COMPLAINT DESCRIPTION:

Hello, I'm writing to complain about Duke Energy's "Central Corridor Gas Pipeline Extension Project" (Case ID: 16-0253-GA-BTX). Running a 30" gas transmission line down my community's residential neighborhoods is outrageous. While the probability of a safety incident may be low, the consequences are very high.
