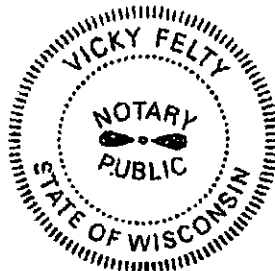

Scientists try gene-editing tool to fight HIV

Scientists are reporting the first use of the gene-editing tool CRISPR to try to cure a patient's HIV infection by providing blood cells that were altered to resist the AIDS virus.

The gene-editing tool has long been used in research labs, and a Chinese scientist was scooped last year when he revealed he used it on embryos that led to

the birth of twin girls. Editing embryos is considered too risky, partly because the DNA changes can pass to future generations.

Wednesday's report in the *New England Journal of Medicine*, by different Chinese researchers, is the first published account of using CRISPR to treat a disease in an adult, where the DNA changes are confined to that person.

The attempt was successful in some ways but fell short of being an HIV cure.

Still, it shows that gene editing holds promise and seems precise and safe in this patient so far, said Dr. Carl June, a University of Pennsylvania genetics expert who wrote a commentary in the journal.

"That's really good for the field," June said.

Chinese government grants paid for the research, which was done openly with advance notice on a scientific registry and standard informed consent

procedures. Some of these steps were missing or questioned in last year's embryo work.

"There are no ethical concerns on this one," June said.

Gene editing permanently alters DNA, the code of life. CRISPR is a relatively new tool scientists can use to cut DNA at a specific spot.

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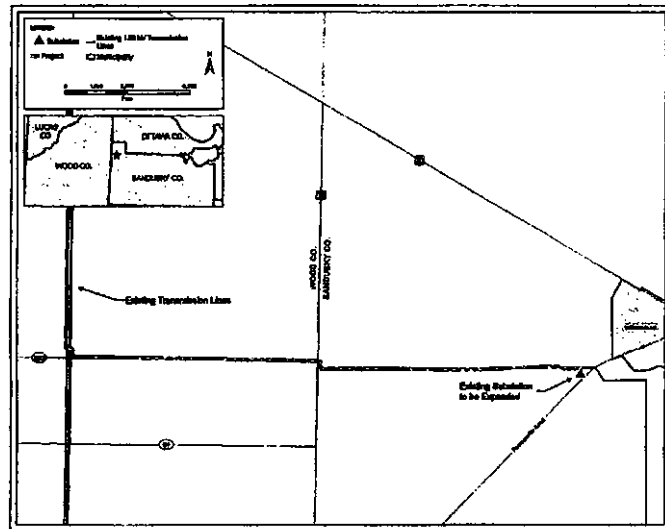

American Transmission Systems, Incorporated ("ATSI"), a FirstEnergy company, has proposed in a Letter of Notification submitted to the Ohio Power Siting Board ("Board") for a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need to expand the existing Woodville No. 2 substation and convert approximately 3.1 miles of existing 138KV transmission line to double circuit as part of the Fostoria West End (AEP)-Lamoyne-West Fremont 138KV Transmission Line and Woodville No. 2 Substation Upgrade Project, ("Project").

The Project is located in Woodville Township, Sandusky County and Troy Township, Wood County Ohio. The substation is located at the southwest corner of the intersection of Pemberville Road and OH-682 in Woodville Township, Sandusky County. The substation expansion will be located entirely within existing Toledo Edison owned property. ATSI is proposing the Project to improve the efficiency, reliability, and operational flexibility of the electric transmission system.

and messy issues,"

Rogers said. "We know that significant learning occurs when students work through complex and messy questions."

Following his speech, Rogers connected

on the growth in enrollment, despite associated demographic concerns. He said he sees three factors driving it.

"One, we have a variety of new academic programs that we've launched over the last few years that are in very high demand, whether it be aviation, forensic science,

software engineering or inclusive early childhood. Nursing saw a huge increase this year as well," Rogers said. "I think, number two, and I keep hearing this from students who made the decision to attend Bowling Green, they are struck by the community we have here. It's a supportive community. One in which they

believe they can thrive."

Rogers stressed the economics of a modern university education.

"Third, we tried to be much more intentional in how we build scholarship programs. I think about the Thompson scholarship program as one example, where we are meeting the need for a lot of students that may be coming from lower income families," Rogers said.

In his speech, Rogers said that Ellen Bowen and Bob Thompson made a financial commitment to "support students from working families with lower income who may not be able to afford higher education." As a result, almost 500 students will be receiving scholarships.

The state has also increased financial support from last year, by 2%.

A Task Force on Diversity and Inclusion has been formed.

"What if we truly enhance our culture to support diversity, so not all, but each student, faculty and staff member felt like they belonged here?" Rogers asked.

He also addressed the Gish Film Theater controversy and the task force that studied the related issues and recommended removal of the Gish name.

"They studied the issue. They engaged in a structured process and a thoughtful dialogue, often looking externally to inform their recommendations. We learned from each other. We listened. We embraced and didn't shy away," Rogers said.

"And if we cannot do that here, at a public university, a place of learning to pursue knowledge, then where can this space live?"

Jennifer McCarty was asked to serve in a new cabinet level role as chief diversity and belonging officer. She has been tasked with the creation of a strategic diversity plan.

"What if?" was part of Rogers' address to an audience of university faculty, staff and students that filled the Leinert Grand Ballroom of the Bowen-Thompson Student Union.

"Now, we are in this moment in time. It's the most transformative period in higher education, including when the Morrill Act funded land-grants or when the GI Bill sparked a major influx in veterans after World War II. The difference is that during those times came large financial support and resources," Rogers said.

"Today, we must rely on our creativity and have courage in our convictions. And so I ask, what if? What if we rise to the occasion, like we have done so many times in our past?"

Rogers also announced the receipt of several grants and donations illustrating the direction of the university's commitment to maintaining financial value.

A National Science Foundation grant of \$1.9 million has been awarded to Jonathan Bostic, Ph.D., School of Teaching and Learning, for exploration of testing standards and assessment.

Tim Davis, Ph.D., biological sciences, has led research into water quality in the Sandusky Bay and algal blooms. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration awarded the university an \$875,000 grant. In addition, because of a donation from the Ryan family, a research vessel has been purchased, which will be called the R/V Zephyr.

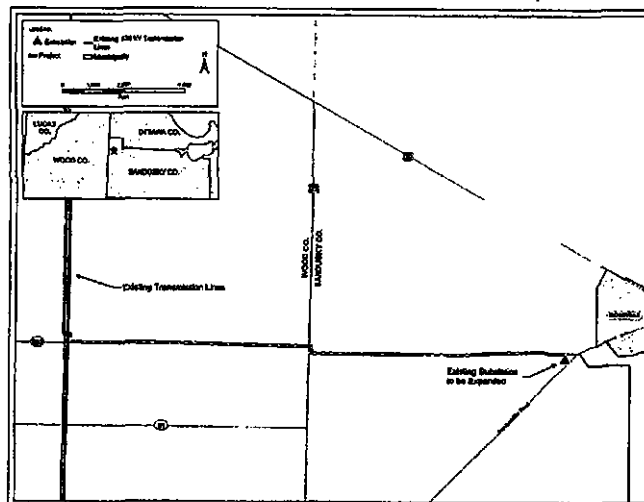

Reiter served on the Owens Board of Trustees from 1978-1985, which included time serving as chairman of the board from 1979-1981.

He is a founding member of the Owens Community College Foundation, serving from 2002-04, then becoming an emeritus director.

Reiter said he helped change the foundation position from part time to full time.

"It's an important part of my life," he said about Owens. "Every time I could help them, I really tried to do that."

He and his wife Linda, who also was at the meeting, established the Edward and Linda Reiter Endowed Scholarship Fund in 1984, which has been awarded to more than 50 Owens students.

Reiter is retired CEO of the former Bowling Green-based Mid Am Bank and is a former vice president of the Bowling Green State University alumni board. He also was a member of BGSU's first Distinguished Graduate class and has served on the board at Lourdes University in Symmes.

"I tried to serve in local education circles that benefited this area," he said.

"My whole life has been helping others," he said. "The most important thing I think you can do in your life is help others."
