consideration by these -- by corporate America
- 14 that's being represented here. Because we are
- 15 facing a situation that -- I don't know, maybe
- 16 the next year, maybe the next ten years or maybe
- 17 never, but we're all facing something. Whether
- 18 it's the food prices, we go to the grocery
- 19 store, what we was paying for milk last year has
- 20 almost tripled.
- Now, I understand that everything
- that eats corn is going up. And I'm going to
- 23 try to say this in a nice way. Corn liquor is
- 24 what they're using now as an alternative. I
- 25 think they call it flex fuel for automobiles.

- 1 But everybody can't trade up to those kind of
- 2 cars.
- 3 And we're all struggling in this
- 4 city. To sum it all up in a nutshell, we're all
- 5 in this together. Whether we are poor, in the
- 6 middle or at the very bottom. And I have been
- 7 somewhere in the good middle, but like so many
- 8 of us I find myself in a position that I don't
- 9 feel comfortable with.
- But so many of us is down here and we
- got to buy this electricity, the gas and
- 12 everything else that's being provided to us.
- 13 And I just wanted to thank, again, the
- 14 representatives from these various companies
- which is part of corporate America for giving us
- 16 a chance to speak on what we're feeling about
- what's effecting us before you make your final
- 18 decision. Thank you.
- 19 MS. STONEKING: Thank you for your
- 20 testimony.
- 21 MR. STEWART: You're welcome.
- 22 **MS. STONEKING:** Is there anyone
- 23 else here that would like to testify that's not
- 24 spoken?
- Okay. Let's go off the record for a
