- 1 MR. FARKAS: I would like to
- 2 begin the hearing now.
- 3 The Public Utilities Commission of
- 4 Ohio has assigned for public hearing at this
- 5 time and place Case Numbers 07-829-GA-AIR,
- 6 07-830-GA-ALT, 07-831-GA-AAM, 08-169-GA-ALT and
- 7 06-1453-GA-UNC, which are captioned, "In the
- 8 Matter of the Application of the East Ohio Gas
- 9 Company, dba Dominion East Ohio, for Authority
- 10 to Increase Rates for its Gas Distribution
- 11 Service and Other Related Matters.
- 12 My name is Scott Farkas. I'm an
- 13 attorney examiner with the Commission's legal
- 14 department and I will be conducting this
- 15 hearing. There are also Commission personnel
- 16 representing our Service Monitoring and
- 17 Enforcement Division up at the front of the --
- or the back of the room. These staff members
- 19 are available if you have a question concerning
- 20 a utility matter other than the applications
- 21 which are the focus of today's -- I'm sorry,
- 22 tonight's hearing.
- 23 At this time I'll take appearances on
- 24 behalf of the parties. On behalf of the
- 25 Company?

- 1 MR. WHITT: Your Honor, from
- 2 the Jones Day law firm, Mark Whitt, 325 John
- 3 H. McConnell Boulevard, Columbus, Ohio 43215.
- 4 MR. FARKAS: And on behalf of
- 5 the Consumers' Councel?
- 6 MR. SERIO: Thank you, Your
- 7 Honor. On behalf of the residential customers
- 8 of East Ohio Gas Company, Janine L.
- 9 Migden-Ostrander, the Consumers' Counsel, my
- 10 name is Joseph Serio. OCC is a state agency
- 11 that is, by statute, set up to represent rate
- 12 payers in proceedings like this hearing tonight.
- 13 MR. FARKAS: Thank you.
- 14 Dominion filed the rate case proceedings
- 15 application on August 30th, 2007. The local
- 16 public hearing schedule in this case is one
- 17 aspect of the process in this case. An
- 18 evidentiary hearing is also scheduled to
- 19 commence tomorrow at the Commission offices in
- 20 Columbus, Ohio.
- Other local hearings have been held
- 22 and will be held in this case. We have had a
- 23 hearing in Youngstown, Lima, this afternoon in
- 24 Akron, this evening in Canton. On August 4th,
- 25 Monday, we'll have a 12:30 hearing in Cleveland

- 1 and a 7:00 hearing in Geneva. On Tuesday,
- 2 August 5th at 1:30 we'll have a hearing in
- 3 Marietta. On Monday, August 18th at 6:00 there
- 4 will be hearing in Garfield Heights. On
- 5 Tuesday, August 19th at 6:00 we'll have a
- 6 hearing in Youngstown. And on Thursday, August
- 7 21st at 6:00 we'll have a hearing in Akron.
- 8 When you arrived you were offered the
- 9 opportunity to sign up to testify. If you
- 10 missed the opportunity, you may still add your
- 11 name to the list at the back of the room. At
- 12 this time I'll begin calling witnesses forward
- 13 who wish to give statements for the record.
- 14 Before you begin your statement, I'll
- 15 ask you your name and address. Your testimony
- will be considered part of the official record
- 17 of this case which will be reviewed by the
- 18 Commissioners before they make their final
- 19 decision.
- 20 Before presenting sworn testimony,
- 21 you will be required to take an oath or
- 22 affirmation stating that what you are about to
- 23 say is the truth. Attorneys for the Company and
- 24 OCC will be allowed to ask you questions about
- your statement while you are under oath.

- 1 Should you decide that you do not
- 2 want to testify when I call your name, you can
- 3 merely pass to the next witness. Once you have
- 4 finished testifying, or if you are just in
- 5 attendance to observe the hearing, you may leave
- 6 any time you wish.
- 7 Since tonight's hearing is being
- 8 transcribed, I would ask that if you plan to
- 9 testify, please speak plainly and clearly so
- 10 that the court reporter can accurately reflect
- 11 your comments on the record. If you have a
- 12 prepared written statement, it will be helpful
- 13 for you to provide a copy to the court reporter.
- 14 And there's a podium where I would
- 15 like -- since there's a microphone and it will
- 16 allow everyone, myself and the court reporter,
- 17 to hear your comments, I would ask you to speak
- 18 from there.
- 19 Again, I appreciate your
- 20 participation in tonight's hearing and I want
- 21 everyone who wishes to make a public statement
- 22 to be able to do so.
- 23 At this time I will begin calling the
- 24 witnesses. Gene Wendling? Would you raise your
- 25 right hand? Raise your right -- right hand.

1	Thank you.
2	(Thereupon, Mr. Wendling was sworn.)
3	MR. FARKAS: Thank you. State
4	your name and then your address.
5	MR. WENDLING: Gene Wendling.
6	MR. FARKAS: Could you spell
7	your last name, please? Spell your name?
8	MR. WENDLING: W-e-n-d-l-i-n-g.
9	MR. FARKAS: Thank you.
10	THE REPORTER: And your address?
11	MR. WENDLING: Gene. Address?
12	It's 430 Aultman Northwest.
13	MR. FARKAS: Okay. You may
14	proceed.
15	MR. WENDLING: Now, what I want to
16	know is the people that's on retirement, and I'm
17	paying 121 and they said they're going to raise
18	it in December, how am I going to make those
19	bills that comes up without going into debt?
20	And people in my apartment is going
21	to a different company, so I'm either going to
22	have to go with another company or move out. I
23	spoke my peace.
24	MR. FARKAS: Okay. Does the
25	Company or the OCC have any questions?

1	MR.	WHITT:	No	questions.

- 2 MR. SERIO: No.
- 3 MR. FARKAS: Okay. Thank you.
- 4 Kathi Cruz? Raise your right hand.
- 5 (Thereupon, Ms. Cruz was sworn.)
- 6 MR. FARKAS: Thank you. Please
- 7 state your name and address.
- 8 MS. CRUZ: My name is Kathi
- 9 Cruz. I'm the assistant director at the Stark
- 10 County Community Action Agency HEAP department.
- 11 The address of the office is 201 5th Street
- 12 Northwest in Canton.
- 13 I'm basically here to -- on behalf of
- 14 our clients who are all low income households.
- 15 We serviced last year in the winter crisis
- 16 program some 5,670 households. Out of that
- 17 5,670, 2,769 of those households were Dominion
- 18 clients, customers. We as an agency gave and
- 19 paid Dominion some \$324,134 for these clients.
- Some of them are on PIPP, but we have
- 21 seen an increase with these clients who are
- 22 trying to work, trying to stay either on budgets
- 23 or different types of programs other than PIPP
- 24 because possibly they have two -- like a
- 25 two-income household basically making probably

- 1 minimum wage for both wages and their PIPP
- 2 amounts, if they actually went on PIPP, would be
- 3 a little higher than budget things.
- 4 This type of increase will
- 5 drastically affect their households. It
- 6 indirectly it will affect our PIPP households as
- 7 well, but basically we're seeing more and more
- 8 people lose their jobs, lose their homes, have
- 9 to go into places and started all over again and
- 10 an increase like this would be devastating to
- 11 them.
- There's no way for people to take
- 13 these kinds of increases and then in turn still
- 14 be energy efficient. It eats up any savings
- 15 that they have trying to do that type of -- that
- 16 they may have put back to try and be energy
- 17 efficient such as trying to make their household
- 18 green as it were.
- 19 And to increase something like this,
- 20 it's really difficult for these low income
- 21 families. And we're seeing more and more of
- 22 them. We're going to see many more this
- 23 particular season as well.
- 24 And unfortunately I'm -- I believe
- 25 that our assistance will decrease. We do not

- 1 have specific numbers about what our budget will
- 2 be this year, but it will not be as it was last
- 3 year. We helped an awful lot of people and we
- 4 want to be able to do that this year, but
- 5 raising something like this is very difficult
- 6 for these families. They're barely getting by
- 7 now.
- 8 And when I sit in on -- day in and
- 9 day out on a half hour basis and I meet people
- 10 who have to make decisions literally whether
- 11 they're going to eat or buy medication or pay
- 12 their gas bill, it's very hard. It's very hard
- 13 to justify any type of increase they get.
- 14 And the people on fixed incomes, when
- 15 they get an increase, it's a matter of, you
- 16 know, maybe 14, \$15 a year. Food alone will eat
- 17 up that increase. So anything that -- this type
- of increase, it's going to be very difficult for
- 19 our low income families.
- 20 MR. FARKAS: Okay. Thank you.
- 21 Do you have any questions?
- MR. WHITT: No questions.
- MR. SERIO: No questions.
- MS. CRUZ: I'm sorry.
- 25 MR. FARKAS: That's okay. Thank

- 1 you. Richard Hiles?
- 2 MR. HILES: May I pass and
- 3 listen to other people speak and then maybe come
- 4 back later?
- 5 MR. FARKAS: Yes.
- 6 MR. HILES: Thank you.
- 7 MR. FARKAS: Bill Dougherty?
- 8 MR. DOUGHERTY: "Dougherty."
- 9 MR. FARKAS: "Dougherty."
- 10 Excuse me. Raise your right hand.
- 11 (Thereupon, Mr. Dougherty was sworn.)
- 12 MR. FARKAS: Thank you. Please
- 13 state your name and your address.
- MR. DOUGHERTY: Bill Dougherty,
- 15 5689 Eastview Street Northeast, Louisville, Ohio
- 16 44641.
- 17 I think you need to be very careful
- 18 before you approve any increases to our gas
- 19 bill. Over the years we have been weaned off of
- 20 coal and now we're at the mercy of the gas, oil
- 21 and electric companies. You at the PUCO are the
- 22 only ones to check their profits and regulate
- 23 public utilities.
- We made a big mistake when we
- 25 deregulated the natural gas industry. Over the

- 1 years I have never seen my gas bill go down. We
- 2 were told when we were going to deregulate we
- 3 were going to have a wonderful situation. We
- 4 were going to get cheap gas. We were going to
- 5 go all over the country and be able to get gas.
- 6 That didn't happen. We don't have cheap gas in
- 7 Ohio.
- Now, the Company, East Ohio Gas, can
- 9 hide its profits as service charges,
- 10 transportation charges. Why should the customer
- 11 have to pay for them to update their equipment
- 12 so that they can make a profit? Don't they have
- 13 the money out of their service charges to
- 14 replace old gas lines and update equipment?
- When we were charged on our bills for
- 16 the upkeep, is this not poor management? The
- 17 CEOs or the stockholders want it all for
- 18 themselves. The customer, they have us with no
- 19 place to go.
- I'm for a fair profit, but not
- 21 gouging the customer because they can. How long
- 22 can we go on with increases in gasoline, taxes,
- 23 school taxes? It seems like there's no end. I
- 24 have to live on a budget. Where can I go and
- 25 ask for more income? I would like to have a new

- 1 car every few years, but I can't afford it. We
- 2 consumers are told the prices are going to go
- 3 up, but does our income go up? No. There is a
- 4 saying in the Navy. People in hell want ice
- 5 water, but do they get it? Hell, no.
- I have a couple questions to ask.
- 7 What do they use the money for repair of gas
- 8 lines? Is this coming out of the service that
- 9 we pay?
- 10 And what are the charges for
- 11 transportation to Gasco? Is that all profit?
- 12 And how much profit did Dominion East
- 13 Ohio make last year and what were the dividends?
- 14 And did they pay their CEO a bonus? Thank you.
- 15 MR. FARKAS: Thank you. Do you
- 16 have any questions?
- 17 MR. WHITT: No questions.
- 18 MR. FARKAS: Any questions?
- 19 MR. SERIO: No, Your Honor.
- 20 MR. FARKAS: Rodney Reasonover?
- 21 Raise your right hand.
- 22 (Thereupon, Mr. Reasonover was
- 23 sworn.)
- MR. FARKAS: Okay. State your
- 25 name and address.

- 1 MR. REASONOVER: My name is Rodney
- 2 Reasonover. My last name is spelled
- 3 R-e-a-s-o-n-o-v-e-r. I'm the director of Stark
- 4 County Community Action Agency. One of my staff
- 5 members here made some comments a little bit
- 6 earlier about the number of low income clients
- 7 that we have assisted during the last year, and
- 8 I'm here to speak on behalf of low income and
- 9 moderate income families in Stark County.
- 10 The numbers -- you know, I'm not sure
- of the exact numbers, but I know they range well
- 12 over 50,000 of residents in the county. And I
- 13 want to talk about three different areas. One
- 14 is what I think is the impact or the effect, the
- issues of the flat rate versus the actual rate,
- and also the issue of energy efficiency.
- 17 With respect to the effect of these
- increases, and I'm sure you'll hear this during
- 19 the course of the testimony here this evening,
- 20 that effect on low and moderate income families,
- 21 I think, is -- will be in disproportion in terms
- of their abilities to pay.
- We've heard presentations a little
- 24 bit earlier about stagnant incomes and increased
- 25 costs in terms of corporations, and in this

- 1 case, Dominion East Ohio Gas' request for an
- 2 increase. I just think that it will have a
- 3 disproportionate effect on low income consumers
- 4 and their abilities of increased costs.
- 5 That rolls me into the flat rate
- 6 versus the actual rate of this proposal. I do
- 7 believe that the actual rate is more equitably
- 8 distributed for low income persons to meet,
- 9 moderate income families to meet, in terms of
- 10 their consumption of gas.
- I would encourage consideration to
- that point of looking at and examining the
- 13 actual rate versus the flat rate, for lack of a
- 14 word, flat rate charge to the expense.
- 15 Energy efficiency. We operate a --
- 16 what's called a Home Weatherization Assistance
- 17 Program. It provides energy conservation
- 18 services to low and moderate income families.
- 19 Over the course of the last few years, we've
- 20 seen obviously an increase in the demand for
- 21 that level of service and continue -- continue
- 22 to meet the projected numbers that we have as
- 23 production levels for the county here, which
- 24 this year is 152 units.
- I will support and ask the PUCO to

- 1 support some level of funding and financing for
- 2 energy efficiency measures. That goes hand in
- 3 hand, I think, with conserving, or the ability
- 4 to conserve, or reducing consumption of utility,
- 5 gas in particular, costs here in Stark County.
- 6 So I would, again, ask for
- 7 consideration to support the actual fee for the
- 8 transmission and the costs related to the
- 9 proposal, and also consideration for energy
- 10 efficiency programs to be funded and financed
- 11 through any type of structured fee from the
- 12 utility companies. Thank you.
- 13 MR. FARKAS: Okay. Any
- 14 questions?
- MR. WHITT: No questions.
- MR. FARKAS: Any questions?
- 17 MR. SERIO: No questions, Your
- 18 Honor.
- 19 MR. FARKAS: Thank you. Dave
- 20 Croxton? Raise your right hand.
- 21 (Thereupon, Mr. Croxton was sworn.)
- 22 MR. FARKAS: Thank you. State
- 23 your name and address.
- 24 MR. CROXTON: It's Dave Croxton,
- 25 C-r-o-x-t-o-n, 6144 Woodcrest Northeast, Canton,

- 1 Ohio 44721.
- 2 My first disappointment is that this
- 3 room isn't full of about 3,000 people, because I
- 4 know come January there's going to be people
- 5 crying everywhere why their gas bill went up a
- 6 hundred bucks or whatever.
- 7 My other situation is if they would
- 8 get rid of one CEO of that company we probably
- 9 wouldn't even have to be there tonight. If you
- 10 look at their wages, it's unbelievable. The
- 11 stock shares they get and the profits and it
- 12 just goes on and on.
- 13 And it seems like every time they ask
- 14 for a rate increase you guys give it to them.
- 15 I'm not sure of the numbers, but it sure seems
- 16 like they always get their increases. And I
- 17 know compared to the electric company, it
- doesn't seem like they get increases nothing
- 19 like Dominion does.
- 20 And the other thing is I'm wondering
- 21 how much downsizing have they tried to do in the
- 22 company itself to lower some of their costs, or
- 23 is it just the fact that it's like a monopoly,
- 24 they can just -- any time they want money
- 25 there's nothing we can do about it.

- 1 There's only one person that can stop
- 2 you -- stop them is the PUCO. That's things
- 3 that -- my biggest concern is that no one ever
- 4 stops them. And I'm not sure how much --
- 5 between foreclosures and gasoline prices, I'm
- 6 just not sure how much more the average
- 7 household can bear. It's not the poor or the
- 8 rich. I think it's affecting everybody big time
- 9 right now.
- I think it's about time people really
- 11 stand up and do whatever they have to do stop
- 12 this gouging from the gas pumps to now it's
- 13 Dominion. Who will it be next? That's all I
- 14 got to say.
- 15 MR. FARKAS: Thank you. Do you
- 16 have any questions?
- 17 MR. WHITT: No questions.
- 18 MR. SERIO: No questions.
- 19 MR. FARKAS: Ron Kuntz? Raise
- 20 your right hand.
- 21 (Thereupon, Mr. Kuntz was sworn.)
- 22 MR. FARKAS: Thank you. State
- your name and address, please.
- 24 MR. KUNTZ: My name is Ron
- 25 Kuntz. I live at 134 Parkview, North Canton. I

- 1 didn't have much to say. I was just reading up
- on this stuff, but I think it's outrageous the
- 3 way -- how much they want to up it.
- 4 And like this one man said, with our
- 5 fixed incomes and stuff when we're retired, it's
- 6 getting pretty well sad that people in this
- 7 country is going to be suffering like this with
- 8 people like the gas company wanting a raise that
- 9 much.
- 10 So I just wanted to voice my opinion.
- 11 It's like anything else. I mean this country's
- 12 going to hell in a breadbasket. That's all I
- 13 got to say.
- 14 MR. FARKAS: Thank you. The
- only other person that was left on the sheet was
- 16 Mr. Richard Hiles. Did you still want to
- 17 testify?
- 18 MR. HILES: Yes.
- 19 MR. FARKAS: Raise your right
- 20 hand.
- 21 (Thereupon, Mr. Hiles was sworn.)
- 22 MR. FARKAS: Thank you. State
- your name and address, please.
- 24 MR. HILES: Richard Hiles. I
- live at 4450 8th Street Northwest in Canton.

- Well, I think somebody did say
- 2 something about they was going to have Q and A
- 3 maybe later on if this is the last speaker. I
- 4 kind of wondered. Mr. Dougherty did have some
- 5 questions. I didn't hear anybody answer them.
- 6 The other thing is what is the
- 7 rate -- I think today was the rate change for
- 8 the MCFs. Was that today? Was there a rate
- 9 change made today? PUCO charter?
- 10 MS. FRISCIC: There was -- we
- 11 filed the August SSO rate yesterday.
- 12 MR. HILES: Okay. What was it?
- 13 What is it?
- 14 MS. FRISCIC: It went down.
- 15 Currently it's 14.545. Gas prices have
- decreased. And this is for the commodity
- 17 portion of the bill, the cost of the gas itself,
- 18 and it went down to 10 something. It was a
- 19 decrease of \$3.89.
- 20 MR. HILES: I thought it was
- 21 around 8, but you said it was 10 something,
- 22 so --
- 23 MS. FRISCIC: It's 10 something.
- MR. HILES: Went down \$3?
- 25 MS. FRISCIC: Uh-huh.

Okay. That's 1 MR. HILES: only -- another thing, I noticed a lot of houses 2 3 going through Canton, I mean all over the United States, houses being foreclosed and closed up. 5 There's a lot of places there that no gas is 6 going to be even used, so that would bring down 7 the use of gas. Maybe that's why you need an 8 increase because most poor people are not using 9 it. 10 The other thing is this gentleman did 11 ask a question about the flat rate and I didn't 12 hear anybody answer that either. And, you know, 13 these strains continue on the elderly people --14 I'm recently retired about a year and a half 15 myself and I can even feel the difference. Т 16 mean I'm okay, but I can feel the difference. 17 And I know the PUCO -- excuse me, I 18 know the natural gas people and utility workers 19 do make good money. That's my fault that I 20 didn't get a job there, but -- and the other 21 gentleman did say something about all the rate 22 increases, that the PUCO just goes ahead and 23 gives them to them. You are the Public 24 Utilities Commission. That's what it means. Some people don't know what it means. 25

- 1 Another thing, a different area, but
- 2 it's still money, the PUCO has acquiesced to the
- 3 electric companies there's definitely going to
- 4 be an increase in '09, and now the gas company's
- 5 asking for an increase. I -- I can't see it. I
- 6 mean everybody, everybody's got to tighten. You
- 7 know, where did the money go that was supposed
- 8 to be set aside for maintaining these
- 9 transmission lines and stuff?
- 10 I mean I come from The Timken
- 11 Company. I've had my ups and downs with them,
- 12 but they did make a record profit. But I'll
- 13 tell you what, I was there and they maintained
- 14 everything and they made money. That's why they
- 15 made money. I don't know why there wasn't a
- 16 portion of the profits or whatever was made to
- 17 maintain this that you're asking for money for.
- 18 So like I said, I think you all
- 19 better reconsider that, but it's a very -- it's
- 20 going to be a tough nut to hold with electricity
- 21 going up. That's a done deal, right? You guys
- 22 are from the PUCO. That's a done deal. And I
- 23 know it's been at least a ten-year process, but
- 24 I think we've been trying to hold it back as
- 25 long as we could.

- 1 So that's about all I have to say.
- 2 Wrong time. Somebody said there hasn't been an
- 3 increase in 10 or 15 years or whatever. Maybe
- 4 back in the good times you should have asked for
- 5 a raise. Because I think there has been raises.
- 6 Somewhere or another there's been some type of
- 7 raise.
- 8 And this business about -- like the
- 9 other fellow said about the different
- 10 utilities -- different companies, you know, that
- 11 you can get lower rates from, that was just a
- 12 big show. That was just -- that's the same
- 13 thing they did with the telephone companies.
- 14 The telephone companies started this thing.
- Well, oh, we have all these different
- 16 telephone companies. Well, how many of them
- 17 gobbled them up? We still got AT&T and, of
- 18 course, they've got in the cell phone business,
- 19 but, you know, it's just -- it's almost like a
- 20 game people try to play.
- 21 And I don't -- the PUCO, you know,
- you guys got a tough job, but you got to do the
- job for the people, the public. I think that's
- 24 all I have to say. Thank you very much.
- 25 MR. FARKAS: Okay. Any

- 1 questions?
- 2 MR. WHITT: No questions.
- 3 MR. SERIO: No. Thank you.
- 4 MR. FARKAS: Michele Lucas? You
- 5 want to raise your right hand?
- 6 (Thereupon, Ms. Lucas was sworn.)
- 7 MR. FARKAS: Thank you. State
- 8 your name and address, please.
- 9 MS. LUCAS: My name is Michele
- 10 Lucas. My address is 213 East 14th Street,
- 11 Dover, Ohio 44622.
- 12 I represent HARCATUS Tri-County
- 13 Community Action Organization as their community
- 14 services director. That stands for Harrison,
- 15 Carroll and Tuscarawas counties.
- I do have prepared testimony that I
- 17 prepared about an hour ago. I've been working
- on it all day and I thank you for your time and
- 19 I know it's been a long day. I almost went to
- 20 Akron because it would have been a little easier
- 21 than waiting until 7:00 in the evening.
- But I would like for you to know that
- 23 a small increase in my monthly gas bill will be
- 24 difficult to manage. Especially if that small
- increase is a jump to an incredible \$17.50.

- 1 Dominion is also requesting
- 2 additional fees to pay for replacing a pipeline
- 3 that isn't even broke or deteriorating and
- 4 retrofitting automated meter reading devices on
- 5 all 1.3 million gas meters in its service
- 6 territory.
- 7 I suspect that my husband and I will
- 8 manage. We usually do. We're both employed.
- 9 We're lucky. Our youngest child is now in
- 10 college. That's killing us. But they're
- 11 probably going to increase his tuition fees to
- 12 cover the cost of their gas increase. So no
- 13 matter how I turn around, I'm probably going to
- 14 get hit one way or the other or probably from
- 15 both sides.
- I guess it's going to be a little bit
- 17 difficult for us who are in what I consider to
- 18 be the lower middle class or upper lower class
- 19 households. My husband works in a local factory
- 20 and their gas bill's going to go up. Are they
- 21 going to be able to afford to give him a raise?
- 22 I'm really frightened that this place is going
- 23 to close. They've already had people coming in
- 24 and looking at them. It's not the first place
- 25 and it won't be the last.

- I work for HARCATUS Tri-County
- 2 Community Action Organization, and I have worked
- 3 for a couple of other nonprofits since 1977.
- 4 Most of it's been with HARCATUS. I know all
- 5 about HEAP, the Home Energy Assistance Program.
- 6 I don't have to tell you folks what that is. I
- 7 don't have to tell you what PIPP is and the
- 8 changes that have occurred over the past 30
- 9 years.
- 10 I know all about HEAP and PIPP
- 11 because I was there when they first announced
- 12 HEAP. I wanted to know what, a HEAP of what?
- 13 What was it going to be a HEAP of? Well, I
- 14 found out real fast.
- 15 I joined with about seven other
- 16 individuals, we traveled to Columbus, sometimes
- 17 twice a month, sometimes twice a week so that we
- 18 could create PIPP. It was exciting. We needed
- 19 to have a way so that our clients would have a
- 20 fighting chance to keep their regulated
- 21 utilities on during the harsh winters that we do
- 22 experience in Ohio. I know what I'm talking
- 23 about when I tell you that seniors on fixed
- 24 incomes and the low income clientele that we
- 25 attempt to help with their home heating bills

- 1 are not going to be able to handle an increase
- 2 of any amount.
- 3 Dominion East Ohio Gas customers
- 4 actually think that by locking in their rates
- 5 that they will not have to worry about any extra
- 6 charges or price increases. Boy, are they going
- 7 to be surprised. How can we help them to plan
- 8 for this winter if Social Security, pension,
- 9 SSI, SSDI, low paying wages and many other fixed
- 10 incomes will be expected to cover an increase
- 11 that can only mean more money in the pockets of
- 12 the Dominion employees and investors?
- 13 (Indicating.)
- 14 Excuse me, Tracy. I'm not pointing
- 15 at you, but there's a few people in this crowd
- 16 that I do recognize. We've known each other for
- 17 a long, long time. I just don't understand how
- 18 much we should be expected to conserve if our
- 19 efforts don't result in any kind of savings.
- I've been working with the Ohio
- 21 Consumers' Counsel, OCC, the Office of Community
- 22 Services, OCS, and Dave Reinbold of the Ohio
- 23 Partners for Affordable Energy to restructure
- 24 the Percent of Income Payment Plan so that
- 25 qualifying customers have a better chance at

- 1 affording their gas and their electric services.
- 2 Hard work that has been done on
- 3 energy efficiency's side with weatherization and
- 4 other conservation measures. Personally my
- 5 husband and I just recently had our home
- 6 insulated and sided and we got all new windows.
- 7 Not cheap. We are only expecting to be able to
- 8 hold our gas price where it might have been last
- 9 winter. I'm not holding out a whole lot of hope
- 10 at this point.
- 11 The HARCATUS housing and
- 12 weatherization program spends every last dime
- 13 that they receive doing similar work for as many
- 14 low income residents as they can reach with
- 15 hundreds still on their waiting list. It's an
- 16 amazing waiting list. I have people who are
- 17 disabled, who are elderly, who are having real
- 18 problems that cannot get insulation. They can't
- 19 get new windows. They can't get the simplest of
- 20 things that would help them conserve. They can
- 21 get a light bulb every so often, and every so
- often they'll get a new furnace filter and
- 23 sometimes they might even qualify for a new
- 24 refrigerator or an energy efficient water
- 25 heater.

- 1 It's kind of sad because all we were
- 2 hoping for was to keep our bills at last
- 3 winter's rates. We didn't even think about
- 4 lowering the bills. That would be absurd. And
- 5 then there's talk about raising the flat rate
- 6 customer charges. All it will do is negatively
- 7 impact customers who attempt to conserve energy
- 8 and result in low use customers subsidizing the
- 9 high use customers.
- 10 OCS has data that clearly shows that
- 11 my clients are not the high use problem. These
- 12 elderly, frail, mentally challenged,
- 13 economically challenged and underemployed people
- 14 are going to be very cold and without
- 15 necessities like medicine, decent food and other
- 16 frivolous things like basic telephone and cable
- 17 service. Thank you for your patience with us
- 18 and thank you for your time.
- 19 MR. FARKAS: Thank you. Do you
- 20 have a copy of your statement?
- 21 MS. LUCAS: Yes. I left one
- 22 back there. (Indicating.)
- 23 MR. FARKAS: Okay. If you could
- 24 bring one up, I will mark it as an exhibit and
- 25 I'll send it into the record.

TO: The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio

Thank you for your time, I know you all must be exhausted after such a long day, I know I am.

I would like for you to know that a small increase in my monthly gas bill will be difficult to manage, especially if that "small" increase is a jump to an incredible \$17.50! Dominion is also requesting additional fees to pay for replacing a pipeline that isn't even broke or deteriorating AND retrofiting automated meter reading devices on all 1.3 million gas meters in its service territory! I suspect that my husband and I will manage, we usually do because we are both employed and our youngest child is in college – which will probably have to increase tuition to cover the huge gas bills that the local campus will have to pay for somehow. I guess we will get hit from both sides, and that is only one example for a lower-middle class or upper-lower class household like mine.

My husband works in a local factory, whose gas bill will go up, affecting their ability to give him a wage increase. I have worked for HARCATUS Tri-County Community Action Organization or other non-profits since 1977. I know all about HEAP and PIPP and the changes that have occurred over the past 30 years. I was one of about 7 individuals that created PIPP so that our clients would have a fighting chance to keep their regulated utilities on during the harsh winters we can experience in Ohio. I know what I am talking about when I tell you that seniors on fixed incomes and the low income clients we attempt to help with their home heating bills are not going to be able to handle an increase of any amount. Dominion East Ohio Gas customers actually think that by locking in their rates that they will not have to worry about any extra charges or price increases. Boy are they going to be surprised! How can we help them to plan for this winter if Social Security, pensions, SSI, SSDI, low paying wages, and many other fixed incomes will be expected to cover an increase that can only mean more money in the pockets of the Dominion employees and investors? How much should we be expected to conserve if our efforts do not result in any kind of savings?

I have been working with the Ohio Consumers' Counsel (OCC), the Office of Community Services (OCS) and Dave Reinbolt of the Ohio Partners for Affordable Energy to restructure the Percent of Income Payment Plan so that the qualifying customers have a better chance at affording their gas and electric services. Hard work has been done on the energy efficiency side, with weatherization and other conservation measures. Personally, my husband and I just recently had our home insulated and sided with all new energy efficient windows. The HARCATUS Housing & Weatherization program spends every last dime they receive doing similar work for as many low income residents as they can reach with hundreds still on their

Canton Publice Hearry waiting list. All we were hoping for was to keep our bills at last winter's rates – we didn't even think about lowering our bills...that would be absurd. And then there is talk about raising the flat-rate customer charges. All it will do is negatively impact customers who attempt to conserve energy and result in low-use customers subsidizing high-use customers. OCS has data that clearly shows that my clients are not the high-use problem. I am truly afraid that they will pay a larger price this winter than many of us are willing to acknowledge. These elderly, frail, mentally challenged, economically challenged and under-employed people are going to be very cold and without necessities such as medicine, decent food and other more frivolous things like basic television or telephone service.
