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11th of July of 2015?

A. I was.

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- Q. And what was your assignment? What were your duties on that date?
 - A. I was actually called in to assist with an investigation with the Delaware, Ohio Fire Department and Police Department.
- Q. And did you have an opportunity to inspect a vehicle being operated by Mr. Alahmad on that date?
- A. I did.
- Q. And as a result of that inspection, did
 you prepare an inspection report?
- 13 A. I did.
- MR. MARGARD: May I approach, your

 Honor?
- 16 ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: You may.
- Q. Mr. Haskins, I've handed you a document that I've marked for purposes of identification as Staff Exhibit No. 1. Have you seen this before?
 - A. Yes, I have.
 - Q. Can you tell me what this is, please?
- A. This is actually a business record, a photocopy of the inspection report that I completed on July 11th, 2015.
- Q. And the information that's contained in

here is information that you put into this report as a result of your inspection?

A. Yes.

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- Q. Can you briefly describe the circumstances that led to this inspection, please?
- A. This inspection was a -- a joint inspection where the City of Delaware requested some assistance during the prior week regarding some hazardous materials, not compliance issues that was discovered within their jurisdiction. They contacted the -- the Delaware Police Department and the Delaware Fire Department contacted the PUCO earlier in the week to request assistance in resolving this -- this matter of the transportation of hazardous materials.

I then worked with the City of Delaware that contacted me directly on this -- this particular day, I believe, was a Saturday, and they requested that I come into their jurisdiction to help investigate this transportation of hazardous materials, and that's when I performed the inspection, on that day.

- Q. What was the nature of your inspection?
- A. The nature of the inspection involved the shipping and transporting of hazardous materials

on a commercial vehicle that had drawn the attention of the Delaware EMS and safety services that was not in compliance with transportation regulations. With their assistance requested, with the PUCO being the -- the enforcement agency that handles such situations, we were asked to come in to help investigate the situation and discover any violations that may be present.

- Q. Mr. Haskins, did you take photographs at the time of your inspection?
- A. Yes.

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- MR. MARGARD: Your Honor, may I approach?
- 14 ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: You may.
 - Q. Mr. Haskins, I've handed you a multiple page document that I've marked for purposes of identification as Staff Exhibit No. 2. Would you please take a moment to briefly look through that document?
 - Sir, I'll represent to you that these represent some but not all of the photographs that are in the Commission's file with respect to this investigation. Can you state for me whether you took these photographs, sir.
- 25 A. I did.

Q. And can you briefly describe for us what these photographs depict?

- A. This is a photo description of the particulars involved that day specific to the vehicle and the cargo that's being transported. The vehicle was operated by Mr. Alahmad, and the cargo was hazardous material which was contained in the packages identified on the trailer attached to the transport vehicle in these photos.
- Q. What was the nature of the hazardous material, sir?
- A. It was gasoline, a flammable liquid, being transported from one facility owned by the Respondent, delivered to another facility which was owned by the Respondent in this case.
- Q. And did you observe this vehicle in operation and transporting gasoline?
 - A. I observed the vehicle at the designated location, and I was informed by the Delaware Police Department that they observed the actual movement of the vehicle.
- Q. And do you have any idea how much gasoline was contained in these containers?
- A. Those containers contain approximately
 330 gallons each, so fully loaded they would have

1 been 675 gallons.

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- And do you know whether they were fully loaded at the time they were being transported?
- I do not know the actual amount, no, Α. 5 sir.
- 6 But you understand that there was Q. 7 some --
 - They were laden, yes, they were. Α.
 - Ο. You indicated that this was a joint, if you will, investigation, a cooperative effort with the Delaware Police and Fire Department; is that correct?
 - Α. Yes.
 - And as a result of your cooperative efforts, did you have opportunity to request copies of the reports prepared by those departments?
- 17 Yes, I did. Α.
- 18 MR. MARGARD: May I approach, your 19 Honor?
- 20 ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: You may.
- 21 Mr. Haskins, I've handed you a document 22 that I've marked for purposes of identification as 23 Staff Exhibit No. 3. Have you seen this document 24 before?
- 25 Α. Yes, I have.

- Q. Have you reviewed this document in preparing for your testimony today?
 - A. I have not.

- Q. Can you describe what this document is?
- A. This is actually the report taken from the Delaware Police Department that was executed on the day -- on or about the day of the inspection, which was July 11th, and their particulars with their affidavit with what they discovered working with the Delaware Fire Department, requesting them to secure the premises, and I helped identify the vehicle in question.
- Q. Now, you indicated that you previously reviewed this document; is that correct?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Are you familiar with its contents?
- 17 A. I am.
 - Q. And do you believe that the contents of this document accurately reflect your understanding of the investigation?
 - A. It is.
 - Q. Now, as a result of your inspection, there is a portion on Staff Exhibit No. 1 that's denoted "Violations." Do you see that section?
- 25 A. Yes, sir.

- Q. Can you briefly describe the violations that you noted as a result of your inspection?
- A. During my investigation I encountered and did an interview of the driver, Mr. Alahmad, and an inspection of the cargo. Consequently, I discovered these violations which were noncompliant conditions of the hazardous materials -- Federal Hazardous Materials Regulations and the Federal Safety -- Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations, and I documented them on the report in this particular section.
 - Q. Mr. Haskins, is there anything else with respect to your investigation or with respect to your discussions or encounters with Mr. Alahmad that you think the Commission needs to know in order to render its decision in this case?
 - A. No. I don't feel there's any outstanding information that I can contribute other than my inspection report and the photos.
 - MR. MARGARD: Your Honor, that's all the questions I have for Mr. Haskins.

- Mr. Alahmad, do you have any questions
- 24 for Mr. Haskins?

- Q. Okay. When you came like that's how much was on the tanks; right? There's a flame on side of the tanks; right?
 - A. That's how much was left in the tank.
- Q. No. That's how much it was. There's no left. This is when they stop me and this is when they -- you came to see it. I didn't drop any. It was closed. The police came at that time, and there's no 30 gallon. It was 24 -- 24.99, 24 gallons. I was testing the pumps. That's how much was on the -- on the things. It's not 300 gallons. I have -- well, it's not a question. I'm going to answer that that's how much it is. That's my question to you.
- A. My question is -- my answer is I estimated 30 gallons which was left in the tank, but I also discovered a hose from the tank into the storage tank in the ground, which appeared to show some product had been unloaded. The photos show that.
- Q. No. There's a couple inches. When you -- when you come toward that -- that site, it takes you, like, 30 minutes to come, maybe more, right, to arrive to the -- from -- when did

they call you out to come?

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- A. Approximately 30 minutes after they notified me, yes, I would say.
 - Q. Okay. Do you think, if there is a full tank, will need 30 minutes to -- to fill -- to dump from the tank?
 - A. I can't estimate that. I don't know. I wasn't present at the time the entire cargo was unloaded, only what I saw once I arrived.
 - Q. How much do you think -- how long a time do you think will take to load 200 gallons or 300 gallons from that tank to the ground?
 - A. It depends. There could be a pump involved, which might lessen the amount of time. I can't exactly say. I can't estimate because I don't know the physical properties of your loading and unloading procedures.
 - Q. Well, that's my question. You see just a couple inch of the liquid, which is -- that's what you said. That's my question. Just a couple inches you put on the tanks; right?
 - A. That's correct.
- Q. Okay. Thank you. That's all my questions.
- 25 ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: Thank you

- very much. I don't have any questions at this time,
 Mr. Haskins.

9 BY MR. MARGARD:

- Q. Just to be clear, you did not see this vehicle operating; is that correct?
- 12 A. I did see it on the public highway, no.
- Q. But you had discussions with the

 Delaware Police and Fire Department that did see this

 vehicle operating on the highway; is that correct?
- 16 A. Correct.
- Q. And they informed you that the tanks had some considerable amount of material in them at the time?
- 20 A. Yes.
- Q. More than the couple of inches that you observed?
- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. Did they indicate that the containers were full?

- A. They were loaded, is the terminology that was used. There was no estimation of product. I only know from experience how much the containers can actually transport, but from their observations and their communication to me was that it was -- they were laden.
- Q. And they had observed this moving between the two gas stations?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And how far separated are these stations?
- 12 A. Maybe 75 yards.
- MR. MARGARD: That's all I have, your
- 14 Honor. Thank you.

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- 15 ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: Thank you.
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- 17 EXAMINATION
- 18 BY ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON:
- 19 Q. Mr. Haskins, I actually did think of one 20 question.
- A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. Does it matter how much gasoline was actually in the tank in order for there to be a violation?
- A. If the cargo contained gasoline, no,

because a bulk package is regulated at all times, whether it be fully ladened or ladened with only residue, but it is always regulated; so really the answer to the question is no, it doesn't.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: Thank you.

Mr. Alahmad, do you have any follow-up

questions?

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MR. ALAHMAD: Yes.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: And you have to limit them to just what was raised by Mr. Margard right now.

MR. ALAHMAD: Yes. I think the police didn't see me drive on the car -- the car from facility to facility, and I was also -- the police officer to tell a witness to see if there is a load of gas on the tank, because there was no police -- they did not -- the police came where I was, just said there is no -- the police did not see how much it was on the -- on the -- on the tank. He did not stop me on the road. The police came where I was sitting, testing my tank -- my pumps, and he just came and he said somebody called, you was going from pump to pump.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: Thank you,
Mr. Alahmad. I will let you explain your side when

21 you come up to the witness stand to testify. Did you 1 2 have any follow-up questions for what Mr. Margard 3 just asked Mr. Haskins about? 4 MR. ALAHMAD: Well, no. 5 ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: Okay. I 6 have no further questions, Mr. Haskins. You're 7 excused. (Witness excused.) 8 9 ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: Mr. Alahmad. 10 MR. 2 BY MR. MARGARD:

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- Q. Sir, if you would please state your name and business address.
- 5 A. Jonathan Frye, 180 East Broad Street, 6 Columbus, Ohio, Transportation Department.
 - Q. You're employed by the Public Utilities
 Commission?
 - A. That's correct.
 - Q. And in what capacity, please, sir?
- 11 A. I'm the Chief of the Compliance
- 12 Division.
- Q. And what are your duties and responsibilities?
- A. To review the assessments that are
 assessed against drivers, carriers, and shippers as a
 result of violations that are discovered on the
 roadway.
- Q. And how long have you held this position?
- 21 A. Approximately 15 years.
- Q. And in the course and scope of your duties, did you have an opportunity to review the Commission's file with respect to this case?
- 25 A. Yes.

- Q. And included as part of that I presume was Staff Exhibit No. 1, the report of investigation?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And Staff Exhibit No. 2 which included the photographs?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. Did you also review the assessment that was prepared by your staff?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Mr. Frye, can you please describe for us how assessments are determined?
- A. Yes. For each violation that's discovered we assess a point value. We use a matrix. There's a point value that's assessed for each type of violation. We also take into consideration the type of hazardous material that's being transported and the amount of hazardous materials that are being transported. We add those numbers together and multiply, and we come up with a dollar amount based upon those factors.
- MR. MARGARD: May I approach, your
 Honor?
- 23 ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: You may.
- Q. Mr. Frye, I've handed you two documents
 marked respectively for purposes of identification as

Staff Exhibits 4 and 5. A moment ago you described a matrix of points. Is that what's contained in Staff Exhibit No. 4?

A. Yes.

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- Q. And can you briefly again describe for us how this document is used?
- A. Yes. For the various violations that are discovered there's a point value that's assessed to the violations. In addition to the point value, we also -- or in addition to the type of violation that's discovered, we also take a look at the hazardous material that's being transported, and that's identified on Page 4 of Staff Exhibit 4. There's a chart for the material that's being transported, and also on Page 4 of Staff Exhibit 4 there's a chart dealing with the amount of hazardous material that's being transported. We take all those factors into consideration in determining how much the fine should be.
- Q. And this is the schedule that's used by the Commission Staff to determine civil forfeiture assessments in hazardous material cases; is that correct?
- A. That's correct.
 - Q. And it's the same procedure for all

- carriers and individuals involved in hazardous materials violations?
 - A. That's correct.
 - Q. And this was the chart or the matrix that was used in determining the assessments in this case; correct?
 - A. That's correct.
 - Q. And are those assessments reflected in Staff Exhibit No. 5?
- 10 A. Yes.

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- 11 Q. And have you reviewed Staff Exhibit No.
- 12 | 5 prior to taking the stand today?
- 13 A. Yes.
- Q. And have you determined whether these factors and points and so forth were accurately and appropriately applied?
- 17 A. Yes.
- Q. And are the resulting forfeitures accurately calculated?
- 20 A. Yes.
- Q. And are those forfeitures reasonable, in your opinion?
- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. And are they consistent with the recommended fines and penalties schedule adopted by

the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance?

A. Yes.

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- Q. Did you also, in reviewing the Commission's file, determine whether the Respondent was served with all notices required by Chapter 4901 of the Ohio Administrative Code?
- 7 A. Yes, he has been served.
 8 MR. MARGARD: Your Honor, may I
 9 approach?
- 10 ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: You may.
 - Q. Mr. Frye, I've handed you what I've marked for purposes of identification as Staff Exhibit No. 6. In preparing for your testimony today did you happen to review this document as part of the Commission's file?
- 16 A. Yes.
- Q. What is this document, please?
 - A. It's a Notice of Preliminary

 Determination letter, and this is a letter that's

 sent out to a Respondent when we're unable to reach a

 resolution of the case, and what the document does,

 it provides instructions on how to make payment, and

 it also provides instructions on how to make a

 request for an administrative hearing as well.
 - Q. This is one of the notices that was

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served on the Respondent in this case?
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A. That's correct.

MR. MARGARD: Thank you, your Honor. I have no further questions of Mr. Frye.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: Thank you.

Mr. Alahmad, do you have any questions

7 for Mr. Frye?

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MR. ALAHMAD: No.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: Thank you.

I have no questions. You are excused.

THE WITNESS: Thank you.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: Do you want to provide a reason as why you are objecting?

MR. ALAHMAD: Because there is no gas on the tanks. Why do I get like -- they make me like I'm transportation of gas and stuff. I've been -- I've been having a gas station for 20 years. Why I have to transportation of gas from -- I bought that gas from the -- the company. Why I have to transportation of gas? I was testing my pumps. I didn't travel on the roads. I didn't travel -- I didn't drive on the roads for gas.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER ADDISON: Thank you,

25 Mr. Alahmad.

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I'm going to overrule the objection and admit Staff Exhibits No. 1 through 6 into the record for the Commission's consideration.

DIRECT TESTIMONY

MR. ALAHMAD: Thank you. My name is Issa Alahmad. I live in Delaware for 15 years. I have two gas stations. I've been working the gas station for almost 20 years. What happened is that they -- we have a test every year. For each gas station, they have to test it to see the -- the gallons, how -- like when you pump the gas, how much gallons that -- same, like exactly, the gallon is exactly a gallon, not this, not over.

So the first time I test the first gas

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station it was okay. Then I went next week when --
when that happened to test. I -- I test five pumps.
Each pump five gallon. It comes to 24.999, which is
okay by the law, like 0.1 is okay.

Then my -- one of the customers, when we was testing the pumps, called the police. The police came. He said when we get -- we get a phone call that you guys pumping the gas on tanks, on the big tanks, which were four regular and one for the premium gas. We have two kinds of gas, regular gas and the premium gas. I didn't have a small container to test the pumps, each one. That's why I have these tanks. These tanks is water tanks, but here it tests the steel tanks. I do transportation -- transportation of gas in these tanks just first time use or second time. The first time I was testing the pumps. Then the second time I was testing the other pumps.

The police came. He asked me a question. I said thought it was just like the others, so -- he said well, I don't know, the police guy. Then he called the fire marshal department. The fire marshal, he came, and he said well, this is -- we have to call the public safety. He call the officer. The officer, after 30 minutes he came, and

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     he asked me the questions. I answer. I answered
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     him. He never see me go on the road. He never see

     any gas on the tanks, because it was just 24 gallons,
    maybe a couple inches. That's what he said, but it
 4

     was 24.99. That's what happened. That's exactly
