There are several concerns that I have concerning the proposed Solar Farm that is adjacent to the property I own. #1. How do Solar Farms affect the environment around it? A. the climate since it is keeping the suns energy from reaching the soil. B. The water shed design and how it will affect erosion and the creek level on the property where much of that drainage will go. C. What about appearance/glare from the panels. D. Is there any noise issues associated in the operation of the Solar farm. E. What about the building process. What will be the temporal issues associated with that. F. This will affect the natural wildlife and this affects Hunting which my family enjoys. G. There is no way to know how this will affect my property value. Real estate is devalued because of High power lines nearby. It does not matter if there are real concerns but it is through public perception and who knows where that can go. We no longer have a place in the country whereby traditional natural growth farming exists. H. What is the construction rating for High winds and tornadoes which are not uncommon for this area. I. How are the property owners within the Solar farm being reimbursed...Bought out? Rented? How much and what are the terms? J. Can the farm expand through increased land purchase/rental and creep closer to my property edge? K. Why was I not approached for the purchase/rent of my land that appears to have direct adjacency to my land. L. Is there opportunity for me and the land owners adjacent to me to benefit from the rental/purchase of our land in the large unused area east of 62 and west of Kuhn Road? Basically I see this solar farm affecting my life and property negatively with no offsetting benefit or choice at this point. I understand the need to generate clean efficient power and I understand that if a horizontal solar farm is chosen it will require a large surface area in close proximity to effectively build. So far I have not seen reasonable effort to satisfy the land owners interests within the reasonable proximity of the farm.
