Pneumonia

You have been diagnosed with pneumonia.

Pneumonia is an infection of the small air tubes and sacs of the lungs. It can be caused by a virus, bacteria or fungus.

Symptoms include fever (temperature higher than 100.4°F / 38°C), shortness of breath and a cough that produces a green or yellow material. You may have chest pain, vomiting, or headache.

Some people with pneumonia must stay in the hospital. Patients with certain risk factors, like diabetes, cancer, alcoholism, or another chronic medical condition, can be difficult to treat. The physician has determined that it is OK for you to go home.

Follow up closely with your doctor.

Do not smoke. Smoking may cause your pneumonia symptoms to become worse. Smoking also causes heart disease, cancer, and birth defects. If you smoke, ask your doctor for ideas about how to quit.

- If you do not smoke, avoid others who do. Smoke will irritate your lungs and make your breathing worse while you have pneumonia.

YOU SHOULD SEEK MEDICAL ATTENTION IMMEDIATELY, EITHER HERE OR AT THE NEAREST EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT, IF ANY OF THE FOLLOWING OCCURS:

- You wheeze or have trouble breathing.
- You have a fever (temperature higher than 100.4°F / 38°C) that won't go away.
