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EXAMINER SCHABO: Good evening and welcome. The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio has assigned for public hearing, at this time and place, Case Nos. 18-298-GA-AIR, 18-299-GA-ALT, and 18-49-GA-ALT, being In the Matter of the Application of Vectren Energy Delivery of Ohio, Inc. for Approval of an Increase in Gas Rates, which has been combined with two applications for approval of an alternative rate plan.

My name is Trish Schabo. I'm one of the Attorney Examiners assigned by the Public Utilities

Commission of Ohio to preside over this hearing.

With me, this evening, is Commissioner Beth Trombold.

Commissioner, would you like to make any statements?

COMMISSIONER TROMBOLD: Sure.

Welcome, everyone. Thanks for coming out on a snowy day. I'm really glad to see a lot of people interested in this.

My role as Commissioner, I'm one of the five Commissioners that will be reviewing and making the final decision on this case, and this is our

chance to listen to the public and really hear what you have to say about the case before us. And I am going to be here in listening mode, and I certainly will be taking into account what you say, in addition to everything else that's going to be put on the record throughout the entire proceeding.

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So Trish is the one that leads us through the process and compiles all the information, but the Commissioners review all of that and we're the ones that make the final decision when it comes time for that. So thanks for coming today. I look forward to hearing from you.

EXAMINER SCHABO: Thank you.

Along with myself and the Commissioner, there are several members of the Commission Staff here tonight. Sarah Huffman is here with Commissioner Trombold; Matt Schilling is here with the Commission's Public Affairs Department; and Lee Gary is here with the Service Monitoring and Enforcement Department. PUCO Staff members are available if you have a question about general utility matters.

Let's see here. Let's go ahead and start with appearances on behalf of the parties.

MR. CAMPBELL: Sure. Thank you, Your

Honor. My name is Andrew Campbell. I'm an attorney for Vectren. I'm with the law office of Whitt Sturtevant, LLP; 88 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215.

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EXAMINER SCHABO: Thank you.

MR. McKENNEY: Your Honor, on behalf of the Ohio Consumers' Counsel, Bryce McKenney, Assistant Consumers' Counsel; 65 East State Street, 7th Floor, Columbus, Ohio 43215.

EXAMINER SCHABO: Thank you.

There have been several other parties that have made appearances in the case, but I don't see any counsel that I recognize if you're back there. No. Okay.

The subject of tonight's public hearing is Vectren Energy Delivery of Ohio's -- I will also say "Vectren" sometimes -- application to increase its natural gas distribution rates.

Vectren filed its application to increase its rates on March 30th, 2018. The Company is requesting to increase its distribution rates by \$30 million.

Staff of the Commission filed its Report and Recommendation on October 1, 2018. In its Report, Staff has recommended limiting the increase

to a range of between 12 and 16 million dollars. At this point, I think it's important to note that Staff's Report is a recommendation only and, as Commissioner Trombold indicated, the final decision does lie with the Commission.

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The local public hearings scheduled in this case are only one aspect of the process. In addition to this evening, there will be one in Washington Court House on November the 26th, and one in Sidney, Ohio on November the 28th. An evidentiary hearing is scheduled to occur at the Commission's offices in Columbus on December the 4th.

Our purpose tonight is to receive comments from the public regarding Vectren's applications. This evening is not a Question and Answer Session. All the representatives from the Company, from Ohio's Consumers' Counsel, and Staff may be able to speak to any concerns after the hearing ends.

To my left is our evening's court reporter. Any testimony given will be incorporated into the official record of the case and reviewed and considered by the Commission in making its final decision. If you do plan to testify, please speak clearly so the court reporter can accurately reflect

your comments. Also, if you have a prepared written statement of your testimony, it would be helpful if you could present a copy to the court reporter, and it will just help with accuracy, spelling, et cetera. It's hard to take down everything that is being said.

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If you do not wish to testify, you may submit written comments under Case No. 18-298-GA-AIR on the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio's website or by mail.

When you arrived, you were given the opportunity to sign up. After I finish, I will begin calling the witnesses forward that have signed up. Once we're through this, I will open it up to the floor if anybody else, at that point in time, would like to offer their testimony. Before you give any comments, I will ask you to state your name and your address and I'll swear you in and, after that, the parties and I will be permitted to ask you any clarifying questions about your testimony; although, that rarely happens. Should you decide that you do not want to testify when I call your name, you can just merely pass to the next witness and then you are free to leave at any time.

The Commission appreciates your participation, and we shall get going. So, Melisa

MELISSA ENGLISH

presented herself as a public witness, and being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

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DIRECT TESTIMONY

MS. ENGLISH: My name is Melissa English. My address is 2330 Victory Parkway, Suite 401, Cincinnati, Ohio 45206.

As I mentioned, my name is Melissa English, and I'm the Executive Director of Ohio Citizen Action Education Fund, a public education and research advocate on environmental and consumer issues.

Vectren's proposed rates increase -fixed rate increase ill-serves the citizens of West Central Ohio and unduly burdens them beyond what customers of other natural gas suppliers pay.

Vectren competitors, Dominion and Columbia Gas, charge \$17.58 and \$17.81 per month, respectively. Even Duke Energy, which charges \$33.03 per month, charges less than the \$35 monthly Vectren's asking. What's more, the way the request is structured, the rate could rise to \$50 by 2024.

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Our concerns here are similar to our objections to other proposed fixed rate hikes before the Commission. First, that a dramatic increase in the fixed rate charge disincentives energy conservation and efficiency; second, that such an increase erodes customers' control over their energy bills; and third and most critical, that low-income families are disproportionally hurt by fixed rate hikes.

I also wonder how many of these Vectren customers will already be paying more once the Dayton Power & Light electric fixed rate increase is implemented.

For these reasons, we urge the Commission to reject Vectren's rate hike request. Thank you.

EXAMINER SCHABO: Okay. Thank you.

Therese Schoch.

MS. SCHOCH: Very good.

THERESE SCHOCH

presented herself as a public witness, and being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

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DIRECT TESTIMONY

MS. SCHOCH: My name is Therese Schoch,

T-h-e-r-e-s-e, and the last name is spelled

S-c-h-o-c-h.

I'm representing the people who can't be here tonight because they're probably on a bus, after having picked up their children, on the way home from work, and they probably also don't even know about this. It was kind of obscure finding out about it.

It's a problem because people like me, unemployed for the past four years and not quite ready for retirement funds and Social Security, are really uncertain about what our costs of living are going to be. We're literally not certain, at this point in the month, where our next meal is coming from. We have SNAP cards that probably won't last through the month; they just are supplemental to the money that we make at our roughly 12-dollar-an-hour jobs. That 12-dollar-an-hour job qualifies us for a SNAP card, but no other benefits whatsoever. It is

still on us to pay our utilities which are already high, very high. This increase is just too much and it's just beyond unacceptable.

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It's a rhetorical question, but what happened to that promise, in the merger with CenterPoint, that this merger would not impact the customers. So here we are, just a month or two out from finalizing that merger in the first quarter of 2019, and we're asking for a fixed rate hike that is nearly double what it is. That is also unacceptable.

And I'm asking that you deny this rate increase. It is unrealistic that the poor, in the State of Ohio, carry the burden of millions of dollars that the corporate executives of Vectren are expecting to make in this merger that's coming up soon, and we really are not going to be very happy about that. Thank you.

EXAMINER SCHABO: Thank you.

Bill Marvin.

MR. MARVIN: I didn't expect to talk this soon, but what the heck.

EXAMINER SCHABO: Better late than never, right? Sooner than later?

MR. MARVIN: Yes.

EXAMINER SCHABO: Raise your right hand.

(Witness sworn.)

EXAMINER SCHABO: You may begin.

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BILL MARVIN

presented himself as a public witness, and being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

DIRECT TESTIMONY

MR. MARVIN: Okay. So you need my name?

My name is Bill Marvin and my address is 319 Rockwood

Avenue, Dayton, Ohio.

I'm a philosopher by profession and an ethicist. I'm also the President of my neighborhood association. My neighborhood association is the Five Oaks neighborhood here in Dayton. We're a diverse neighborhood economically, age-wise, ethnic-wise, probably no matter how you cut it, you know, religious-wise, we're really diverse.

And a lot of people I represent from my neighborhood are on fixed incomes and they're having a hard time figuring out, you know, whether they can paint the house or pay their medical bills or, you know, get food. I mean, there are some, you know, serious choices to make, and increasing costs like this presents a serious burden to these people.

Ethically, and this is something, you

know, I live with, I think about all the time, ethically it is defying one of the basic principles of ethics that you call upon the least-advantaged people to subsidize some of the most-advantaged people.

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And here, with the recent heavy tax cut to major corporations that the people in my neighborhood didn't experience, they didn't see any of that. The people down at the bottom here, you know, didn't get that. None of it trickled on us. The bills trickle on us, the debts keep trickling on us, but none of that trickles on us that they're called upon to subsidize this.

And yeah, you know, I was looking over, you know, some of the information, you know, stock prices and everything, it seems like Vectren is not hurting. You know, I don't see any real reason to ask for, you know, this drastic increase with the possibility of greater increases later on. In fact, at a time like this, when they're making good money like this, when they're looking forward to this merger, you know, we shouldn't be called upon to, you know, subsidize the profits to this. It's kind of irrational and, like I said, unethical.

And it seems to me that, you know, if the

Company is a well-functioning company, they ought to be able to provide a service and not call upon us, you know, to go ahead and give them this subsidy. I mean, subsidizing the well-off is not -- is not the way to go.

So I'm here to strongly object on behalf of myself, my friends, my neighbors, and I think ethics-wise this pay rate is just not right, it's just not right. Thanks.

EXAMINER SCHABO: Thank you.

Phil Parker.

DIRECT TESTIMONY

MR. PARKER: Good evening, Commissioners and PUCO representative. My name is Phil Parker.

I'm the President and CEO of the Dayton Area Chamber of Commerce.

Our Chamber of Commerce is a business association, representing over 2,500 businesses throughout the Greater Dayton region and employ over 200,000 individuals. We are the 25th-largest Chamber

of Commerce in the nation, and we believe it's a true testimony to the integrity and health of our region's business community that we are one of those largest organizations in the country.

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I'm here today to testify in support of Vectren's impact on the regional business community. Vectren's partnership with the business community as a workforce development and economic development partner has allowed Ohio and the Dayton region to realize significant investments and economic growth.

Vectren is committed to advancing the economic health of the region for the betterment of employers, employees, customers, businesses, and our citizens. It is with this vision in mind that Vectren has invested \$700 million in capital expenditure investments over the past 10 years. A significant amount of this investment was directly dedicated to modernization of physical infrastructure and new infrastructure to support businesses and new residential growth in Ohio.

Vectren's support and strategic infrastructure investment over the years has highlighted their commitment to making Ohio and the Dayton region economically prosperous. The Dayton area is currently experiencing a strong economic

1 resurgence as new jobs, downtown investments, and 2 industry growth are thriving in the economy. EXAMINER SCHABO: Thank you. You may

CHERISH CRONMILLER

presented herself as a public witness, and being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

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DIRECT TESTIMONY

MS. CRONMILLER: My name is Cherish Cronmiller. Business address is 719 South Main Street, Dayton, Ohio 45402.

Good evening. Again, my name is Cherish Cronmiller, and I'm the President and CEO of the Miami Valley Community Action Partnership. Our agency has offices in Montgomery, Greene, Darke and Preble counties.

We provide weatherization services in more than 10 counties in southwest Ohio. We serve upwards of 25,000 customers annually through our various programs, including the low-income Home Energy Assistance Program, most people know as "utility assistance" or "PIPP."

I'm here to discuss the support our agency receives from Vectren. Our agency has worked in partnership with Vectren to provide weatherization services since 2004. Since 2012, our agency has been able to weatherize 2,486 homes with assistance from Vectren's Project TEEM, which stands for Teaching Energy Efficiency Measures, and "Share the Warmth."

The financial support we receive from

Vectren allows us to fully service the customer and ensure all weatherization measures are completed.

Weatherization services help to maintain housing stock in our communities. When we're able to do work in multifamily dwellings, it brings down operating costs, which stabilizes rent and reduces housing instability, especially in our senior communities.

Work ensures a reduction in utility usage in the home and an overall healthier home through better air quality. It is calculated that every weatherization dollar spent, returns \$2.78 in health and safety benefits.

Yet, the impact of Vectren's financial support extends beyond our customers. Our agency employs over 50 full-time people in our weatherization department in jobs that pay twice as much as minimum wage, offer benefits and career advancement opportunities. Additionally, our agency contracts out our HVAC, electrical and plumbing work, since that work requires special licensures and permits. The agency uses sole proprietorships, minority-owned, and small businesses. Vectren's programs help to support the businesses in our community including local suppliers.

Beyond the Weatherization Program,

Vectren supports the Miami Valley community through
the Dayton Air Show, to Clothes that Work, and

various scholarship programs.

And though I can supply facts and figures, I think the words of our customers are far more important than my own. Our agency receives letters every week from thankful people, and I just want to share this one from Sharon -- from Rachel B.:

"Dear Weatherization Program Staff,

"This letter is written to express our heartfelt gratitude for all the irreplaceable assistance that our family has received from the Weatherization Program at Community Action Partnership.

"Our first encounters with you were generous from the start as you answered my many phone questions and placed us on a list for quicker action due to our serious situation of being without a furnace in our newly-purchased home, and two little girls, ages 3 and 6 months. When even the 'quick list' was lengthy, we were offered the opportunity to participate in the particular programs partially funded by Vectren and DP&L that would speed the process up even further.

"We gratefully accepted the special consideration as we were bitterly cold in our home, all sleeping in one room so that we could be warm at night with the space heater we had borrowed from a friend.

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"The first item to come was a brand new furnace in a particularly frigid week of February. It was installed quickly and the old defunct furnace removed. We were overjoyed to walk comfortably through the entire house. My husband and I kept exclaiming to each other afterwards, 'It's warm in here!' I could set my baby down to crawl on the kitchen floor without fear that she would bump into the space heater, and on other floors without freezing her little hands.

"Next to arrive was our beautiful new refrigerator, and not a moment too soon since the one that came with the house was so old that no one had ever seen one like it and its freezer was beginning to fail. I love that I can give my children filtered water to drink and shop economically with all the freezer space for storage.

"The third gift we received was the insulation aspects of the Weatherization Program. We were disappointed to learn that it was no longer

permitted to insulate walls like ours with knob-and-tube electrical wiring, but grateful that your team was willing to investigate whatever air leaks could be found and seal them. The best part of the resulting fixes for me is the two new windows we have in our kitchen and downstairs bathroom through which the cold wind used to come in so freely, it would move the curtains.

"Thank you very much for all these gifts and their timely arrival! There is no way we can begin to repay you, but please know that you have made a difference in the life of this little family, and given us a warm, energy-efficient home in which to raise healthy, loving, and generous children.

MOSER: Hello, Commissioner. 19 COMMISSIONER TROMBOLD: Nice to meet you. 20 2.1 CARL MOSER 22 presented himself as a public witness, and being 23 first duly sworn, testified as follows: 24 DIRECT TESTIMONY 25 MR. MOSER: I'm a senior citizen on a

fixed income. I'm concerned about environmental issues and I do my best to not impact the environment. I do my best to conserve my resources so that I can make it in the world of rising prices.

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And the biggest part on my Vectren bill is this charge that we're discussing. I don't know if you take exhibits, but here's my last three Vectren bills. I used 3 CCFs, 3 CCFs, and 4 CCFs. So I'm paying, like, less than \$2 for my gas, but 29-1/2, 28-1/2, and 30 dollars for the infrastructure.

I don't mind paying for infrastructure, it's important for all of us, but I would like to pay my fair share. If we think about roads and bridges, a lot of that is paid by gasoline taxes. And the people that drive more, buy more gas, therefore they pay more in those taxes that support the infrastructure. I think the same idea should be applied to the utilities; gas and electric.

So I think things aren't fair right now and I would urge the Commission to look into making things fair. I picked up one of the sheets of paper in the hallway there and it says a household using an average of 100 CCFs would have an increase of about 7.25 a month or almost 10 percent, but if you only

use 60 CCFs, your increase is 13 percent. You've got it backwards. If you use more, you pay more; not the other way around.

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So please, please look at how Vectren gets the money for their infrastructure. Make the people that use more, damage the environment more, pay more for the infrastructure to deliver the gas to them. So that's my fairness concern.

The other thing, that nice letter by Rachel B. sounded real good, but it was just one family, and this rate increase is going to affect a lot of families, a lot of poorer families, a lot of people on a fixed income like me.

And if Vectren can be held accountable and somebody can oversee their expenses, to see that they return the money that they get for these increases to people like Rachel B. and many, many, many others, then, you know, maybe I could go for it, but I don't think that's in the plan that we can look at their expenses for that.

So I don't think that the nice programs, that were talked about, compensate for the millions of dollars they'll get with this rate increase. It's nice to hear, but I don't think it balances things out.

And the third -- or, the last thing I want to talk about is the big tax cut that the Federal Government passed. Vectren was one of the -- one of the organizations that benefited greatly from that, and I don't know what they're doing with the extra money they have, but it seems to me that they could take that tax cut and apply it to the infrastructure and not make people on fixed incomes and poor incomes pay for it.

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Also, people on fixed incomes and poor incomes are unable to well-insulate their homes, buy new replacement windows and lower their gas cost. In fact, many are in rental properties and landlords don't do that. So they use a lot more gas and adding more to their bill is just not right; it's not fair.

And I would like to disconnect from the gas company, but I need the gas, and paying \$30 a month just so I can get my necessary 4, 5, and 6 CCFs is unfair to me. Thank you.

EXAMINER SCHABO: Thank you.

Hugh McGuire.

MR. McGUIRE: Good evening. My name is
Hugh McGuire. I reside at 329 Marathon Avenue. And
I object to this rate increase, number 1 --

EXAMINER SCHABO: If I could -- I'm sorry

to interrupt your train of thought, but I need to swear you in before we proceed.

MR. McGUIRE: Oh, I'm sorry.

EXAMINER SCHABO: It's okay.

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EXAMINER SCHABO: Wonderful. Thank you.

HUGH McOUIRE

presented himself as a public witness, and being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

DIRECT TESTIMONY

MR. McGUIRE: I don't have that much information. I just got an e-mail about this meeting, yesterday. So the only thing that I know is that there's -- excuse me -- a company called Dominion and another one called Columbia. They're selling their gas, it was about 17 -- well, less than \$18 a month for both of them. I don't see why Vectren has to double that amount practically.

There's a lot of people on fixed income and a lot of working people here and, as you know, a lot of people cannot afford a hit of \$500 to their situation. And you're talking about adding \$300, over a span of a year, to their budget? I don't

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think it's justified.
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Also, some of the things, the positive things that were announced about Vectren, I think that they could do it with the current rate right now. That's all I have to say.

EXAMINER SCHABO: Okay. Thank you.

Jill Johnson.

EXAMINER SCHABO: Good evening.

And I, too, heard of this meeting and about the rate hike of gas, and I would just go on record saying it's a high rate of increase, and it's not clear to me of how they're using the increased

revenue, for what purpose. And to target or focus the increased rate on residential and small business, I think is unfair and I object to it, and I just wanted to go on record as saying that.

EXAMINER SCHABO: Okay. Thank you.

DIRECT TESTIMONY

MS. PFEIFFER: I live at 209 East Herman Street, Yellow Springs, Ohio. I drove here tonight from Yellow Springs, 20 or 25 miles, just to be here because I thought it was important. I'm on a fixed

30 income. And I, too, would like to know -- it would 1 2 be great if corporations gave you a breakdown of what -- how they use their increases when they put rate 3 increases out there. 4 I also think the federal tax to 5 6 corporations, of reducing their rate, should help --7 be trickled down to help pay for this kind of stuff. I quess that's about all. It's a cold 8 9 night out there. Thank you. 10 EXAMINER SCHABO: Open floor again. 11 One more time. Anybody? 12 All right. Seeing no one, I would like 13 -- oh, Mr. Moser. 14 MR.
