As it is I keep my heat so low in the winter months that my Mother can not visit me for long as the house is too cold for her. She is 88. I have included two articles that appeared in my local paper, the Canton Repository, on the <u>same</u> recent day. How can a company that just admits their earnings are up 67% say they need a 17% rate increase? I can not go to my boss and ask for a pay increase to cover my electric bill. I am All Electric. Where are the plans for people who are all Electric? Why aren't their any discounts for me? I honestly do not know what I will do if my rates go up that much. As it is, I close all my other rooms off and only heat the room I am in, mostly the Living Room. I use little room heaters for the bathroom and kitchen and only turn them on as I need them. I use a lot of blankets at night and do not turn the heat on at all in my bedroom. How else do you suggest I keep warm without going in debt?

P.S. When my Grandkids come to visit I do turn the heat on for them so they don't end up getting sick. Isn't that a shame! Then I have to pay extra money every month so my budget doesn't go up from their visit!!

AEP third-quarter earnings up 67%

can Electric Power's thirdquarter net income rose 67 percent, the company reported Wednesday, thanks to a favorable court ruling in Texas and hot weather that boosted electricity demand.

The company reported net income of \$928 million, or \$1,93 per share, compared with \$555 million, or \$1.16 a share, in same period a year ago.

AEP's revenue for the period rose to \$4.3 billion from \$4.1 billion.

AEP said its results also benefited from a Texas Supreme Court decision worth \$425 million that allowed the company to recover some costs related to retail competition.

Tell PUCO to reject AEP's request for 17 percent rate increase

He nime of gortan and to another instance of comparate greed American Electric Power is reduceding a 17.5 percent distribution rate in cease for its Object power customers and a 9.5 percent increase for its Columbus Southern Power customers (Two voice opposition to electricistic pikes Oct. (8). This is the same songpany that asked the Rubig Collines Commission of Chio for a 45 percent increase three years 420.

According to AEP's website, since 2000 AEP has imposed a 22 percent increase for Ohio Power cusfoiners and a 19 percent increase for Columbus Southern Power customers. Has anyone reading this received a 23 percent increase in your pay in the last three years and are you going to receive a 17.3 percent increase next year?

The PUCO has the ability to deny these increases. Part of its mission statement states that its role is to see that we get utilities for a fair price. I was one of two people who spoke at the PUCO's meeting Oct. 18 in Canton af you want to finally do something about this greed, contact the PUCO. Tell them you won't stand for this greed and increase from AEP and it's time they started representing common people.

This increase will cause a hard-
