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	EXAMINATION Witness Name George Sarantou Direct By Mr. Hayden

HEARING OFFICER: This is the 1 2 Public Utilities Commission of Ohio 3 public hearing, at this time and place, 4 case number 10-0388-EL-SSO being copied 5 in the matter of the application of the 6 Ohio Edison Company, the Cleveland 7 Electric Company and the Toledo Edison 8 Company who are authorities that 9 establish a standard of service offer 10 pursuant to section 49.28.143 of the Ohio 11 Revised Code in the form of an electric 12 security plan. 13 As I previously stated, my name 14 is Katie Stenman and I am the hearing 15 officer that has been assigned by the 16 Commission to preside over this 17 proceeding. At this time in the hearing, 18 we will hear from the parties, starting 19 with the company. 20 MR. HAYDEN: Thank you, Your 21 Honor. On behalf of the company is Mark 22 A. Hayden. 23 HEARING OFFICER: Did you have 24 any type of a presentation --

1 MR. HAYDEN: No, I do not, Your 2 Honor. 3 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. 4 behalf of the OCC? 5 MS. KYLER: Thank you, Your Honor. On behalf of the residential 6 7 consumers of FirstEnergy, Janine 8 Migden-Ostrander, consumers counsel, Jody 9 Kyler, assistant consumers counsel. 10 with me are Greg Fuller, Jim Carlo, Mark 11 Mullins from my office if you have any 12 questions. Thank you. 13 HEARING OFFICER: Are there any 14 other interviewers present tonight? 15 Okay. At the hearing tonight there are 16 representatives from the Commission's 17 service monitoring and the enforcing 18 department, also from FirstEnergy and the 19 occ. If you have any questions 20 concerning a utility matter that is not 21 related to the electric security plan 22 proceeding, which is the focus of 23 tonight's hearing, please see a company 24 representative, admissions personnel or

OCC personnel tonight.

On March 23, 2010, FirstEnergy filed with the Public Utilities

Commission an application along with a signed agreement among several parties to establish its next electric security plan, commonly referred to as an ESP.

This ESP is for the supply and pricing of electric service from June 1st, 2011 through May 31st, 2014. Electric rates under the new plan would again be determined through a competitive bid process conducted by an independent bid manager, as they were in the company's first electric security plan.

Under the proposed ESP,

FirstEnergy's distribution rates would remain frozen through May 31st, 2014.

The company also would establish a mechanism in 2012 to recover improvements to the company's distribution system.

This cost recovery would be subject to quarterly filings and annual audits by the Public Utilities Commission.

FirstEnergy would also continue to promote economic development, job retention, energy efficiency, conservation, and low income programs.

The eight local public hearings scheduled in this case are only one aspect of the process. The evidentiary hearings in this case are scheduled to begin on April 20, 2010 at the Commission's office in Columbus. The purpose of that hearing is to allow the company staff and engineers to present witnesses and evidence in support of their positions in the case. The purpose of tonight's public hearing is to receive comments from the public regarding FirstEnergy's proposed application for an electric security plan.

We will not be hearing from the company, the staff, or any interviewers tonight. This is your opportunity, the public, to let the Commission know what you think about the company's request to establish a new ESP. When you arrived

you were given the opportunity to sign up and testify. If you missed that opportunity, it is still available, outside of these doors, and I will also give anyone who hasn't signed up the one last opportunity to speak at the close of our hearing.

I will take the witnesses in the order in which they signed in. Before you begin your statement, I will swear you in and I will ask that you give your name and address. Your testimony will be considered part of the official record of the case and will be reviewed by the Commission before they make their final decision. All testimony will be under oath and attorneys for the company and other parties will be allowed to ask you question about your statement while you are under oath.

Should you decide you do not want to testify when I call your name, you can simply pass. Tonight's hearing is being transcribed by a court reporter,

so it's important that you speak clearly and loudly so that she can accurately record your statements. Also, if you have a written statement, would you place those on the table beside her, that would be helpful.

> As I am presiding over the proceeding tonight, I am unable to answer any substantive questions about the case, please refer those questions to others as I previously discussed. Before we get started, are there any questions about tonight's process? Hearing none at this time, we will begin calling witnesses forward. When I call you forward, like I said before, I will swear you in and I ask that you state your name, address, spelling your last name for the record.

And I will butcher your names, George --

MR. SARANTOU: George Sarantou. HEARING OFFICER: You are welcome to use the podium, if you would

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like.

1	MR. SARANTOU: Yes, I would like
2	to.
3	GEORGE SARANTOU,
4	being sworn to tell the truth, the whole truth and
5	nothing but the truth, testified and said as follows:
6	MR. SARANTOU: Thank you very
7	much. I'm George Sarantou. I'm a Toledo
8	City Councilman.
9	HEARING OFFICER: Can I have you
10	spell your last name and give your
11	address for the record?
12	MR. SARANTOU: Yes,
13	S-a-r-a-n-t-o-u. I'm a Toledo City
14	Councilman at large, and I represent
15	about 300,000 people in the city of
16	Toledo. I appreciate the opportunity to
17	be here this evening. I have some
18	concerns on the proposed electric
19	security plan by FirstEnergy. First of
20	all, my understanding is that FirstEnergy
21	has requested the Public Utilities
22	Commission of Ohio to waive its normal
23	and legal 275-day review process
24	regarding this proposal, and what they

would like is a decision by May 5th.

This a an extraordinarily large proposal, very complex, and involves the potential of rate increases of \$390 million. It is my belief that the Public Utilities Commission should absolutely use the legal requirement of the full 275 days to totally review and verify all of the data that has been submitted by FirstEnergy. I believe this is what you owe the rate payers and consumers of Ohio.

To have a decision made by the Public Utilities Commission by May 5th is simply wrong. A full 275 days is absolutely needed, when you talk about a huge rate increase of \$390 million.

Those rates could increase quarterly over the next two-and-a-half years.

Obviously, they would begin 2011. \$390 million primarily on the residential consumers could be very, very painful.

My understanding is from the proposal that primarily this affects

residential consumers, not so much the commercial customers. My question to the Public Utilities Commission is why do we need to have distribution rates raised for FirstEnergy. In 2007 FirstEnergy sought from the Public Utilities

Commission a \$340 million increase in rates. Fortunately the Public Utilities

Commission granted the rate increase of \$137 million. This was for distribution costs.

In looking at the financials of FirstEnergy, I must tell you I'm a financial advisor with Brennan Financial here in Toledo. I notice that for quite some time, many, many years, FirstEnergy has not lowered its dividends. The company is doing very, very well as a company. And they're doing very profitable work. It's interesting to me that when you look at the net income of FirstEnergy Solutions and FirstEnergy Corporation, let's talk about FirstEnergy Solutions, first of all. This is from

the Securities and Exchange filing. net income of FirstEnergy Solutions, which is strictly the electric company, the provider of electric services, in 2007 FirstEnergy Solutions had net income of \$520,864,000.

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In 2008, they had net income of \$506,410,000 and in 2009, this past year, FirstEnergy Solutions had a net income of \$577,804,000. No dividends were ever cut by FirstEnergy. It would appear to me, from my perspective, that they are doing very, very well as a company.

Let's talk about FirstEnergy Corporation, the parent company of FirstEnergy Solutions. Their net profit in -- their net income in 2007, according to the Securities and Exchange Commission filings, net income was one billion, that's with a B, \$1,312,000,000. 2008, firstEnergy Corporation's net income was \$1,339,000,000, and I'm pleased to say that the net income of FirstEnergy for 2009 was \$990,000,000.

Commission of Ohio, how can you justify a decision to raise rates this high when this company is making, essentially, last year made a billion dollars overall and FirstEnergy Solutions made \$577,000,000? That just doesn't seem right, and once again, never, never have dividends been reduced by this company. So they're doing very, very well. This is after their expenses.

Public Utilities Commission, as a councilman representing over 300,000 people, people that have been stuck with some of the highest electric rates in the nation for quite some time, and even with Davis-Besse, and we know they're having additional problems at Davis-Besse, why the rush. Why the rush? Why must the Public Utilities Commission make a decision by May 5th? That just doesn't make sense, when you're talking about an enormous rate increase, and they just got

one back in 2007. 1

> We all remember what happened recently, not last year. FirstEnergy embarked to provide energy efficient light bulbs. They rushed into it and the rate payers said, wait a minute. don't want to pay for these light bulbs. We don't want to have to pay these extraordinary prices for light bulbs, when we can go to the Andersons or we can go to Home Depot or Lowe's and get these bulbs much cheaper.

> In the final analysis, in my humble opinion, I think the Public Utilities Commission needs to do what they are paid good money to do, and that is to evaluate this rate request very carefully over a 275-day period. You owe it to the citizens of this community, this region, you owe it also to all citizens throughout the state of Ohio. That is why we have an independent Public Utilities Commission. If you so choose to approve this rate increase by their

deadline of May 5th, rather than honor 1 2 the State law, which calls for 275 days, 3 then we might as well shut down the 4 Commission and have FirstEnergy make all 5 the decisions for all the rate payers of 6 Ohio. Thank you, very much. 7 HEARING OFFICER: Any questions? 8 MR. HAYDEN: Yes, I do, Your 9 Honor. Let me address from the -- do you 10 want me to address from the microphone? 11 HEARING OFFICER: If you can 12 speak loud enough, you don't have to. 13 It's up to you. 14 HEARING OFFICER: Okay. Mr. 15 Sarantou, you can stay there. We have a 16 few questions for you. 17 MR. SARANTOU: Okay. 18 HEARING OFFICER: As I previously stated, the company and any of 19 20 the other parties are allowed to ask 21 questions of the witnesses tonight. 22 23 EXAMINATION 24 BY MR. HAYDEN:

1	Q. Sir, my name is Mark Hayden. I am
2	attorney for FirstEnergy. I have just a couple
3	questions for you, based on your testimony. Are you
4	aware that the application that the company has filed
5	in this case is not an application to increase rates?
6	A. I'm going by the media reports that it
7	could be up to a \$390 million rate increase.
8	Q. But this is not an application to
9	increase rates.
10	A. Then what it is?
11	Q. It's an application for an electric
12	security plan.
13	(Discussion had off the record.)
14	HEARING OFFICER: Go ahead.
15	Thank you.
16	Q. Sir, are you aware that this application
17	is not an application to increase rates?
18	A. I am aware that this an application for a
19	proposed rate increase.
20	Q. Are you aware that the proposal includes
21	a base distribution rate freeze through May of 2014?
22	A. Once the my understanding is that once
23	the increase was approved, yes, the rates will be
24	frozen, but it would be increased. Are you saying

we're not going to have a rate increase in 1 2 distribution? 3 I'm sorry, sir. This is a public forum. 0. 4 As an attorney for the company I can ask you questions 5 but you can not ask me questions. 6 Α. All right. 7 Sir, were you aware that the proposal 0. 8 includes several million dollars to support jobs, 9 economic development and distribution of liability? 10 Α. I'm aware of the \$25 million in this 11 proposal. 12 Sir, are you aware that FirstEnergy ٥. 13 Solutions is not a party to this application? 14 Α. Who is a party to it? 15 Q. I'm sorry, sir. I can't answer your 16 question? 17 I believe it is FirstEnergy. I don't 18 think it's another company. Is it? 19 Q. My question was, are you aware that 20 FirstEnergy Solutions is not a party to this 21 application? 22 Α. I'm not sure I understand the question. 23 Q. Okay. Are you aware at this time that 24 FirstEnergy Corporation is not a party to this

1 If I could have them marked, please. 2 Thank you. 3 HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mr. 4 Sarantou. You're excused. Josephine A. 5 McIntire. 6 7 JOSEPHINE MCINTIRE, 8 being sworn to tell the truth, the whole truth and 9 nothing but the truth, testified and said as follows: 10 HEARING OFFICER: Please state 11 your name and address for the record. 12 MS. McINTIRE: My name is 13 Josephine McIntire. My address is 9211 74 Schadel Road, Waterville. 15 HEARING OFFICER: Thank you. 16 Please go ahead. 17 MS. McINTIRE: Okay. What Mr. 18 Sarantou was saying about the \$300 19 million, I had called the consumer place 20 in Columbus and talked to them because my 21 bill, like, in December my bill was \$107 22 and FirstEnergy put \$420 onto it. It 23 made it \$523, and I had put that on a 24 credit card, because we live on a fixed

income, like a lot of other people live, on unemployment, and how are we supposed to pay a \$523 light bill.

And this last month, my electricity from Edison was \$56.02 and they added \$185 onto it. And now I got a \$300-and-some bill. And I don't understand why we really need FirstEnergy to begin with. When they never come out and fix anything. Edison is the one that comes out.

And why do we have to pay for the Cleveland Clinic and the auto companies that you want to give the big breaks to so they can use more electricity this year than they did last year and then put it on the consumers' bill? Why did we have to pay it?

Because at the bottom of the letter that I got back from them, they said it would not be good for the consumers. I don't understand what your company is doing and why they're cheating the public and people of Ohio.

1	I thought we lived in a free
2	country. That we could choose. Now,
3	answer my questions, because I get the
4	same information he did in the second
5	letter that I got back from them, from
6	Columbus. What do we have to do with the
7	Cleveland Clinic or the big car dealers?
8	Why do we have to pick up the slack for
9	FirstEnergy, and I guess that is all I
10	have to really say.
11	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Ms.
12	McIntire. Do you have any questions, Mr.
13	Hayden?
14	MR. HAYDEN: I do not, Your
15	Honor.
16	HEARING OFFICER: Ms. Kyler?
17	MS. KYLER: No.
18	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you.
19	Robert Mettler.
20	
21	ROBERT METTLER,
22	being sworn to tell the truth, the whole truth and
23	nothing but the truth, testified and said as follows:
24	MR. METTLER: Robert Mettler,

M-e-t-t-l-e-r, 1121 Colton Street,
Toledo, Ohio. I speak as a private
citizen and also a member of the board of
trustees at the area office in northwest
Ohio. Our concerns are our senior
citizens, over the nine-county area that
we serve in northwest Ohio. The woman
here was mentioning the fact that if
you're on a fixed income and you suddenly
get a bill for \$300 more than your normal
bill, you know, unless you have some cans
in the backyard, you're out of luck. And
it always ends up being the residential
consumer customers that bear the brunt of
this.

Our utility rates are the worst in the nation. It affects our ability to bring new business into the area, because what they can see is what is being paid in for utility bills. And again, as George pointed out, as much money as is involved, as complex as all of this is, there certainly should be a total of 275 days spent, if not more, looking at all

1	the details, because before this happens,
2	I think the citizens and especially our
3	seniors I mean, they are extremely
4	vulnerable. They live on a very moderate
5	fixed income and, you know, they're doing
6	without a lot of things right now because
7	of the economy. They are doing without
8	medications.
9	So we are deeply concerned in
10	the area office that something is going
11	to go on that is going to adversely
12	affect them because they deserve better.
13	That is all I got to say.
14	HEARING OFFICER: Any questions
15	for Mr. Mettler?
16	MR. HAYDEN: I do not, Your
17	Honor.
18	MS. KYLER: No, Your Honor.
19	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mr.
20	Mettler. Next is Jimmy Gaines.
21	
22	JIMMY GAINES,
23	being sworn to tell the truth, the whole truth and
24	nothing but the truth, testified and said as follows:

HEARING OFFICER: Please state 1 2 and spell your last name for the record 3 and give your address. 4 MR. GAINES: My name is Jimmy 5 Gaines. It is spelled G-a-i-n-e-s, Sr. 6 I'm the executive director of Onyx, 7 Incorporated. We are a CDC in central 8 city of Toledo, Ohio. 9 HEARING OFFICER: Go ahead. 10 MR. GAINES: The reason I'm here 11 is to represent the central city 12 residents. We have 86 housing units. Ιn 13 those housing units are three- or 14 four-bedroom houses. They are designed for the residents that have income below 15 16 50 percent of poverty level. 17 consequently, we're talking about people 18 who have -- who normally live in 19 apartments, have an opportunity to live 20 in a home and learn about home ownership 21 and about keeping home property. 22 I also want to mention that the 23 president of the NAACP wanted to be here 24 to testify this evening, but because of

her attendance at the Benjamin Hooks funeral, the wake this evening in Detroit, she will not be present. She asked for me to notify you of that, also that the statements I will be making will also represent the local chapter of the NAACP.

Employment, obviously, is a burden on our entire state of the union and specifically here in Toledo with the low employment rate. And what happens from a practical standpoint to the residents who live in our housing units is that they have less overtime. They have less hours at their jobs. Their children are, as they get older, require more expenses feeding and clothing.

Not only the utility bills, that we are talking about here, specifically, but there are the water bills, anything that has an increase can affect our residents. The consequence is that the water bills have been recycling and recycling the sewage, if you had an

increase with the utility bill, the consequences will affect them.

What we have experienced is that those home owners, because they are not able to pay those increased costs, in some cases, are leaving our homes, not able to sustain the rental cost and utility cost they leave our homes. homes became vacant and although we prepare the homes as fast as we can, vandalism can come in and take over the property, squatters, people staying in some of our units. You will notice that when we would go in and clean them up, you might see some squatters that have been in there, with McDonald's bags and food and then also there's drug activity around the units. In one unit we even saw some dead animals. Unfortunately, they use the units as a base for dog fights.

Our tree maintenance cost requires a burden on us, not only for maintaining units but just for trimming

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trees and those around the property. date, and the consequence is that those costs that we normally use for cleaning up the property have to go for additional I want to just testify to the things. fact that we would like for you to consider maybe some alternatives to these increases. Here is what happens, because of the board-ups that require a nuisance abatement to board up our units, those who would, again, are familiar, those vandals go around and the board-ups often -- we experience the cost of \$125 to \$250 to simply replace -- because we would be fined if the boards are off the property.

And so what I'm bringing to you this evening is that we just experienced an increase in taxes. We experienced an increase in taxes to the recycling program. We experienced an increase in taxes to pay for inspectors and we experienced an increase in taxes with the utility situation. Obviously, we can not

have our residents living in these properties without the utilities, water or gas. And so consequently when they leave those properties we are required to turn the property, which means that we are required to fix them up for the next resident. We have experienced theft, and we have experienced the increased cost to get those units occupied.

Our waiting list, we don't have a lack of people looking for places to live, but we do have a lack of money to sustain ourselves, not only us as a CDC to sustain our units, but also those who live in our units, to have a place to live and to have a nice place to stay. So we're recommending a decrease. We are saying that you should lower the rate. We're saying that you should also provide some very reasonable payment programs.

We've experienced payment
arrangements that have been made with
some people, and although -- they are not
looking at the fact that they have other

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costs. Payment arrangements are not practical. We are recommending that you provide some kind of grants that we might be able to use to rehab other homes or provide some kind of security for our homes if we do experience the things that I'm talking about to help us keep the vandals out.

We are recommending that you provide a basis, and on that, specifically, on that rehab component, we receive dollars to build new homes, and this year, we will build -- the number of homes that we have built 12 years ago were 86 homes. We're going to build this year another 16 homes for people of lower income. What I'm saying is this, we've been provided funds through grants to build homes, but we can not obtain those same grant dollars in -- probably, a 10-year period would be a practical time frame to rehab those homes, so we can make those homes available to purchase.

These are the kinds of items I

·	
1	would like to see that you consider to
2	help us, not only keep those houses so
3	that people can live in them, but also
4	address the needs of the residents who
5	stay there presently.
6	HEARING OFFICER: Anything?
7	MS. KYLER: No.
8	MR. HAYDEN: No.
9	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Mr.
10	Gaines.
11	HEARING OFFICER: Jay Leeming.
12	
13	JAY LEEMING,
14	being sworn to tell the truth, the whole truth and
15	nothing but the truth, testified and said as follows:
16	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you.
17	Please state and spell your last name and
18	give your address.
19	MR. LEEMING: Jay Leeming,
20	L-e-e-m-i-n-g, 6111 Chaney Drive. I am
21	coming out not only as a private citizen
22	but also for Goodwill Industries of
23	Northwest Ohio, so I'm coming to
24	represent the individuals who utilize the

services of northwest Ohio and the employees of Goodwill Industries of Northwest Ohio.

> My statements are pretty much the same as the other people who have testified here, just really, just a high concern over the amazing increase that is proposed by FirstEnergy. Most of the individuals who we work with are under-employed. They can barely pay the rates for all utilities now because of what they are making. These are not necessarily people who are uneducated or The rate of who are not trained. underemployment in the -- not only the Toledo area, but also the Ohio area, is very high.

> If you look at the employment, at underemployment rates, within the area, these are some of the highest in the country. So therefore to propose a rate increase on families, while unemployment is soaring within this area, is -- it's unfathomable to me how a

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company can continue doing such,
especially a company that, as has been
pointed out, is already making so much

money.

I think looking, again, at alternative ways of not only creating electricity, but also alternative ways of assisting individuals paying those rates, such as was pointed out by the last person who testified, rather than raising the rates is imperative. You're just putting people at risk again of losing their homes or their apartments, because of also facing huge collections, simply because they're unable to afford these rates.

So I ask what alternative have you considered to the rate increase, and also just again, why are you trying to push this through so quickly in the time that you have requested, rather than going through the means that have already been set up, the 275 days.

HEARING OFFICER: Anything?

1 MS. KYLER: No. 2 MR. HAYDEN: No. 3 Thank you, Mr. HEARING OFFICER: Leeming. That is the end of the list 4 5 that I have been provided with. Is there 6 anyone coming in that would like to sign up to testify that has not yet had an 7 8 opportunity to do so or who just didn't 9 sign up but would like to testify? 1.0 Anyone else? 11 If you would like to amend your 12 statement, go ahead to the podium so we 13 can hear you. You have to come up here, 1.4 so she can record your statements. 15 MS. McINTIRE: We got a letter 16 telling us that we could opt out of the 17 FirstEnergy with no consequence to us, 18 but they keep putting it on my bill. If 19 we had that choice to opt out, which we 20 did, why do we still have to have that on 21 our bill? I have the letter. I brought the letter with me. I don't understand 22 23 the way your company works. That is what 24 I said up there, we all have a choice.

1	thought we lived in a free country, so.
2	HEARING OFFICER: I just want to
3	remind you that you are still under oath.
4	Do you have any?
5	MR. HAYDEN: I do not have any
6	questions.
7	MS. McINTIRE: That's all I have
8	to say. I hope you understand and listen
9	to what people are saying.
10	HEARING OFFICER: Thank you, Ms.
11	McIntire. Anyone else like to give
12	statements? All right. Then we are
13	going to conclude for the evening. I
14	want to thank all of you for being here.
15	I appreciate your attendance and taking
16	the time to share your points of view
17	with us. The hearing is adjourned.
