Dear OPSB Staff,

I am writing to express my <u>SUPPORT</u> for the "feathering condition" imposed on LEEDCo's Lake Erie Icebreaker project, case number <u>16-1871-EL-BGN</u>, on account the condition looks out for the safety and protects thousands upon thousands of migratory birds and bats across Lake Erie each year. The board has received hundreds of letters of support of and also against this condition, however, the main questions that need to be asked at the end of the day are:

- 1. DO INDUSTRIAL WIND TURBINES BELONG IN LAKE ERIE?
- 2. IS WILDLIFE AND OTHER ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS PROTECTED?
- 3. IS IT IN THE BEST INTEREST OF OHIO'S RESIDENTS?
