I am writing you on behalf of the ALL Family of Companies, which is the largest privately owned crane rental and sales organization in North America. Since 1964 ALL Crane has been headquartered in Cleveland with 8 other locations in Ohio and a total of 36 branches operating nationwide. ALL Crane offers rental, sales and parts for cranes and other lifting equipment. Our business focus includes commercial construction, roads and bridges, power generation and facility maintenance. We have been working in the wind industry now for two decades and have erected countless turbines across the county.

Based on our experiences in the wind power industry, ALL Crane strongly supports the Lake Erie Energy Development Corporation's (LEEDCo) application to the Ohio Power Siting Board (OPSB) to build the Icebreaker Wind project: a 6-turbine wind farm in the waters of Lake Erie eight miles off the coast of Cleveland. This project has the potential to help create a robust offshore wind industry in the Great Lakes region and jobs in Ohio. Alone, Icebreaker Wind will create more than 500 construction jobs and a projected economic impact of \$168 million.

In the last decade, Icebreaker has achieved significant success:

- LEEDCo has reached an agreement with the staff of the OPSB on proposed permit conditions. Ohio Department of Natural Resources staff was involved from the beginning. The project also has its Water Quality Certification from Ohio EPA.

Please grant Icebreaker a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need (as recommended by the OPSB staff) so the project can move forward and is not stifled or killed by regulatory delay.

The Northeast Ohio Areawide Coordinating Agency (NOACA) is a transportation and environmental planning organization that represents state, county, city, village and township officials in Northeast Ohio. Through its 45-member Board of Directors, NOACA addresses the transportation, air quality and water quality needs of the two million residents of Cuyahoga, Geauga, Lake, Lorain and Medina counties. NOACA and its partners cooperatively develop and implement plans to ensure that travel throughout the region is multimodal, safe, cost-effective and environmentally sound.

I am writing to strongly support the Lake Erie Energy Development Corporation's (LEEDCO) application to the Ohio Power Siting Board (OPSB) to build the Icebreaker Wind project: a 6-turbine wind energy project in the waters of Lake Erie, eight miles off the coast of Cleveland. The project has the potential to help create a robust offshore wind industry in the Great Lakes region and jobs in Ohio. On its own, Icebreaker Wind will create more than 500 construction jobs and a projected economic impact of \$168 million.

As the regional air quality planning agency for Northeast Ohio, NOACA supports any project that will improve air quality and help the region attain the United States Environmental Protection Agency's (U.S. EPA) National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS). Icebreaker Wind meets this purpose, as it will provide 20.7 megawatts (MW) of zero-emissions wind energy, which will help clean Northeast Ohio's electric grid. Based on our analysis, Icebreaker Wind will prevent the release of 4.3 tons of fine particulate matter (PM_{2.5}), 22.7 tons of nitrogen oxides (NO_x), 30 tons of sulfur dioxide (SO₂), and 36,720 tons of carbon dioxide (CO₂) per year.¹ As a result, the project will generate \$1.7-3.8 million in public health benefits annually.²

In the last decade, Icebreaker has achieved significant success:

- Icebreaker won a \$40 million grant from the U.S. Department of Energy to support innovation in offshore wind.



The Board of County Commissioners of Ashtabula County, Ohio, met on the 5th day of November, 2019, in regular session at the offices of said Board in the Old Courthouse Building, 2nd Floor, 25 W. Jefferson St., Jefferson, Ohio, with the following members present: J. P. Ducro IV, Casey R. Kozlowski, Kathryn L. Whittington.

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners hereby finds and determines that all formal actions relative to the adoption of this resolution were taken in an open meeting of this Board of County Commissioners, and that all the deliberations of this Board of County Commissioners and of its committees, if any, which resulted in formal actions, were taken in meetings open to the public, in full compliance with applicable legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Revised Code; and

WHEREAS, the Icebreaker Wind Farm will be the first freshwater offshore wind project in North America and only the second offshore wind project in the United States; and

WHEREAS, Icebreaker Wind is a 20.7 megawatt, six turbine project that will be located eight to ten miles off the shore of Cleveland, Ohio; and

WHEREAS, there is a critical need to develop more domestic clean energy to protect our environment and create new industries in the region; and

WHEREAS, the Great Lake's region has the technical potential to provide over 700 gigawatts of offshore wind generation, including in the waters off of Ashtabula County; and

WHEREAS, Icebreaker will be a small demonstration project that will allow us to advance the development of this huge clean energy resource in Lake Erie and the other Great Lakes; and

WHEREAS, the Icebreaker Wind project alone will create over five hundred (500) jobs and provide \$168 million in local economic impact over the project life; and.

WHEREAS, Icebreaker is committed to hiring workers from the local labor force and sourcing materials from the region, to the greatest extent possible; and

WHEREAS, the vast offshore wind industry potential in Northeast Ohio could provide thousands of jobs and significantly boost the local economies, including the economy of Ashtabula County; and

WHEREAS, the region's air quality is among the worst in the nation, which air pollution leads to increases in respiratory disease including asthma, heart attacks, and premature death. Clean energy will help improve the County's air quality; and

WHEREAS, Ohio depends on fossil fuels for over eighty (80) percent of its electric energy mix while clean renewable energy accounts for less than three (3) percent of Ohio's electric energy mix. Developing an offshore wind industry will provide greater fuel diversity, which can serve as an insurance policy against price volatility and/or shortages; and

WHEREAS, Icebreaker Wind power has received strong community support from residents, businesses and local governments; and

WHEREAS, Icebreaker Wind power has secured \$10 million from the U.S. Department of Energy to date, with a commitment to provide an additional \$40 million in funding if certain milestones are met; and

WHEREAS, the Lake Erie Energy Development Corporation (LEEDCo) has attracted a private investor in Fred Olsen Renewables, a leader in the European wind industry, to own, construct, and operate the project; and

This project has the potential to help create a robust offshore wind industry in the Great Lakes region and jobs in Ohio. Alone, Icebreaker Wind will create more than 500 jobs and \$85 million in economic impact during construction and an additional economic impact of \$168 million over the life of the project.

Dear Chairman Randazzo,

We, the undersigned, strongly support the Lake Erie Energy Development Corporation's (LEEDCo) application to the Ohio Power Siting Board (OPSB) to build the Icebreaker Wind project: a 6-turbine wind farm in the waters of Lake Erie eight miles off the coast of Cleveland. This project has the potential to help create a robust offshore wind industry in the Great Lakes region and jobs in Ohio. Alone, Icebreaker Wind will create more than 500 construction jobs and a projected economic impact of \$168 million.

In the last decade, Icebreaker has achieved significant success:


- Icebreaker won a \$40 million grant from the U.S. Department of Energy to support innovation in offshore wind.
- LEEDCo attracted Norwegian private investor and developer Fred. Olsen Renewables to help with development, finance, and construction of the project.
- Icebreaker has a signed contract with the City of Cleveland where Cleveland Public Power and Cuyahoga County have agreed to buy a significant portion of power from Icebreaker.
- Icebreaker will connect to Cleveland Public Power's Lake Road Substation that is expected to feed Cleveland's planned "microgrid."
- The project has earned all required federal approvals. Those include a "Finding of No Significant Impact" from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, U.S. Coast Guard and U.S. Department of Energy. Other federal agencies that have signed off include the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the U.S. State Department and the Federal Aviation Administration.
- LEEDCo has reached an agreement with the staff of the OPSB on proposed permit conditions. Ohio Department of Natural Resources staff was involved from the beginning. The project also has its Water Quality Certification from Ohio EPA.

Please grant Icebreaker a Certificate of Environmental Compatibility and Public Need (as recommended by the OPSB staff) so the project can move forward and is not stifled or killed by regulatory delay.
