The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio has scheduled for this time and place Case No.

16-1852-EL-SSO which is entitled in the Matter of the Application of the Ohio Power Company for Authority to Establish a Standard Service Offer Pursuant to Revised Code Section 4928.143 in the Form of an Electric Security Plan and Case No. 16-1853-EL-AAM, in the Matter of the Application of the Ohio Power Company for Approval of Certain Accounting Authority.

EXAMINER SEE: Let's go on the record.

My name is Greta See and seated to my right is Sarah Parrot. We are the Attorney Examiners with the Commission in the Legal Department that have been assigned to this case.

In addition, there are several other

Commission staff members joining us this evening
including Anna Sanyal, Matt Schilling, Kimberly

Norris, and seated at the table is Tara Jones. If
you have some questions concerning how the Commission
processes electric security plan cases or the
joint -- in this case the application as amended by
the joint stipulation, the staff can answer some of

those questions for you. If you need information on how to access the application or the stipulation, you can access our website. And if you need any assistance on how to do any of that, you can approach any member of staff, and they will be willing to help you with that.

As we move on tonight, I am aware that there are some members with consumer services of Ohio Power Company and just a little later Mr. Nourse will introduce those individuals to you and they will be -- they can address any questions you have for the company about service or other concerns.

At this time I would like to take appearances on behalf of the parties that have counsel present. Let's start with Ohio Power Company.

MR. NOURSE: Thank you, your Honor. On behalf of Ohio Power Company, I'm Steven T. Nourse and this is Christen M. Blend, counsel. And today we have -- tonight we have Marc Reitter from AEP Ohio Regulatory and Finances at AEP Ohio and Katie Graham with the Customer Organization AEP Ohio.

There are other people, I am not going to introduce all the AEP people, but I did want to point out that we have folks out in the hall, that we have

some customer service reps that would like to answer questions you have about billing. We have energy efficiency experts there if you have questions about saving energy and our programs there and that's Maxine Joseph, Chris Day, Kelly Buzzard, Dave Dabatta, and Mike La Scala. Excuse me. So we're here to either -- somebody that just came to have a question about their bill, the folks will be out there the whole time, and we will be here after, so either way. Thank you.

EXAMINER SEE: Thank you, Mr. Nourse.

On behalf of Ohio Consumers' Counsel.

MR. MICHAEL: I'm Bill Michael on behalf of AEP's residential utility consumers with the Office of the Ohio Consumers' Counsel.

EXAMINER SEE: And on behalf of the staff of the Public Utilities Commission.

MR. MARGARD: Thank you, your Honor.

Werner Margard, Assistant Attorney General on behalf
of the staff of the Public Utilities Commission.

EXAMINER SEE: Okay. I note that there are many parties that have intervened in this proceeding to represent the interest of residential customers including low income residential customers, commercial customers, industrial customers,

competitive retail energy -- electric service providers, environmental advocates, and other consumer advocates. Each of these parties represents its various constituents in this case before the Commission. The staff of the Commission is also a party in this matter.

2.1

Ohio Power Company's current electric security plan is effective through May 31, 2018. On November 23, 2016, the Ohio Power Company filed an application with the Commission to modify and extend its electric security plan, or you may hear us refer to it as an ESP, to be effective from June 1, 2018, through May 31, 2024.

As part of the Commission's consideration of Ohio Power's application, the Commission scheduled and conducted four local public hearings in April 2017; and on August 25, 2017, as previously noted, a joint stipulation and recommendation was filed by numerous parties to the case. A hearing on the stipulation commenced on November 1, 2017, and continued through November 6, 2017.

This evening we will receive additional testimony from the public regarding AEP Ohio's application and the stipulation. It's not a question and answer session, but it's your opportunity to let

the Commission know what you think about the company's application and the settlement agreement.

2.1

Tonight's hearing is being transcribed by a court reporter. If you plan to testify, please speak clearly so that the court reporter can accurately reflect your comments on the record. Also if you have a prepared written statement, it would be helpful if you provided it to the court reporter once you're finished.

When you are -- when you arrived this evening, you were offered the opportunity to sign in to testify. After I finish the introduction, I will begin calling the witnesses forward in the order listed on the sign-in sheet. When your name is called, if you decide that you no longer want to testify, you can pass, and we'll move to the next witness. I will ask each witness to come up to the table -- to the table and face the court reporter before you present your testimony. I will ask you to take an oath or affirmation that the testimony you are about to give is the truth and then ask that you state and spell your name and provide your address for the record.

Your testimony will be considered part of the official record from this case, and it will be

reviewed by the Commission before a final decision is made on the application and stipulation.

Additionally, counsel for the parties to the case who are present, myself, and Ms. Parrot, may ask you questions about your testimony. Also once you finish testifying or if you are just here to observe, you are not required to stay the entire time, and you may leave at any time.

Are there any questions about tonight's process?

Okay. With that we'll go to the first witness. And I apologize now if I mess up your name. First witness is Matthew Roberts. Mr. Roberts, if you would raise your right hand.

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THE WITNESS: All right. Well, thank you for hosting this public hearing for us tonight. My name is Mathew Roberts. I'm representing an organization called Upgrade Ohio. We are a nonprofit based in Athens County. We also work closely with the Southeast Ohio Public Energy Council. Here tonight to offer my support for this rate case largely for its solar and grid modernization efforts as part of the entire electric security plan.

2.1

For our organization it's really important that this is moving forward because it helps continue the narrative that there's new energy jobs that are available in a coal-impacted region and area that AEP Ohio serves in that the components of the plan are moving forward in a way that helps support our organization and the efforts that we've already done.

Our story really starts with a loan program where we helped provide information and zero percent loans for our community to move forward on electric vehicles in a community that AEP Ohio serves, and it's great to see that this case moves forward on progress that we've made, and it would be -- we would encourage the Utilities Commission to ensure that the proposal really stretches throughout

the entire service territory of AEP Ohio and not just its center based in Columbus.

2.1

Another interesting thing that we've done that touches to some of the components of this plan is we've been working on our own community solar initiatives, and we're getting ready to propose to the city of Athens an opt-out solar program that would allow them to choose to pay extra money to build solar on buildings in their community. And so we support the solar component of this plan because it helps our case in adding to distributed energy resources of the entire service territory while AEP Ohio gets to focus on adding more solar as a baseload resource continuing on the effort that they've announced as an entire company to reduce their emissions by a 2050 date.

So we certainly support those efforts.

And last time I came to present our testimony about this case in particular, we encouraged the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio to really see this as an opportunity from a utility perspective too, that a utility bringing this forward, that it creates a fair and open access to the electrical grid, that it makes way for a consumer energy highway essentially giving consumers the power to make the grid more resilient

and timely provide some service to the utility making it a collaborative effort.

And a lot of the components of this new plan, distributed energy resources with solar and electric vehicles, microgrids and other grid modernization efforts really talks to the Public Utilities Commission's PowerForward initiative. So this plan really creates another opportunity for -- for learning and allowing a pathway to be created for other utilities in the state to file their own electric security plans with the same type of components.

So, yeah, that's essentially the end and I want to thank the Public Utilities Commission -Public Utilities Commission of Ohio for hosting this hearing and for giving us an opportunity to speak about the positive benefits of this plan. Thank you.

Since 2016 our organizers 23 have been raising awareness among AEP customers about 24 the utility's proposal to increase the fixed rate 25 customer charge by 119 precent.

We've laid out our opposition to this increase based on the fact it penalizes homeowners who have efficiency and renewable upgrades, disincentivizes investments in renewables and efficiency. This disproportionately harms low income and senior households and generally subsidizes AEP's least competitive coal plants.

2.1

The feedback that we've received from our field and phone contacts indicates thousands of AEP customers agree. That is why we appear today offering gratitude and congratulations for the parties responsible for withdrawing the fixed rate increase from AEP's electric security plan.

Furthermore, we are encouraged by other pro clean energy initiatives thoroughly outlined by the previous speaker. But I know I speak on behalf of our 32,000 Ohio members when I say we hope these initiatives take a pro consumer approach because Ohioans have long paid with both their health and their treasure for reliance on coal for electricity, and the economic burden of transitioning to renewable energy must not be disproportionately shouldered by those same people.

Thank you for the opportunity to speak this evening.

Firstly, I wanted to thank AEP for listening at the last public hearings and rethinking their misguided increase in the fixed customer charge which would have unfairly led to low consumption customers effectively paying for a decrease in the bills with higher consumption customers.

I believe that we must act more urgently on a transition to renewable energy sources. I really wanted to commend AEP on their 2018 strategic vision for a clean energy future. I hope that the PUCO are now able to quickly approve their plans for the 400 megawatts of large scale solar and the 500 megawatts of wind power generation.

However, I did also want to ask that as AEP and PUCO continue to work on diversity of supply, that you find ways to switch to encouraging rooftop solar as a great option for customers who want to take personal responsibility for reducing Ohio's carbon footprint as soon as possible. Rooftop solar uses land which is already taken and reduces transmission costs by connecting power to the grid in our communities exactly where the power is being used.

Our residential sources of power can also

be just as predictable as the large scale power plants, solar power plants, and being distributed sources that are more resilient to local -- local grid issues or weather issues. So I believe that if you keep working with your customers to encourage energy efficiency and also rooftop -- rooftop solar, you will have a boundless supply of support for your vision of a clean energy future.

I finally wanted to quote an inspiration of a small company. They are in -- they are called Appalachian Renewable Power. They are based in Stewart, Ohio, Athens, in Athens County. They installed the rooftop solar on -- at our house, and their quote is "Power to the people one rooftop at a time." So please encourage these local jobs too.

I'm really here tonight because I wanted to support clean energy and the provisions of AEP's case and upcoming Appalachian solar proposal. I really think that right now it's very critical that we see Ohio and major utilities like AEP moving forward on clean energy issues, and we need to see cities like Columbus committing to 100 percent clean energy, and the time to move forward on that is now.

1 I truly believe that climate change is 2 the greatest challenge that is facing us at this time, and we have to all work together to address 3 these issues. Moving to 100 percent clean energy is 4 5 something we must do, and we are running out of time 6 to move forward on that if we are going to keep 7 temperatures below limits that will cause irreparable and irreversible damage to our world and our earth. 8 9 And that's really all I had to say. I 10 just want to thank them again for moving forward on 11 clean energy and doing the right thing with that. 12 EXAMINER SEE: Okay. Just a moment. 13 Just a moment. 14 Any cross-examination? allowing us to testify about this today. My name is Cathy Cowan Becker. I'm Chair of the Sierra Club's Ready for 100 Campaign in Columbus. We are asking the city of Columbus to commit to 100 percent renewable energy by 2050 or before across this -- across the country, 53 cities, 6 counties, and 1 state have already committed to getting 100 percent of their energy from renewables by 2050 or before. 5 cities are already there and mayors in almost 200 more cities including Cincinnati have pledged support for a community-wide transition to 100 percent

renewable energy.

2.1

I am here to strongly support AEP's proposal to build a 400 megawatt -- 400 megawatts of solar energy production in Appalachian, Ohio, with a solar panel manufacturing facility that will create hundreds of long-term, good paying, clean energy jobs. Provisions within this current case that this hearing is about tonight will help move the solar projects forward.

Such a facility would bring jobs to an area of the state that sorely needs them with a preference for hiring military veterans. A 400-megawatt facility would be the largest solar facility east of the Mississippi making Ohio the largest solar state in the midwest.

According to the Bureau of Labor
Statistics, the fastest growing jobs in the country
are wind turbine service technician and solar panel
installer. So why would we not want these jobs to
come to Ohio? If AEP can make good on its plan to
build facilities to produce 400 megawatts of solar
energy and 500 megawatts of wind energy in Ohio, our
Ready for 100 Campaign will have a much easier time
persuading the city of Columbus and other cities in
Ohio to commit to transitioning to 100 percent

renewable energy. It is crucial that cities across the country make this commitment.

2.1

Currently we have no federal leadership on climate change. But even if we did, cities still have to do their part because 75 percent of carbon emissions from energy use come from urban areas.

Science tells us that we are running out of time to take the action necessary to deal with climate change. Already carbon emissions have raised global temperatures about 1.25 degrees Celsius, and in order to hold temperatures to an increase of no more than 2 degrees Celsius and as long as possible to 1.5 which is what is called for by the Paris Agreement, we need to get to zero emissions by 2050 or before.

It will take all people and all tactics and all areas of the world to deal with climate change. But we in Ohio must do our part. Our industrial state has lagged in addressing carbon and state legislature has tried to gut what legal we have done.

The Appalachian solar facility proposed by AEP would turn Ohio from a lagger to a leader on climate while creating jobs and strengthening our economy. There is no downside. Let's allow AEP, a forward-looking utility, to help lead Ohio into the

So I wanted to share some 20 brief words as a young person and as a millennial 2.1 when considering both this project and the greater 22 context of pushing back and fighting against the climate crisis. 23 24 You know, only two hours ago, I received 25 a push notification from CNN that scientists have

reassessed some of the risks associated with the climate crisis and now believe that an additional 2 feet of sea level rise could occur by the end of this century if this progress is not addressed. That would be devastating to communities that live across the coasts of this world, not only here in the United States, and will add to many of the other catastrophic effects that we already expect to occur in the coming decades.

2.1

The climate crisis is often too big of a problem, and it's too complex to comprehend for many people. Its implications and the consequences that will come up often make people just want to ignore it and not think about it and to just continue the course as is. However, for my generation and the generations that will continue on, we cannot ignore this threat.

When I think about the crisis, it causes me to consider questions like whether or not my partner and I want to have children, whether or not my friends and family who live in vulnerable areas will be safe, whether or not it's worth it for me to put money away into my Roth IRA considering whether or not I will even be able to retire. These are the types of questions that my generation continue to ask

ourselves as we see the world many times refuse to address this problem on the levels that it needs to be addressed.

To be frank the future looks bleak for many young people with the federal government that is insane and our state legislature that makes every effort to make it more difficult for projects like this to actually occur in Ohio. It can be really difficult sometimes to think about the crisis.

That's why it gives me so much hope when I hear about companies like AEP making the choice to invest in such a large project as a southeastern solar -- solar energy program. It's exactly the type of leadership that we need in the vacuum that we have right now. If our political leaders continue to not act, then our energy companies and companies that produce solar and renewable energy need to have the opportunities to step in.

So I'm really excited about AEP taking this opportunity and moving forward, and I hope that it continues on as quickly as possible. So thank you.

I don't have any prepared notes but -- and I plan to be brief, but I want to start, first of all, by affirming the testimonies of Matthew and Cathy, Matthew Roberts and Cathy. I have never met them before, but both of them testified that there are jobs for people who are in -- currently in coal. There are jobs in the clean energy sector and I can affirm that because I am a solar energy consultant. Took the class two years ago. There were 12 people in my class and 2 of them were from the Athens area. They had lost their jobs in coal, and they were pursuing new opportunities in the area of clean energy. So thank you for bringing that up. Those opportunities are really helping people in the Athens area as well as myself.

I want to take an opportunity to throw my support, add my voice to the support of clean energy initiatives for three reasons. No. 1, solar is cheaper for the consumer. I am a solar consumer. It will save me enough money over time to send my kid to his first year of college, and so I -- I want to bring that up and make sure that it is supported.

And the second reason is because it is environmentally responsible. I think several people have brought that up already but if there is one

reason we really need to move forward with clean energy, I think that is the No. 1 most important reason.

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As well as I also want to bring up something that so far hasn't been brought up tonight and that is the clean energy policy is something that large companies like eBay and Amazon are looking for when they are putting out their bids to expand. I know that we are currently looking at bringing companies like Amazon to Columbus. My husband is a civil engineer. He works with developers, and I can tell you that, you know, sometimes bids are won and lost by clean energy policy.

So if we want to bring those people and those companies to Columbus, I think we need to model it and I want to thank AEP for their efforts in clean energy so far and I just want to add my voice of support in encouraging AEP and PUCO to pursue clean energy initiatives in the future.

mainly to listen, but I just feel compelled to speak to support what so many others have said. I'm retired. I was delighted a couple of years ago when I went to negotiate my electric plan and found out that for pennies more I could get an alternative energy, 100 percent alternative clean energy plan, in my case wind. And, again, it was going to cost me very little extra.

I'm on a fixed income, so I have to be careful what I spend, but this delighted me. I am an AEP customer. And as I look forward to the plan that I'm hearing more and more about, I just want to lend my support. I think that at this time facing the climate change, problems is one of the most important things we can do, and I'm hoping that -- I want to compliment AEP and PUCO for pushing in that direction.

I thought it was important that somebody retired stand up and speak with so many young people we have here today and those of middle age. But, again, you know, kudos to AEP and PUCO for looking

ahead and trying to confront this climate change in this positive way. The Appalachian solar project is just what we need in Ohio and across the country.

So thank you for the opportunity to speak.

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EXAMINER SEE: Thank you. Any cross-examination for this witness? Mr. Michael?

MR. MICHAEL: No, your Honor.

EXAMINER SEE: Mr. Margard?

MR. MARGARD: No, thank you, your Honor.

EXAMINER SEE: Mr. Nourse?
