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EXAMINER McKENNEY: Let's go on the record. Good evening. The Public Utilities

Commission of Ohio calls for hearing -- public hearing at this time and place Case No. 16-395-EL-SSO being In the Matter of the Application of The Dayton Power and Light Company to Establish a Standard Service Offer in the Form of an Electric Security Plan.

As I mentioned previously, my name is Bryce McKenney, and I'm an Attorney Examiner assigned by the Commission to hear this case. Also with us this evening is Commissioner Howard Petricoff, who is sitting next to me here.

I'd like to thank everyone for coming this evening.

At this time, I'd like to take the appearances of the intervening parties that are here. I'll start with the Company.

EXAMINER McKENNEY: Thank you.

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MR. GARVER: Andrew Garver on behalf of the Ohio Consumers' Counsel and DP&L's 455,000 residential utility customers.

EXAMINER McKENNEY: Thank you.

As I mentioned briefly before, the purpose of this evening's public hearing is to receive comments from the public on the application filed by The Dayton Power and Light Company. This is not a question-and-answer session, but it is your

opportunity to let the Commission know what you think about DP&L's application in this case.

The local public hearings are only one aspect of the process. There will also be an evidentiary hearing for the parties to present their case to the Commission.

When you arrived, you were offered the opportunity to sign up to testify. After I finish with this introduction, I will begin calling the witnesses forward that have signed up to testify and ask you to come to the table and face the court reporter.

The first name I have on this list is Mary Sue Gmeiner.

Please raise your right hand.

MS. GMEINER: My name is Mary Sue

24 | Gmeiner. I live on Arbor Avenue in Dayton. I was

25 here -- I came here originally to protest the

coal-bailout rider, which I understand now has been withdrawn, so my remarks are a little more general.

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But I would oppose any kind of coal bailout or any support of -- any extra support of the coal-fired power plants. And I would oppose this on three levels.

One, at a personal level. I'm retired.

I'm on a fixed income. I'm already being as careful as I can with my electricity use. And I also choose the green energy option so that all of my electricity is coming from solar, wind, geothermal, and I do that in spite of any possible higher cost because I firmly believe that climate change is real, it's here, and we need to pay attention to it, and we need to move away from fossil fuels as quickly as possible

At a second level really is at a national level. And I would point out that the U.S. military has determined that climate change is a serious national security threat; they've made that clear. And so, again, we need to turn away from coal, we need to move away from coal and other fossil fuels as quickly as possible.

And finally, on a moral level. We find that coal is damaging our air; it's damaging our water. And most importantly this impacts the poor

the most; those people who can't move away from the poor quality air and so on.

So as a member of a faith community, as a member of Ohio Interfaith Power and Light, I would encourage the PUCO to look at anything that can improve our use of renewable energy and move away from coal. Thank you.

EXAMINER McKENNEY: Thank you.

The next name I have is Lynn Buffington.

I'll ask you to just briefly raise your

testified as follows:

## DIRECT TESTIMONY

MS. BUFFINGTON: So my name is Lynn

Buffington. I live in Beavercreek, Ohio. So the

next county over, but still in the greater Dayton

area.

And I'm here specifically because of coal, not fossil fuels in general, but coal. I'm concerned about the fact that we need to decrease our

use of coal, whether that slack is taken up by other fossil fuels or other forms of energy such as renewables. And so, therefore, I'm opposed to any -- whether you want to call it a bailout of coal, or extra subsidy of coal, or rate hikes which therefore enable older coal generating plants to stay open, I'm just opposed to anything that helps us keep coal in our mix of electricity sources.

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And the reasons for that, the previous person mentioned climate change; that's one of the reasons. I want to say maybe a little bit more about that. Some people think of climate change, they think of tree huggers or environmentalists, and I would like to mention that it goes way beyond that.

If you look at mainstream industries like the property insurance industry or realtors, they have been writing position papers and planning papers about the impact of climate change on their industries.

And so, coal is a -- for a certain amount of energy, I'm sure most people know, to get a certain amount of energy from coal contributes more to climate change, to global warming, to carbon dioxide gases than does another type of fossil fuel to get that same amount of energy.

So there's big expenses. A vast majority of us, whether we care about the habitat for a rare species, the vast majority of Americans do care about their property tax premiums and their property tax deductibles and all these things are predicted to go up because of climate change, and I'm sure that most citizens would like them to go up less.

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Another factor is the money that our government needs to spend for natural disasters. An example is Hurricane Sandy. We know climate change did not cause Hurricane Sandy, but it made the effects worse, it made the loss of property worse, the suffering of people worse, because when you have sea level that's higher, then any kind of storm surge is much worse, it has a much bigger effect. So this is something that all taxpayers pay for. And so, I'm concerned about the impact of coal on the functioning of our government and our government expenses.

And finally, the last thing I would mention was mentioned previously is the health effects of burning coal. My husband is a physician. He's a pediatric specialist. He doesn't specifically treat children because of their asthma, but asthma is so on the rise these days that he treats plenty of patients who do have asthma. And the particulates

Proceedings 11 that come from burning coal have a big impact on 1 2 asthma, whether it's childhood or adult. And so, just to summarize, we shouldn't 3 be doing anything that helps us keep burning coal. 4 5 Thank you. 6 EXAMINER McKENNEY: Thank you. 7 Are you prepared? Would you like to 8 testify? 9 MS. JEFFERS-TRACY: Yes.

#### DIRECT TESTIMONY

MS. JEFFERS-TRACY: My name is Karen

Jeffers-Tracy. I'm from Fairborn. And I just wanted
to say that it's really important that we not put our
money and our investments in old infrastructure,
because we need a new way and we need to think about
the future. The future is not in old coal plants and
old ways of making energy. And even our energy usage
needs to change.

And I think if it's put before the

American people, they would be willing to change. I

think if it's put -- I mean, we accept the science of

climate change, and a lot of people are confused

about that, but if we stick with simply the science,

there's exaggeration on both sides, but science tells

us we need to change our way of life to use less

energy, and we need to change to renewable sources.

So I would be concerned that putting this

kind of money towards reviving old infrastructure would not be -- would really not be fulfilling our responsibilities for the future.

EXAMINER McKENNEY: Thank you.

Thank you, everyone. That concludes the list of names that I have to testify this evening.

Are there any questions that anyone else has or is there anyone else who would like to testify this evening?
