the state.

As a court buff in the mid-1960s, he saw some good judges slow down, he said, "and nobody had the nerve to talk to them about it."

"They just stayed a little too long," said Bessey, who recalled a judge mistakenly instructing jurors on a treason charge when it was a burglary case. He said he would seriously consider seeking re-election next year because he loves his job, yet added, "I want to leave at the top of my game."

Issue 1 poses a question that few outside the legal community are tracking, but it's one that has the potential to affect any citizen who comes into contact with the court system.

How old is too old to be a judge?

In 1968, voters amended the state constitution to prohibit judicial candidates from taking office once they turn 70, although they can serve the remainder of their term. The ballot measure would make 76 the age at which a person cannot win election to or be appointed to judicial office.

For supporters, giving judges more time on the bench is a chance to address blatant, state-sponsored ageism. No other elected officials face mandatory retirement. Some proponents, in fact, would prefer that Ohio join 18 states with no age restriction.

"This arbitrary age limit eliminates some of our most-experienced judges from serving Ohio and administering justice fairly and impartially," said Supreme Court Chief Justice Maureen O'Connor, who added that Issue 1 is a step in the right direction.

Supporters see a chance to address blatant, state-sponsored ageism. Opponents see no reason to raise from 70 to 76 the age in which a judge can't begin a term, a change that would allow some judges to serve until age 81.

Another argument is that people are living longer than when voters last considered the age issue 43 years ago.

Opponents, namely prosecutors, see no reason to raise the retirement age, and they worry about allowing some judges to serve until age 81.

John Murphy, executive director of the Ohio Prosecuting Attorneys Association, said that although people are living longer, there is no evidence that their mental acuity is improving.

He denied rumblings that prosecutors really came out against Issue 1 out of pure self-interest — because it would hurt their chances of running for judgeships held by entrenched incumbents.

"We have a much more immediate concern. We have to practice in these courts every day," Murphy said. "We are interested in having a judiciary that is competent, capable and energetic."

He said experienced retired judges still sharp in their 70s and even 80s can be assigned to fill in as visiting judges. The late Chief Justice Thomas J. Meyer did not assign retired judges who were 80 or older, O'Connor did away with the age limit this year.

O'Connor said safeguards are in place to discipline and even remove elected judges who are not performing well.

Besides O'Connor, other Issue 1 backers include the State Bar Association, the Ohio Judicial Conference (a judges' association) and about 100 lawmakers who voted to put the amendment before voters.

Another opponent is the Democratic Party, although

its opposition probably has more to do with Issue 1 letting two Republican justices on the GOP-dominated high court run again.

If the measure passes, it eventually could affect all 718 judges in the state. Most immediately, 71 judges banned from running again at the end of their current term could do so, according to Supreme Court data.

Eight live in the Columbus area: John Bender, Bessey, David Fais and Richard Shaward of Franklin County Common Pleas Court; Robert Nichols in Madison County; Kenneth Spicer and W. Duncan Whitney in Delaware County; and John Connor of the 10th District Court of Appeals.

Fais, 68, said he would try for another term in 2014 if his health and mental sharpness stay steady.

"I feel my legal skills now are as good as they've ever been," he said. "As you sit on this bench the number of years I have, you're beginning to know what the job's all about."

He pointed out that federal judges and U.S. Supreme Court justices have served well into their 70s and 80s.

"I don't buy into the rationale that you reach a certain (age) and can't do the job any longer," Fais said.

Bessey would be 81 at retirement if he can run again. His job hearing business cases is demanding. He takes work home every day.

He does not think a higher retirement age is "necessary bad," but he is mindful of the risks.

"As judges, we have a lot more responsibility," Bessey said. "If we make a mistake, we can really hurt somebody."

Sarkozy election opponent is chosen

■ HOLLANDE GETS THE SOCIALIST PARTY NOD

PARIS — Former French Socialist Party chief Francois Hollande declared victory Sunday in the party's presidential primary, urging the left to unite around his bid to unseat embattled conservative Nicolas Sarkozy in elections next year.

Hollande, a 57-year-old moderate known more as a behind-the-scenes consensus-builder than a visionary, is seen by many as a welcome contrast to the tough-talking, hard-driving Sarkozy. Opinion polls say Hollande is the leftists' best chance to win the presidency for the first time since 1988.

Sunday's vote for the main opposition party's presidential nominee comes at a time when many French citizens are worried about high state debt, cuts to education spending, anemic economic growth and lingering unemployment.

With 2.2 million votes counted after Sunday's run-off voting, the Socialist Party said 56 percent of the ballots were for Hollande and 44 percent for his challenger Martine Aubry, who had succeeded Hollande as Socialist Party leader.

The party estimates that more than 2.7 million people voted in Sunday's run-off.

"I note with pride and responsibility the vote tonight, which ... gives me the large majority I had sought," Hollande told supporters in party headquarters as results rolled in.

3 charged for locking up 4 disabled adults in Pa.

PHILADELPHIA — Three people have been charged following the discovery of four cognitively disabled adults chained to a boiler in a locked northeast Philadelphia basement room that was too small for an adult to stand up straight and also reeked of waste from the buckets they used to relieve themselves, police said Sunday.

Officers were investigating a report of squatters in a building Saturday when they found three men and a woman in a 15-by-15-foot room behind a steel door that was chained shut. The subbasement room they were in called to mind a Cold War-era bomb shelter and contained a makeshift bed, mattress and sheets, said Officer Tanya Little, a police spokeswoman.

"It was horrible," she said Sunday. "The space was very tiny and confined."

Charges of criminal conspiracy, aggravated assault, kidnapping, criminal trespass, unlawful restraint, false imprisonment and related offenses were filed Sunday against Linda Ann Weston, 51, and Thomas Gregory, 47, both of Philadelphia, as well as Eddie Wright, 45, officially listed as homeless but originally from Texas. Listed numbers for the defendants could not be found Sunday and it was unclear whether they had attorneys.

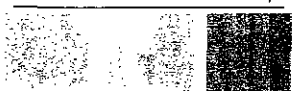

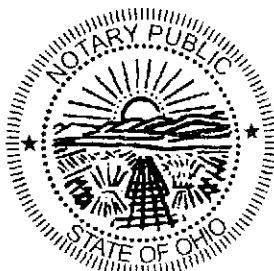

U.S. plays quiet role in Africa

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — While putting few U.S. troops at risk, the United States is playing a growing role in Africa's military battles, using special forces advisers, drones and tens of millions of dollars in military aid to combat a growing and multifaceted security threat.

Once again, the focus is Somalia, the lawless nation that was the site of America's last large-scale military intervention in Africa in the early 1990s. By the time U.S. forces departed, 44 Army soldiers, Marines and airmen had been killed and dozens more wounded.

This time the United States is playing a less visible role, providing intelligence and training to fight militants across the continent, from Mauritania in the west along the Atlantic coast, to Somalia in the east along the Indian Ocean.

The renewed focus on Africa follows a series of recent and dramatic attacks.

In August, a hard-line Islamist group in Nigeria bombed the U.N. headquarters in the capital, Abuja, killing 23 people. A year earlier, the Somali group al-Shabab unleashed twin bombings in Kampala, Uganda, that killed 76.

Wrecked cars are covered with mud in Burgello di Vado, in northwest Italy, Thursday. Soldiers and volunteers battled knee-deep mud searching for survivors after violent rains triggered flash floods and mudslides in the coastal areas of Liguria and Tuscany.

U.S.-born Israeli released; 25 jailed Egyptians freed

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel said Thursday that it agreed to trade Egyptian prisoners for a U.S.-born Israeli citizen imprisoned in Cairo on unsubstantiated suspicions of spying to defuse a potential crisis between the neighboring countries.

Israel's agreement to such a swap highlights how brittle relations have become between the two since the fall of Egypt's longtime leader Hosni Mubarak, and that many on both sides want to preserve them.

Israel released 25 jailed Egyptians, most of them smugglers, for the U.S.-born Ilan Grapel, who was arrested in Cairo in June and who previously served in the Israeli military.

The freed Egyptian prisoners passed into Sinai through a land crossing from Israel. TV broadcasts showed some of the Egyptian men kneeling to kiss the asphalt after crossing through a blue metal gate at the border.

At a news conference late Thursday in Jerusalem, Grapel said Egyptian authorities "made sure that I was fed well, respected me and made sure no one harmed me in any way."

Grapel said he was held on "trumped-up allegations." Israel's government, his family and friends insisted all along that Grapel was not a spy.

Many Israelis scoffed at the need for a deal to free a citizen arrested by a friendly nation on what were widely believed to be falsified charges.

Israel Hasson, an Israeli lawmaker dispatched to Israel to escort Grapel from Egypt, said the Israeli government agreed to free prisoners to ease tensions.

"This event could have developed into a crisis and we don't think either country needs that," Hasson told Israel Radio. "This was not a prisoner exchange. This was crisis prevention between Israel, the U.S. and Egypt."

E. coli outbreak possibly linked to N.C. state fair

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — North Carolina officials are investigating up to 21 possible cases of E. coli affecting people in six counties, with four children still hospitalized because of the ailment.

State Epidemiologist Megan Davies said Thursday that nine cases have been confirmed, and 12 more are being evaluated.

Most of the cases come from Wake County, which has seven confirmed and four suspected. Sampson

County has six, and there is one each in Durham, Johnston, Franklin and Cleveland counties.

Eight of the nine confirmed cases occurred in people who attended the state fair, but Davies said investigators don't know yet how many of the suspected cases were linked to the event.

Davies said it's not clear yet what else the confirmed cases had in common besides attending the fair in its early days.
