Middletown Coke Company (MCC), a subsidiary of SunCoke Energy (SunCoke) is developing a site in Middletown, Ohio with a heat recovery coke oven project that will provide a stable and economic supply of metallurgical coke to AK Steel's adjacent Middletown Works. One of the by-products of MCC's process is heat, which is turned into steam during the flue gas cooling process. MCC proposes to utilize otherwise wasted heat from the coke plant to generate electricity. The Cogeneration Station will be located in Butler County, in the City of Middletown, bordered by State Route 4 to the west, Yankee Road to the east, Oxford State Road and Dicks Creek to the north and residential and agricultural land to the south. The Cogeneration Station will be located within an approximately 3-acre tract of land located to the southeast of the Coke Plant that will be located on an approximately 250-acre tract of land, which was optioned by SunCoke for the construction of a coke facility. The proposed power generation equipment will occupy only about 3 acres of the site. Other proposed facilities include coke ovens and their associated facilities including rail, road, or other site infrastructure.

The Cogeneration Station will include a single steam turbine building (administration, operation, and STG Hall), an administration area, flue gas desulphurization (FGD) area, outdoor HRSG area, exterior tankage, cooling towers, 69kV substation and general roadway access to the major equipment. The Cogeneration Station will require several auxiliary systems to support power generation including: 1) condensate; 2) feedwater; 3) blowdown; 4) flue gas; 5) station water

- treatment; 6) station compressed air; 7) station process cooling water; 8) station circulating cooling water; 9) station monitoring and control; 10) station electric supply; and, 11) utility interconnection.

The Area of Potential Effect (APE) for this project consists of the land directly impacted by ground disturbance which includes the Cogeneration Station and support features discussed above and locations of access road to the major equipment (direct APE), and the surrounding viewshed (indirect APE) which includes cultural resources that may be visually impacted by the construction of the items above. URS identified previously recorded cultural resources within two miles and immediately adjacent to the project area to evaluate the viewshed.

URS conducted a literature review at the OHPO to locate any previously recorded cultural resources within or near the APE. An arbitrary one-mile buffer was used to identify any cultural resource investigations that had previously taken place, and to provide information on the expected types and location parameters of sites in the vicinity. The archival study included a review of the Ohio Archaeological Inventory (OAI), Ohio Historic Inventory (OHI), and National Register of Historic Places (NRHP).

As a result of the literature review using a one-mile buffer only two archaeological sites, one historic structure, one NRHP-listed property and one area of previous archaeological survey were identified. In order to develop an accurate predictive model for the types of sites likely to be encountered within the APE, URS expanded the buffer to 2 miles. As a result of the expanded 2 mile buffer, six additional areas of previous archaeological survey, 36 additional archaeological sites, 48 additional historic structures and three additional NRHP-listed properties were identified. None of the previously recorded resources were identified within the proposed three-acre direct APE.




