Thank you for your concerns regarding the proposed American Transmission Systems, Inc. / Geauga County -138kV Transmission Line Supply Project. As with the consideration of all transmission projects, local and surrounding businesses, residents, municipalities and officials are invited to discuss the present and long-term economical and environmental feasibility of such projects.

Please be advised, the public and adjudicatory hearings have been postponed. This postponement is to allow both the Applicant and the Power Siting Staff an opportunity to review the impacts of the Maple Highlands Bike Trail right-of-way and utilization of an abandoned railroad corridor through the City of Chardon as a viable route selection for the proposed transmission line.

Once investigations of this route consideration are complete and the hearings re-open, the applicant will publish appropriate notice in local newspapers of general circulation in the area. Interested persons may testify at only one of the two local public hearings.

As we continue to appreciate all input into the siting process, your document will be shared with members of the Board and placed in the official docket for the case. Dear Dr. Schriber:

I am writing you to state my strong objection to the Geauga County 138kV Transmission Line Supply Project, PUCO case number 07-0171-EL-BTX, as proposed by FirstEnergy Corporation.

In the application, FirstEnergy describes two proposed routes. Each route consists of a sixty foot wide, clear cut corridor through and over everything in its path. The preferred route is an over-land route near SR528 that bisects prime agricultural land, outdoor sports areas, pristine wetlands and forests. The preferred route will require clearing 62.9 acres of forest, crossing 58 streams and impacting 55.1 acres of wetlands. The alternate route follows Clay Street, plowing through the front yards, or requiring demolition of, beautiful residential properties. The alternate route will require crossing 182 properties, passing within 100 feet of 43 residential family homes and require demolition of six residential homes. Both routes impact the habitat of wild turkey and snowshoe hares, two species that conservation organizations such as the National Wild Turkey Federation and Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) have invested significant time and money to re-establish in this region.

Both routes entail creation of a brand new utility corridor where none presently exists. Creation of a new utility corridor will cause irreparable damage to the properties and farms that constitute the rural eastern Geauga County community. Usable pre-existing civil corridors exist that are able to accommodate a new transmission line to serve the intended area. For these reasons, neither proposed route is acceptable. Once land is gone, it's gone.

I am personally asking you to help save the properties, wetlands, fields, habitats, forests and homelands from the unnecessary intrusion or destruction that this project proposes. I am urging you to support the use of a suitable existing utility corridor, such as State Route 11 or the B&O railroad grade, to bring the much needed power to the southern portion of Geauga County. Please keep the countryside of North Eastern Geauga County green.

I appreciate the opportunity to express my deep opposition to the Geauga County 138kV Transmission Line Supply Project as proposed by FirstEnergy Corporation.

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
