Pomeroy resident wins \$500K in Ohio Lottery

POMEROY — Darryl Pooler, 61, of Pomeroy claimed a \$500,000 prize at the Ohio Lottery's Athens regional office last week. He won the prize playing the Ohio Lottery's \$10 instant game, 50X the Money. He told Lottery officials that this has been one of his favorite Ohio Lottery games. He hopes to take his nephew Phillip, who purchased the ticket for him, on a trip to Las Vegas — first class.

Pooler has some practical needs for the money as well. He'd like to fix his driveway and pay bills. The winning ticket was purchased from Speedway #9235, 319 East State Street in Athens. Speedway receives a \$5,000 sales bonus.

Palestinian ambassador in Prague killed in blast

PRAGUE (AP) — The Palestinian ambassador to the Czech Republic died Wednesday in a blast that occurred when he opened an office safe that had been sealed for at least 30 years, officials said.

Ambassador Jamel al-Jamal, 56, was at home with his family at the time of the explosion, according to Palestinian Embassy spokesman Nabil El-Fahel. Al-Jamal was seriously injured and rushed to a hospital where he died, according to police spokeswoman Andrea Zoulouva.

Palestinian Foreign Minister Riad Malki said no foul play was suspected, noting that the safe hadn't been opened in at least 30 years. It was recently moved from an old embassy building.

"The ambassador decided to open it. After he opened it, apparently something happened inside (the safe) and went off," Malki told The Associated Press.

It was not immediately clear how Malki knew the safe hadn't been opened in at least 30 years or why the safe would have contained explosives.

It was also unclear where the safe had been three decades ago — during the Cold War, the Palestinian Liberation Organization maintained a presence in many eastern bloc countries.

Zoulouva said police were searching the apartment but declined further comment.

Martin Cervick, the country's top police officer, told the Czech public television that nothing was immediately found to suggest that the diplomat had been targeted.

Prague rescue service spokeswoman Jitka Ernestova said al-Jamal was placed in a medically induced coma when he first arrived at Prague Military Hospital. Dr. Daniel Lange, who works there, told public television that al-Jamal had suffered serious abdominal injuries.

sion of Jeopardy against others who were auditioning. Then, there was an interview to test your personality and charisma. Finally, we had another 50-question test. This one was hand written, and we were only given eight seconds to write each answer."

Struble said after the audition, his name was placed in a pool for 18 months. He could receive a call at any point during this time, or no call at all. Struble's call came in late August asking him to be a contestant in an episode taped in September.

"When they called to tell me I was going to come out to California to tape, I screamed," Struble said. "I didn't think it was real. I thought there was a mistake. I immediately hung up the phone and called my parents. I was excited and nervous."

Struble said he enjoyed the experience and that he felt that everyone involved in the process from producers, staff and Alex Trebek to the other contestants were very nice.

"It was so surreal to be in

the studio and see the set you watched on TV, in my case, for 25 years," Struble said. "You get there and think 'Is this really happening?' I didn't realize I would be in such close quarters with the other twenty contestants scheduled to tape that day, but they kept us together and put us all in the same hotel. We became friends. The staff was just so nice to all of us."

Struble's episode aired Friday, December 13 and until then, he had to keep everything secret.

"Keeping quiet was probably the hardest part of the whole process," Struble said. "You can't talk about anything you saw. I had to watch five other shows being taped, and I couldn't even talk about what color shirt Alex Trebek wore. It made Thanksgiving this year so awkward because all of my family members kept asking me about the results, and I kept having to put them off because I had to keep the secret even though I wanted to talk about it."

"It was weird to watch," Struble said. "I've never been on television. I had a viewing party and people

were cheering when I got questions right and booing when Alex said I was wrong, and I just appreciate the support."

Struble said he has been recognized by people just by being on the show.

"People come up to me and tell me they remember my face on Jeopardy and talk about how tough the board was that day," Struble said. "One thing they wanted us to send on the set was 'Rockwell' groupies' who try to send friend requests to the contestants on the show, and just a few days after my episode aired, people were trying to send

me friend requests."

Struble said he came in third place, winning \$1,000. He also said although he did not win, he has no reason to complain.

"I didn't have the \$1,000 dollars when I went out there, but now I do," Struble said. "It's an experience I'll treasure for the rest of my life so I can't complain about that."

Struble, a 1998 graduate of Southern High School, is the son of Michael and Patricia Struble of Sycamore, Ohio, and grandson of Joseph and Martha Struble of Pomeroy, Ohio, and John Hale of Racine, Ohio.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED MAJOR UTILITY FACILITY

AEP Ohio, a unit of American Electric Power, proposes to improve the transmission system in Gallia County by relocating the existing Gavin 138-kVolt (kV) Extension No. 2 Line at AEP's Gavin Plant.

The purpose of the project is to relocate the existing steel lattice towers to accommodate the expansion of the Gavin Coal Combustion Resource Landfill. The relocated line will be approximately 1.3 miles in length. Construction is scheduled to begin in February 2014. The transmission line project is located entirely on AEP property.

The project is known as the Gavin 138-kV Extension No. 2 Relocation Project. As required by Ohio Revised Code Section 4906-11-01, AEP Ohio has filed a Letter of Notification with the state of Ohio Power Siting Board.

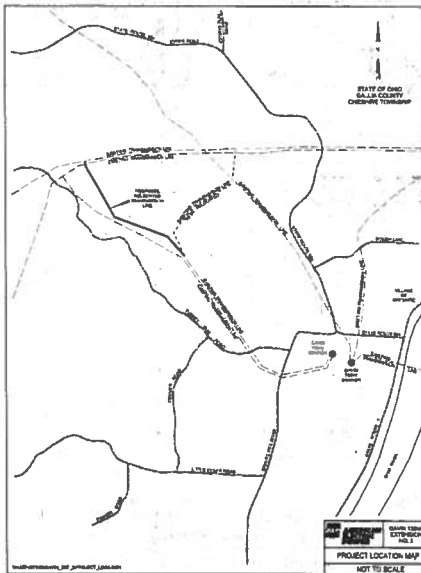
This project qualifies as a Letter of Notification filing because it meets the requirements outlined in OAC 4906-1-01, Item (1)(d) of Appendix A "Application Requirement Matrix for Electric Power Transmission Lines" where routing of single or multiple circuit electric transmission lines 125 kV and above but less than 300 kV and greater than 0.2 miles in length but not greater than two miles in length.

The Letter of Notification for the Gavin 138-kV Extension No. 2 Relocation Project is pending before the Ohio Power Siting Board. This application has been assigned Case Number 13-2412-EL-BLN. This number should be included in all communications with respect to this proceeding.

Petitions to intervene in or comment on the Letter of Notification will be accepted by the siting board up to 10 days following the publication date of this notice required by Rule 4906-5-08(C)(1), OAC. Petitions should be addressed to Ohio Power Siting Board, 180 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio, 43215-3793 and must cite the above-listed case number.

The Gavin 138-kV Extension No. 2 Relocation Project involves the installation of six new steel lattice towers and two new steel pole structures. New conductors, insulators and hardware will be installed on the new structures.

The project will be an approximate \$4 million investment by AEP in its transmission system in the area. The project will allow AEP to continue to provide this level of service its customers expect.



The accompanying map depicts the general location of the transmission line. It should be noted that due to the reduced scale and limited detail, this map should be used only as a general guide.
