DEAR HELOISE:

After a bout of ...

... sickness at our home, I picked up the phone and, when it was time to start for Sunday, a question came to mind: Does anyone washing machine detergent kill germs?

Your question got Heloise Central wondering about this. You might be surprised when you read the information!

If you're not using hot water (120-130 degrees F) or chlorine bleach, or a pine-oil disinfectant, you probably are NOT killing the bacteria. When you use hot water and the dryer, this will kill most germs. If your wash load includes colors or items that color-lose, bleach may be needed, use color-safe bleach or place-oil disinfectant. And believe it or not, house-mothers who hang their clothes out to dry in the sunbaker, or actually killing bacteria. The truth is, sunbaking is great! Unfortunately, it isn't possible for many of us to hang clothes outside.

So, to keep your washing machine as clean as possible, clean it once in a while, and also, if a lady someone has been sick in your house, use chlorine bleach and water only (no clothes). Current washing methods may have a cleaning cycle on them.

DEAR HELOISE: When creating a cellphone contact, I put the association first.

NOTICE OF PUBLIC INFORMATION MEETING FOR PROPOSED MAJOR UTILITY FACILITY

AFP Ohio, a unit of American Electric Power, Schedule Open House to Outline Plans to Reinforce Transmission System in Hancock County

AFP Ohio, a unit of American Electric Power (AEP), and the AEP Ohio Transmission Company (AEP Ohio) invite residents of Hancock County, including the communities of Findlay and Clay Township, to attend an informational open house regarding plans to construct a new 138 kV (kilovolt) transmission substation in Hancock County.

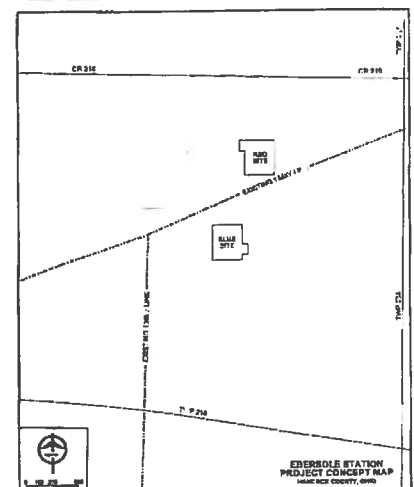
The public open house will take place from 6 to 8 p.m. July 11, 2013, at Owens Community College, Conference Center Room 111, 2080 Bright Road, Findlay, Ohio. The open house format allows the public to visit individual project displays and speak directly to project management and project engineers about the various aspects of the proposed project. No formal presentation will be given.

This project is known as the Findlay Area Improvement Plan. It is a major transmission reinforcement effort to help AEP meet its vision development and maintain an adequate level of transmission reliability in the northeast Ohio and Hancock County.

AEP proposes to build Elmwood Station on approximately 64 acres in Clay Township in Hancock County, approximately 1.7 miles northwest of Findlay. The property is near the intersection of Township Road 28 and County Road 216. The completed station will use approximately 64 acres, with between one half to one acre dedicated to an access drive. AEP will propose blue and black station layout on this property. This property currently is an active agricultural field.

The project also will make improvements to several existing substations, and upgrade and remove existing 138 kV transmission lines along existing rights of way. This includes replacing several existing overhead lines and structures.

The proposed station will allow the company to address reliability concerns about potential low voltage during certain emergency conditions. Without this substation, in a worst case scenario, unexpected widespread power outages may affect major portions of Hancock and nearby counties.



The 138 kV station work is needed to provide line voltage capacity at the company's new Liberty North Findlay, Findlay Center and Marion stations. This project also reinforces the company's 138 kV and 33 kV subtransmission systems in the Findlay area. It addresses double contingency conditions required by AEP and PJM (the regional transmission operator) to provide the level of service that the customers need and expect.

The new station also establishes a new 138 kV source in the Findlay area, reinforcing the existing system.

The proposed Elmwood Station also will enhance service reliability and provide capacity for economic growth in the area. AEP's Findlay station has been the backbone of the company's transmission system and will be inadequate to provide the level of service that the customers need and expect.

The Ohio Power Siting Board is responsible for reviewing information related to the project — including to inform the public — and determining whether the proposed project should be approved. The accompanying map shows the proposed line and bus area AEP Ohio will submit to the OSB.

The guidelines established by the OSB board require AEP to study multiple sites and submit two station sites for the board's evaluation. Information and comments submitted during the public information open house and other factors help determine the site and determine which site the company will propose for approval.

AEP expects to file its formal application for the station along with the siting application August 2013. If the application is approved, construction of the station could begin in mid-2014 and be in service in late 2015.

AEP projects Elmwood Station, an estimated \$112 million investment, will provide approximately 340,000 in property taxes to local schools and communities.
