Examination by Mr. Evans

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MR. EVANS: Let the record reflect that it's 11:31 a.m. on Thursday, October 2, and that this is the deposition of Chief Phillip Jackson scheduled for 11:30 on today's date in the CSX Transportation petition pending before the Public Utilities Commission regarding the potential closure of the Crawford Morrow County Line Road grade crossing. PHILLIP JACKSON, of lawful age, a witness herein, called by the Petitioner for purposes of Discovery, pursuant to the Rules of Civil Procedure, being first duly sworn according to law, was examined and testified as follows: EXAMINATION OF CHIEF PHILLIP JACKSON BY MR. EVANS:

Q Chief Jackson, just for the record will you state your full name?

A Phillip D. Jackson.
Q
What is your business address?
A It would be 301 Harding Way East.
Q And that is what community?
A In Galion, Ohio.
Q Okay. By whom are you employed?
A The City of Galion.

Q I referred to you a couple of times as Chief.
I understand you are Chief of the Fire Department?

A Chief of the Fire Division for the City of Galion.

Q How long have you held that position?
A I've been employed at the company quite a while, 20 years, but four years as Chief.

What, in a nutshell, as Chief of the Fire
Division, what are your duties and responsibilities?

A To manage the department and its emergency responses as I see fit. That includes not only fire and hazard mitigation, but emergency medical services.

Chief, we appreciate your time today. As I said before we got started, I'll try to keep this moving. I don't think it's going take particularly long, but have you ever given a deposition before?

A I have.
So you're familiar with the process. If I ask any question of you that is not clear or for some reason you don't hear a portion of the question, please let me know that and I'll
remedy that by either stating it again or having the court reporter read it back to you. Okay?

A Sure.
Q
Otherwise we'll assume that when you respond you are responding and understood what the question was. Okay?

A Yes.
Q And as you just did, it is necessary to respond verbally just so the court reporter can take down your answer. Okay?

A Yes.
Q Do you have a general understanding as to the nature of the proceeding that you're here to testify about in relation to the potential closure of a grade crossing on the County Line Road?

A I do.
Q Are you familiar with that crossing personally?

A I am.
Q Through your work here in this area and you've indicated you've been with the fire division for 20 years. You've been to that particular crossing or across that crossing at one time
or another?
A I'm very familiar with the crossing. Again, not only through employment, but through being born and raised in town and utilizing that street/crossing often.

Okay. Do you live here in Galion?
A I do not. I live just outside of Galion. It has a Mansfield mailing address, but it's just east of the town.

When you grew up in this area, did you grow up specifically in the vicinity of where this crossing is located?
A Within three-quarters of a mile.
Q Where are the -- where is the -- strike that. How many fire stations are there in Galion or at least that you're responsible for?

A Technically three and I say technically -would you like me to clarify?

Please.
A Technically because two of them are unmanned, but do house equipment. So we do have three stations, but one manned station.

Q Where is the manned station?
A That is the address I gave you previously, 301 Harding Way East in Galion.

Q Can you tell me where the two unmanned stations are?

A One is located on Murray Street.
Unfortunately the number I can't recall which is east of our present fire station, that main station that address I've given you.

Q Okay.
A And the other one is just disconnected from the fire station of the address I've given you. It's considered the same address, but it's connected to our street Department building. So it would somewhat south of our station there, just separate buildings.

But it's in close proximity to the main station?

A It is.
Q Okay. How would you describe the general location or do you reference it in any particular way the location where this crossing that we're here to talk about today is located?

A When we reference it we talk about it as the Morrow County Line crossing or the crossing near the natural gas pipeline area.

Okay. So if I understand the location of the
unmanned stations correctly, neither of those are located in close proximity to this crossing?

A Correct.
MR. EVANS: Let's mark as Exhibit $A$ an aerial photograph that is intended to depict the general area including the crossing.

THE COURT REPORTER: I happened to use numbers, is that okay?

MR. EVANS: That's fine.
(Jackson Exhibit 1, was marked for identification.)

Chief, I've marked as Exhibit 1, actually Jackson Exhibit 1 for identification an aerial photograph that we obtained of the general area and are you able to from looking at that determine what you're looking at?

A I am, yes.
Okay. Tell you what, it's going to be a lot easier to take care of the administrative stuff right now.

MR. EVANS: So let's go ahead and mark as Jackson 2 and 3 these other two.
(Jackson Exhibits 2 and 3, were marked for identification.)

Q Now I've actually placed in front of you Jackson Exhibits 1, 2, 3. Take whatever time you need to look at those. Are you able to orient yourself and determine what you're looking at in those pictures?

A I am. The one that is further away just takes some time to locate. I'm thinking I'm there just because of the non-clarity, but I think I know where we're at.

Q Okay. In Exhibit 1 in the top right corner, you can see is that an area of greatex population and buildings. Is that your understanding that would be Galion?

A That would be the City of Galion.
Q Or at least a portion of Galion?
A Correct.
Q
In Exhibit 2, would you agree that's a closer aerial photo that shows the general area where this Morrow Crawford County Line Road is located and this particular crossing?

A Yes.
Q And you just pointed to that on Exhibit 2; correct?

A Yes.
And Exhibit 3 would be just for the record an even closer aerial view that shows the crossing, the road going across the two sets of tracks and on the north or top side of that photograph there is a driveway that comes off and goes to the right; correct?

A That is correct.
Q

A
Q

A That's correct.
Okay. And you know them through just --
More professionally. She happens to be a business owner in the area and through my work of inspecting her buildings and stuff, so I've had occasion to meet her.

Okay. So the photographs we're looking there depict the Morrow Crawford County Line crossing that we've referenced and just so the record is clear, we're talking about the crossing you were envisioning we were talking about is the one we're looking at here?

A Yes; that is correct.
Q Using one of those photographs, I guess in particular -- well, I'll let you decide how best to do it. Using one of those photographs are you able to give me some understanding as to where your fire department EMS department territory covers in this area of the county?

A I can. I'm looking at Jackson Exhibit 2.
Q Okay.
A And as you see the residence, anything south of that Morrow County Line that you see approaching the tracks and curving, anything south of that is not City of Galion property. That is not our territory.

Q Okay.
A And I say that because the City of Galion owns the reservoir. It's their personal property. However, it's located in Morrow County. So although that's our property, that's technically not our response area. If I understand correctly you would respond to something happening at or about the reservoir?

A Correct, because it's our property. However, we would also probably receive response from Morrow County as that's their jurisdictional
area including the Sheriff's Department, not our Police Department.

So something that would occur there would more typically, $I$ don't know if it's ever happened before, but would it be in all likelihood a joint response?

A It would be, exactly.
Now I should have asked you, obviously in those photographs we can only see a portion of the territory that your department covers?

A In that particular photo, yes.
Q If I asked you to give me, to verbally explain to me the territory that the City of Galion Fire Division is responsible for, could you do that?

A I can give you measurements. It's 20.6 square miles. It is both the City of Galion and Polk Township, anything that lies in those areas and what we discussed earlier would also be city property that outlies which then would be our airport to the east and our reservoirs to the south as we've indicated.

Now, a couple of additional questions on that. So the City of Galion I understand. Where is Polk Township in relation to the City of

## Galion?

A Polk Township actually surrounds the City of Galion similar to a donut.

So this area we're talking about where the Fox residence is and this particular crossing at least the Crawford side of it would be within Polk Township?

A It would be, yes.
And as far as the city property, the airport is located in what direction?

A East of the city.
Q And the reservoir is to the south and in fact, it's in the vicinity of this crossing; is that correct?

A That is correct.
When you say the city, that Galion owns that reservoir, do they own just the reservoir itself or is there a park like area around it that is also owned by the city?

A There is some grassy lands around it that is owned by the city. So the reservoir and surrounding property areas are owned by the city as well as even further to the south it joins with one called a mix reservoir and the surrounding property to that which abuts

Amann's Reservoir.
Q Is that also owned by Galion?
A It is.

Q
Do you from time to time get calls that require you to respond to the reservoir?

A We do, yes. Many of them are vehicular accidents due to the east there would be some highways that cross, some intersections that cross state Route 309 and 61. Those things as well as we've had multiple instances of vehicles in the reservoirs. That area is utilized by our high school's cross country team. So we've had emergency medical calls during their meets.

Okay. Setting aside the reservoir for a moment, in terms of your department's responsibility, am I correct that you would typically respond to calls that come in from properties or residences that are located on the compass of north side of County Line Road?

A That's correct.
So if you don't mind part because of the glare it's hard for me to see what I'm looking at,
if we use Exhibit 2 as a reference just to orient myself and make sure we're talking about the same thing. If I understand it correctly if you would go from the crossing in that direction that would be generally an east direction; correct?

A That's correct.
Q There is a little dip here at that time crossing itself, but if you go in the direction my pen is pointing now that would be west?

A That's correct.
Q
The direction of the Fox residence would be compass north from the crossing roughly?

And of course, the reservoir I think is over in this area?

A Right here.
Q
Right there is essentially compass south of the tracks?

A Right, yes.
Q Okay. If your department is in a position where it needs to respond to the reservoir you would be coming from Galion which is up in this location?

A That's correct.
General location? Well, let me go back. Do you have as a department, do you establish any prescribed routes, if you will, that your firefighters and EMS squads are supposed to take depending upon the area that they're going to for the call?

A We have no standard operating procedure as to which routes. We have deemed the most expedient route as the term of the response at all times. Therefore, if they're out training in another area of town to having a set route might not be conducive to the best response. So it's at the officer's discretion that's on that truck which route they take.

Do you have discussions within the department is there an effort to try to reduce or minimize interaction with railroad tracks and crossings?

A Yeah, there is as well as with times of day and traffic conditions dealing with our school release, our uptown busy areas and potential railroad crossings that we might not have an overpass for. We try to avoid those things. Because of the uncertainty as to whether there
might be a train there and an inability to get through?

A
Yes.
So if you were responding to the reservoir from and I understand what you said earlier, that a squad or a truck could be somewhere else, but if we assume it's coming from the station, what would be the typical route that they would take to get to the reservoir?

A Assuming that traffic is not an issue uptown or construction we would head uptown which is considered 309 or Harding Way to the intersection of Portland Way which is also 309 heading south at that point all the way to County Line which we would head west to the property if we were responding to that railroad crossing or the Fox residence that's the route we would take.

So for purposes of a reservoir response, you would typically go down 309, go across that crossing there and make a right turn onto County Line Road to go west to get to the reservoir?

A Correct.
Q Okay. You mentioned some other runs that
there is another reservoir as I understand it that is sort of associated or connected with this particular reservoir?

A
It is connected loosely by some gravel roads, yes.

Q
That would be a little bit further what compass?

A Compass south and our route would take us further on 309 and turn into that particular reservoir's drive.

So it would be the same basically as you described earlier, you would go past County Line Road to another drive that would take you back into that area?

A That's correct.
So again, as we look at this photograph, I'm not actually sure. Well, $I$ can see a few structures on there. I think if I recall correctly if you go further east on the County Line Road from what we can see in Exhibit 2, there are some additional structures that are on the north side of the road; correct?

A That's correct, yes.
Those structures we can see here that I'm pointing to on the north side of the road as
well as those others we can't see would be within your jurisdiction?

They would be correct.
And the response to those locations would similarly, would be essentially the same of what you've described to get to the reservoir?

A That's correct.
Do you ever use Biddle Road to get there? I believe this is called Biddle Road?

A You're correct. That is Biddle Road. We don't typically use that for no other reason than we think that's our shortest route the way I described, but we have been on Biddle when there are a few residences on Biddle we will then take another route going Biddle.

That way it's easier to track the numbers as they count down.

Now, if we go to what would be the west side of the crossing, your department once again would be responsible for structures that are on the north side of County Line Road?

A Correct.
Q
As we look at what we've captured in Jackson
Exhibit 2, there really aren't any -- it's farmland in that area?

A It is. There are no residences.
Q
Do you know how far out the County Line Road in a westerly direction you would need to get before there are additional buildings or residences?

A I believe the next road is Taylor if I'm not mistaken. It's little past Taylor. I don't know, maybe a half mile.

In terms of responding to -- strike that. How far west then, we don't have a picture I don't think shows it unless this one, this Exhibit 1 does, but how far west does your territory go? I guess we're talking about how far west is Polk?

A Polk Township reaches past Iberia Road. There is no hard staked delineation between their territory, but there should be some signs to the west of Iberia Road.

We don't have that on this picture?
That's different. Iberia Road is the one in Jackson Exhibit 2 that comes into play past Biddle, if I'm not mistaken. Maybe it's two past. It might be the second one past. It may be one that's not shown and maybe we can see it on --

Q
In Exhibit 1 that we have, is that Iberia or is that a different road?

A
That's a different road. That's 100.
Q Okay.

We're out in here somewhere. So there is our intersection. That would be --

Is that Taylor?
That is Taylor. That's the one I'm thinking. That is Taylor and then the next one up would be Iberia.

Q That would be the rough explanation that you would give as to how far out Polk Township and therefore, your territory or jurisdiction would go?

A That's correct.
I'm just going to make sure $I$ do it right here. So this was the north intersection? Right there and we got Taylor. We got another one and then this one would be Iberia. No, it's Biddle, Taylor, Iberia. So Biddle is before. Biddle, Taylor. So that would be Iberia right here.

Chief, just for the record so we know what we're talking about later when we go back and look at this, I've written sideways on the
photograph the word Iberia to reflect our conclusion as to where Iberia Road is located and again, that would be roughly the western limit of your jurisdiction?

A It would be.
Okay. And when you respond to residents or structures a call that is west of this crossing, I think pretty much we've established that any of those structures would also be west of Taylor Road; correct?

A Yes.
Q
If you're responding out that direction from Galion, is there, from your experience is there a typical route that you would take to get to that general area?

A There is. We would typically take which our 309 goes straight which then becomes Galion New Winchester Road which is a direct west route out of our city and then pick up either Biddle, Iberia or whatever road from that point.

Q So you would be going west on -- tell me that name of the road again?

A Galion New Winchester Road.
Q Okay.

A Not to be confused with Monnett New Winchester Road.

So Galion New Winchester Road is essentially an east/west roadway?

A It is.
And it would intersect with you mentioned Biddle for one; correct?

A Yes.
Q
A
Q
And it would intersect with the Iberia Road that we identified in the photograph?

A That's correct.
Depending on where you're going to an address or location on this western portion of County Line Road in your jurisdiction, you would go out instead of coming south first on 309 you would go out west and then on Galion New Winchester Road and cut down whichever street made the most sense based upon where you're going?

A That's correct.
Q
Do you as a department, do you have any data and maybe we'll be getting into the document that I know you brought with you today in
relation to this, but do you have any data regarding response times?

A I do.

Q
A
Is your question about response times to this area?

Q Yes, to this area.
A The report I brought which was in the subpoena lists the numbers of calls and the calls in that area that were past the address and the response times for those three calls, yes.

Okay. Why don't we go ahead and I can mark you have your original there?

A I do.
Q Let's mark as Exhibit 4 to this deposition the documents that you've brought with you.
(Jackson Exhibit 4, was marked for identification.)

I've marked as Exhibit 4, Chief Jackson, just for the record it's a composite exhibit that consists of five pages. The first three have some typewritten writing as well as some handwriting or marking on it. The second two appear to be maps; is that correct?

A That's correct.
Q Can you just go ahead and tell me what it is these documents are, what they show us?

A The subpoena asked for runs within a mile of the intersection to which we're discussing, the railroad intersection. We had contacted our county EMA and through their GIS system which is a mapping system in our dispatch logs came up with a list of addresses that fit the criteria. Further, they listed addresses that were what they considered past the railroad that possibly could be affected by this closing. Those are listed on Page 1 on the top right. It looks to be about ten. On the left are addresses that just plainly fit the criteria a mile from that crossing. Because we're utilizing multiple reporting software vendors from our system from a change a few years ago, it was impossible to have one printed report. So we had to then utilize the address and search each address for its response since I think it was January 1, 2010 as per the subpoena. Therefore, those numbers then reflect both on the list on the left and the list on the right how many calls of which
type we went on. You'll see on the right any tallies or numbers you see on the right of $a$ list of addresses are those of an emergency medical response. Those listed on the left are those on the exhibit it says engine response, but it's a fire department response. Even though we're one department that does both, we try to separate which calls are fire based and which calls are emergency medical based. So you'll see some handwriting, number of calls at certain addresses. Particularly the ones that the address is past the railroad listed by the closing you'll see some times written there for the numbers or the calls that we have that are past that intersection. I did not go through on the ones that were within a mile and put all response times to that.

If I can stop you there just to ask a few questions to clarify. So first of all, this is the first three pages are this listing of runs or calls, but it's essentially two different columns. The left-hand column being the runs that met the criteria for the location of the property being within that
radius?
A Sort of correct and sort of incorrect. That list is all addresses within that criteria, not just runs. It was impossible to search by runs without knowing which addresses that we were going to have to research. So that lists all of the addresses and the tallies list all of the number of runs to that address.

The tallies you've described it as being on the right-hand side and the left-hand side distinguishing between EMS versus other fire runs?

A That's correct.
Q But the reason that this list goes onto essentially three pages is because we're capturing all of those addresses that are within that radius?

A We're capturing all addresses in that mile radius; correct.

Q The list on the right-hand at the top right of the first page of Exhibit 4 is considerably shorter and does not go onto Pages 2 and 3; correct?

A That's correct.
Q That's because that's just looking at those
addresses that are compass west of the crossing in question?

A That's correct.
As we look at this crossing in terms of its impact, if any, on being closed upon your department's operation, would I be correct in understanding that any of the properties -that with the exception of those properties on the right-hand column having to do with crossings that -- I'm sorry, properties west of this crossing, none of the other properties, runs to those properties would involve this particular crossing? That's not a very well worded question.

A Involve or affect?
Q Affect.
A They would not affect. The addresses listed on the left would not be affected by this crossing closing; correct.

So when we say that, any of those addresses if you were responding as you have on some of these occasions indicated by the tally marks, when you responded, your response did not require you to go across this crossing?

A Correct. We were either east of the crossing
or a different route was taken.

Q
That was the case on these particular runs and
from your knowledge of the geography going forward, it would be your understanding that if you had to go back to these residences, that trip would not involve going across this crossing?

A That is correct.
Q And just so then going back to the photograph for a second -- well, on Exhibit 4, the righthand column having to do with addresses past railroad possibly affected by closing, we're talking about 11 crossings or 11 addresses?

A $\quad 11$ addresses; correct.
Q Three of those are on Crawford Morrow Line
Road which would be the County Line Road we've
been talking about?
A That's correct.
Q And then the remainder are on Taylor Road which is a north/south street that intersects with County Line Road?

A That's correct.
Q
Am I correct from what you just said earlier
that in responding to Taylor Road, Taylor Road is one of the roads that I think we talked
about earlier that intersects with Galion New Winchester?

A Correct.
Q From what I understood you to say earlier in terms of your typical response from the fire station to that area of Polk Township, am I correct that you would typically to get to Taylor Road go out Galion New Winchester and then make a left onto Taylor going down Taylor to whichever address you were headed to?

A That is correct.
Q
I don't know if there is any way for you to know this, as we look at the list of Taylor Road addresses on the right-hand column on Exhibit 4, it looks like there was one -let's see, the right side is EMS?

A The ride side is EMS; correct.
It looks like there was one EMS run to 338
Taylor Road that you captured here; is that correct?

A That's correct.
And there was one fire or at least non-EMS run
to 302 Taylor Road that you've captured here?
A That's correct.
Q And you have indicated response times for
those. The first one I referenced being if I'm reading this right 5 minutes 34 seconds.

A That's correct. That is from the time our department received word from dispatch that there was a call to our arrival on scene.

And the other one at the 302 is 5 minutes 14 seconds?

A That's 19. 5 minutes 19 seconds.
I'm sorry. Would it be your belief and understanding based upon the way the department normally does thing, if you in fact know this, you can let me know that, that those response times reflect a response to those Taylor Road addresses that would have been the route we talked about a couple minutes ago, Galion New Winchester to Taylor making a left?

A It would be an assumption, but I would assume that they took the Galion New Winchester and left on Taylor Road route.

Okay. Do you as a department have either a goal or is there any type of actual
requirement that you're aware of as far as response times within your jurisdiction?

A There is not a requirement and previously
we've had things written in contracts dealing with response times, but that's no longer the case. So the answer to that question would be no, currently we don't.

Is the same answer that there is no stated or written goal, I mean outside goal that you have as a department?

A The goal is probably as fast as you can get there, that's what I like to say, but currently no, there is no stated goal. We have used in the past five minutes for certain areas and up to seven minutes in others.
Again, looking at this list, I'm focusing on the properties listed on the right side of Exhibit 4, regarding the Crawford Morrow Line Road it looks like there was at least initially one response by EMS that was intended to be the 6040 Crawford Morrow Line Road?

A That's incorrect.
Q Okay.
A Actually on the left you'll see actually the numbering and I apologize for the confusion. There were two calls to that 6040 Crawford Morrow County Line Road you'll see on the

> left.

Q I see that.
A. On the right is the response times.

Unfortunately, I listed them on the right where the medic response tallies would be, but those are times.

All right. So the only responses to these
Crawford Morrow Line Road during the time period you were asked to look for were two fire or at least non-EMS responses to 6040

Crawford Morrow Line Road; correct?
A That's correct.
And the first response at the time was 8 minutes and 17 seconds?

A That's correct.
Q And it looks like the second one was actually it says cancelled, does it mean it was cancelled before they had even left or enroute?

A It was cancelled enroute.
Q Do you happen to know were those two related to one another, where they the same --

A They were ironically within a few months of each other. One was a false alarm, that was cancelled enroute, the second call. The first
call that's listed there with the 8 minutes 17 seconds response was a small fire in the furnace blower.

Q Are these structures, these potentially affected structures on Crawford Morrow Line Road, do you know from your knowledge of the area are these residences?

A I do know that one we just spoke of is a residence. I don't know the other one.

Now, if we could use the photograph one more time here, I guess we've been -- probably the best one is going to be either 2 or 3 , I'll let you decide where best to do it, but Exhibit 1 is where we indicated Iberia Road. So from your understanding your jurisdiction or territory the three Crawford Morrow Line Road addresses would be somewhere inside or to the right of Iberia Road between there and this crossing; is that right?

A As I stated earlier our territory is not a hard delineation to Iberia Road. So there could be an address past that marking. However, the general area that you're speaking of, that's correct, where those other residences would fall.

Q Do you for a fact know what route your personnel would have taken to $I$ guess we're just talking about two responses, fire responses to the same address, 6040, do you know how they got there?

I can speak from experience because I was on that call. We took the route discussed earlier, out 309 and down County Line because it was our dispatch also has the ability to give us cross streets and that was marked as right past that railroad crossing. So we knew exactly where that was. So that was our most expedient route.

Q Are you able to -- well, I guess Exhibits 2 and 3 would not depict that residence. Are you able on Exhibit 1 to point out where that residence is located?

A It's not very -- the residence that we're speaking of?

Q Yes.
A It's right there.
Q I'm just going to put a circle around that.
So that would be 6040?
A That's correct. That's what it appears to be, yes.

Q So between where that residence is located -I also have trouble finding the crossing on this thing?

A The crossing is right here.
So it's actually located -- this is Mr. Fox?
A That's what 6040 is.
Q That's 6040?
A Yes, it's one in the same.
Q Okay. So there's my confusion. So 6040 is the Fox residence?
A That's correct.
Q And tell me one more time. The one was a false alarm. The other one, what was the nature?

A It was a minor fire within the furnace. The blower motor that was minimal and was out upon arrival.

Q Okay. The response time was 8 minutes and 17 seconds. Is that consistent with a normal response time to that area?
A It is. I mean I'm unable to ascertain if we were on another call prior to that and why 8 minutes, but that's pretty consistent.
If to get to that location from the Galion station if that's where you were and I
understand you might have the been somewhere else?

A Correct.
If we assume for the moment you're responding from the station, to go the route that you recall you did that night, you would have had to first cross the tracks on Route 309; correct?

A That's correct.

You would then make a right onto the County Line Road and then you would have the crossing that's the subject of this proceeding and you would have to go back across that to get to --

A That's correct.
Q
So you were crossing the tracks essentially twice?

A Correct.
Q If you were to go that other route that involves Galion New Winchester Road down Taylor Road and then you say when you got to the County Line Road you would have to make a left onto County Line Road; correct?

A Correct.
Q That would not involve any grade crossings or not involve any grade crossings, I don't know
what's in town?
A It would not involve any crossings whatsoever.
Q Have you ever to your knowledge responded to -- strike that. Is there any other residence other than the Fox residence that would be if you come down Taylor Road and make a left and go towards this crossing, is there any other residence that would be between that left from Taylor Road and the crossing?

A I don't believe so.
Q
Do you have any idea what the response time going that Galion New Winchester to Taylor and then Taylor into the Fox residence what that response time would be?
A I don't. I don't have that information.
If this crossing through this proceeding or otherwise were ultimately closed, is that route that I described going out New Winchester to Taylor and then Taylor and County Line Road to the Fox residence the route that you would assume your department would take?

A I'm going to assume either that route or the one to which when I was researching for this deposition that came up with the least amount
of travel and time differential according to Google Map would be out 309 and then Monnett New Winchester which also avoided the railroad tracks, but kept us gaining some ground on 309. The benefit of the 309 route is the fact that you start heading somewhat easterly as you're coming down that area as opposed to going straight west and coming back. So the route that you list, however, would be speculation would be slightly longer than the alternate route that $I$ have chosen.

Q Okay.
A However, it may with less turns it may prove to be equally as fast.

All right. You brought with you in addition to what we marked -- well, I guess this is part of what we've already marked; is that correct?

A Yes.
Let's get to those. Part of Exhibit 4 is two maps. Why don't you go ahead and tell me what it is we're looking at here?

A It's two maps. It's the current route that we utilize to respond to that address which is out 309, also 309 South and turning east on --
west, I'm sorry, on County Line Road over the crossing in question to 6040 Crawford Morrow County Line Road. The second paper is an alternate route and $I$ apologize for not bringing the third, but this shows the likely route of heading out if that crossing were to be closed and we needed to access it via a different route what that would be and this is printed from Google utilizing Google Maps. Okay. Is this something you personally did? I did.

Just so we're clear and so the record will be clear, what I'm going to do, Chief, is the first three pages of Exhibit 4 are not maps and I think we've talked about those to some extent. Actually what I'll do just so the whole thing is clear, I'm going to label at the bottom and a circle on each page I'm just going to number each page so we can be clear what map we're talking about. So the maps will now be marked as -- or part of Exhibit 4, but they're on Pages 4 and 5. Exhibit 4, Page 4 if I understand correctly is the old route, if you will, or the route that was taken when you actually responded to 6040?

A That is correct.
Q At the bottom right-hand corner it looks like there is a mileage total. Is that just a mileage total for a portion?

A It is and I am holding a two-page print and maybe you are as well on the back side which will continue with that each turn and the mileage estimate from Google Maps.

So the record should just reflect there is and I didn't catch this, but on the back side of the document Number 4 and back side of the document Number 5, there is continuation of those respected documents; correct?

A That's correct.
So again, Exhibit 4, Page 4 including both sides of Page 4 , that's the complete Map Quest route or Google Maps route from your station to the 6040 location?

A That's correct.
Q And the document marked as Exhibit 4, Number 5 is this alternate route that you believe is probably the most expedient alternative route, if you will?

A That's correct.
Q This route, this alternative route using

Monnett New Winchester Road also does not involve any grade crossings between the station and the 6040 address?

A That's correct.

And you haven't done and you weren't asked to do, but I'm just confirming, you haven't done any study or anything to determine the actual times between these two routes whether there is any significant difference between those two?

A I have not. Mainly due to safety I don't want to run a truck emergency for timing sake. So I did Google Maps to estimate out time.

Right. Have you tallied up the number of miles and I quickly tried to do it in my head, I didn't see a total, but did you tally up the mile difference between the prior route and this other route?

A I did. Actually Google at the top of each document has listed one being 3.2 and the alternate route being 4.2.

So the alternate route would be obviously approximately one mile longer?

A That's correct.
Q From your standpoint as a fire chief and I
guess we should be clear here what we're really talking about an alternate response route assuming this crossing was arguably closed for one residence within your entire jurisdiction; correct?

A That's correct.
We're talking about a one mile difference in response to that one particular residence?

A That's correct.
Q
From your standpoint as the fire chief realizing that you always would want to get to
the scene as quickly as you can, does that give you any particular concern or do you feel you're within the reasonable response time that you would hope to have as a fire department to that location?

A As you said, obviously my concern is always with getting to and taking the most expedient route somewhere. However, the number of residences affected by the potential closing and the extra mile will not in my opinion make a huge difference in the results.

And I guess it's fair to say, you know, it also as to responding on that alternative route, it eliminates any possibility that you
would get hung up by a train at a grade crossing?

A That's true.
If you were to respond the way the department went on the night that you actually responded there, if by chance if there was a train passing through or even blocking the crossing, you would need to reroute yourself. There would be a way to get there, but you would probably be adding additional mileage and time?

A That is correct. Our alternative route would had to have been used because those are the same tracks that would have contained a train. So we wouldn't be able to cross that first crossing on 309. We would have to head west on that Monnett New Winchester as we were talking about on Page 5.

Q There are a couple of markings on, a little bit of information on Exhibit 4 that I didn't specifically ask you about. It says medic response. That's where you're confirming first of all in parentheses what is indicated on the right side of each chart; correct?

A That's correct.

Q And the number there am I correct that that's just the total number of medic responses reflected here?

In the whole parameter in which we were given in the one mile it was 72 ; that's correct.

That would include -- are all of the addresses that are on the right side in which the table called addresses past railroad possibly affected by crossing, are all of those addresses also on the listing on the left?

A They are not.
Q Okay. So they were segregated out for purposes of this report?

A And that was done at the county level. I didn't specifically request that. They understand the scenario and did that on their behalf.

Q The engine response again there's a total of 20, that's the number of engine responses that are reflected on this entire document?

A That's correct.
But we've already in terms of responses to the addresses past the railroad possibly affected by the closing, we've talked about all of those and they were a total, if you combine
medic and engine, it would be a total of four with one of those being a cancelled run?

A That is correct.
Q Am I correct in understanding with the exception of the properties owned by Galion that are outside your territory to which you would respond that anything on the south side of County Line Road would be a different fire department that would respond?

A That's correct.
Q Just for my knowledge can you tell me which department responds where or where they would be coming from?

A I've seen a couple of signs out there, but whichever township that jurisdiction is.

Morrow County Fire would respond to anything south of that.

Q They come out of Mount Gilead?
A They do come out of Mount Gilead and multiple places in the county as well as Iberia. That would come out of Iberia, the fire would. Morrow County EMS, they have multiple stations and I don't know where that one would come from. There is also it looks like I thought I saw West Holmes Township signs out there when

I took a drive by. I don't know where them and Polk Township's areas meet.

Okay. Fair enough. It's not your department?
A No, unfortunately.

All right. A few more questions. Chief, to your knowledge has your department ever responded to a train motor vehicle accident at this crossing?

A To my knowledge, no.
And whether your department responded are you just personally aware of any train motor vehicle accidents at this crossing?

A I'm not aware of any.
How is it currently set up at this particular crossing to the extent it's now an opened and used crossing jurisdictionally with it being on County Line Road, how is it set up? Would your department respond or would somebody else respond?

A Our department would respond as well as Iberia Fire or Iberia Fire would as well.

Q Okay.
A Until we put boots on the ground and see if it's on the right side of the road or the left side of the road and unfortunately, we're
unable to tell by dispatch information.
That would be an instance where both would respond?

Both would respond; correct.
Is Iberia a volunteer fire department?
A They are.
And do you know where their equipment would be housed?

A It's in that Village of Iberia on a side road. I can't think of the name of the street, but it's in the center of their area and their town.

Q Chief, you said you've been out to this crossing many times both in your professional capacity and otherwise, but despite the fact that you're not aware of accidents that have occurred there, would you agree that that doesn't necessarily mean that this crossing doesn't present a certain set of challenges to motor vehicle drivers?

A I would agree with that.

Particularly if motor vehicles traveling from
east to west on County Line Road from having been out there, would you agree that there is kind of a mound or a raised area of ground
that basically prohibits you from seeing the tracks until you get up closer to the tracks?

A That's correct.
Q And in any event, you're traveling on County Line Road essentially parallel to the tracks such that a train could be coming sort of over your shoulder, if you will?

A That's correct.
Q And this particular set of tracks you're aware there are two sets of tracks there?

A I am aware.
Q There is a gap of some distance between those two sets; correct?

A That's correct.
Q And that would raise at least the possibility that somebody could get across one and be trapped between two sets of tracks because of a train?

A That is possible.
So based upon the accident history it would appear that if motor vehicle drivers are using care they can successfully negotiate that crossing, but nevertheless you recognize it as one that is perhaps more of a challenge to motor vehicle drivers then say Biddle Road or

County Road 309, some other crossing in that vicinity?

A I would agree with that.
Q
You referenced earlier $I$ think in the deposition that you're aware that there is a facility located just north of the tracks related to an underground pipeline; correct?

A That's correct.
Q
Are you generally familiar with that pipeline and where it runs within your territory?

A I am not.
Has your department that you know of ever received any special or particular training or information from whoever owns that pipeline as far as hazards associated with it or response thereto?

A We have, yes.
Q Do you know who the owner of that pipeline is?
A PGNS.
Q What kinds of materials have you received from them?

A We annually receive an update on that area from the company. It goes straight to my fire Prevention Bureau. So I don't have firsthand knowledge, but $I$ do know we receive that. We
receive mailings about trainings for gas disasters or gas if it were to be exposed to air and out response to that and some we attend and some we don't.

Are those trainings and information you receive specific to that location I'm going refer to it as a substation, I don't know what they would refer to it as, but to that substation or is it intended to provide you with information and training that would relate to essentially the entire length of that pipeline where something may occur?

A Originally when they first built this facility we were trained out there on the location specifically since it's been more just on the natural gas itself.

Has anybody indicated to you that there is any greater likelihood of a natural gas -- of a failure of the natural gas pipeline at that particular location where the substation is as compared to anywhere along that line that may run through your territory?

A No.
Q And to this point in time based upon your 20 -- strike that. How long to your knowledge
has that substation been there?
A It would be a guess, but it would be a dozen years, 12 years maybe.

Would that coincide, did that go in at a time that the pipeline associated with it was installed in this area?

I don't recall exactly why. I just know that there was a larger project which included that facility.
But it would be your understanding that there is a pipeline associated with that substation?

A That's correct.
Q And it goes in some direction. I think
Mr. Fox may have recalled that it passes in
the general direction of his somewhere
underground under his property and I don't
know where it goes from there. It's going
north and south or east and west from that substation?

A I think that's true.
Q So getting back to the question, your best recollection sounds like is that the substation itself has been there somewhere in the vicinity of 12 years?
A To my best recollection.

Q During that time has there ever been an incident there, an emergency incident to which you or your department had to respond?

A There was responses that turned out to be next to nothing. We had to respond a couple of times to odors or some slight leakages. Nothing that we could remedy and ended up calling PGNS.

Do you have a particular contact person or I assume you have at least a contact number that your department would call if there is a need to get somebody from the pipeline or substation owner involved?

A We do. Not only do we have that computerized, but that's information located in our dispatch center which connects with our police department.

Okay. You mentioned some reports that come in annually from the pipeline or substation owner. Do you have any idea as to what kind of information they're providing?

A Usually it's contact information. You know, I think they update their contact information. Are you aware of what inspection procedures or requirements there are related to the
pipelines or the substation?
A I'm not. I just know that we don't inspect it ourselves.

Is it your belief or understanding that they are regularly inspected by somebody or do you know?

A I would not know. I would hope so. MR. EVANS: I think I'm about done. Give me a second here.

A No problem.
Q
As Fire Chief are you advised or made aware of for any reason school bus routes?

A No.

Do the school systems in this area ever seek your input or your department's input as to what the best school bus routes would be for safety purpose or anything like that?

A They don't. Our communication with the transportation department at the schools is simply no matter where you're at, our trucks will respond to them, but not any information shared as far as routes go.
Have you aside from our discussion here today and any discussions you may have had in just setting this deposition up, have you ever
discussed the potential closure of the crossing with anyone?

A
Outside of the subpoena and utilizing my crew to help gather data, no.

Q
Have any complaints of any kind or concerns of any kind been registered with you by any citizens that you're aware of related to the potential or possible closure of this?

A The short answer is no. I do recall the Polk Township fiscal officer briefing me on the situation that there was a potential closing many months ago before I heard from your office or from anybody about it.

Q Okay. Do you recall from your knowledge of the area that the Biddle Road crossing and Route 309 -- by the way 309 and 61 at that location are one in the same?

A They are one in the same.
Q
Is it generally referred to as 309 or 61?
A
Multiple references. It could be Portland Way. It could be 598. It could be 309 and it could be 61.

A
Same road?
Same road.
Q
But Biddle and that road Route 61 or Route 309

I'll refer to it as, those crossings are protected by or equipped by flashers and gates; correct?

A The State Route 309 and 598 crossing is.
Biddle I would not really. I think it is as well just recent memory, but I haven't been there.

MR. EVANS: I think that's all of the questions that I have. Anything?

MR. THOMPSON: No.
MR. EVANS: I think we're good. This will be typed up into writing. You have the right as a witness to review the transcript or you can waive that right. It's totally up to you. You just need to indicate on the record which it is you would like to do. It's really just for accuracy.

A I'll review it.
