This is the hearing in Case No. 08-379-TR-CVF 6 being in the matter of John R. Schneider, notice 7 of apparent violation and attempt to assess 8 9 forfeiture, Inspection Report No. OH3296004432. 10 My name is Dick Bulgrin, I am the 11 Attorney Examiner assigned by the Commission to 12 conduct this hearing. 13 And I would note for the record that 14 Mr. Schneider is not present and I have not 15 received any word from him. Mr. Margard, would 16 you put in an appearance? 17 MR. MARGARD: Thank you, Your Honor. Good morning. On behalf of the Transportation 18 19 Staff of the Public Utilities Commission of 20 Ohio, Ohio Attorney General Michael DeWine, 21 Public Utilities Section Chief William L. 2.2 Wright, by Assistant Attorney General Werner L. 23 Margard, 180 East Broad Street, 6th Floor, Columbus, Ohio 43215. 24 25 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Thank you. And

6 1 you have not heard from Mr. Schneider either? 2 MR. MARGARD: I have not, Your 3 Honor. And in his absence I would respectfully request and move that a default judgment be 4 5 entered against Mr. Schneider. We are 6 nonetheless prepared to go forward with our case 7 in this matter. ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Okay. Let's go 8 ahead and do that. 9 10 MR. MARGARD: Thank you, Your Honor. 11 And for my first witness I would call Officer 12 Mark Lambert to the stand, please. 13 (WITNESS SWORN) 14 15 MARK LAMBERT 16 called as a witness on behalf of the Staff, 17 being first duly sworn, testified as follows: DIRECT EXAMINATION 18 19 By Mr. Margard: 20 Q. Good morning. Will you state your 21 name and business address for me, please? 2.2 Α. Mark Lambert. Business address is 23 Massillon District Headquarters. I don't remember the street address. 24 25 Q. And by who are you employed?

- A. State of Ohio, State Highway Patrol,
 Motor Carrier Enforcement.
 - Q. And how long have you been employed in that capacity?
 - A. Since May of '83.
 - Q. Do you have any special training to conduct motor vehicle inspections?
 - A. Right. I have the North American Standard Course. Certified in that.
- Q. Officer Lambert, were you on duty on Valentines Day 2006?
- 12 A. T was.

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- Q. Do you recall what your assignment was on that day?
- 15 A. I was in Summit County.
- 16 Q. Just regular road patrol?
- A. Road patrol.
- Q. And in the course of your duties
 that day did you have an opportunity to inspect
 a vehicle being operated by the Respondent in
 this matter, John Schneider?
 - A. Yes, I did.
- Q. And as a result of that inspection did you generate an examination report, Report No. OH3296004432?

- A. Yes, I did.
- Q. Before I discuss your report, do you have an independent recollection at all today as you sit here of that examination?
 - A. No.

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MR. MARGARD: Your Honor, may I approach?

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Yes

- Q. Officer Lambert, you have before you what is marked for purposes of identification as Staff Exhibit No. 1, a two-page document that appears to be that examination report; is that correct?
- A. Yes.
- Q. And have you had an opportunity to review this document?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. And is this a true and accurate copy of the report that you generated on that day?
- 20 A. Yes.
- Q. And can you tell me how you
 conducted your inspection and what you found,
 please?
- A. I was in the cross-over and observed this vehicle driving by me southbound. And I

saw a flat tire. I was about 145, at 142 there was a rest area.

So I activated the lights, pulled in the rest area and did the inspection. And during the inspection I found a few out of service. Two flat tires, U-bolt assembly loose, three brakes out of adjustment.

Which he was put out of service for the flat tire, U-bolt assembly and brakes. And some lighting violations also.

- Q. And the out of service violations were all noted in the violations section of this report in the column noted OOS designating out of service, and each of those is denoted by a Y; is that correct?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. Could you tell me briefly how you inspected the brakes?
- A. I had the driver get to 100 psi and release all the brakes. I went under there and took my measurements. And I had him apply one time and took measurements from the release to the applied position.
- Q. Very good. There is also a column on this report that says verified. Do you know

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what that is for?
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- A. Yes.
 - Q. And what is this here for?
- A. That would be like say if I had a turn signal out and I could fix it during the inspection I will put an A that it was repaired and it would say verified, yes.
 - \mathbb{Q} . In this column there are Ns and Us. I would assume the N means no. What days the U signify?
- 11 A. Unknown at the time of the 12 inspection.
 - Q. Does that then indicate that you left the scene prior to whatever repairs being completed?
- 16 A. Yes.
- Q. So, at the time that you were done
 with your examination you generated this report,
 I presume a copy was given to the driver; is
 that correct?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And a copy was ultimately uploaded here to the Commission; is that correct?
- 24 A. Yes.
- Q. And was any kind of a sticker or

- designation put on the vehicle to indicate that that it was out of service?
 - A. Right there out of service sticker placed on both the tractor and the trailer.
 - Q. And at the time that you left the driver was out of service in the rest area and was informed that he was not to move the vehicle until the repairs had been made; is that correct?
 - A. Correct.

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- Q. And you have no further personal knowledge of what happened to that vehicle after your inspection; is that correct?
 - A. Correct.
- Q. Let me just for the sake of completeness here note that at the time this driver was hauling cargo designated as other, and the shipper was Cargill Incorporated. And he was on his way to Navarre, Ohio; is that correct?
 - A. Correct.
- MR. MARGARD: Your Honor, I have no further questions of Inspector Lambert.
- 24 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Okay. Thank
- 25 you. You can step down.

- 2 Q. Is this a copy of that examination 3 report?
 - A. Yes, sir.
 - Q. Now, again, before we talk about the report, do you have an independent recollection of what happened at the time of this inspection?
 - A. Vaguely.
 - Q. Have you had an opportunity to review this report?
 - A. Yes, sir.
 - Q. And is this a true and accurate copy of the report that you generated on that date?
- 14 A. Yes, sir.
 - Q. And did reviewing this report help to fresh your recollection of the events of that date?
 - A. Yes, sir.
 - Q. Can you briefly explain to us how you came to inspect this vehicle and what your findings were?
- A. I was in Stark County doing a random rolling patrol of the county and randomly pulled over this vehicle northbound on State Route 421.

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- Q. This was strictly a random inspection? This was not an obvious violation?
 - A. Yes, sir.

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- Q. Okay. And in the course of inspecting this vehicle what did you discover?
- A. I approached the vehicle and the driver told me that he was just inspected the day before. And he gave me a copy of the report that was generated the day before, which showed some out of service items.

So I just went around and verified that the out of service was taken care of and going to get him out of there without doing another report. And when I was checking the out of service violations I noticed that the front brakes were out of adjustment. Therefore, I went ahead and did a whole new inspection report on him.

- Q. And you also found a number of out of service violations, specifically the brake violations; is that correct?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Now, have you had an opportunity to review the inspection report conducted by or completed by inspector Lambert?

A. Yes, sir.

- Q. And what was your conclusion with respect to the brake adjustment measurements?
- A. They were the exact same. The driver had told me that the mechanic that the mechanic didn't have a wrench with him when he came down to fix that stuff, and he was going to fix it after he got done with this load that they had to get in the morning here.
- Q. The driver acknowledged to you that the brakes had not in fact been fixed after the inspection?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And just to be clear, this particular load was a dry bulk commodities load shipped on behalf of Allied Corporation.
 - A. Yes, sir.
 - O. This is a different load?
- A. Yes, sir. The driver stated that in the morning he got there and he had to get to Massillon to get that load because it needed picked up. And that the mechanic was going to adjust the brakes when he got back.
- Q. And so you completed this report, gave a copy of this report to the driver and

uploaded a copy to the Commission?

A. Yes, sir.

- Q. And I assume that when you placed him out of service you also placed a sticker on the vehicle?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And I note that the verification column on your report also indicates a U. Do I presume that that means that after you gave him the report you also left the scene without verifying that in fact the brake repairs had been completed?
- A. Yes, sir. The mechanic wasn't on the scene yet.
- Q. Is there anything else regarding this inspection that you think the Commission needs to know to be able to make a determination that Mr. Schneider operated this vehicle without having completed the repairs while the vehicle was out of service?
- A. Just that he acknowledged that he knew that they weren't fixed. They needed to get that load. Other than that, no.
- MR. MARGARD: Your Honor, I have no further questions for Inspector Bell.

18 1 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Thank you. You 2 can step down. 3 MR. MARGARD: Your Honor, I respectfully call Mr. Jonathan Frye to the 4 5 stand, please. 6 (WITNESS SWORN) 7 8 JONATHAN FRYE 9 called as a witness on behalf of the Staff, being first duly sworn, testified as follows: 10 11 DIRECT EXAMINATION 12 By Mr. Margard: 13 And will you please state your name Q. and business address? 14 15 Jonathan Frye, F-R-Y-E, Public Α. 16 Utilities Commission of Ohio, 180 East Broad 17 Street, Columbus, 4th Floor. And what do you do at the 18 Q. 19 Commission, Mr. Frye? 20 A. I supervise the Compliance Officers. 21 Compliance Officers assess fines against 22 carries, shippers and drivers who are found in 23 violation. You are familiar with the evaluation 24 0. 25 process and how assessments are determined?

A. Yes.

- Q. Have you had an opportunity to review the Commission file or portions of the Commission's file with respect to this case?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Can you, please, describe for me how the violation was assessed in this matter?
- A. Yes. When the inspection report is uploaded into our system the violations are grouped into one of four groups, 1, 2, 3 and 4.

Group 4 violations are typically violations that are assessed against drivers.

And in this particular case the driver was issued a violation for operating an out of service violation. And as a result there is a \$1,000 fine that is assessed against the driver.

- Q. And where does that fine come from? Where does that number come from?
- A. It's based upon the Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Alliance recommended fine schedule.
- Q. And this is a schedule that has been adopted by the Commission and is used in such matters?
- 25 A. Yes.

MR. MARGARD: Your Honor, may I approach?

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Yes.

- Q. Mr Frye, I have handed you a multi-page document that has been marked for purposes of identification as Staff Exhibit No.
- 3. Is that a copy of the fine schedule?
 - A. Yes, it is.

- Q. Can you identify for us where on this fine schedule the fine assessed in this matter appears?
- A. Yes. On page 2 of the fine schedule under Group 4 as violations. And the last violation under Group 4, violation of out of receive notice. And it indicates that the fine amount is \$1,000.
- Q. Now, no fine was assessed for the actual brake violations; is that correct?
- A. Not against the driver.
- Q. Okay. Can you explain what happens after the forfeiture amount has been determined?
- A. Yes. After the forfeiture amount is determined we will mail via certified mail a copy of the fine, and with payment instructions on how to pay for the forfeiture. And also how

to make a request for a conference if the Respondent wants to dispute it.

And in this particular case the Respondent indicated that he would like to contest the violation.

- Q. And a conference was held?
- A. Yes. A Compliance Officer conducted the conference with the driver, listened to the information that the driver presented, were unable to reach a resolution of the case.

And as a result we issued a notice of preliminary determination to the driver which is a letter advising the driver that he could either pay the fine or can go through the next step in the hearing process, which is an administrative hearing.

MR. MARGARD: May I approach, Your Honor?

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Yes.

- Q. Mr. Frye, I have handed you a two-page document that has been marked for purposes of identification as Staff Exhibit No.
- 23 4. Can you identify that document for us, 24 please?
- A. Yes. It's the notice of preliminary

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determination letter. It's the letter that is

    sent to the driver at the conclusion of a
2
    settlement conference if we are unable to reach
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    a resolution. Again it provides the driver with
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   information on how to pay the fine, and it also
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   provides him with information on how to contest
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   the violation at the next step in the hearing
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   process.
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- Q. Mr Frye, in your opinion was the forfeiture in this case properly determined?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. And in your opinion is it reasonable and was it properly assessed?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And in your opinion did the Respondent receive all notices required by law in this matter?
 - A. Yes.
- MR. MARGARD: Your Honor, I have no further questions for Mr Frye.
- 21 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: You may step 22 down. Thank you.
- MR. MARGARD: Your Honor, at this
 time I would respectfully move for the admission
 of Staff Exhibits No. 1, 2, 3 and 4.

And I would renew my motion for default judgment in this case. ATTORNEY EXAMINER: The exhibits will be admitted. And the motion will be noted for the Commission. Anything further? MR. MARGARD: I have nothing further, Your Honor. Thank you. ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Okay. This hearing will be concluded then. Thank you very much. (At 11:30 A.M. the hearing was concluded)
