This includes development and partnership activities, acquisition and disposition, design, renovation and construction and property management of all OhioHealth properties. My responsibilities include ensuring that these facilities have a dependable, high quality supply of electricity, both from the local electric utility grid, as well as on-site backup generation. The facilities operated by OhioHealth range from the main campuses of the hospitals and medical centers listed above, to smaller office spaces in local neighborhoods and smaller special-purpose facilities. I will refer to the hospital and medical center buildings as our "major facilities."					
37 38	6.	Q.	PLEASE DESCRIBE YOUR EDUCATIONAL BACKGROUND.					
39 40		А.	I have a bachelor's degree from Western Michigan University.					
41 42	7.	Q.	ARE YOU FAMILIAR WITH AEP'S APPLICATION IN THIS CASE?					
43 44		А.	Only in a general sense. I am aware that AEP is proposing to increase its rates for electric service by approximately 45% over the next three years, based on the					

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		reports contained in the local media. I am also aware that AEP is requesting a new rate structure for its alternate feed service.
8.	Q.	WHAT IS THE PURPOSE OF YOUR TESTIMONY IN THIS CASE?
	А.	OhioHealth is an active participant in the Ohio Hospital Association (OHA). I have been asked by counsel for OHA to provide testimony in this case describing the importance of dependable, high-quality electricity to the operation of OhioHealth's facilities and the particular characteristics of the hospitals as consumers of electricity.

9.	Q.	HOW MANY PEOPLE ARE EMPLOYED BY OHIOHEALTH?
	А.	OhioHealth has approximately 15,300 associates of which 12,800 are in Central Ohio. The Real Estate Department has about 175 people.
10.	Q.	PLEASE DESCRIBE THE CHARACTERISTICS OF OHIOHEALTH'S FACILITIES AS CONSUMERS OF ELECTRICITY.
	Α.	Our major facilities operate around the clock, 365 days of the year. The most important characteristic of our major facilities is the fact that they <u>must</u> have a supply of electricity, either from the local utility, or from on-site generation facilities. This is required of any healthcare facility that provides any overnight services, provides surgical facilities, or provides care to non-ambulatory patients. These requirements are contained in the NFPA Life Safety Code 1.1, as well as in portions of the National Electric Code.
		In addition to maintaining on-site standby generating facilities, our major facilities also employ redundant electrical feeds from the local distribution grid. These redundant service feeds provide a higher level of dependability from the local distribution system, as service can be maintained if the local circuit serving any particular feed is disrupted.
11.	Q.	HOW MUCH ELECTRICITY IS CONSUMED BY OHIOHEALTH'S FACILITIES EACH YEAR?
	А.	OhioHealth will have consumed approximately 537,590,360 kWh of electricity in 2008, costing OhioHealth approximately \$8,601,446.

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1 2 3	12.	Q.	PLEASE DESCRIBE THE IMPORTANCE OF ELECTRICITY TO THE OPERATION OF THE OHIOHEALTH FACILITIES.
4		A.	OhioHealth plans to have around 100,000 inpatient admissions and over
5			2,200,000 outpatient and emergency visits in 2009. Each of these patients' health,
6			and even life, would be at greater risk with disrupted or unavailable electricity.
7			From the lighting, heating and cooling of the facilities, to the high technology
8			diagnostic and treatment equipment that are used to treat these patients, electricity
9			is integral to the services that we provide.
