MEMORANDUM IN SUPPORT OF MOTION TO INTERVENE

Ohio Partners for Affordable Energy ("OPAE") should be permitted to intervene in this matter pursuant to Section 4903.22.1, Revised Code, and the Commission's Rules and Regulations contained in Rule 4901-01-11 of the Ohio Administrative Code. The above-referenced proceeding concerns the application of Ohio Edison Company ("Ohio Edison"), The Cleveland Electric Illuminating Company ("CEI"), and The Toledo Edison Company ("TE") (together "Companies") to amend their 2010 energy efficiency and peak demand reduction benchmarks. In the application, Ohio Edison states that it will not meet its statutory energy efficiency and peak demand reduction benchmarks, and, along with CEI and TE, does not yet know its actual 2010 energy efficiency benchmark requirement. Therefore, all three companies seek amendments to their respective 2010 energy efficiency benchmarks to the degree it is deemed necessary to bring each of them in compliance with their modified energy efficiency obligations. Ohio Edison further requests that its 2010 peak demand reduction benchmarks be amended to the actual 2010 peak demand reduction levels.

In determining whether to permit intervention, the following criteria are to be considered: the nature of the person's interest; the extent to which that interest is represented by existing parties; the person's potential contribution to a just and

expeditious resolution of the proceeding; and, whether granting the intervention will unduly delay or unjustly prejudice any existing party. OPAE meets all four criteria for intervention in this application.

OPAE is an Ohio corporation with a stated purpose of advocating for affordable energy policies for low and moderate income Ohioans; as such, OPAE has a real and substantial interest in this matter, which will address the 2010 energy efficiency and peak demand reduction benchmarks of the Companies. Additionally, OPAE includes as members non-profit organizations located in the service areas that will be affected by this proceeding.¹ Moreover, many of OPAE's members are community action agencies. Under the federal legislation authorizing the creation and funding of these agencies, originally known as the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, community action is charged with advocating for low-income residents of their communities.²

The purposes of this subtitle are--

⁽¹⁾ to provide assistance to States and local communities, working through a network of community action agencies and other neighborhood-based organizations, for the reduction of poverty, the revitalization of low-income communities, and the empowerment of low-income families and individuals in rural and urban areas to become fully self-sufficient (particularly families who are attempting to transition off a State program carried out under part A of title IV of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 601 et seq.)); and

⁽²⁾ to accomplish the goals described in paragraph (1) through-

⁽A) the strengthening of community capabilities for planning and coordinating the use of a broad range of Federal, State, local, and other assistance (including private resources) related to the elimination of poverty, so that this assistance can be used in a manner responsive to local needs and conditions;

⁽B) the organization of a range of services related to the needs of low-income families and individuals, so that these services may have a measurable and potentially major impact on the causes of poverty in the community and may help the families and individuals to achieve self-sufficiency;

⁽C) the greater use of innovative and effective community-based approaches to attacking the causes and effects of poverty and of community breakdown;

⁽D) the maximum participation of residents of the low-income communities and members of the groups served by programs assisted through the block grants made under this subtitle to empower such residents and members to respond to the unique problems and needs within their communities; and

⁽E) the broadening of the resource base of programs directed to the elimination of poverty so as to secure a more active role in the provision of services for—

OPAE also provides essential services in the form of bill payment assistance programs and weatherization and energy efficiency services to low income customers of these companies. OPAE members are also ratepayers of these companies.

OPAE's primary interest in this case is to protect the interests of low and moderate income Ohioans whose provision of electric service may be affected by this proceeding. Further, OPAE has been recognized by the Commission in the past as an advocate for consumers and particularly low-income consumers, who may be affected by the outcome of this case.

For the above reasons, OPAE has a direct, real and substantial interest in this matter. The disposition of this matter may impair or impede OPAE's ability to protect its interests. No other party to the matter will adequately represent the interests of OPAE. OPAE is a rare organization that serves as an advocate, service provider and nonprofit customer group. No other party represents this group of interests. OPAE's participation in this matter will not cause undue delay, will not unjustly prejudice any existing party, and will contribute to the just and expeditious resolution of the issues raised by this docket.

Therefore, OPAE is entitled to intervene in this proceeding with the full powers and rights granted by statute and by the provisions of the Commission's Codes of Rules and Regulations to intervening parties.
