Excellence Committee member and Student Activities Council (middle school); Tammy Wilson, Excellence Committee member; Jeneva Ford, Pep band and mentor; Natalie Kee, Science Club advisor; Katie Spencer, Student Activities Council (high school) and mentor; Karli Townsend, Student Activities Council (high school); Tiffany Fletcher, Student Activities Council (high school) and High School Recovery; Shannon Schmidt, Student Activities Council (elementary), and Lynn Simpson, mentor. In other business, the Board: - APPROVED tuition reimbursement for Lance Gram; - APPROVED the 2017-18 board policies; - HIRED Lavern Davenport and Toni Haidet as food service assistants for the Seamless Summer Lunch

program; - APPROVED Schools of Ohio Risk Sharing Authority as Brown Local's provider for property and fleet insurance for fiscal year 2018 at an approximate cost of \$28,000; - APPROVED the original appropriation budget of \$11,104,348.79 for the 2017-18 school year; and annual appropriation budget adjustments for the 2016-17 school year; - APPROVED bills totaling \$211,854.20; SET the next regular meeting for July 5 at 7 p.m.

The Conotton Valley Union Local Board of Education has approved 2% pay increases for four administrators and a technology director. Pay hikes approved at the Board's June 15 meeting include the following administrators whose new salaries listed will become effective Aug. 1: Andrew Melster, junior/senior high school principal, \$66,300; Michael Wright, elementary principal, \$61,223; Lauren Hanstine, director of Special Education,

\$31,012, and Stephanie Garrott, curriculum director, \$52,541. A 2% pay increase was also approved for the Technology Director position, increasing the salary from \$45,000 to \$45,900 effective Aug. 1. A two-year administrative contract was approved for Shay Young as an academic advisor at a yearly salary of \$80,000 plus benefits with the cost to be shared equally by Bellaire Local Schools. In other business, the board: - APPROVED a shared services agreement with the Bellaire Local School District for the 2017-18 school year in which Conotton Valley Union Local agrees to provide 102 days of curriculum director services to Bellaire Local at a salary cost of \$51,503; - APPROVED the purchase of four new Xerox copiers at a cost of \$38,513.91 from ComDoc of Uniontown, along with an agreement for the service and maintenance of the copiers July 1; - ENTERED into a contract with Strategic Solutions of North Canton to provide software and services for document imaging at an estimated cost of \$8,000 for three years, beginning July 1 with an automatic two-year renewal at the end of the three-year contract period; -NON-RENEWED classified positions of Angela Ball as a teacher's aide and Milo Baker as a part time cook; - APPROVED membership in the Ohio High School Athletic Association for the 2017-18 school year; - APPROVED a \$150,000 supplemental appropriation which amended the 2017 appropriations to \$5,769,642; -APPROVED fiscal year 2018 temporary appropriations totaling \$1,828,800; -APPROVED payment of \$3,562.50 of approximately 57 unused accumulated sick leave days for Debbie DiDonato who is retiring June 30.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED MAJOR UTILITY FACILITY

AEP Ohio Transmission Company, Inc. (AEP Ohio Transco), an affiliate of AEP Ohio, proposes to rebuild a 138-kilovolt (kV) transmission line in Brown, Center and Harrison townships in Carroll County and Canton, Osnaburg and Sandy townships in Stark County. The project is known as the Carrollton-Sunnyside 138 kV Transmission Line Rebuild Project.

The purpose of the project is to improve the electric transmission power grid in northeast Ohio. AEP Ohio Transco will rebuild the line within the existing right-of-way. AEP Ohio Transco will build the new line using primarily single pole, steel structures. The Carrollton-Sunnyside transmission line is about 20 miles long. This project will be an approximate \$50 million investment by AEP Ohio Transco. Construction is scheduled to begin in fall 2017.

AEP Ohio filed a Letter of Notification with the Ohio Power Siting Board (OPSB), under Case No. 17-1318-EL-BLN. This number should be included in all communications related to this project. The Letter of Notification to construct, operate and maintain this facility is pending before the OPSB.

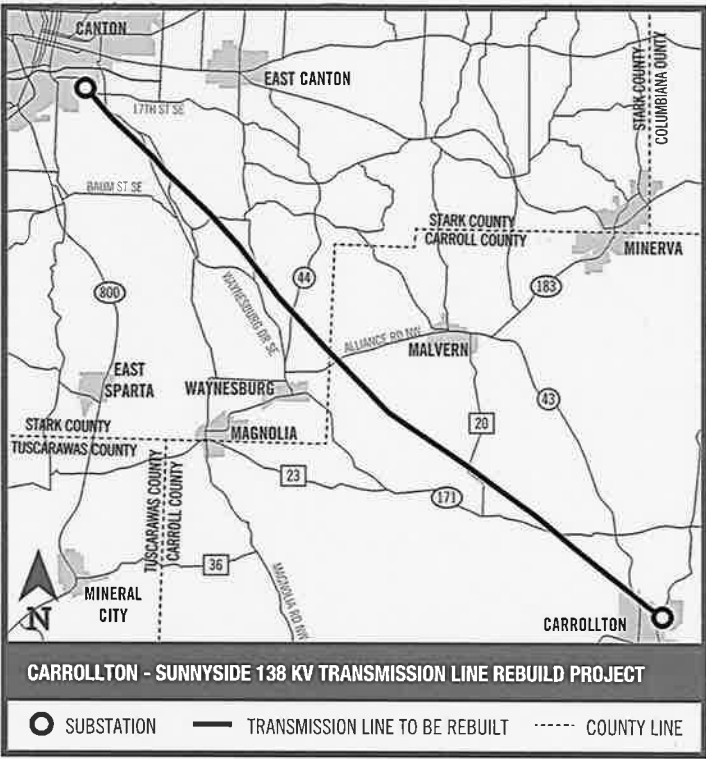
Petitions to intervene in the Letter of Notification will be accepted by the OPSB up to 10 days following the publication date of this notice required by Rule 4906-2-12, Ohio Administrative Code. Petitions should be addressed to Ohio Power Siting Board, 180 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio, 43215-3793 and must cite Case No. 17-1318-EL-BLN.

## Six things to know about the new rules for tobacco-free, smoke-free campuses

**1** Kent and Akron join nearly 30 other Ohio colleges and universities that have banned smoking campuswide. In Stark County, Malone University and Aultman College of Nursing & Health Sciences also are smoke-free. When they approved the smoke-free, tobacco-free policies, Kent and Akron officials cited the growing concerns of about the harmful effects of smoking and second-hand smoke as their primary reasons for enacting the bans. Smoking remains the leading cause of preventable death in the United States. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that 22 percent of Ohio college-age adults smoke, which is higher than the national average of 13 percent. The CDC also has found that 99 percent of smokers tried tobacco before age 26. The universities also anticipate other benefits from the smoking and tobacco bans, such as reduced health and property insurance, reduced risk of fire and lower maintenance needs, but officials said it's too early to calculate the expected savings.

**2** The new rules ban nearly all use of tobacco and nicotine, whether it's smoked, vaped, heated, chewed, absorbed, dissolved or ingested by any means including mod boxes and electronic devices that create an aerosol or vapor. Restricted items include cigarettes, cigars, cigarillos, cloves, hookahs, e-cigarettes, herbal and oil vaporizers, pipes, water pipes and all smokeless tobacco. Exceptions to the policies include controlled research, educational, clinical, or religious ceremonial purposes that have prior university approval. Both universities also permit the use of nicotine replacement therapy, such as patches, gum, inhalers and lozenges.

**3** Visitors to the Balloon Classic & Fireworks, to an event held at Kent State Stark's Corporate University and Conference Center or to any other event on any Kent State or University of Akron property also must follow the smoking and tobacco-use ban. Both universities also forbid smoking and tobacco use inside personal vehicles that are parked on university property. Akron also prohibits the smoking and tobacco

use at university sponsored events, regardless of venue.

**4** University officials at both Kent and Akron hope to see voluntary compliance of the new policies and will remind violators of the rule and asked them to comply. Students and employees who repeatedly refuse to follow the policy could face disciplinary action, similar to the discipline they would face for violating any other university policy.

**5** Stark State College, which shares its Jackson Township campus with Kent State at Stark, still permits smoking and smokeless tobacco use in designated areas. Stark State spokeswoman Marisa Robb said the college's wellness committee is researching whether to institute a smoke-free or tobacco-free policy for its sites and plans to review a student survey on the topic in July. She said Stark State will not block Kent smokers from crossing over to its campus and expects them to remain respectful if they do. "We'll see how this plays out and if we need to do something different because of an issue, we'll address it," she said.

**6** Research on the impact of smoking bans has shown the prohibition can be effective. Ohio State University and Purdue University researchers who studied city smoking bans found that casual male smokers were more likely to give up cigarettes once a city smoking ban took effect, but a ban had almost no effect on women or existing heavy smokers. Researchers at Indiana University compared its campus, where smoking was banned in 2008, to a nearby university where smoking was allowed in certain outdoor areas and found the ban significantly had reduced student smoking at Indiana during a two-year period and that more Indiana students had developed a favorable attitude toward smoking regulations. Other research has shown that campuses that enact tobacco-free policies have not witnessed a decrease in enrollment following the ban.

p.m. The Greater Canton Concert Band will perform at 7:30 p.m. until the fireworks display, which will begin about 9:45 p.m.

The fireworks staging area will be adjacent to the McKinley Monument.

"This is a tremendous achievement for our community," Bernabei said in a statement. "Without the outpouring of support from residents, the foundations, and our partners in business and labor, we would be unable to celebrate this tradition. I would especially like to thank Patrick and Bob Harper for their leadership in making this event a reality."

Donations continue to be accepted, which may be sent to the American Legion Post 44 or USW Local 1123. Patrick Harper, who can be reached at 330-265-3117 for more information about supporting the fireworks, said a little less than \$5,000 remains to be raised. If a deficit remains after the

fireworks, a fundraiser will be organized. "We are close enough that we need to do it," he said.

Donations also will be collected at the event, which costs nearly \$30,000 total, Harper said. The fireworks cost about \$15,000, and the rest of the funds pay for city workers — including police and firefighters — and portable toilets.

Harper said work already is underway to secure a major donor for next year's fireworks.

The city of Canton opted to stop funding the event in 2016 when massive cuts were made to the city's operating budget.

Bob Harper, one of the organizers of the event, emphasized residents should be aware that the event is Monday.

The Canton Arts District, which previously canceled fireworks for First Friday's 10th anniversary because of lack of funds, has since announced that the July 7 show is back on. Those fireworks, scheduled for 9:45 p.m., are sponsored by The Canton Repository, The Deuble Foundation, Faye & Teke Heston, Pat Miller and Joy Timken.

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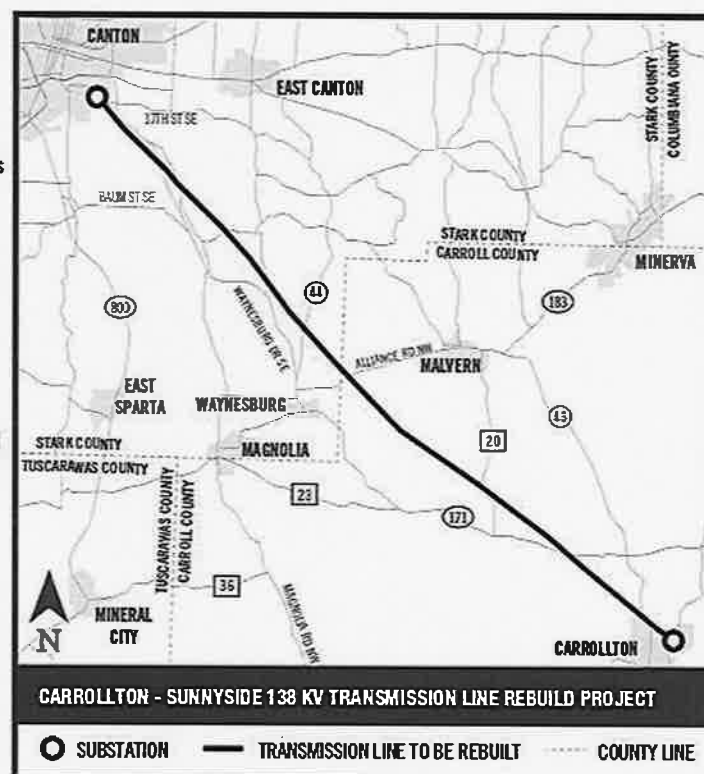
