Matheny, Jr., Case No. 8 08-596-TR-CVF which is inspection report No. OH3271003440D as in David. 10 My name is Dick Bulgrin. I'm the 11 Attorney Examiner assigned by the Commission to 12 conduct the hearing and I will first note for 13 the record that Mr. Matheny is not present at 14 this time. Mr. Lindgren? 15 MR. LINDGREN: Yes, Your Honor. On 16 behalf of the Staff of the Commission, Ohio 17 Attorney General Richard Cordray and Dwayne 18 Luckey, chief of the Public Utilities section. 19 I am Thomas Lindgren, Assistant Attorney 20 General. My address is 180 East Broad Street, 21 9th Floor, Columbus, Ohio 43215. 22 HEARING EXAMINER BULGRIN: Thanks. 23 Are you ready to proceed? 24 MR. LINDGREN: Yes, Your Honor. - 9 Q. And what are your duties in that position?
- 11 A. The duties include, but are not
 12 limited to, stopping random motor vehicles and
 13 inspecting for compliance with the Federal Motor
 14 Carrier Safety Regulations.
- Q. What sort of training have you received for your job duties?
- A. Numerous classes throughout the
 year, and some include level 1 CVSA, Commercial
 Vehicle Safety Alliance, Driver Commercial
 Vehicle Safety Alliance, and hazardous material
 courses, and inspector and officer safety
 classes, and constantly being updated.
 - Q. Do you hold any certifications in connection with your job?
 - A. Yes. I am certified to conduct, to

- stop and conduct inspections under Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance for my certification.
 - Q. Thank you. Do you recall being on duty on August 16 of 2007?
 - A. Yes, I do.

- Q. And do you recall inspecting a vehicle driven by James Matheny on that date?
- A. I do recollect the configuration of the vehicle and the location of the stop and inspection, and through the inspection, the violation. I do remember the stop. As to the specific person, I don't.
- Q. Do you recall at all what prompted you to stop and inspect this vehicle?
- A. A random safety inspection for compliance with the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations.
- Q. Okay. Was this at a weigh station or was it on the roadside?
- A. It was on a roadside which I very frequently check that area on Interstate 71 and I pull them into the rest area to do the safety inspection and that's where this one was located, in the rest area.
 - Q. Thank you.

8 1 MR. LINDGREN: May I approach the 2 witness? 3 HEARING EXAMINER BULGRIN: 4 (EXHIBIT HEREBY MARKED.) 5 MR. LINDGREN: Let the record show 6 I'm handing the witness what has been marked as 7 Staff Exhibit 1. 8 Q. Mr. DiRosario, do you recognize this document? 10 Yes, I do. Α. 11 And can you explain what it is? Ο. This was an inspection that was 12 Α. 13 procured out of my lap top on Interstate 71 in 14 the rest area on said date, the 16th of August 15 of '07, on a random safety inspection, and 16 according to the violation detail, the driver 17 was disqualified at that instance in time; and 18 through normal practice, I run the driving 19 record through NCIC on the lap top in the 20 vehicle and follow up with a call to the 21 dispatcher on call to do a hand check or a file check or an Ohio driver's license to ensure that 22 23 this was a proper placement out-of-service 24 driver. 25 Q. Did you prepare this report?

- A. Yes, I did, sir.
- Q. And is everything in it accurate?
- A. To the best of my knowledge, it is.
- Q. You used the term NCIC; is that
- correct?

- A. Yes, that.
- Q. Can you explain what that is?
- A. It would be a database which permits an inspector to run a driver's license for the exclusive use of a safety inspection to ensure that that driver is qualified to drive that motor vehicle by definition at that instance in time.
- Q. Did you use that database for the driver in this case?
 - A. Yes, I did, as well as all the other stops that I do throughout the work day.
 - Q. And what was the result of your searching in this case?
- A. The computer screen noted that the driver was disqualified for an FRA suspension from January 19 of that year to indefinite, and I also followed up with a call to the dispatcher on call to make sure that that information was valid and accurate at that instance in time.

Q. And did the -- what was the result of that call?

- A. They did concur with the findings in the vehicle that the computer NCIC was updated and the driver was disqualified.
 - Q. Thank you. You used the term FRA suspension. Can you explain what that means?
- A. Through my conversations with the state troopers in the field and at the post, after reviewing the driver's license, the said subject needed to file his insurance with the BMV and post a bond to the situation that it expired and it was suspended on January 19 of '07; and according to the report in conversations with the state troopers, the driver went ahead and paid the bill, filing posting on the next day, and his driver's license was reinstated.
 - Q. Thank you. Did you give a copy of this report to the driver following your inspection?
- A. Yes, I did, as well as all the other stops that I make, the driver receives a copy of the inspection report.
 - Q. Thank you.

1 MR. LINDGREN: May I approach the 2 witness again? 3 HEARING EXAMINER BULGRIN: 4 (EXHIBIT HEREBY MARKED.) 5 MR. LINDGREN: Let the record show 6 I'm handing the witness what has been marked as 7 Staff Exhibit 2. 8 Q. Mr. DiRosario, do you recognize this document? 10 Yes, I do. Α. 11 Ο. And can you explain what it is? 12 Α. To the best of my knowledge, it is 13 Mr. Matheny's current driving record for today 14 and the prior years in which this was used upon 15 the initial stop that showed that the driver was 16 disqualified; and this is the document that was 17 used to confer with my colleagues and 18 supervisors of the disqualification of the 19 driver. 20 Where is the source of this Ο. 21 document? 22 Α. I do believe that this would be the 23 BMV, Bureau of Motor Vehicles driving record, 24 and NCIC check for misdemeanor and felony 25 warrants for this driver throughout the whole

United States.

- Q. Did you print out this document or did someone else?
- A. Initially, when I made the stop, I

 used my computer screen with voice radio. The

 document was printed last Wednesday at the local

 patrol post which has the authority to run the

 NCIC check to prepare for a proceeding or

 litigation or to clarify any issues.
 - Q. Thank you. Can you explain what this document shows about Mr. Matheny's license on the date of the inspection which was August 16, 2007?
 - A. Correct. This document also shows that Mr. Matheny was disqualified January 19 of '07 indefinitely for failing to pay a fee, and this document also shows that the fee was paid the following day on August 17 of '07 in which the driving privileges were reestablished and reinstated.
 - Q. So he paid the fee the day after you inspected his vehicle?
 - A. Correct, according to this document.
 - O. Thank you.
- MR. LINDGREN: I have no further

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questions for this witness.
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- HEARING EXAMINER BULGRIN: Mr.
- ³ DiRosario, does it show -- looking at Staff
- 4 Exhibit 2, can you tell whether he currently is
- 5 authorized to or qualified, I should say, to
- 6 drive?
- 7 THE WITNESS: Through numerous
- 8 discussions with state highway patrol personnel,
- 9 supervisors and myself, we can say that on 02-28
- of year 2008 he was again disqualified for
- 11 failure to pay a fee, from 2-28 of '08 to
- 12 | indefinite. To the best of our ability he now
- 13 has no driving privileges.
- 14 HEARING EXAMINER BULGRIN: So if you
- 15 stopped him today on the road he would --
- THE WITNESS: On a random safety
- inspection and we followed the same procedures
- of running NCIC and asking a dispatcher for time
- 19 checks and hand checks, it would be my belief,
- to the best of my ability, that he would not
- 21 have driving privileges.

Good afternoon. 8 Q. Can you state and spell your name for the record, please. 10 William Thomas Forbes, F-o-r-b-e-s. Α. 11 Q. What is your business address? 12 Α. 180 East Broad Street, 14th Floor, Columbus, Ohio 43215. 13 14 And who is your employer? Ο. 15 The Public Utilities Commission of Α. 16 Ohio. 17 Q. What position do you have with the 18 Public Utilities Commission? 19 I'm a compliance officer in the Α. 20 civil forfeiture section. 21 How long have you been in that Ο. 22 position? 23 Roughly three and a half years. Α. 24 And what are your duties in that Ο. 25 position?

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1 Α. Is is a letter that the compliance 2 division sends to the responsible party, in this 3 case Mr. Matheny, of a notice of a violation, an apparent violation, and an intent to assess a 4 5 civil forfeiture. 6 What was the violation and the Ο. 7 forfeiture noted here? 8 Α. The violation noted was Code 391.15A 9 and it was driving a commercial motor vehicle 10 while disqualified. The forfeiture amount 11 proposed was \$500. 12 Q. Thank you. 13 MR. LINDGREN: May I approach the 14 witness again? 15 HEARING EXAMINER BULGRIN: 16 (EXHIBIT HEREBY MARKED.) 17 MR. LINDGREN: Let the record show 18 that I'm handing the witness what has been 19 marked as Staff Exhibit 4. 20 Mr. Forbes, do you recognize this O. 21 document? 22 Α. Yes, sir. 23 Can you explain what this is? Ο. 24 Α. This is a notice of preliminary 25 determination letter that is sent to the

- respondent and, again, in this case Mr. Matheny,
 after a settlement conference was held with a
- 3 compliance officer in the civil forfeiture
- 4 division, and this letter indicates that a
- 5 settlement was not reached, that at the end of
- 6 the settlement conference the respondent wanted
- ⁷ to further contest the violation. So no
- 8 reduction or settlement of the forfeiture was
- ⁹ reached and the fine remained at \$500.
- Q. Thank you. Can you explain how the
- 11 | forfeiture amount of \$500 was calculated?
- 12 A. The violation for non-hazmat
- violations are broken up into four categories.
- 14 | Categories 1, 2 and 3 are violations that
- 15 require being out of service and are typically
- 16 equipment violations. Category 4 violations
- deal more with driving qualifications, medical
- 18 cards, authority for carriers, alcohol
- 19 violations, and this was a category 4 violation
- 20 and in category 4 violations, there is a set
- 21 | forfeiture assigned to each violation code, and
- this Code 391.15A has a set forfeiture of \$500
- 23 assigned to it.
- Q. So is that the amount you typically
- assess for this type of violation?
