# DIRECT TESTIMONY OF PHIL HONSEY ON BEHALF OF THE CITY OF GROVE CITY, OHIO

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### I. INTRODUCTION

- 2 Q. Please state your name and business address.
- 3 A. My name is Phil Honsey, and my business address is 4035 Broadway, Grove City,
- 4 Ohio 43123.
- 5 Q. Please describe your affiliation with the City of Grove City, Ohio ("Grove
- 6 City").

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- 7 A. I currently serve as the City Administrator for Grove City. In my role as the City
- 8 Administrator, I manage and provide direction to all departments and employees
- 9 in Grove City, while carrying out policy directives provided to me by Grove
- 10 City's City Council. In that capacity, I have developed an understanding of
- municipal services both provided to, and provided by Grove City, and more
- specifically, the electricity services procured by Grove City from Columbus
- Southern Power ("AEP").
- 14 Q. Please describe your educational background.
- 15 A. I obtained a Bachelor of Science degree in Urban and Regional Studies from
- Minnesota State University in1978. I have attained Credentialed Manager Status
- 17 with the International City/County Management Association. I have also
- completed additional graduate level studies and professional development courses
- 19 at numerous universities.
- 20 Q. Please describe your professional experience.
- 21 A. I was appointed City Administrator of Grove City in March, 2009. From
- January 2006 to thru December 2009, I was the Planning Department Manager at
- Poggemeyer Design Group, a full service planning, engineering and architectural

firm in Bowling Green, Ohio, serving public and private clients in planning and economic development matters. From August 1994 to December 2005, I was the City Manager in Galion, Ohio, where I managed full municipal utility services, From 1986 to 1994, I was the City Administrator of including electric. Groveport, Ohio, where I participated in very successful economic development From 1978 to 1986, I was a Planner with the Mid-Ohio Regional Planning Commission. Prior to that I worked in the Minneapolis/St. Paul area with the City of Columbia Heights, Minnesota, and with the private firm Midwest Planning and Research. I have served on the board of directors of the Ohio Municipal League, the Ohio City/County Management Association, the Ohio Department of Natural Resources ("ODNR") and Heritage Ohio. I currently serve on the Ohio Geographic Referenced Information Program Council, having been appointed by both Republican and Democratic Ohio Governors since 1993. I have also been appointed in the past to serve on the ODNR Forestry Advisory Commission. I currently serve on the Board of Directors of the Solid Waste Authority of Central Ohio ("SWACO"), representing the general interests of citizens.

## Q. Briefly describe some attributes of Grove City.

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Grove City is one of Central Ohio's fastest growing cities both residentially and commercially. Grove City's infrastructure is sound and continues to achieve significant advances. Grove City is currently constructing a multi-million dollar interchange improvement project at Interstate 71 and State Route 665. This infrastructure improvement will further enhance Grove City's profile and should

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bring tremendous opportunity for economic development to Grove City and that
 particular area within Grove City.

### 3 Q. What interest does Grove City have in this proceeding?

Currently, Grove City utilizes electric service from AEP to illuminate municipal traffic signals, a number of proprietary street lights, as well as to power certain municipal buildings and facilities. On an annual basis, Grove City expends in excess of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000.00) on electric service with just the first two aforementioned electric uses. Furthermore, almost all of Grove City's residential customers rely upon AEP for electric service. residents in many Ohio cities and metropolitan areas, Grove City residential customers are currently dealing with high unemployment rates and low wages. Grove City has a duty to represent these residents and ensure that they receive readily available and dependable electric services, attainable at reasonable prices in this economically challenging environment. In addition to the impact on Grove City and on residential customers, Grove City is also concerned about the impact of these proceedings on its commercial citizens. Any proposed cost increases and service modifications will have an economic development and job retention impact on a local economy that cannot afford to lose jobs or opportunities for future growth.

## 20 Q. What is the purpose of your testimony?

21 A. The purpose of my testimony is to discuss the Standard Services Offer ("SSO")
22 submitted by both AEP and the Ohio Power Company (collectively the

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1		"Companies") and the anticipated impact of the SSO on Grove City, its residents
2		and its businesses.
3	Q.	What materials and information did you review in preparation for your
4		testimony?
5	A.	I reviewed portions of the Companies' SSO application as cited in this testimony.
6		II. PROPOSED RATE RESTRUCTURING
7	Q.	What is your understanding of the rate restructuring for electricity
8		generation as proposed by AEP in its SSO?
9	A.	My understanding is that the rate restructuring for electricity generation proposed
10		by the Companies in its SSO application will result in rate increases that will be
11		shouldered by, among others, Grove City and its taxpayers. In reviewing page 1
12		of Exhibit DMR-1, Grove City's rates for electricity generation will increase in
13		the following amounts based upon Customer Class:
14		• GS1: 18.1% total increase over the life of the SSO;
15		• GS2: 17.8% total increase over the life of the SSO;
16		• GS3: 1.2% total increase over the life of the SSO; and
17		• SL: 13.1% total increase over the life of the SSO.
18		These rate increases could result in a substantial overall cost increase for Grove
19		City to procure electricity from AEP, increases that will trickle down to Grove
20		City's residential and business taxpayers. Aside from the obvious financial
21		impacts on Grove City's budget, the rate increases could hinder Grove City's
22		economic development efforts, as job growth and retention will be a natural
23		victims of these rate increases.

## III. PROPOSED RIDERS IN SSO

2	Q;	What is your understanding of how the riders proposed by AEP in its SSO
3		will impact Grove City?
4	A:	It is difficult to determine at present how the array of riders proposed by AEP will
5		impact Grove City and its residential and commercial citizens, and this in itself is
6		a tremendous concern. The uncertainty is attributable to many of the riders being
7		non-bypassable riders that have no fixed dollar amount associated with them. For
8		example, Grove City has concern as to how the following riders will affect Grove
9		City and its residential and commercial citizens. The numbers associated with
10		these riders are those numbers assigned in Exhibit DMR-4:
11		• Phase-In Recovery Rider (19);
12		• Distribution Investment Rider (20);
13		<ul> <li>Generation NERC Compliance Cost Recovery Rider (22);</li> </ul>
14		• Facility Closure Rider (23);
15		• Carbon Capture and Sequestration Rider (24); and
16		• Plug-In Electric Vehicle/Tariff/Costs Rider (29).
17		Grove City is also concerned about being subjected to the Rate Security Rider
18		(28), as this rider should not be assessed to non-industrial customers. Finally,
19		Grove City is concerned about being subjected to the Environmental Investment
20		Carrying Cost Rider (13) as this rider is non-bypassable. Again, there is
21		uncertainty as to how these riders will impact Grove City's payments to AEP as
22		well as its residential and commercial citizens' payments to AEP. The
23		unanticipated costs associated with these riders not only runs contrary to the

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traditional necessity of governmental budgeting for the procurement of services, but they could impede economic development within Grove City for the same reasons that generation rate increases will impact economic development – all costs flow downhill to Grove City's taxpayers.

### IV. EXISTING CONCERNS WITH AEP SERVICES

Q: Are there areas in Grove City that experience a poor delivery of service from
 AEP?

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Yes. Grove City has received a number of complaints about AEP's services near and around the Grove City Industrial Park, close to the intersection of Interstate 71 and State Route 665. Grove City is concerned about all services delivered to its Industrial Park, as poor services delivered to that area could result in business relocation and a loss of jobs within Grove City. Grove City would expect that if it is going to be paying more for AEP's services, that AEP would make every effort to cure any and all service areas within Grove City that experience service difficulty.

Q: Do you have other concerns with Grove City's dealings/interaction with AEP?

Yes. First, AEP has been billing Grove City for construction projects that have long since been completed. This adversely affects our finance department's payment processes. Second, Grove City would appreciate AEP's cooperation in moving some of its facilities underground. Specifically, Grove City will need cooperation from AEP in the movement of its facilities underground in the

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Stringtown Road "Phase 2" roadway construction project, as well as the
Broadway roadway construction project.

### V. ASSISTANCE IN ALTERNATIVE ENERGY INITIATIVES

4 Q: Can AEP be of assistance to Grove City in alternative energy initiatives?

Absolutely. If AEP is serious about the development of alternative energy mechanisms, AEP should provide assistance to Grove City in its waste energy initiatives which are being undertaken cooperatively with SWACO and the Franklin County Commissioners. There is tremendous opportunity here for AEP to take the lead as a utility that is committed to the development of alternative energy mechanisms, and reap the rewards of being at the forefront of such initiatives, both through participation and funding.

### VI. ECONOMIC DEVLEOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES

The Companies have stated in the testimony of Mr. Joseph Hamrock that their primary objective of this SSO is to stabilize rates and support the economic development of the state of Ohio. (Hamrock Testimony, p. 17, lines 9-11). Mr. Hamrock states in the same testimony that the Companies are committed to assisting Ohio with economic development opportunities, and that successful economic development requires a collaborative effort amongst local leaders and business developers across the state. (Hamrock Testimony, p. 40, lines 9-15). What is your reaction to this?

I appreciate Mr. Hamrock's statements and am hopeful that the Companies are genuine in their desire to work with local governments in pursuing economic

development opportunities. I have concerns that the Companies have not been as

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active as they once were in assisting in economic development endeavors. The
Companies have, in the past, been partners with Grove City in community
outreach to assist in economic development within the region. This commitment
to local governments in economic development endeavors must be renewed by
AEP, especially since economic development is, according to Mr. Hamrock, the
core policy consideration behind this SSO.

Mr. Hamrock has also stated in testimony that the Companies are establishing the Ohio Growth Fund in the amount of 25 million dollars to assist in economic development – to support infrastructure investment and directly support public-private partnerships in the state and local economic development arena. (Hamrock, p.37, lines 4-16). What is your reaction to the Ohio Growth Fund proposed by AEP?

I think the Ohio Growth Fund is an excellent idea and I believe that AEP should strongly consider supporting local governments through that Fund and say so with specificity. It is local governments who actually have a degree of control over economic development, both within their regions and in the State. Local governments are consistently working with businesses to create jobs, providing incentives to those businesses to either relocate to, or stay in Ohio. I would also hope that the Companies consider allocating more money to the Ohio Growth Fund, especially considering that economic development is the core policy consideration behind the SSO.
