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MS. BOJKO: The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio has assigned for public hearing at this time and place. Case No. 10-388-EL-SSO, being captloned in the matter of the application of Ohio Edison, the Cleveland 18:08:41 Electric Illuminating Company, and the Toledo Edison Company for authority to establish a standard service offer pursuant to section 4928.143 of the Revised Code in the form of an Electric Security Plan. 18:08:57
My name is Kim Bojko and with me this evening is commissioner Centolella and Beth Trombold. I am one of the attorney examiners that has been assigned to preside over this proceeding. And I also presided over 18:09:09 the evidentiary hearing in Columbus that occurred last week and lasted approximately -it lasted four days of hearing from numerous witnesses on this case.

But at the hearing tonight, we are 18:09:22 going to hear from you. There are representatives from the company here and there are representatives from interveners, but tonight, this is the opportunity to hear from you. So if you have a question other than the 18:09:33
proceeding before us today, feel free to speak with one of the individuals, either us or the company representatives or the Consumers' Counsel that's here. I'm not sure if other interveners are here, but feel free to talk to \(18: 09: 48\)
them as well and they will be happy to answer your questions.

And at this time I would like to take appearances of the parties. Let's begin with the company, FirstEnergy. 18:09:59

Toledo Edison Company and Ohio Edison Company.

First of all, I would like to \(\quad 18: 10: 31\)
describe a little bit more about the case. On
March 23, 2010, FirstEnergy filed with the
Commission an application along with the signed
agreement among several parties to establish
its next Electric Security plan, and this plan 18:10:46
is commonly called an ESP Plan. And this will be for the supply and pricing of electric service from June 1, 2011 through May 31, 2014. Electric generation rates under the new plan would again be determined through a competitive 18:11:03 bid process, conducted by an independent bid manager, as it was done in the companies' last Electric Security Plan. And under the proposed ESP, FirstEnergy's base distribution rates would remain frozen through May 31, 2014. The 18:11:18 company would also establish a mechanism in 2012 to recover improvements to the company's distribution system. And this cost recovery would be subject to quarterly filings and annual audits by the commission. FirstEnergy 18:11:32 would also continue to promote economic development, job retention, energy efficiency, conservation and low-income programs.

As has been stated this evening,
there have been eight local public hearings 18:11:47
scheduled in this case, and those local public hearings are only one aspect of the entire process. The evidentiary hearing began, which is just explained, on April 20 and it concluded on April 23. And the purpose of that hearing

The Federal Energy Regulatory
Commission, which is known as the FERC - a
federal agency that regulates the transmission 18:21:55
of electricity, natural gas and oil -- in a
December 17, 2009 order, stated, "Transmission
owners seek to change RTOs should be prepared to assume the costs attributable to their
decision." The PUCO, in my opinion, should 18:22:14 enforce this principle to protect Ohioans.
Under the agreement, several organizations have
struck deals with FirstEnergy related to its economic development and job retention. While I wholeheartedly support economic development, 18:22:28 I am hard-pressed to ask my constituents to pay for these investments without assurances that the benefits will follow. This should be addressed in a separate proceeding.

If FirstEnergy wants to expand 18:22:41
their sales in our area, they should contribute to the funding of this economic development from their shareholders' money, not my constituents'. Thank you for your time.

And I would like to reiterate my

concerns for my constituents or customers of
FirstEnergy. They simply cannot afford these rate increases. And I strongly urge the PUCO to reject this plan. And before I turn this over, I again would like to thank everybody for 18:23:05 coming.

economic development in advanced energy and new technologies, and provide accountability and transparency provisions for utility customers based on significant evidence that Ohio customers would actually pay less under these 18:25:03 plans in comparison to market-based prices.

Senate Bill 221 stipulates that
Ohio's electric utility companies must file these rate stabilization plans to eliminate market uncertainty. As a result, FirstEnergy 18:25:18 filed their plan with the PUCO to offer long-term rate stability and support for economic development.

My understanding is the plan would use a competitive bidding process to establish 18:25:27 generation supply and pricing, determining generation rates for FirstEnergy customers from June 2011 to May 2014. In addition, the plan would also allow the utility to collect up to 390 million through quarterly increases, while investing milions of dollars in local economic development arrangements.

The additional request that has been filed along with the competitive bidding process proposal is imprudent, especially with
the May 5 PUCO ruling deadline. While I understand that the competitive bidding process is the best cost-savings measure for FirstEnergy customers, and investment in local economic development is critical to the \(18: 26: 08\) Northeast Ohio region, the approval of this plan, as presented, could negatively impact customers who are already struggling during this tough economic situation and further impact their ability to pay monthly electric \(\quad 18: 26: 23\) bills.

The bidding process, I know, is fast approaching and that is the reason for the expedited PUCO ruling on the stipulated plan. However, with most recent experiences with 18:26:32
FirstEnergy, the PUCO and over 4,000
all-electric homeowners in my district, I
believe fast-tracking this review process could prove to be irresponsible and yield unintended consequences. This ruling holds a great 18:26:48 significance to my area and my communities and many FirstEnergy customers. Therefore, I want to ensure that the public, PUCO, the Ohio Consumers' Counsel and FirstEnergy are working together, thoroughly participating in this 18:27:02
procedure, to understand the impact of these rates could have on the community.

SB 221 provides a mechanism for deliberating fair and just decisions, particularly when it comes to dealing with 18:27:12
utility companies. The consumers of
FirstEnergy must be provided some assurances
that increases will not significantly impact
their bills and that they remain a part of this process.

I urge the PUCO Commissioners and staff to carefully consider the concerns of the Ohio Consumers' Counsel, the FirstEnergy customers, and our people in the 99th District when making your final decision regarding this 18:27:36 case.

Unemployment is over 14 percent and people are struggling like never before during this toughest economy ever; and they need our help and consideration -- even though I know these are probably not part of the things you have to consider.

But FirstEnergy customers simply cannot accommodate any more significant increases, no matter how important other

On behalf of my constituents of the 18th Senate District, I oppose the proposed FirstEnergy Electric Security Plan for the following reasons: 18:30:27

With respect to the replacement for the current delivery system improvement charge with a new larger delivery capital recovery charge. The new proposal would allow FirstEnergy to collect up to \(\$ 390\) million \(18: 30: 37\) through quarterly increases over approximately two and a half years. Further, Mr. Wilson Gonzalez's April 15 , 2010, testimony on behalf of the OCC addresses the uncertainty in connection with FirstEnergy's switch from the Midwest Independent System Operator, MISO, to the East Coast-based PJM transmission authority in Philadelphia and the possible price risk associated with excessive lead time between a July 2010 auction and the start of actual delivery on June 1, 2011, when the Electric Security Plan will take effect. FirstEnergy's exaggerated claims of 19:03:10 millions of dollars in savings by not passing along to customers fees associated with leaving MISO and entering PJM. According to FERC, the transmission owner, in this case the American Transmission Systems, Inc., ATSI, is responsible for these fees, not the customers served by American Transmission Systems. The ESP does not guarantee that FirstEnergy customers will be protected from incurring extra charges associated with FirstEnergy's
business decision to switch from MISO to PJM. The stipulation delivery capital recovery charge Rider DCR, which would permit FirstEnergy to collect \(\$ 390\) million through quarterly increases over a 30 -month period subject only to FirstEnergy's "burden of proof to demonstrate the accuracy of the quarterly filings," which requires considerably less verification and review of the accuracy and reasonableness of these filings than would occur under a separate distribution rate proceeding. FirstEnergy has claimed in various Plain Dealer and News Herald articles that since Rider DCR "replaces an existing rider, in most cases customers wouldn't see any additional impact" or "an increase of, only, \(\$ 90\) million."

Page 15 of the stipulation states, "Quarterly Rider DCR will not be an application to increase rates within the meaning of Revised Code 4909.18." In his April 15, 2010 testimony, the OCC's Mr. Gonzalez characterizes Firsienergy's semantic shenanigans as provision that proposes that quarterly
increases in ordinary distribution rates do not fit the description of an increase is absurd." Delivery issues should be handed in a separate distribution rate case.

Collection of lost revenues

As a result of this, the Minnesota lost revenue recovery program was discontinued. As noted in

Mr. Gonzalez's April 15 testimony, Connecticut electric utilities are "only allowed recovery of lost revenues if their earnings are below their allowed rate of return for six months." I have been hearing from these people on fixed incomes, I would love to be on 19:17:52 a fixed income. The recession has caused my income to drop by about 30 percent in the last couple of years. My electrical usage has gone down by about 10 percent, but my cost of electricity has gone up by over 120 percent. 19:18:06

So I'm using less and paying considerably more.
The case before the commission is relative to transmission distribution of electricity. You know, we look around this room, we can see the results of the 19:18:19 electricity. We used 670 kilowatt hours less due to our conservation measures that we put in place last year after the high
bill we got in January, and yet we paid \(\$ 111\) more this year for the same time period. Why? Because the distribution-related component charge went up 129 percent due to the 2009 rider. 19:26:32

FirstEnergy's Electric Security
Plan makes us very anxious because of the unknowns about the distribution charges. What will FirstEnergy use as a formula this time to charge us for the \(\$ 390\) million they want to collect from us?

The formula which it appears
FirstEnergy wants to use to bill us include,
but is not limited to: \(\$ 15\) million for Ohio
Partners for Affordable Energy (OPAE), plus \$70 19:27:00
million for the Cleveland Clinic's expansion, plus increasingly higher billing for kilowatts hours used over 500 because we are an electric nome.

All of these components and 19:27:10 additional unknowns will price us out of our home. How much does it really cost FirstEnergy to deliver their product to my home?

Please take note: The Ohlo
Partners for Affordable Energy mission says on
their website, "We advocate for affordable energy policies for moderate and low-income Ohioans." FirstEnergy clearly finds this classic mission worthy of their \(\$ 15\) million, so they must support that mission.

We ask that any rate plans that the Public Utility Commission approves, going forward, include a commitment to provide all homeowners of Northeast Ohio affordable electric power to our homes based on reasonable, transparent and accountable requests for increases. Thank you very much.

1 would like to start by thanking the PUCO for having these hearings in open public for an opportunity to speak. It's refreshing.

I happen to have been one of those 19:50:52
lost souls that bought an all-electric house in
early 2007. My seller told me, "Ah, you got this great discounted rate." Well, with the new increases, we now pay 13 cents akilowatt. My January bill was "only" \$1,151. I oppose 19:51:14 this new ESP and I suggest to you that you wait until May 5 -- I think that's the date -- and just tell them that we reject it.
\(\$ 390\) million is almost three times
as large as the last increase. Now, let me
19:51:43
digress and talk about how that impacted my
family personally. My mother-in-law lost her
house, so we moved her into our house and put
her in an in-law suite. She's 75 and she likes
the building temperature to be her age, which 19:52:01
is about 10 degrees higher than we keep the
rest of the house. So she moved in last year
and I kept saying, "Well, you know, mom, you
know, we got to figure something out, our
electric bill went up' -- I'm thinking it must 19:52:18
be her. Well, no, it wasn't her, it was
FirstEnergy. We actually consumed two percent less enengy. Now, that's not a fot, but that's a little bit. And this is before we even knew what was going on with these rates; I was just 19:52:34 thinking it was my mother-in-law. In spite of the fact that we now have a second stove and a second refrigerator, we have electric heaters because our all-electric house -- you know,
that's the only way we can heat lt. But we 19:52:48
have special extra electric heaters to keep her
warm. We consume about 47,000 BTUs a year.
According to what I understand, there used to
be a declining scale as you consume more electric, now with the new rate lt's less, 13, 19:53:10
whether you buy one unit or 1,000 units.
That's not correct. I certainly appreciate the idea of, you know, timeliness and some of the other things that used to be in place.

To allow something like this to 19:53:28
even go into consideration at this time, when you haven't really figured out how to sort out the issues about conservation and what to do with the all-electric people who - and to tum around and fast track it. No. Just decline. 19:53:45 They still have plenty of time before the current program, or time to revise the program.

I want to share with you a trust issue with FirstEnergy, because you're dealing with them. And I think you need to know about 19:54:00 this. In the Plain Dealer on the 16th of April, reporting on your ruling to them on Thursday April 15, the PUCO ruled Thursday that anyene who buys or rents a home that has had the low rates in the past will get them again 19:54:19 "at a minimum," through next winter. And tonight we have the information about the temporary rollback. The article further clarifies a March 3 ruling that requires FirstEnergy temporarily restored low rates to \(19: 54: 37\)
customers who have been with them before January 1, 2009. Still doesn't include me. It's okay. But thank you PUCO, your new ruling orders FirstEnergy to extend the rates within one week -- one week would be April 22-- to 19:54:52 people who bought all-electric homes or rented all-electric apartments even after FirstEnergy began phasing out the program, which was the 2006 adjustment that you made.

Well, on April 22 I called

FirstEnergy -- well, actually, I called them on the 16th and I called them back on the 22 nd and I asked them -- first on the 16 th I asked if they were aware that our house and our property was all-electric. They said, yes, they were 19:55:22 aware of it and its in their records. I said that's good. So I said, Il'm calling just to make sure that you've got us set up and we're now getting -- because it's now one week -getting this new rate." And I was told that 19:55:35 order is pending. I was told it will take a while before it goes into effect. And I was told that FirstEnergy will not credit back to the date that PUCO said that they had to provide that new rate.

I didn't really come prepared with a testimony or statement, but I do want to speak. What I am concemed about is when
FirstEnergy says that they had support of a 19:57:59
broad diverse number; parties including PUCO
Stafi, Ohio Schools Council, the City of
Cleveland, and competitive electric suppliers.
Well, they didn't ask every person. So when
they say they have support of what thay are

going to do, they didn't ask everyone here. So
that's what concerns me. What also concerns me
is I do not have an all-electric home. I guess
you can consider it an all-gas home. I have gas stove, gas water heater, gas air, forced

why, I was told I could always go somewhere

1 also feel for the all-electric people that keep saying don't bring that up,

Again, I don't want to waste anybody's time here tonight. I just feel that this is wrong. I also called the Public
Utility Commission, I know you hire other 19:59:37 people to take on the extra calls, but the lady informed me, "Do you know how many times you've called to question or to complain?" Yes, 1 could tell her. I called every month to ask what was going on. And I think that is my

19:59:50 right as a United States citizen. So thank you for your time.

SAL RUSSO, of lawful age, having
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been first duly swom, testified as follows: MS. BOJKO: Please state your name and address for the record.

My background is in the grocery
business. It was started by my
great-grandfather Sam Russo. And we had our
original store in Cleveland Heights. And we 20:00:49
were fortunate enough, we had a good relationship with the adjacent property owner, that in 1998 we bought a mixed-use building. It has retail on the first floor and the mezzanine level, it has two fioors of offices. 20:01:10
The building was built in 1918. And the
offices on the second and third floor are
small. And I could sympathize with the people
that are here this evening that have spoken
about the impact of the removal of the
20:01:29
all-electric discount on their residences. But
I am here to talk about the impact that it's
had on a commercial account at this particular
building that I own. A lot of the tenants are
soclal workers, therapists, counselors,
20:01:49
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costly to maintain and It was impossible to provide consistent heat across the wide range of offices. Some on the south side, some on the north side. So we purchased electric fumaces. We had all of the rooftop 20:03:38 air-conditioning units converted to have electric heat. We paid the expense for that. And it worked out well and everyone -- every individual tenant had, you know, regular heat during the winter months. The rate increase 20:03:55 that came about in the summer of 2009 -- this gets to what the previous speaker mentioned -the service plans were flattened, so that was the first negative impact that I experienced. I was no longer able to buy in bulk because the 20:04:18 tenants were now the same rate, even though they had much smaller unis.

But the bigger impact for us was the -- was the removal of the all-electric discount. And as far as that impact, I looked 20:04:39 at from January 7th of 2010 through April 5th of 2010 the cost - and this is just on the meter for the electric heat -- I paid 11.3 cents per kilowatt hour versus from January 9, 2009 through April 6, 2009, I paid 3.5 cents 20:05:12
psychologists, psychiatrists, dentists, writers, consultants, they're small-business owners. And quite a few of them when they inquired about our building, I asked them, you know, "Where are you leasing now?" And it's 20:02:05 very common for them to say that, "Well, you know, l'm working out of my house right now and I want to get out and you know establish myself. I need a commercial address." And because we have smaller offices, it's seems to 20:02:18 be a good fit. So you know, just like owning -- affording a home is part of the American dream, so is owning your own business. The previous owner of my building, decades ago, purchased sub-meters and had them installed. 20:02:37 And he would buy his electricity in bulk and then the sub-meters were read and the tenants paid a standard charge under the Illuminating Company. Same rate that they would have if they had an account directly with the 20:02:56 Illuminating Company based on their usage.

I would say six years ago or so, we
made a strategic decision to abandon a central boiler that heated the second and third floor offices. The boiler was old and it was very 20:03:16
per kilowatt hour. So that's an increase of 3.23 times, over 300 percent.

And to give you an example, when the typlcal tenant is looking at my building and he says, "Well, what's it going to cost me, 20:05:34 I'm in my house now, so I'm sharing utilities." You say, Your rent's going to be \(X\) and your electric is based on the past year they had used, should be about \(\$ 150\) a month. And he gets his first bill for January and it's close 20:05:51
to \(\$ 500\) a month. And as a building owner it makes me look foolish. I didn't provide him with accurate information.

So I'm happy to hear that the
Commission has ordered the temporary 20:06:08
relnstatement of the all-electric discount.
And I have tried to follow it with regard to
what's been written in the Plain Dealer. I've
had some correspondences with Governor
Strickland's office, but I haven't heard 20:06:23
anything about the reinstatement of the
discount applying to commercial accounts. And
that's the main reason I came here is to let
everyone know that it's not just residential
users; there are commercial accounts, there are 20:06:38


Therefore, you have the rate certainty plan, which guaranteed them at a certain rate. And then down the road -- which other people iterated on this -- down the road the artificially low interest rates also work 20:12:42 against Ohioans' efforts to encourage conservation. They were stupid enough to put this in there. What they don't tell you is, if you conserve, you're not going to have strong enough electricity generation markets to 20:13:00 develop a free-market plan. So if you conserve electricity, you get charged more. If you don't conserve electricity, you get charged more. So who is helping you out in this? They're not helping you out at all. I think 20:13:12 that's about it.

I also would like to say that I think they should look over this program and try to do what's right for the consumer and give the people some answers. If you call 20:13:35 FirstEnergy, let the people - don't give the people some answers, don't treat them like they're nobody, because that's what FirstEnergy does. Thank you.

MS. BOJKO: Mary Lambert. been first duly sworn, testified as follows:

MS. LAMBERT: Okay. I live in Burton, too. I live on Claridon Troy Road. And I have lived in Geauga County for 35 years. \(20: 14: 18\) I have been almost exclusively in new construction for most of that. And I remember back in 1978 when this all-electric promise started. I was working for a builder in Chagrin Falls and, I mean, he would come take 20:14:29 us to lunch at least once a week and try to get us to build all-electric homes because this promise of this all-electric discount. And over the years I have encouraged people to build all-electric homes because of this \(\quad 20: 14: 43\) wonderful discount that was promised.

In 1994 when my husband and I
started our own construction company, we were solicited by the lluminating Company at that time. In August of 2000, we started a rental project. A little number of suites. We have eight rental suites that are all-electric. And we got a letter from FirstEnergy promising us the all-electric discount on our rentals. It said, "FirstEnergy is interested in becoming \(\quad 20: 15: 14\)
your energy partner to assist you in making the
best energy decision possible for your
construction projects. The following proposal
is based on" -- okay. It's got names and stuff
in here -- "featuring the electric/heat pumps 20:15:30
and installing this HVAC equipment package will
create a win-win situation for you as a builder
and for each of your future tenants." Now
they're starting to say that when the account
name changes, the discount shouldn't carry 20:15:44
forward. And this is a letter promising it to
tenants. And am I supposed to pay my tenants'
electric bills? Good thing I'm not. I'm
sorry, I didn't mean to target you with that.
But it seems to me that there has been a real 20:16:01
betrayal of the very people that supported
FirstEnergy or supported the llluminating Company in building their market.

You know, when I go to sell a home
and I say this is an all-electric home, it's a 20:16:20
wonderful thing to have an all-electric home,
you know, it's going to be a one-utility bill, and it's very reasonably priced, it's competitive with gas, we've gone -- it took years to get people to believe that 20:16:33

all-electric could compete with gas. Now, these very people that have bought an all-electric home, you know, they're not going to have that advantage in the resale market.

You know, as when I rent to 20:16:45 tenants, I estimate the electric bill, like Mr. Russo was saying. They say, "How much is it going to cost me to heat my apartment? What's my budget bill going to be?" And then they move in and it's over twice as much as I 20:16:57 promised them. And I'm feeling bad. So now I have tenants that are behind in their rent. And when I go to get new tenants, I probably will get less income and it's because I believed in the all-electric promise.
