And Case No. 13-2386-EL-AAM captioned in the matter of the application of Ohio Power Company for approval of certain accounting authority.

My name is Sarah Parrot, thank you all again for coming this evening. I am an Attorney Examiner with the Commission's Legal Department and will be conducting this public hearing this evening.

Also with me tonight is Chairman
Thomas Johnson of the PUCO. And in the rear of
the room we have Darita Patterson and Jill
Kocher who are also with the Commission's staff
and they are here this evening to answer any

questions that anyone may have regarding a utility matter that is not the subject of the application. That is why we are all here this evening.

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At this time let's get started with appearances on behalf of the parties. And we will start with Ohio Power Company.

CHAIRMAN JOHNSON: May I say something?

Johnson, and I am the Chair of the Public
Utilities Commission and I would like to just
welcome you here and tell you that this is part
of the process that we go through, but those
that are testifying we appreciate it very much.
And if you happen to be just here observing we
also thank you for that.

But this is the 5th hearing and we have five Commissioners, and so at least one Commissioner has I believe attended every one of these meetings. And, so, whether those Commissioners are here or not they read what has been said here, and also the other hearings.

And, so, this is very important to

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us. And, again, thank's for being here.
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much. Now let's continue with our appearances starting with the company.

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ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Thank you. Are there any other parties present this evening?

All right. Let the record reflect that there are no other parties present. I would note, however, that there are a number of intervenors representing residential customers,

25 commercial customers, industrial customers as

well as other numerous consumer advocates and other groups in the case. Each of these parties represent their various constituents in the case before the Commission.

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On December 20th, 2013 Ohio Power Company filed an application with the Commission to establish a standard service offer in the form of an electric security plan, or ESP, to be in effect from June 2015 through May 2018.

The five local public hearings scheduled in this case are just one aspect of the case process. An evidentiary hearing is also scheduled to commence on June 3, 2014 at the Commission's offices in Columbus, Ohio.

The purpose of this evening's hearing is to receive comments from the public regarding Ohio Power Company's application. It is not a question and answer session, but it's your opportunity to let the Commissioners know what you think about Ohio Power Company's application.

As you likely noted tonight's hearing is being transcribed by a court reporter. If you plan to testify please speak clearly so that the court reporter can

accurately reflect your comments for the record. If you have prepared a written statement it will be helpful if you provide a copy of that to the court reporter.

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When you arrived you were offered an opportunity to sign up to testify. After I finish with my opening remarks I will begin calling witnesses forward in the order that you have signed the sign-in sheets. I will ask each witness to come forward to the podium or to the front of the room, face the court reporter, and before you offer your comments I will ask that you provide your name and address and take an oath or affirmation that what you are about to say is the truth. Your testimony will then be considered part of the official record in this case and will be reviewed, as Chairman Johnson said, by the Commissioners before a final decision is rendered on the application.

The parties to the case or myself will have an opportunity to ask any questions that we have, if necessary, for purposes of clarity of the record or so forth.

Should you decide that you do not wish to testify when I call your name you may

pass to the next witness. And once you finished testifying or if you are merely here to observe this evening please feel free to leave at any time that you wish.

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We do appreciate your participation tonight, and we want all of you that wish to make a public statement to have the opportunity to do so.

At this time I am going to begin calling witnesses forward. And we will start with Mr. Bill Hutchinson.

(WITNESS SWORN)

BILL HUTCHINSON

called as a witness, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Please state your name and address for the record.

MR. HUTCHINSON: Bill Hutchinson, 815 2nd Street, Marietta, Ohio.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Thank you.

MR. HUTCHINSON: I would just like to so show support for this AEP Ohio plan. It looks like on average there will be a 9 percent decrease for customers. They are proposing to hire more line people, they are proposing to

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hire more construction support staff, which is
always good for the economy.
I represent the local building
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trades and the local area unions in the area.

We work many, many thousands and thousands of hours with AEP. And it's a great stimulus for the local area. Brings money into the area. It helps out on everything.

I believe if they are given permission to do this that it will be able to continue their efforts to stimulate the economy in the State of Ohio, attract and retain business to our state, and create even more job opportunities.

So with that we would like to show our support. Thank you.

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## CHARLOTTE HATFIELD

called as a witness, being first duly sworn,
testified as follows:

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ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Name and address for the record.

MS. HATFIELD: Charlotte Hatfield,
426 5th Street, Marietta, Ohio. And I bring
testimony from John Molinaro, who is the
President and Chief Executive Officer of the
Appalachian Partnership for Economic Growth in
the form of a letter dated May 20th, to Chairman
Thomas W. Johnson.

Dear Chairman Johnson and Commissioners. As the JobsOhio Partner for Appalachian Ohio, the Appalachian Partnership for Economic Growth would like to express it's support for AEP Ohio's Energy Security Plan III ESP. APEG'S mission to promote widely shared prosperity across Appalachian Ohio could not be accomplished without AEP Ohio continuing to serve as a strong and healthy principal electric supplier and partner in the region's development.

As of June 2012 Derecho event amply demonstrated, a robust energy security plan is

critically important to the economic health of Appalachian Ohio. AEP's hard work to repair storm damage and increase reliability is a credit to the company. Its continued work to increase reliability through the Distribution Investment Rider and Enhanced Service Reliability Rider is necessary to support the region's current economy and encourage its economic growth.

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The ESP proposal also supports other areas of partnership between APEG and AEP Ohio that advance the region's economic health.

With the aging of the region's workforce and so many skilled workers nearing retirement, AEP Ohio's Sustained and Skilled Workforce Rider is essential to allow the company to recover incremental costs associated with the creation of new jobs.

AEP Ohio's Energy Efficiency Rider and Alternative Energy Rider provide important tools for supporting economic development in the region.

Programs made available through the Energy Efficiency Rider have been important components in making a "Why Ohio" case with

companies looking at investing in Ohio operations. They provide a necessary set of tools to demonstrate that Ohio can provide companies with a low-cost operating environment.

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The Alterative Energy Rider supports APEG's efforts to attract foreign direct investment from companies headquartered in regions sensitive to environmental concerns, especially the E.U. The rider demonstrates that the region's energy supplies are sourced in ways that address company sustainability goals.

The Economic Development Riders supports essential components of APEG and its partners' work in the region. Examples of just a few of the many ways this rider has returned real value to the region and its residents include:

APEG, helping meet costs associated with promoting development in the region that have not been eligible for support through other funding mechanisms. These critical, flexible dollars have been essential to APEG's success in attracting more than 3,000 jobs to the region since 2011.

AEP Ohio is collaborating with the Appalachian Partnership to create a Community Economic Development Academy. The academy is currently working with teams of leaders from 17 Appalachian Ohio counties to improve essential skills and enhance community readiness to pursue effective company attraction and expansion efforts.

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AEP Ohio, along with APEG and other partners, sponsors a Utica Shale Region Real Estate project at the Eastern Ohio Development Alliance. The project connects site consultants and commercial real estate brokers with commercial and industrial development sites in the eastern Ohio Utica Shale Region. This effort has provided significant benefits to the region and state's efforts to attract investment related to shale energy development.

AEP Ohio's Local Economic

Advancement Program grants have provided dozens of local communities and development organizations with financial assistance for efforts that prepare them to operate successful economic development programs or support specific development projects.

AEP provides further non-financial support for APEG's efforts through the generous contribution of its staff and expertise. Mark James, Vice President Economic and Business Development, serves on APEG's Board of Directors. AEP's economic development and community affairs staff provide essential assistance to economic development efforts in the region, including help with site identification and inventory efforts, capacity building, and assistance to local and regional programs. Its technical and engineering staff provides essential technical support for specific economic development projects.

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AEP Ohio's Rate Stabilization Plan
Grant Program provides financial assistance to
new and existing industries for expansion
projects that create new jobs, retain existing
jobs, and generate new investment within the AEP
Ohio service territory. These funds which are
designated to assist with the cost of utility
infrastructure, have been a major factor and
sometimes the deciding factor in the decisions
of companies to locate or expand in Appalachian
Ohio. They have also been critical to

preserving jobs that may otherwise have been lost to the region.

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We are particularly pleased to see that AEP's proposed ESP further benefits the region and its ratepayers by proposing an estimated nine percent reduction over the three-year term for customers that receive there generation rate through AEP Ohio. The combination of outstanding service, support for economic development, and substantial rate reduction is a win for both the region's economy and its ratepayers.

We recommend approval of AEP's case and ask that this testimony be docketed with Case No. 13-2385-EL-SSO.

(WITNESS SWORN)

MICHAEL L. BOSTER

25 called as a witness, being first duly sworn,

testified as follows:

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ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Name, address for the record, please.

MR. BOSTER: Michael L. Boster. My office address is 515 Park Avenue, Ironton, Ohio 45638.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Thank you.

MR. BOSTER: And I represent the Lawrence County Emergency Management Agency in Ironton.

Good evening ladies and gentlemen.

I am Michael Boster, Director of Lawrence County

Emergency Management Agency in Ironton, Ohio.

Thank you for the opportunity to speak in

regards to the American Electric Power Electric

Security Plan, ESP, which was filed on December

20th, fulfilling the Commission's objective for

AEP Ohio's full transition to market-based rates

for generation supply.

I want to speak briefly this evening about my experiences with AEP both on a personal and professional level. I will give examples of AEP's dedication to maintaining a viable power distribution delivery system as well as their commitment to community safety.

As both a personal consumer of and a professional partner with AEP Ohio I am privileged to witness and experience excellence in customer service from both perspectives. AEP leaders clearly recognize their roles in citizen and responder safety, economic injury mitigation for business customers, and the criticality of maintaining open communications with partner agencies.

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Routinely throughout the year AEP
Ohio's Community Affairs Manager out of
Chillicothe, Mr. Jon Buck, and his office staff
provides to or discusses with EMA director such
as weather information, outage restoration
updates, critical infrastructure information,
special needs population information, electrical
safety information, or fire law and EMS
responders and other information crucial to a
rapid and effective response during an outage
event.

Here are two examples of AEP's commitment to Lawrence County. First, in the aftermath of the July 2012 Derecho that resulted in massive electrical infrastructure damages in Ohio and much of the eastern U.S. AEP Ohio

quickly sent line crews into our county working with the county engineer and local officials as roads were cleared and access opened to restore power as quickly and possible.

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In the life-threatening heat in the days following AEP Ohio also offer to fund the purchase of ice and water for our citizens.

Additionally, AEP maintained and promoted an updated list of cooling stations and shelters in our county. Throughout the event Mr. Jon Buck maintained regular contact with the EMA office providing updates on restoration efforts and assuring that critical facilities would be restored as a high priority.

Secondly, on March 2, 2014, a more recent event, the National Weather Service forecast for Lawrence County called for heavy ice with widespread utility impacts, including the potential for extensive power outages.

Weather models of the impending ice storm closely resembled those of the President's Day ice storm of 2003 which resulted in major utility infrastructure devastation and long-term utility outages for many people in the county.

Various response agencies were busy

preparing for the storm and agency leaders met that Sunday afternoon for a pre-event briefing at the Lawrence County Emergency Operations Center. Mr. Jon Buck joined the briefing via teleconference to inform our county of AEP's preparations to address potential outages and including the pre-staging of AEP resources, mutual aid crews in and around our county. fact, Mr. Buck and AEP within had begun reaching out to our county and other EMA directors in the southeast Ohio area several days before that briefing, keeping us informed of changing weather conditions and AEP's preparedness activities and actions. Fortunately, the ice storm did not have the impact expected and our power infrastructure was spared major damage.

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These are a few examples of many that demonstrate AEP Ohio's lean-forward approach in working with local jurisdictions to assure that our citizens remain safe and healthy as possible, a goal shared by the Lawrence County Emergency Management Agency.

According to AEP, as they continue to invest in our community the proposed ESP 3 would yield some positive benefits for AEP

customers as follows:

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Customer rates will be decrease.

The plan projects an average 9 percent decrease in rates over the three-year term for customers who receive their generation rate through AEP

Ohio. The average residential customer using

1,000 kilowatt hours per month could see a decrease in total monthly bills of approximately \$9 or eight percent starting in June of 2015.

Customers will experience increased reliability. By continuing to invest in the distribution infrastructure AEP Ohio will further its incremental work to continue improvements and increase reliability across the system.

Third, customers will benefit from additional employment growth within AEP. AEP Ohio is proposing to hire 150 line mechanics and construction support personnel with a focus on veterans, to address a projected shortfall of internal resources needed for long-term improved reliability and infrastructure investment.

In Lawrence County AEP is committed to the strategic centralization of their offices and is moving forward with building a new

facility at the Point Industrial Park in South Point.

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Enhancement of available budget and payment options and simplified one entity billing. Through the purchase of receivables program, AEP Ohio will be able to attract more providers by alleviating credit issues that smaller providers may have. Customers who shop will be able to be placed on budget and average monthly payment programs not currently available. Also customers will have to deal with only one entity on billing.

5. Statewide and local economic impacts. Economic Development Rider allows AEP to continue it's efforts to stimulate the economy in the state by attracting new business, retaining and expanding existing businesses and helping to create new jobs.

In conclusion, AEP has demonstrated a commitment to the individual consumer, to the local community, and to the State of Ohio. The proposed ESP demonstrates that AEP Ohio is willing to continue current investments into our state while seeking to maintain the reliable infrastructure, emphasize community investment

through hiring additional employees into the workforce, and seeking to maintain lower costs for customer. Because of their continued efforts I recommend that the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio approve the American Electric Power ESP 3.

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If you have any questions you can address those to me. Thank you.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Any questions?

MR. SERIO: No.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Thank you very much, Mr. Boster. That concludes the witnesses on the sign-up sheet. Is there anyone else in the audience at this time that would like to testify?
