Examiner with the Ohio Power Siting Board assigned to process this proceeding. In addition, there's Board Staff here, Don Rostofer, and at the back, as you came in, was Matthew Butler. If you have any questions about the Board's role in this proceeding, you can ask them, or if you wait until the conclusion of the hearing, I'll be available for a few minutes

after the hearing is over.

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At this time, I'd like to take appearances of the parties. On behalf of Carroll County Energy.

On behalf of Carroll County Energy, LLC, Michael Settineri, with the law firm of Vorys, Sater, Seymour & Pease, 52 East Gay Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215. With me tonight is Jonathan Winslow, the Project Manager for Carroll County Energy. Also, we have other members of the project team who are available in the information area who can answer any questions informally. Thank you.

Carroll County Energy filed its initial application

for approval to construct the proposed electric generation facility on November 15th, 2013. As proposed, the generation facility would consist of two natural-gas fired, combined-cycle turbines with steam generators, providing a total capacity of 742 megawatts. The total project area, including the generation facility, access roads, and ancillary equipment, will be constructed, if approved, on 77 acres in Washington Township, Carroll County. The proposed site is currently agriculture land. The Applicant proposes to commence construction in February 2015 and to begin commercial operation by May 1st, 2017.

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The Board Staff has evaluated, reviewed, and investigated the application and conducted site visits and filed its report of investigation in the docket on February 19th, 2014. I emphasize that the Board Staff report is its recommended decision. It is not the decision and does not necessarily reflect the decision of the Ohio Power Siting Board.

This local public hearing is one aspect of the process. In addition, there will be an evidentiary hearing held at the Board's offices in Columbus next week on March 13th where the parties to the proceeding, in this case Carroll County,

Washington Township, and Board Staff, are scheduled to offer their testimony and cross-examine each others witnesses.

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The purpose of this evening's hearing is to receive comments from the public in Carroll County regarding the application. It's not a question-and-answer session. If you have questions, you need to go right back out into the room where there are representatives from -- of the project, and you can get your questions answered and come back in and offer your testimony, because this is the best time for you to put what your position is in this docket for the Commission -- I'm sorry, for the Board's consideration.

As you may have noticed, tonight's hearing is being transcribed. If you plan to offer testimony, please speak clearly and accurately so that it is reflected in the record. If you brought with you a written statement, if you would please provide it to the court reporter after you concluded so that she can use your statement in making sure the record is clear, spelled correctly, and reflects the names and the places that you may refer to in your testimony.

When you arrived you were offered the

opportunity to sign in to offer testimony this evening. If when I call your name you decide that you do not -- that you no longer want to offer testimony, please just say pass, and I'll move on to the next witness. We'll bring witnesses forward in the order that you signed in at the table just outside the door. If you would like to offer testimony, when you step forward, I will ask you to give us your name and provide your address for the record. I will also swear you in. I will ask that you -- if the information that you're about to give is the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth before you give any of your testimony. 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days, and the fact that we can have a cheap source of energy in this neighborhood that's going to provide good jobs and it's going to reduce carbon emissions is a wonderful asset to the community, beyond being a job provider.

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You know, America is leading the world in CO2 reduction, which is a big deal, and one of the big reasons is because of the conversion to natural gas power and other uses of natural gas. And in support of the project, I decided I would look down at some of the economic benefits that are listed in the -- I think it's the application that's online, and I just pulled out some of the statistics that were really impressive to me; 150 million in wages, 500 -- that's 500 workers average over a 28-month construction period for the project; so that's a -- that's a lot of tax revenue, a lot of people being put to work here in this community.

They say the indirect job creation across Northern Ohio for indirect suppliers, et cetera, is about 156 jobs. Once operating, 5.6 million a year in local wages that will be paid. That's people running the plant, and that's not to mention the other suppliers, you know, the people that supply the floor mats for the facility, that

upkeep the landscaping, that do all the ancillary things that also go along with a project like this. Hundreds of millions of dollars in impact across the whole State of Ohio from all the supplies that will need to be built and then sent here to build the plant with and to maintain it afterwards.

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And I read in there that you're seeking an Enterprise Zone, and if that could happen -- I know it's not a done deal, but if it happens, it's going to be a really wrong economic resource for the local schools, which, as I understand it, are in a pretty tough financial situation, so that would solve that problem.

The sewer and water extensions that would be put in place to provide -- you know, to provide sewer and water to this plant would also open up some land that's in a great location and would now have sewer and water that's accessible for other industries that want to come here and create jobs, private investment in the community, and it would be a -- you know, it would be the beginning of a -- something that could grow from within over time; so I truly support the project, and I think Carrollton is blessed to have this opportunity.

DIRECT TESTIMONY

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MR. SZOLLOSI: Thank you, your Honor. I appreciate the opportunity to be here this evening. I have the privilege of serving as the Executive Director of ACT Ohio, which stands for the Affiliated Construction Trades of Ohio. ACT Ohio is a 501(c)(5) organization that was established by the state building trades to facilitate economic and industrial development opportunities and to promote industry best practices for Ohio's public and private construction.

Our 123 affiliates and 14 regional councils across the state represent over 90,000 of the most highly skilled, highly trained construction workers in the state, many of whom reside here in Carroll County and, in fact, as my colleagues have said already, are here this evening in support of this project.

We partner with our employer contractors to provide the very best work product and value for our customers. We've worked with many national contractors who employ thousands across the country. Seventy percent of our 13,000 signatory contractors employ 15 or less people. Through these partnerships

and labor management cooperatives jointly administer health insurance and retirement funds that have been established to attract and maintain the best and brightest in the construction industry. Random mandatory drug testing has been standard in our workforce for many, many years. One cornerstone of our approach is our investment in state-of-the-art apprenticeship training, again, jointly administered in equal numbers by labor and management representatives or trustees. Our affiliates invest hundreds of millions of dollars per year to train apprentices and update our journeyman mechanics.

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The other fundamental building block of our industry is safety. Any one of the guys here will tell you more than anything our members want to do two things: They want to have the opportunity to go to work, and after work they want to have the opportunity to go home safely to their families. Our partner employers strict, ironclad enforcement of safety standards and our rigid approach with respect to safety training and the investments therein help minimize or eliminate workplace injuries and fatalities.

Last year I had the privilege of attending a ribbon cutting a \$450 million reformer

replacement at Ohio's largest oil refinery, 400 plus workers over 16 months, zero lost time injuries on that project, and that's -- no pun intended, that does not happen by accident.

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Our workforce has successfully completed tens of billions of dollars of work from nuclear power plants and power plants such as this, with natural gas, coal, to oil refineries, auto and other manufacturing facilities, skyscrapers, schools, hospitals. Every type of vertical construction imaginable, we've completed. Our heavy highway division has successfully completed millions of miles of highways, roads, and bridge construction.

Our members, these highly skilled, highly trained construction workers and our partner employers live here. They work here. They raise their families here. They coach their kids here. They attend church services here, and they support the local economy. Due to the fluid nature of the construction industry, our workers are not guaranteed a paycheck every other Friday. We compete every day for our jobs. We see this \$800 million project as a win, win, win for the local economy and its workforce, the investors, and the State of Ohio.

conditions as set forth in the March 3rd notice filed by Mr. Settineri on behalf of Carroll County Energy. I'm not going to comment specifically on each of the 14 or so conditions listed therein. I will say overall we support efforts to minimize disruption to the adjacent property owners to the greatest extent possible, of course. Similar, we are sensitive to the concerns that I saw expressed by Mr. Shurtz, Harold Shurtz. We will certainly do our part to adhere to the parameters established by the local authorities and the owners for ingress and egress, noise, debris, and the like.

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While there may be some inconvenience, this 700 megawatt natural-gas fired, combined-cycle power plant will help anchor the local economy for decades to come. The key is to strike the correct balance between the rights and interests of the adjacent property owners, the community, and the investors. I am very confident that this balance can be reached.

On behalf of ACT Ohio, our local affiliates, and our 90,000 plus members in the State of Ohio, we urge your favorable consideration in certification of this project. Thank you.

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DIRECT TESTIMONY

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MR. CONDRICH: I'd first like to say I do represent the Boilermakers Local 744. I am their Acting Vice-President. We have our members. represent almost one-third of Ohio, and we do have active members that live right in your community, even though, you know, I'm from Parma; so we do represent a lot of people and a lot of good, hard-working men, and like the ironworkers and your other union officials have stated, highly trained, highly motivated, and respectful workers, because I can vouch. I've been in the field for 33 years. These men are family men, and they do appreciate -just like he said, paychecks are -- we prove ourselves, believe it or not, daily, because just of the nature of our work.

We've had nothing but bad news from other power stations, like FirstEnergy, just closing plants left and right, and you guys have an opportunity here to be a state-of-the-art boiler, and clean air is boilermaker business. This could be state-of-the-art, showing the big boys that -- you know, they're just taking their ball and going home, and they're giving up on the American people and our workers in Ohio. This is a time to -- for us. You

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know, we stand with you. You know, if you can bring

And certainly with the energy being created, unlike other types of industries, you know, there's no truck traffic in this. The gas is coming in, to his plan, and the power is going out on that line; so we're going to be able to provide 25 or 30 new jobs to our county without really having any problems with our -- with our infrastructure, except water and sewer. You

know, we're not going to have a lot of traffic, except this is also going to give us the ability -and the other gentleman talked about this opportunity for us to develop our water and sewer. Not only that -- you know, we certainly need to make sure that we work extremely hard to be able to provide that source to Carroll County Energy, the water and sewer, but it also gives us the opportunity -- we have a commerce park plan just adjacent to that, and we've got companies knocking on our door every day saying we want to come to Carroll County, and our answer is we'd love to have you, we've got the ground, but we don't have the infrastructure, and with this opportunity, I think we're going to be able to provide that, so -- you know, this is a win-win for the 25 or 30 employees that's going to land at that position and have long-term jobs for 30, 40 years. It certainly will be, but it will also provide opportunities for other employment not only in the early stages during construction and also the opportunity for some of our local vendors to be able to supply material to that plant, but it's also going to provide us the opportunity to -- for ongoing development, so we can -- when those clients call or those prospects call and say, you know, we want -- we

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want to come to your county, can you take us, and we'll say absolutely, when do you want to put the shovel in the ground.
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So thank you very much for letting me address this audience, and we're certainly excited and look for every opportunity to make sure this works, so thank you.

It's my understanding a nearly a \$943 million impact that it could have here, some 500 construction jobs, and I want to just go on the record as an advocate for good-paying, qualified, skilled construction trades that have done a great job, I think, with the power plants throughout this district and I think would do a marvelous job here for this project, and certainly understand, you know, the desire and hunger and thirst for new jobs to come to Carroll County, to come to the 30th Senate
