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1 Tuesday morning, 2 August 15, 2017. 3 4 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: The Public 5 Utilities Commission of Ohio has set for hearing at 6 this time and place Case No. 17-591-TR-CVF in the 7 matter of William B. Ketchum. My name is Kerry 8 Sheets. I'm an attorney examiner for the 9 Commission, and I've been assigned to hear this 10 case. 11 May I now have the appearances of the 12 parties, please, starting with Staff. 13 MR. BEELER: Thank you, Your Honor. On behalf of the Staff of the Public Utilities 14 15 Commission of Ohio, Ohio Attorney General Mike 16 DeWine, I'm Assistant Attorney General Steven 17 Beeler. My address is 30 East Broad Street, 16th 18 Floor, Columbus, Ohio 43215. Thank you. 19 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: Thank you. 20 Now, Mr. Ketchum, would you please give 2.1 your name and address. 22 THE RESPONDENT: William B. Ketchum, 23 and my address is 11440 Columbiana Canfield Road,

ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: Thank you.

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Canfield, Ohio.

5 Do we have any preliminary matters to take 1 care of this morning? 2 3 MR. BEELER: No, Your Honor. ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: Do you have 4 5 any witnesses to call? MR. BEELER: Yes, Your Honor. 6 7 Staff would call Inspector Maffitt to the stand. (Witness sworn.) 8 9 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: Be seated. 10 11 GLEN L. MAFFITT, 12 called as a witness, being first duly sworn, 13 testified as follows: 14 DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. BEELER: 15 16 Q. Good morning. Could you state your 17 full name for the record. 18 My name is Glen L. Maffitt. That's Α. Glen with one N. 19 20 Okay. Where are you employed? Q. 2.1 I work for the State of Ohio State 22 Highway Patrol. I work with the motor carrier 23 enforcement up in Warren, Ohio.

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Α.

Okay. And what is your exact position?

I work in motor carrier enforcement.

- Q. Okay. And do you have a title? Motor carrier inspector?
 - A. Motor carrier enforcement inspector.
- Q. Okay. How long have you been with the patrol?
 - A. In November, it will be 28 years.
 - Q. Okay. And for that eight years, have you been in this same position the entire time?
- A. No. I've been in this position since probably 2000, 2001.
- Q. Okay. What are your duties in your capacity as a motor carrier inspector?
- A. I inspect commercial motor vehicles, trucks, busses.
- 15 Q. Okay.

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- A. Inspect drivers' logbooks. If there's a crash, we get called out and do an inspection, see if we determine if there were any defects prior to the crash or not.
 - Q. Okay. What sort of training do you have for your position?
- A. We had to go to Part A and Part B

 school. We've been to hazmat class. We are

 certified in different types of hazardous materials,

 bulk, nonbulk, other buck, tankers, and motor

7 1 coaches. 2 Okay. And that's an initial training Q. 3 that you take. Do you also take ongoing training for your job? 4 5 Α. Yes. Okay. Just generally, would you -- you 6 Ο. 7 would say that motor carrier inspections are conducted to protect the safety of the traveling 8 public in Ohio, correct? 9 10 Α. Yes. 11 How many inspections do you perform on Ο. 12 average per year? 13 Α. Oh, anywhere from 1,000 to 1,300 14 inspections. 15 MR. BEELER: Okay. May I approach the 16 witness, Your Honor. 17 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: You may. 18 MR. BEELER: I would ask to be marked as Staff Exhibit 1 -- this is the driver examination 19 20 report that is with an inspection date of October 10, 2016. 2.1 2.2 (Staff Exhibit 1 was marked for identification.) 23 24 BY MR. BEELER:

Q. Do you recognize this document?

- A. Yes. The format's a little different than what we print out, but it's got all the same information on there.
- Q. So it's substantially the same as the document that you print out?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Is this document a patrol record?
- A. I would say, the way this is formatted, this would be for PUCO.
- 10 Q. Okay.

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- A. But with it having all the same information, yeah, it's an official document.
- Q. Okay. And it's kept in the ordinary course of business of the patrol?
- 15 A. Yes.
 - Q. And it's the practice, when you make these stops, to make a report on each stop, correct?
- 18 A. Correct.
 - Q. And you report on matters observed pursuant to a duty imposed by law as to which there was a duty by you to report, correct?
- 22 A. Yes.
- Q. Was the reason for preparing this
 report an inspection of the motor carrier vehicle
 operated by Murray Trucking, Inc.?

9 1 Α. Yes. 2 Do you remember this inspection? Q. 3 Α. For the most part, yes. Okay. Who's the driver listed on the 4 Ο. 5 report? It would be William B. Ketchum. 6 Α. 7 Is Mr. Ketchum here today? Q. Yes. He's sitting over there. 8 Α. 9 Ο. Does the driver get a copy of the 10 report at the stop? 11 Α. Yes. 12 Q. And you gave him that copy? 13 Α. Correct. 14 Okay. Is there a violation noted on Ο. 15 this report? 16 Yes. It would be for the seat belt. Α. 17 Okay. And that would be a violation Q. 18 for failure to use seat belt, and that is 49 CFR 392.16(a). That's correct? 19 20 Α. The section that we use is 392.16 of 2.1 the Federal Motor Carrier Safety regulations. 22 Okay. You observed Mr. Ketchum not Q. 23 wearing his seat belt; is that correct? When you 24 observed him?

Well, when I saw Mr. Ketchum, I was in

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Α.

the crossover watching eastbound traffic. And when he went past, I did not see his seat belt over top of his shoulder like I would want I would want to see.

So I stopped Mr. Ketchum, and I asked him -I said, "How come you weren't wearing your seat
belt?" At that point in time, it looked like he had
no seat belt on.

- Q. When you approached the cab, it didn't look like he -- it still didn't look like he had a seat belt on, correct?
 - A. Correct.

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And he said, "Look." And he opened the door or I looked in, and he says, "I've got my seat belt -- lap belt under." And he showed me that he did have it on.

And then I said, "Well, how come you don't have your shoulder harness over top your shoulder and you seem to be wearing it underneath?"

And he said, "Well, I'm a short person, and if I wear it over top of my shoulder here, it rubs my neck, and it's very uncomfortable for me to do that."

Q. Okay. There are some inspection notes on this report, Staff Exhibit 1. Could you just

read those inspection report for the record -- or the inspection notes.

- A. "Driver was eastbound on Interstate
 Route 80, and I was stopped in the crossover and
 watched the driver driving without his seat belt on.
 When stopped and asked why was he driving without
 his seat belt on, driver said he was adamant about
 wearing his seat belt and wears the shoulder strap
 under his left arm because he is short and it rubs
 his neck."
- Q. Okay. And you completed these notes contemporaneously on the day of the stop, correct?
 - A. Yes. Before he got his copy.
- Q. Okay. So going back up to the violations box on the -- on Staff Exhibit 1, there's a violation description there. So the first part of that violation, the "failing to use seat belt while operating a CMV" before that colon there, that just -- when you put that violation in, that's automatic, right?
- A. Right. It automatically comes up, and then you add description to it.
- Q. So the rest, the stuff that's in all caps, that's notes that you added, right?
- 25 A. Correct.

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- Q. Could you read that?
- A. It says: "Driver had a teal shirt, and the truck had a gray seat belt."
 - Q. Okay. And you complete that note contemporaneously at the stop as well, correct?
 - A. Yes.

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- 7 Q. Okay. Why did you put that note in 8 there? Teal shirt, gray seat belt.
 - A. Because it helps people understand what took place, what I was seeing.
- 11 Q. Okay. So you --
- A. It was a contrasting color. If it was
 a black seat belt on a black shirt, it may have been
 harder to see.
- 15 Q. Okay.
- A. A white shirt to black seat belt is
 more of a contrasting color, and it would be easier
 to spot.
- Q. Okay. So you look for different colors across the chest, correct?
- 21 A. Correct.
- Q. Okay. And when you observed

 Mr. Ketchum, you didn't see -- all you see was teal

 shirt. Did not see any contrasting colors, correct?
- 25 A. Correct.

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So commonly, as part of your job in

     look for drivers not wearing their seat belts,
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     correct?

                  Yes.
                  The reason code on your inspection is

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     OBVI. That means obvious, correct?
                  Yes, it does.

                  So because you witnessed, observed
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    Mr. Ketchum without a seat belt, you pulled him over
     because of that, correct?
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            Α.
                  That's correct, yes.
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            Q.
                  The stop was at -- at least it started
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     at 8:50 in the morning; is that correct?
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            Α.
                  Yes.
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            Ο.
                  Okay. No rain that day that you

     remember?
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                  Not that I recall. I think it was --
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Q. Okay. And the truck was heading eastbound on I-80 --

from what I remember, it was a clear day.

22 A. Yes.

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Q. -- according to your notes. That's correct? So the sun wouldn't have been an issue for you?

- A. No. I use the sun to my advantage.
- Q. Yeah. So the sun --
- A. If he's driving east into the sun, a lot of times, the sun will light up the inside of the cab, and that it makes very easy to see things.
 - O. It illuminates the cab, correct?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. So as a result of your observation, you then cited Mr. Ketchum with the violation, correct?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. I know you said that Mr. Ketchum was adamant about wearing his seat belt under his arm because he is short and it rubs his neck. Is that a proper way to wear the seat belt?
- A. Well, let me explain if this helps.

 Mr. Ketchum says he's adamant in wearing his seat

 belt, and then he said that he wears the shoulder

 harness. He said -- he wasn't adamant about wearing

 his shoulder harness under his arm. He did say the

 seat belt specifically he was adamant about wearing

 like that.
- Q. Okay. So wearing a shoulder harness under your arm, in your professional opinion, is not the proper way to wear the -- to use the seat belt assembly, correct?

- A. Well, if I may say, it's not my opinion. It's the way the rules are worded. But when we see violations that are in black and white and then we stop the truck, we have a legitimate violation.
- Q. But you are a motor carrier inspector.

 It is your professional opinion here --
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. -- that that was a violation because --
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. -- the seat harness was not worn properly, correct?
 - A. Yes. I enforce the rules.
 - Q. Okay. The seat belt assembly was all one piece, correct? It wasn't two separate pieces, one for the shoulder, one for the waist, correct?
 - A. It was one piece. That's correct, yes.
 - Q. Similar to most cars today, right?
 - A. I would say yes.
 - Q. So from your testimony, again, when you observed him on the road, you didn't see -- you didn't see a seat belt; but then, when you approached the truck and opened the door, he -- Mr. Ketchum still had the shoulder harness under his arm, correct?

- A. Correct, yes.
- 2 Q. So you observed that as you approached the truck, right?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. Okay. So it's your testimony -- with all that, it is your testimony here today that

 Mr. Ketchum was in violation of the regulation,

 correct?
- 9 A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Anything else that you can think
 of that would be important for the examiner to know
 or the Commission to know here today that we didn't
 talk about?
- A. Not that I can think of. That pretty

 much covers it.
- MR. BEELER: Okay. No further questions for this witness, Your Honor.
- I would move Staff Exhibit 1 into the record or ask for it to be moved into the record subject to any cross-examination from Mr. Ketchum.
- 21 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: Okay. I'll
 22 admit Staff Exhibit 1 into the evidence.
- 23 (Exhibit admitted into evidence.)
- 24 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: Mr. Ketchum, 25 do you have any questions for this witness?

1 THE RESPONDENT: Yes. 2 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: If you do, 3 come up here, please. Go ahead and you can ask your question. 4 5 You've got to -- you have to ask questions now. Then you get an answer. Then you go on. That's the 6 7 way we conduct the hearing: question and answers. 8 THE RESPONDENT: Okay. 9 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: So go ahead. THE RESPONDENT: I'm no attorney, but I 10 drove three hours for this. 11 12 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: Speak up, 13 will you, please. 14 THE RESPONDENT: Okay. 15 16 CROSS-EXAMINATION 17 BY THE RESPONDENT: 18 My first question is: When I passed Q. you on Route 80 going eastbound, you're sitting in 19 20 the middle in the medium [sic] just west of the 2.1 Hubbard exit, correct? 2.2 Α. Yes. 23 Okay. When I went past you, you said Q.

that you seen I had no seat belt on, correct?

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- O. You didn't see the shoulder harness.
- 2 A. Correct.
 - Q. You didn't see the seat belt.
 - A. Correct.
 - Q. You did not see the seat belt.
- 6 A. You mean your lap belt?
- 7 Q. You didn't see the seat belt at all,
- 8 correct?

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- 9 A. Are you referring to the lap belt or 10 the shoulder harness, sir?
- Q. No. I'm asking you if you seen my seat belt off.
 - A. Okay. I would say no because the seat belt would be your lap belt, and that would be down below the window, and I did not see that.
- 16 Q. Okay. You didn't see that. Okay.

When I went past you and you pulled out, you were probably two miles west of the Hubbard exit, correct? Because it's right after Belmont Avenue.

- 20 I've already went up and measured it.
 - A. Somewhere around there.
- Q. Okay. When you drove up, why did you drive beside me for at least one mile with one hand on the wheel, leaning over with your passenger window open, looking up at me? Because you didn't

1 know if I had my seat belt on because you couldn't 2 see it, correct?

ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: You can't supply the testimony now. You have to ask questions. Okay?

6 THE RESPONDENT: Okay.

BY THE RESPONDENT:

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- Q. But why did you drive beside me for so long looking out your window?
- A. For two reasons. And I don't look out
 my window for so long.

I pull up beside the driver. Okay? And when I get right up and just a little bit past the cab, I turn real quick and I look back like this because now my line of vision is looking back at you like this rather than straight across. If I look straight across, the seat belt could be back into the cab area where I'm not able to see if you're wearing it or not.

- Q. Yes.
- A. Okay? So I pull slightly forward, and I turn and look a little bit back to my right. Then I can clearly see the driver's shoulder without any obstructions to see whether he has it in the right location or not. That's why I do that.

- Q. Okay. And you're driving the SUV?
- 2 A. That's correct.

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- Q. You can look back and see.
- A. Absolutely.
- Q. But you weren't leaning over, looking out the window at me?
- A. No. I looked like this. And about like that, I can tell. I have to pay attention and watch where I'm going so I don't run into things.
- 10 Yeah. Because you were on the dotted Q. 11 line, I was on the white line, and you pulled me 12 over. Do you think it is correct to pull someone 13 over right in front of the barrels in a construction 14 loan which -- I have 8 foot of lumber on my 15 trailer -- blocking the whole flashing sign at the 16 merge point, which I sat in my truck while you was 17 in your car --
 - ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: You have to ask questions now.
- 20 BY THE RESPONDENT:
- Q. I mean, do you think that's a safe procedure to pull me over right there?
- A. Does that have to do with why I pulled you over for the seat belt?
- Q. No. I'm asking if that's a safe

procedure because I felt unsafe parking there. And then when you asked for registration, is it --

ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: Okay. We have to let him give an answer now.

THE RESPONDENT: Okay.

THE WITNESS: Okay. Where I stopped you was at the widest point in the road, was it not? Was it right there on the Hubbard exit, where we had that extra right lane for safety purposes, away from the higher speed traffic? Yes, it was. That's why we stopped there. Okay?

12 BY THE RESPONDENT:

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- Q. So it's safe the pull a truck over and block the flashing light.
- A. It's safer right there at the wider spot of the road than it would be at the narrower part. That's why we do it that way.
- Q. Are you aware of how many accidents in the construction zone in the Youngstown 680/76/Route 80 area? Are you aware that there's an accident on the news every night in that construction zone, just about?
- A. Well, they do give us overtime because it's what you call a high crash area.
 - Q. Okay. And -- but when you walked up to

my truck and you looked in the truck, this thing that you're saying I said, that I put it under my arm -- you said that I told you I put it under my arm, correct?

- A. According to what the notes said, that's what you told me.
 - Q. Okay. Questions.

Okay. Isn't it true that I told you almost one year to the day that you pulled me over -- I told you the story. I got a seat belt violation for having it under my arm because it rubs my neck. I explained that to you. You told me I need to buy a thing to put on there.

- A. I said you're welcome to check with the manufacturer if you wanted to do --
 - Q. Okay. But --
- A. -- something like that. Sometimes there are --
- Q. Didn't I explain to you what happened to me and I told you that I had the seat belt under my arm and I got a ticket for it?
 - A. Would you let me finish the answer?
- 23 Q. Okay.

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A. You were talking about sometimes it rubs your neck. I explained to you that you could

put something on there that would be a softer
product --

- Q. Yeah, I know that.
- A. -- that maybe wouldn't do that as an option for you. I'm not telling you that you had to do that. That's your business.
- Q. But didn't I say to you that I got picked up, I have a seat belt violation because I had it on incorrect? I had it under my arm. I explained that to you.
- 11 A. I don't remember that.

12 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: Okay. We've
13 asked that question now about three times. He's
14 given an answer.

THE WITNESS: I don't remember that.

THE RESPONDENT: Okay.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: So you're going to another question.

19 BY THE RESPONDENT:

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- Q. So you're driving beside me to see.

 And you say that you seen when you were parked in the middle, in the medium strip. I was going east, and you had seen that I had no seat belt on.
- A. I'm saying you didn't have your shoulder harness where it belonged, yes.

- Q. Okay. Then, if I didn't have it on when you pulled out, why didn't you pull me over then?
- A. Because I had to catch up to you first. There's two lanes there. Okay?
 - Q. Correct.

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- A. There's two lanes, and it's better for both of us for me to stop you where we have that extra third lane where traffic is slower for the exit and we have more room between us and the faster traffic.
- Q. Yeah, the two lanes. So it's standard procedure for you to drive up and ride beside me for a mile before you back out of it, get behind me, then turn your lights on? That's normal procedure?
- A. I don't know about procedure, but sometimes I do that. That's not uncommon.
- Q. Is it true that you were riding beside me looking because you didn't know if I had my seat belt on?
 - A. No, but --
- MR. BEELER: Objection. I think he's answered that before.
- THE RESPONDENT: But that's what he was doing.

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                  ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: We've
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     covered it before.
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                  THE RESPONDENT: Okay. Then I have
     nothing further.
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                  ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: No more
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     questions? Okay.
                  THE RESPONDENT: But I had to --
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                  ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: You'll have
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     the chance to testify in a minute.
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                  MR. BEELER: Can I have just one
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     second, Your Honor?
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                  ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: Go ahead.
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                  MR. BEELER: No further questions, Your
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     Honor.
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                  ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: You're
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     excused.
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                  MR. BEELER: At this time, Your Honor,
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     I would reserve Inspector Maffitt for rebuttal if
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     necessary.
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                  ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: That's fine.
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                  MR. BEELER: At this time, Staff will
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     call its second witness, Rod Moser to the stand.
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              (Witness sworn.)
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2	ROD A. MOSER,
3	called as a witness, being first duly sworn,
4	testified as follows:
5	DIRECT EXAMINATION
6	BY MR. BEELER:
7	Q. Good morning.
8	A. Good morning.
9	Q. Please state your full name for the
10	record.
11	A. My name is Rod Allen Moser.
12	Q. Where are you employed?
13	A. With the Public Utilities Commission of
14	Ohio, 180 East Broad Street.
15	Q. Okay. What is your position at the
16	Commission?
17	A. I'm the chief of the compliance section
18	within the Department of Transportation.
19	Q. What are your duties in that position?
20	A. I review inspections and oversee the
21	conference process and the hearing process of the
22	administration of forfeiture amounts.
23	Q. What is your training and
24	qualifications to do that job?
25	A. Well, I worked for the highway patrol

for nearly 30 years, primarily in commercial enforcement. I also am trained in North American Standards Part A and Part B, and then I had on-the-job training with a more-experienced person when I came here.

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- Q. Okay. Just generally, before we get into the actual violations here, how does the Commission determine amounts of forfeitures?
- A. They're generally based on the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance suggested amounts.
- Q. Okay. So inspection reports come in that have violations listed on them. You look at those violations, and you determine dollar amounts from a forfeiture system that the Commission has, correct?
- A. Yes. Basically, the process is automated. If the violation carries a fine or a forfeiture amount, the system will generate a letter to the individual, to the respondent, advising them of the violation and what the amount would be.
- Q. And the Commission applies that process uniformly to everyone? Carriers? Shippers?

 Drivers?
- A. Yes. No human intervention, just an

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1 automated system.
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2 MR. BEELER: May I approach the 3 witness, Your Honor?

4 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: You may.

MR. BEELER: I would like to have marked as Staff Exhibit 2 -- this is a notice of preliminary determination sent to the driver, and it's dated January 18, 2017.

(Staff Exhibit 2 was marked for identification.)

11 BY MR. BEELER:

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- Q. Do you recognize this document?
- 13 A. I do.
- 14 O. What is it?
- 15 A. It's a copy of the letter that was sent
 16 to the respondent following a scheduled conference.
 17 The conference actually never took place. And this
 18 is a letter just saying what the Commission's stance
 19 is on this particular case.
 - Q. Okay. And this document is titled a notice of preliminary determination, correct?
 - A. That's correct.
- Q. Did you review this document in preparation for the hearing today?
- 25 A. I did, yes.

- Q. Is this a Commission record?
- 2 A. Yes, it is.

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- Q. Kept in the ordinary course of business?
- 5 A. Yes, sir.
 - Q. So explain how the forfeiture was derived in this case.
- A. Well, all the violations are divided into groups depending on the severity of the violation, who committed the violation, whether it would be something assigned to a driver or a carrier.
- This one happens to be a Group 4 violation,
 which is generally a driver violation. That's
 always a \$100 fine in our system.
- Q. Okay. So the forfeiture amount here is \$100?
- 18 A. Yes.
- Q. Is that penalty consistent with the recommended fine schedule and recommended civil penalty procedure adopted by the Commercial Motor Vehicle Alliance?
- 23 A. It is, yes.
- Q. And it's a correct amount, correct?
- 25 A. It is a correct amount.

Okay. Would you recommend this amount 1 Q. 2 to the Commission? 3 Yes, sir, I would. Α. Anything else that you can think of 4 Ο. 5 that would be important to note for the examiner or the Commission? 6 7 Α. No, sir. 8 MR. BEELER: Thank you. No further 9 questions. 10 At this time, I would move for the admission of Staff Exhibit 2 subject to 11 12 cross-examination by Mr. Ketchum. 13 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: I will admit Staff Exhibit 2 into evidence at this time. 14 15 (Exhibit admitted into evidence.) 16 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: Mr. Ketchum, 17 do you have any questions for this witness? 18 THE RESPONDENT: No. 19 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: You're 20 excused. 2.1 MR. BEELER: I believe both Staff 22 Exhibit 1 and Staff Exhibit 2 have been admitted. 23 So, at this time, Staff has no further witnesses. 24 ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: You rest? 25 Okay.

When he walked up to my truck, he went to the passenger side, and he got up in the truck. He said, "Why weren't you wearing your seat belt?"

I said, "I was wearing my seat belt."

And he said, "Well, I need your license, registration, and I need the registration of that trailer." The trailer is a company trailer. My truck, company trailer.

I said, "I don't have the registration.

It's on the trailer." So I had to get out, like I said, in the construction zone, right before the merge point, and get down beside the trailer and get the thing out -- the container to get the registration.

I gave it to him. He said, "Have a seat in your truck. I've got to do a short inspection. It won't be long." So I sat in my truck and waited.

He walked back up, passenger side again.

He opened my door, climbed up in my truck, and
handed me all my stuff back. And that's when I
looked and seen "seat belt."

And I told him -- I said, "I had a seat belt ticket before," I said, "for not wearing it

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correct." I said, "This time, I had it on correct."

And I know for -- I know that he couldn't tell if I had it on or he wouldn't have been riding beside me like that.
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I'm 55 years old. I've been trucking a long time. I've got two very good friends that work for a post pretty close to him -- state patrols. I know that -- I mean, he didn't want to do an inspection. I don't know why. Inspect the truck if you pull me over, but he just decided to write up seat belt. I think it was to meet his quota or something.

I don't mean to be ignorant or have an attitude, but I know that I had my seat belt on. I wouldn't have drove three hours to Columbus today over \$100, but it's the principle. It goes on my PSP score. That makes it harder, you know, applying for a job or anything. I don't need that on my record, especially knowing that I had it on.

That's all I've got to say.

              Inspector Maffitt has particular expertise
25
     in motor vehicle inspection, prepared a report, and
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testified that the driver violated that section.

Inspector Maffitt testified, in his professional opinion, Mr. Ketchum violated that section because he failed to properly wear his seat belt while operating a commercial motor vehicle.

2.1

Inspector Maffitt observed from a stationary position on a good-weather day that Mr. Ketchum was in an illuminated cab with a teal shirt and had no seat belt across his chest. As a result, Inspector Maffitt pulled the driver over. The driver stated to him -- and Inspector Maffitt's notes repeat that, both in the vehicle description and in the inspector notes -- that Mr. Ketchum stated to him that the -- Mr. Ketchum wears his shoulder strap under his left arm because he is short and it rubs his neck.

That is not a proper manner of wearing a seat belt under the arm. The Commission has held in the past that wearing the shoulder strap under the arm is not a proper way to wear the seat belt in Case Nos. 08-734-TR-CVF -- that's a Lyden Oil case -- and 08-593-TR-CVF, Gregory Tincher. Where the seat belt assembly has a shoulder harness, it must be worn across the chest.

So here, Inspector Maffitt observed that

the driver was not wearing a seat belt at all in the first instance. But then, when he approached the cab, he also, a second time, witnessed when he opened the door that Mr. Maffitt still had the seat belt shoulder harness under his arm, and that was an improper use of the seat belt here. Inspector Maffitt testified that this violation is a safety issue that protects Ohio's travelers from accidents and harm to property and life.

2.1

Staff witness Moser testified that the forfeiture was correct in this case and it's consistent with the recommended fine schedule and recommended civil penalty procedure adopted by the Commercial Motor Vehicle Alliance. This is a nationally recognized system, and Staff applies this system to everyone.

So the Commission should order that the driver, Mr. Ketchum, violated 49 CFR 392.16(a) and order that the Mr. Ketchum pay the civil forfeiture of \$100. Thank you.

ATTORNEY EXAMINER SHEETS: Very good.

Do you have any remarks, to say in response?

THE RESPONDENT: Yes.

THE RESPONDENT: When the officer testified, I don't believe that he said when he walked to my truck that I had the seat belt under my arm. I had the seat belt on correctly. He never said that I had it under my arm. We talked about that because of a ticket I got for having it on wrong before.

And the simple fact that he admitted that he had to pull forward to look backwards to see if I had my seat belt on, for the simple fact -- when you're beside my truck, I don't care -- illuminating or not, sometimes the glare off the hood would screw that up too. So you can argue that.

But if he had to look back, that means when you're beside my truck -- when I passed him -- when you're beside my truck, the way the post is in an International -- now, in my Kenworth I used to have, you can see. This International, the way I sit in my truck, there ain't no way you can look in and see the strap because of the post in the window, and I know that. And I know that's why he was riding beside me for so long: because he couldn't see if I had it on or not.
