MESSENGER: 8 Q. Can you please state your name and business address for the record? 9 10 Α. Steven R. Morgan. Business address is 2855 Dublin Granville Road, Columbus 43235. 11 12 Ο. And who is your employer? 13 Α. State of Ohio. And what is your position with the 14 0. State of Ohio? 15 I'm a motor carrier enforcement Α. 16 17 officer. 18 And what are your duties as a motor carrier enforcement officer? 19 20 My duties are to check -- do semi 2.1 inspections on the side of the road. 2.2 Can you describe your work experience? Q. Yes. I've had -- I drove a truck for 23 Α. 24 about 28 years, and I've been a mechanic for almost

15. We used to have a truck garage. I'd done

mechanic work there.

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- Q. And how did you come to work for the Ohio Highway Patrol?
- A. I started out 14 years ago working as a maintenance man. Then I was moved up to security and everything else. Then they had this opening, so I applied for the motor carrier vehicle.
- Q. And how long have you been a motor carrier enforcement officer?
 - A. About a year and a half, ma'am.
- Q. What certifications or trainings do you have as a motor carrier enforcement officer?
- A. Federal motor carrier. We had Part A,

 Part B, hazmat, bus, passenger bus, school bus, and

 just other endorsements.
- Q. Were you on duty on August 16, 2016?
 - A. Yes, ma'am.
 - Q. What was your job assignment that day?
 - A. My job assignment was to go out and look for violations on motor carriers -- on the semis.
 - Q. And what area were you working?
- A. I was working down around Rickenbacker
 Air Force Base on the south end of Columbus.

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- A. This is an inspection I have done on Mr. Sigman's vehicle.
 - Q. Was it prepared by you?
 - A. Yes, ma'am, it was.
 - Q. How did you prepare it?
 - A. We have Aspen in our motor carrier vehicles. And in the Aspen program -- I printed it out in that. Then, after we get everything done in that, then I upload it to PUCO.
- Q. Was this inspection prepared in the ordinary course of your duties?
- 12 A. Yes, ma'am.

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- Q. And was it prepared at the time of the inspection?
- A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. Is this report an accurate
 representation of the report that you created at the
 time of the inspection?
- 19 A. Yes, ma'am, it is.
- Q. What time did the inspection take place?
- 22 A. The inspection started at 2:52 -- 1452 23 on 8/16.
- Q. What was the inspection level for this inspection?

- A. It's a Level 2 --
- 2 | O. And what is --

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- A. -- which is a walk-around inspection.
 - O. What does that entail?
 - A. I usually go up and speak to the driver, get his information, driver's license, and medical card. Then I do a walk-around around the vehicle, checking lights and tires and so on from there.
- Q. Was the information in the report accurate at the time you inputted it into the computer?
 - A. Yes, ma'am, it was.
- Q. And what did you do with the report once you finished putting the information into the computer?
- 17 A. I uploaded it to PUCO.
- 18 Q. Who is the driver identified on this 19 report?
- 20 A. Jerry -- Jerry Sigman.
- Q. And how did you identify the driver?
- 22 A. By his license.
- Q. What were the origin and destination of this trip?
- A. He was going from Columbus to Columbus.

So he was staying right here in the city.

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- Q. Okay. Why did you pull his vehicle over?
 - A. I saw that Mr. Sigman was speaking on his cell phone, which is a violation.
 - Q. Was the road that you pulled him over on -- was that under the jurisdiction of the Ohio Highway Patrol?
 - A. Yes, ma'am.
 - Q. Can you describe where you were parked and what direction you were facing?
 - A. I was facing -- sitting on the right side of the road facing southbound. Mr. Sigman was coming northbound on Rickenbacker Parkway.
 - Q. Do you recall the weather that day?
- A. I believe it was pretty nice out, ma'am.
- 18 Q. And what did you see as the driver 19 drove past?
- 20 A. I noticed the driver had his left hand 21 up to the ear, and I saw the cell phone -- talking 22 on the cell phone.
- Q. After you pulled him over, what happened?
- 25 A. I walked up to the truck, and I said,

"I stopped you today because you was talking on your cell phone."

And Mr. Sigman said, "Yes." He said, "I went" --

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Him and his wife went to eat, and they brought some food back. And he wasn't feeling -- he was feeling bad. And he was calling -- he called his wife to see what maybe he had ate to make him sick.

So I said, "Okay." I said, "Let's get off the road" because we was sitting in the middle of the road. I said, "Let's get off the road and go up here and turn in."

So we went up and parked in an open lot, and then I continued to do my inspection from there.

- Q. So the driver admitted to you that he was on his cell phone?
 - A. Yes, ma'am, he did.
- Q. Can you take a look at the violations section of the report?
- A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. And what information goes into the violation description?
- A. "Using a hand-held mobile telephone while operating a CMV," commercial motor vehicle.

- Q. And is that something you write in there, or does it populate automatically?
 - A. It populates automatically.
- Q. Okay. If you look at the first violation listed, in Section 392.82(a)(1).
 - A. Yes, ma'am.

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- Q. And what does that section provide?
- A. It's talking about operating a commercial motor vehicle while talking on a cell phone.
- 11 Q. How did you determine that Mr. Sigman violated this section?
- A. Through my training that I had and through the regulation book that I have in the vehicle. I pulled it up, double checked. But the training we -- my certifications tell me that that is a violation.
 - Q. So you saw him speaking on the phone with his wife at the time that you pulled him over?
 - A. Yes, ma'am.
- Q. After you completed the report, did you sign it?
- A. Yes, ma'am, I did.
- Q. And did the driver sign it?
- A. Yes, ma'am.

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1 THE RESPONDENT: I'd like to. 2 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Come up. 3 4 JERRY L. SIGMAN, 5 being first duly sworn, testifies and says as 6 follows: 7 8 DIRECT TESTIMONY 9 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Why don't you go 10 ahead and tell us what happened on the day of the 11 inspection? Just present a narrative-style 12 testimony. 13 THE RESPONDENT: Okay. 14 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Speak up so the 15 reporter can hear you. 16 THE RESPONDENT: Oh, okay. I work for 17 Rush Expediting. And we are hauling containers out 18 of Norfolk Southern down at Rickenbacker, and we're 19 only hauling them five miles. I really didn't like 20 doing it, but, like I said, I've been with the 2.1 company three years. 22 And I did -- I told them -- I said, "Well, 23 you need to find something else for me to do because 24 these are not safe. That's all there is to it." 25 And the day that I picked this one up, I

did notice that the -- the light that comes on to let you know the brakes -- when something might be wrong with the brakes came on but it was busted loose, and one of the marker lights was out. But being that I was only going five miles, I called dispatch, and they said, "Well, you've got to take it. We've got more to pull out of there. You need to take it over there. Don't worry about it."

So I went around to check with the service department. They didn't have time to fix it. They said, "Just go ahead and take it. Don't worry about it."

So I thought, "Well, okay."

So anyway, I went ahead and pulled it out and was going down through there. I really wasn't feeling good that day. I don't know if I ate something or what, but when the officer pulled me over, I thought, "Oh, he's seen the lights or something -- you know, what I missed."

And he said, "I'm pulling you over. You were talking on your cell phone."

I said, "Yeah. I was talking to my wife because I'm trying to figure out what's wrong with me." I thought I was going to throw up on him. But anyway, he found what was wrong with the trailer and

everything and did his job.

But as far as my history -- do you want to hear that? I've been driving since 1964. I had one violation with 3.5 million miles of driving. I've done all kinds of driving all over, and I liked what I did.

And anyway, after he gave me the ticket and everything, I went ahead and called Rush before I -- when I got over to drop the trailer, told them what happened. They said, "Well, we can't use you anymore. You messed up."

She said, "You know that's a \$2,500 fine?"
I said, "I only got a \$250 fine."

"Yeah, but we'll get an \$11,000 fine."

I thought, "Okay. Whatever." You know?

So I went back to the terminal, and they let me go. And that's where it ended. And as far as trying to get another job, nobody would hire me.

"No," they said. "Not with that kind of a violation. We just can't afford to have you."

I said, "Well" --

I checked with different companies.

I thought I was on private property back there too. I didn't realize that the state of Ohio had any kind of a jurisdiction back there. And I

checked with Rickenbacker, and they said the only thing they do for us is keep the roads clean.

And the guy told me -- he said, "I think they just started having the DOT back here in the last couple of months."

I said, "That's the first time I'd ever seen them back there." There was two of them sitting there on the side. It kind of surprised me. And I said, "Well, you know, you've got to do what you can do."

But I thought I was on private property or I would never have even had my cell phone out. So I didn't -- you know, wasn't aware that I was, you know, in an area where I could get a ticket for that. So that's basically what it is. You know?

And I have not been able to collect unemployment because the company won't approve that. So I'm not able to even get a job. I'd like to drive a couple more years, you know, just locally, but -- I'm kind of a victim of circumstances, but I did it myself. So I'm not going to --

And the officer -- very, very nice. You know, I would not go against what he said at all. I had a nice conversation with him that day and everything.

1 So that's basically what it is. And this 2 has been going on since August. I finally got to a hearing anyway. I've been up here three or four 3 different times talking to Mr. Banks, and I sent one 4 5 letter up here that never got to who it was supposed 6 to go to, because I called him two or three 7 different times. He said, "Well, bring it up here, 8 and we'll a copy of it" because I even got a 9 registered mail back, but it was delivered here 10 somewhere. I forget the guy's name that signed it, 11 but I've got his name there too. 12 So basically that's what it is. You know? 13 I made a mistake, and I'm willing to do that. I'm 14 willing to pay my \$250 fine and whatever it takes 15 to -- so I can get a job. That's the main thing. I 16 mean, I can't even go on unemployment. I can't get anybody. So just -- that's where it is. 17 18 Is that all you need to know? 19 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Does that conclude 20 your testimony? 2.1 THE RESPONDENT: Yes. 22 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Do you have any 23 questions for this witness? 24 MS. MESSENGER: I do not, Your Honor. 25 ATTORNEY EXAMINER: You're excused.

21 1 THE RESPONDENT: Thank you. ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Do you have 2 3 anything more at this time? MS. MESSENGER: I have nothing further, 4 5 Your Honor. ATTORNEY EXAMINER: Very well. I will 6 admit Staff's Exhibits 1 and 2 into evidence. 7 8 (Exhibits admitted into evidence.) 9 MS.
