Dear Mr. Scriber:

My name is E. Patricia Lincoln and I live in a Bob Schmidt Home here in Strongsville. I have lived in the Meadowood Association since 1987. I attended the meeting last Wednesday, October 27 at Strongsville High School. My story is no different then the hundreds you have already heard, but I want to share it with you.

I am a 78 year old widow. My husband, a minister of the United Church of Christ, died after a very long illness in 2008. I receive a pension as a public school teacher and a widow's pension from the United Church of Christ. One would think I was on a fixed income, in fact while my teachers' pension has remained stable, my widow's pension went down 35% in 2009, and in August of this year it went down an additional 7%. Since I am a public school retiree I come under the G.P.O. (Government Pension Offset) law. Each time I receive a C.O.L.A. increase on my teachers' pension, Social Security deducts 2/3 of the C.O.LA. increase from my Social Security check, which is presently \$84 a month. In a few years I will receive nothing.

Since my husband was a clergyman, we got into the housing market late in life. I still have a large monthly mortgage. At this point I can make it month to month, but I have had to go into what little savings I had left as I had some unexpected emergencies.

Two problems I can foresee:

- 1. If the electric rates go up to level they were this past winter. I will not be able to meet my monthly expenses.
- 2. If the rates go up, I will not be able to sell my house. If I can't pay my expenses or sell the house, I'll have to walk away from it, and I won't be the only person that will have to do that. This will add to the foreclosure fiasco; which in turn will hurt the city of Strongsville.

Your commission has a Solomon like decision to make. Your decision will effect millions of lives and many communities for a long time to come. I pray you make the right one.
