

# Comedians get laughs on stage and screen

Comedian Don Rickles died last week and it got me thinking about comedians making the transition to film and television.

Stand-up comedy has grown over the years, as many popular funny men and women often leave the club scene to shoot cable specials.

The 90-year-old Rickles may have never hit it big as a dramatic actor, but he will forever be remembered for the way he made people laugh.

With a career spanning five decades, most people under the age of 40 may not know Rickles, but his worth checking out his classic stand-up routines on "The Tonight Show with Johnny Carson."

Rickles made numerous guest appearances in movies and TV including "Addams Family," "The Dick Van Dyke Show," "The Munsters" and "Get Smart."

He also lent his unique voice to the "Toy Story" animated movie franchise as Mr. Potato Head.

The funny man carved out a long career full of plenty of laughs, helping to pave the way for other comedians to break into TV and movies.

I think everyone has their favorite comedians, and more recently a number of comedians have left the stage and found great success at the box office.

Notably, stand-up-turned-actors Kevin Hart and Amy Poehler have found big success on the silver screen, starring in several summer movies releases.

Hart may be more of a one-trick pony as far as his acting range, but it works to tune of millions at the box office with movies like "Central Intelligence," "Ride Along," and "Think Like a Man."

Poehler starred in "Trainwreck" in 2015 and helped lead the movie to gross more than \$100 million on a \$35 million budget.

Some comedians make it in the movie business but are type-cast into humorous roles and comedy genres.

The one stand-up comedian who best made a turn to

serious actor in recent years is Jamie Foxx.

Foxx cut his teeth on the stand-up scene before getting his own TV show. Following a successful run on "The Jamie Foxx Show," he scored several big movie roles culminating in 2004 when he was nominated for two Oscars for best supporting actor in "Collateral" and best actor in "Ray," for which he took home Oscar gold.

Since his Oscar turn, Foxx apparently has had a challenge landing lead roles, though that is no fault of his own. There just seems to be a lack roles for black actors.

I hope that will change, because Foxx is a major talent, as seen by his command of the material in "Ray,"

"Collateral" and more recently, "Django Unchained."

Making the transition is not new, as other comedians have had their fair share of success while transitioning from standup to movies and TV.

Among those success stories are Steve Martin, Eddie Murphy and Jerry Seinfeld.

Jim Carrey has been perhaps the most popular, appearing in several well-known movies like "Lemony Snicket's A Series of Unfortunate Events," and a rare dramatic turn in "Lemony Snicket's A Series of Unfortunate Events."

I think the transition can be tough, because there are so many comedians working today. Going to a comedy club or an arena has become a relaxing fun night to laugh and get away from stresses.

While many comedians are able to make the jump from the clubs to the screen, others have fallen short.

John Mulaney, for one, has failed to resonate on TV when his show "Mulaney" crashed and burned on Fox.

Mulaney came in with great fanfare, most notably as a top writer for "Saturday Night Live," where many stand-ups break into the acting business.

Ultimately, however, Mulaney's show did not make it.

Whitney Cummings, one of my favorite comics, also failed to resonate with audiences as her show "Whitney" failed to capture fans of her whip smart writing and vulgar humor.

Even though Cummings' self-named show failed, the savvy comic is still a star in the sitcom world as a writer and creator of "2 Broke Girls," a funny and wretched sitcom that has kept CBS relevant after losing top sitcoms like "Two and a Half Men" and "How I Met Your Mother."

Not every comedian needs to make it on TV or in movies. Some are better suited to write and others thrive right where they started, making people laugh in the comedy clubs.

For the second time in three days, we get the 100th episode of a show. On Tuesday, it was "Switched at Birth's" tonight, "Scandal" has a "what if" episode.

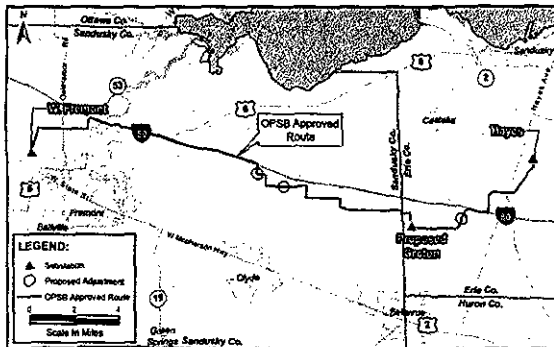





# Raptors handle resting Cavs

Cleveland to face

CLEVELAND  
Jonas Valanciunas made his first career 3-pointer and the Toronto Raptors closed the regular season with a 98-83 win on Wednesday night over the Cleveland Cavaliers, who didn't play their "Big 3" All-Stars so they're playoff ready.

Norman Powell scored 25 points as the Raptors beat the Cavs for the first time in four tries this season and gave the defending champion something to think about if they meet in the postseason. Cleveland took Toronto down in six games in last year's Eastern Conference finals.

Although there was still a chance to secure the No. 1 seed in the East, the Cavs put more value on rest and sat LeBron James, Kyrie Irving and Kevin Love. Cleveland fell to 0-4 in games this season without the trio and 0-8 minus James.

The Cavs did get forward Tristan Thompson back after he missed four games with a sprained right thumb. Wearing a brace he'll sport in the playoffs, Thompson scored 10 points in 18 minutes.

Cleveland also got its

first look at newly signed 7-foot-3 center Edy Tavares, who blocked six shots and grabbed 10 rebounds.

The Raptors, too, chose to keep legs fresh as All-Star forward DeMar DeRozan (flu-like symptoms) and Serge Ibaka watched.

This game looked more like a preseason exhibition than a matchup between two of the league's top teams.

Both Toronto coach Dwane Casey and Cleveland's Tyronn Lue opted to get players off their feet and played reserves after halftime.

Valanciunas stepped behind the line before knocking down just his second 3-point attempt.

James, who will attempt to get to his seventh straight Finals in the coming weeks, stayed in street clothes while Irving and Love wore their warmups for Cleveland's final home game. It was a somewhat fitting ending to the 82-game schedule for the Cavs, who at times seemed bored with the regular season and also endured injuries and roster upheaval.

But the club's inconsistency and an outside belief they are vulnerable and can get knocked out before the Finals, Lue remains confident his team will step up when it matters most.

"It's enough talking and the playoffs are here," Lue said. "We either got to put up or shut up, and I think we'll put up."

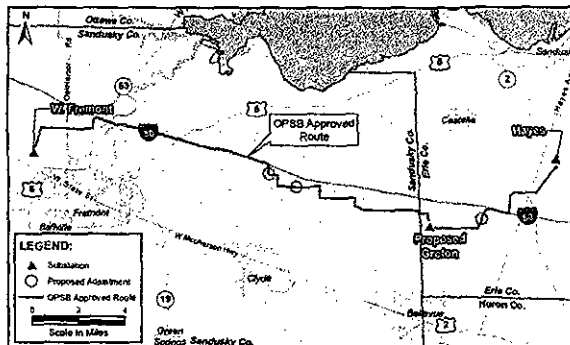
