



Suspect in U.S. consulate attack is arrested

has been looking into the arrests of two Tunisian men being detained in Turkey reportedly in connection with the attacks. The State Department in Washington had no further comment on Wednesday.

A U.S. intelligence official was cautious about the Tunisian arrest, saying that the Tunisians have so far not allowed American officials to interview the suspect, so the United States is not yet certain how directly he is connected to the attack.

The suspect has ties to both Ansar al-Sharia and al-Qaeda in the Islamic Maghreb, the official said, speaking on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to discuss the investigation publicly.

Tunisian Interior Ministry spokesman Tarrouch Khaled confirmed that Mr. Harzi was in custody in Tunisia.

Tunisian man to face terrorism charges

He said Mr. Harzi is one of two Tunisians reportedly arrested Oct. 3 in Turkey when they tried to enter the country with false passports.

The person spoke on the condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to release the information.

Mr. Harzi's alleged role in the attack is not clear. Mr. Anwar denied there was any evidence that Mr. Harzi was implicated in the attacks. He added his client was not using a fake passport, saying he was a "scapegoat to satisfy the Americans."

The charge against Mr. Harzi is punishable by six to 12 years in prison, according to the provisions of the anti-terrorist law in force in Tunisia since 2003.

Residents "feel safe" in their homes.

"We don't need to remove just crime, but also the feel of crime. We have people in the county who have shotguns next to their front doors from the fear of crime," Dailey said. "Pike and Scioto County have been the focal point for several years for drug trafficking. When I was growing up in Pike County, it wasn't the epidemic that it is today. These days, it isn't just pot or pills, it is substances like meth and black tar heroin. People can get drugs here now as easily as they can make it themselves."

Dailey served more than 26 years in the U.S.



The staff members who attended the meeting at Seneca Valley Watershed Conservancy District will continue to accept written, public comment until Nov. 1 concerning a proposal with respect to oil and gas leasing at the Seneca Lake area as well as the possible sales of water to companies in the gas and oil industry.

The conservancy hosted a public hearing last week that was attended by about 85 people and at which 20 people registered to provide comments and to ask questions of the conservancy staff.

However, members of the public who were unable or who simply did not attend the meet-

ing may still email comments to the MWCD staff and board of directors for their review as they deliberate the proposals. The staff told those attending the hearing that the conservancy plans to negotiate a "no-development lease" on its Seneca property. What that means is that the conservancy will forbid companies from placing any gas or oil wells directly on MWCD property. Some of those attending the hearing expressed opposition to any plans pertaining to gas and oil leasing in the lake area. They expressed concerns about possible contamination of the lake's water and sale of water they said would then be beyond rehabilitation.

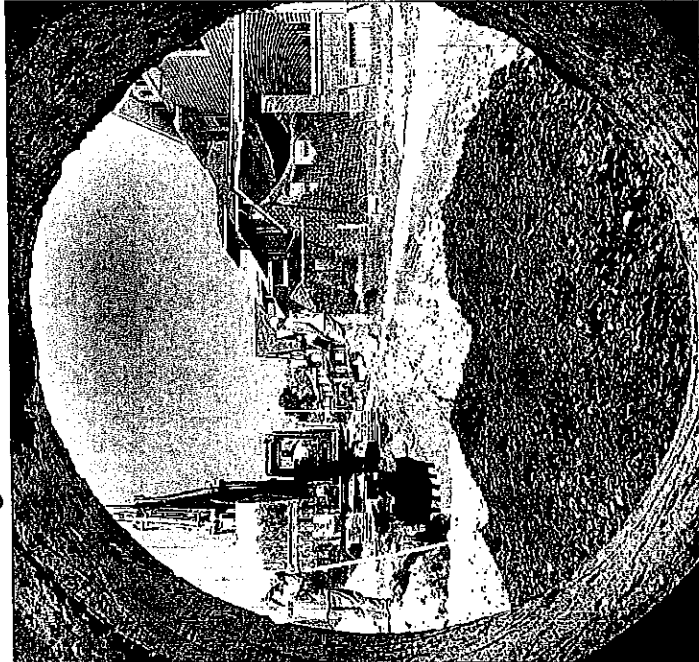

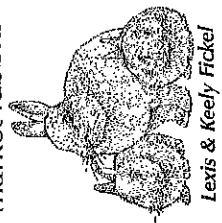

Panel: Get whooping cough shot in pregnancy

ATLANTA — The government's expert vaccine advisory panel is urging every expecting mother to get a shot preventing whooping cough, preferably in the last three months of her pregnancy to help protect her baby.

The advice follows a frightening resurgence of the dreaded childhood disease. More than 32,000 cases, including 16 deaths, have been reported so far this year, and 2012 is on track to be the nation's worst year for whooping cough since 1989.

Aspirin may help treat some cancers

NEW YORK — Aspirin has shown remarkable promise in treating colon cancer in people with certain genetic mutations that often play a role in the disease.

Among patients with the mutations, those who regularly took aspirin lived longer than those who didn't, a major study found. Five years after their cancers were diagnosed, 97 percent of the aspirin users were still alive versus 74 percent of those not taking the drug.

Aspirin seemed to make no difference in patients who did not have the mutations.

This sort of study can't prove that aspirin caused the better survival, and doctors say more research must confirm the findings before aspirin can be recommended more widely. The study wasn't designed to test aspirin, people were taking it on their own for various reasons.

Still, the results suggest that this simple medicine might be the cheapest gene-targeting therapy ever found for

cancer: About one-sixth of all colon cancer patients have the mutated gene and might be helped by aspirin.

"It's exciting to think that something that's already in the medicine cabinet may really have an important effect" beyond relieving pain and helping to prevent heart attacks, said Dr. Andrew Chan of Massachusetts General Hospital. He and others from Harvard Medical School led the study, which appears in Thursday's New England Journal of Medicine.

New nuclear plants ready for approval

China said Wednesday that it is ready to approve new nuclear power plants as part of ambitious plans to reduce reliance on oil and coal, ending a moratorium imposed after Japan's Fukushima disaster last year. The government said it hopes to generate 30 percent of China's power from solar, wind and other renewable sources as well as from nuclear energy by the end of 2015. That's up from an earlier target of 15 percent from renewables plus 5 percent from nuclear by 2020. The Cabinet on Wednesday passed plans on nuclear power safety and development that said construction of nuclear power plants would resume "steadily."

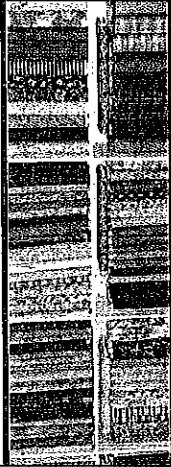

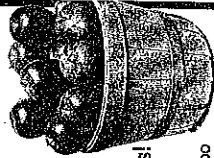

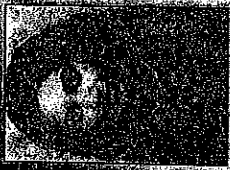

"She just won't get a screening and I tell her what I tell other women, you've got to go," said Pam, her voice rising.

According to the American Cancer Society, regular breast cancer screening is recommended for all women over the age of 40. Self-examination, mammography and clinical exams are the most common and effective screening methods. For women over 40, mammography is recommended once a year.

For Pam, those screenings would take place at The Ohio State University's cancer center.

"The care I received was excellent. They did four different exams in one day including an MRI, mammograms and a biopsy," Pam said.

Pam would endure the physical pain and the mental anguish of five biopsies. The results were a diagnosis that would change Pam's life forever.

Pam was told she had LCIS (lobular carcinoma in situ) and DCIS (ductal carcinoma in situ).

"They found cancer in one breast and then the other," Pam said. According to the National Center for Biotechnology Information, lobular carcinomas start in the parts of the breast that produce milk, the lobules. A LCIS is a marker for an increased risk of invasive cancer in the same or both breasts.

DCIS, or intraductal carcinoma, starts in the lining of the ducts that carry milk to the nipples. Left untreated, intraductal cancers may become invasive.

"It took me six months to decide on a double mastectomy."

Pam said "But I had to survive. I'm a single mom with a 13-year-old son and thought, do I have a choice?"

While fighting her own battle, Pam is a passionate advocate for breast cancer awareness. She volunteers, sells T-shirts, and spreads the word about breast health.

"It's hard for people to accept the idea of getting an exam, but if I can get one person to get screened, that's enough for me," Pam said.

Hopeful about the future, Pam reflected on her own battle.

"You learn to appreciate the little things," she said.

"I've learned to always have faith, and take things one day at a time."
