To the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio,


As a taxpayer, business owner, contributor to the community, and consumer of public utilities, I disagree with the proposed bailout of First Energy's and Duke's power plants. This bailout will almost certainly lead to limiting outside competition, which will then lead to uncompetitive utility rates, which will then lead to consumers accepting rates they otherwise may not be charged. The bailout seems to have an additional destructive implication: reducing incentive to look farther down the road to what should be the inevitable conversion to cleaner and more renewable energy sources. Delaying or denying the conversion to clean and renewable energy is likely to cause unjustifiable harm, when properly considering the big picture.

I want to reduce air pollution, save money on my electric bill, and urge utility providers to offer cleaner energy. The energy companies are too near-sighted, and are more concerned with retaining or gaining profit that is excessive when compared to the damage done to the environment. Consumers pay for what they use; that's the cost of living. The energy companies need to accept the costs of converting to cleaner energy as a cost of doing business, without offloading that cost-burden onto the consumers, through thinning out competition.

The energy companies should be meaningfully discouraged from continuing to pollute our air with outdated technology. Beyond that, neither I nor any other consumer should be required to eat the cost of doing so. Businesses naturally and sometimes justifiably raise rates by spreading the cost among a large populace, to avoid gouging individuals.
