L5	application filed by Union Ridge Solar, LLC, which is
L6	a subsidiary of Leeward Renewable Energy, LLC. The
L7	application is for the purpose of constructing a
L8	solar powered electric generation facility of
L9	approximately 108 megawatts in Harrison Township, in
20	Licking County. The application was filed on March
21	26, 2021, and supplemented on May 6, 2021.
22	I would also note that the board the
23	board staff filed its report of investigation on
24	August 16, 2021. This report is a recommendation by

the staff and does not necessarily reflect what the board's final determination in this case will be.

The purpose of this evening's hearing is to receive testimony regarding the application from persons in the local community who are not parties to this case. Tonight's public hearing will not be treated as a question-and-answer session, but rather an opportunity for you to let the board know what you think about the proposed project.

Tonight's public hearing is only one aspect of the process in this case. An evidentiary hearing has been scheduled to begin on September 14, 2021, at 10:00 a.m. at the board's offices in Columbus. The purpose of the evidentiary hearing is for the parties and board staff to provide testimony and other evidence regarding the project.

Tonight's hearing is being transcribed by a court reporter. If you signed up to testify, please speak clearly so the court reporter can accurately reflect your comments on the record.

Also, if you have a prepared written statement, it would be helpful if you provide a copy to the court reporter for reference to ensure the transcript is accurate.

After I finish with the introduction, we'll begin by inviting individuals on the sign-up sheet to speak about the proposed project. Each person who signed up to testify will be permitted to speak once about the proposed project. Before you present your testimony, we'll ask you to take an oath or affirmation that what you are about to say is the truth. We'll ask you to state your name and your address for the record and to indicate if you work or reside in the project area. You can then present your thoughts on the proposed project.

Counsel for the parties to the case, Chair French, Judge Davis or I will be permitted to ask you questions about your statement. The testimony that you provide tonight will be a part of the official record in the case, and it will be reviewed by the board before a final decision is made on the application.

A couple other notes. If you decide that you no longer want to testify when your name is called, you can just indicate that you pass, and we'll move on to the next witness. If you decide that you prefer to file written comments in the case, approach one of the board staff members that are at

I don't want to be that person that -- years ago, they talked about water running through lead papes, "What a great idea." Well, not so much anymore. There are so many unknowns, in my opinion, about solar and the panels to that large a degree that I'm not just not willing to chance that in my community.

I think that -- We talk about Amazon and Google and these large businesses that want this energy. They have large rooftops in those buildings that they built. They could put those solar panels on their rooftops. They have large parking lots where they park their employees. They could elevate those panels over top those parking lots in some way.

I realize it's about the money. It's cheaper to pay a farmer to go use his field. But I

Again, I think there's also an issue of the direct community versus the bigger community, the bigger community being Licking County. The immediate community is the people on Watkins Road and the people that are going to be looking at this. I live, like I say, within 100 feet on a hill; and I will look directly at these solar panels.

Now, I know they're going to put as much trees and shrubbery and decorate it very beautifully. But sitting on top of a hill, I think I'm going to be waiting a while for those trees to block my view because I'm going to be looking down. And there's about five people in my direct community, as I would refer to it, that will be surrounded on at least three sides by this solar farm.

So, you know, I just think that, again, it is a community. It's a direct community. And I think we ought to be taking that into consideration a little bit more than the larger community of Licking County.

You know, you talk about the number of

jobs and growth and so forth. You know, we're using 600 acres to employ two people. When this whole thing is done, it's two people. There will be 225 people come to work it and build it. Licking County is not going to get anything from that 225 people.

Harrison Township doesn't have tax, so there's no local tax going to be paid. They're going to come from Columbus. They're going to come from Reynoldsburg, Pickerington. Those people will get their local taxes. We get the traffic.

So I just think there are more issues that need to be raised and, you know, for people to think about a little bit. I've asked the questions from Leeward, and they don't have an answer yet; and that has to do with where the panels are actually going to come from. And as far as I know, initially they were coming from China.

Well, the Biden administration has now stopped importation of solar panels from China because they're coming from what I believe to be Xinjiang Province -- or pronounced that way -- which uses slave labor. So they have been seized at the west coast airport -- or west coast ports of entry.

And so now we're looking for alternatives,

Any county commissioners come to any of you and say what will it do to affect your -- the price of your home? What will it do when they bury

that hundreds and thousands of yards of cable that,
by the way, after 35 years will not dig it up and
dispose of it. It will remain in the ground. And
I'm told that I'm supposed to recycle a plastic jug,
but this company is going to be allowed to bury
thousands of yards of cable and leave it. And I
guarantee you that cable is probably surrounded by
plastic or rubber.

Now, I understand. I grew up on a farm.
And I had another public official, I believe from the
school system, that had the audacity to say -- now,
mind you, from the school system -- "At least we

Think about that. She's with the school system. Their customers are students, and she's okay with them not building housing in that area.

It went through the legal process that our state has which is -- Folks, I spent -- I retired from the highway patrol. And I can tell you that government agencies follow the law. It doesn't mean it's good for us.

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Christ, half of the time I ask a government official, "Where do you stop at a stop They don't know. They'll say, "That clearly marked white line." "What if there isn't one? What if I'm the second car back?" You can follow the legal process. Ιt doesn't make it right for us. If we have to get up every morning and look out that window and see that -- that -- that field and know that it's reducing the price and value of my property, not theirs -- they don't live here. Pardon the 13 expression, but we won't. 14 You know, so it's like, we don't get green 15 energy credit. We don't -- Like I said, we don't get 16 anything from this other than 15 feet panels with four feet -- I'm five feet. So they're going to put 17 18 trees around a 15 foot panel. That's going to be a 19 little taller -- or a little shorter than me. 20 So, you know, like I say, Kelly, we appreciated your comment, but we don't want your 21 22 project in our backyard. 23 ALJ SEE: Any cross? 24 MR. teacher education in all buildings while the planning for additional educational space, as our older buildings exceed capacity. It is difficult to plan for additional programs and space as school districts are reliant on local property taxes, which fluctuate year after year. Our district is also a capped district with our funding, meaning we do not see additional funds from the State with our growth.

We were pleased when Licking County commissioners approved a \$9,000 per megawatt PILOT agreement for the project. If the project goes forward, the approximate annual revenues to the Southwest Licking Schools would be \$445,000 every year for the life of the project. These revenues would help with the facility improvements tremendously.

With the PILOT revenue, we will have the opportunity to plan for improvements and to meet the needs over time. This sustained revenue will improve -- will provide important resources to our district and allow us to feel confident as we budget year after year. We look forward to seeing this project move forward. And thank you for your consideration.

But it's also 20 about -- it's also about finances. That's what I 21 did. It's a ten year investment before I'll even see 22 my first dollar. But I'm planning on saving money, 23 so in that the sense it's a good thing. But at some 24 point, finances will come into it because -- I

appreciate what the other gentleman said, is that there is a life to these solar panels structurally, but also technologically, because 30 years from now these solar panels might be obsolete.

And the other thing is that these guys might go out of business. So what we're left with is these solar fields. I've done all the research because of what I wanted to do. There's a lot of money to do this, so I did a lot of research. And there are some solar fields out there. There's some good ones, and then there's some bad ones. Some bad things have happened.

And California is kind of where all this started. Daggett, California, and Ivanpah,
California, if you go and research those, there's two solar fields out there that are no longer solar fields. They're gone.

And you ought to see the pictures. One is almost like a desert. There's strewn parts all over. The other one is solar panels broken, falling apart. Everything is just abandoned. It actually ruined -- the one in Daggett ruined the town because they said it was going to bring jobs and whatnot.

So there is a concern environmentally, and

that's what you were talking about. We're talking about environmental. I'm not talking about the environment today. I'm talking about 30 years from now, not in our lifetime. But as that gentleman said over there, his grandkids, that's what I'm concerned about.

So I don't want to bring up the problem without offering a solution. And this is what I would like you to consider. I would like you to consider the cleanup costs of this field, looking 30 years down the road. I don't know what that is going to be. It could be \$10 million.

Whatever it is, find out what that is and assess that to this project over the next 25, 30 years, whether they're paying that to us in increments or it's in a bond or something like that so that when these panels are no longer generating electricity, technology has made them obsolete or these guys go out of business that we, as a county and as a community, have a way of cleaning this up, because certainly we're not going to have the money to do it on our own. They should be making enough money that they could put something -- just like a mortgage, put together payments, put together money

So I did like most people. Most people that don't know about solar fields, what do you do, you Google it, right? And so when I Googled it, some things came up. And I think a lot of people brought this to a point.

And so the solar panels only going to last 25 to 30 years. They're filled with toxic materials. And 80 percent of the solar panels that have been manufactured to this date are from China. So we're virtually giving a bunch of money to China.

My background is in the electrical engineering, so then my next thought process was:
Well, is it even feasible to put solar energy in
Ohio? I mean, look. It's raining right now.
Anybody ever been sunburnt in the middle of winter?
I haven't.

So the next thing I did was I pulled up a map. And this shows the solar energy in the United States. And as you can see, it looks like Florida, it looks like Texas, Arizona, these are places to put

solar. You can see that Ohio is like a blue color on this map. Blue is indicating that there's less solar energy.

Next question I had was: These solar panels -- So they release this picture, which I -- the picture looks horrible. This picture here shows the rotating solar panels. These rotating panels are 15 feet tall -- or could be up to 15 feet tall. So this is right at the end of my road.

And I kind of want to talk a little bit about the way real quick that I was notified about this. And so there's some people that live, like -- in my original picture back here, the people that live in these four houses, those four houses, they received letters about the solar field. The rest of these houses, this entire community was not notified. We were notified through Facebook. That's the only way we found out about this.

My next concern is decreased property value. And so as you can see, like, in 2019, I built a beautiful deck. This is my beautiful deck. This is where my kids play. I see beautiful sunsets every night.

This is a place of glory. This is where

it's all at. This is my dream. So this is really rough to think that that's going to change.

I'd like to make my next point. My next point people brought up earlier. I did a little research. So what does this look like? So these are buildings owned by Amazon actually in the area. Some of these are only a couple miles away. They got these massive rooftops, massive, massive buildings. Do you see any solar panels on their roof?

MR. MUNCY: No.

MR. HAMMOND: Do you see this down here at the bottom? I got, "What does the homeowner do?"

The homeowner wants solar, they put the panels on the roof. I ask these large companies who want to put solar panels in my backyard, put them on the roof of your facilities first. That's where you should be putting them.

Next point I'd like to make is: I think they realized that big companies were taking advantage of people. And you can see Mike DeWine right there. He signed Senate Bill 52. Now, this project was excluded from that. It does not have to follow these regulations. But you can see that Senate Bill 52 is supposed to protect people like me,

1 people like you. It's supposed to protect us. 2 They realized there was a problem. People 3 were building solar panels in people's backyards. They're not building solar panels in big fields where 4 5 nobody is looking at them. It's in my backyard. 6 It's in your backyard. 7 And so Senate Bill 52, what it does, it 8 gives the county commissioner more oversight. 9 restricts certain areas, areas that would be like my 10 backyard. 11 They have to submit a decommissioning 12 And so I haven't seen a decommissioning plan. plan. 13 But I can tell you that these solar panels are very 14 toxic. Are they going to end up in our landfills? 15 Are they going to poison our water 30 years from now? 16 I don't know. 17 So I ask people to really consider that 18 they're not putting these solar fields -- they're not 19 putting them in big fields where you can see them. 20 They're putting them in my backyard. When I looked at some of the plans that I've looked over, it appears that there's a very good depiction of what the project area looks like before the solar panels are put into place, after the solar panels are put into place and then five to seven years down the road. But what that picture does not show is what does the landscaping look like at time of planting. And I think that's something that's an unknown. I think that makes a lot of folks a little nervous about that right now.

I would like to see something that shows that those plantings reflect what our code requires, that they have to be at least six feet in height and at least 70 percent opaque during the winter months.

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MR. GORDON: Good evening. So my name is
Kevin Gordon. I've lived in Harrison Township for
over 30 years now. I graduated from Watkins. That's
where I met my wife. And we got married, and I
started my business here, which I'm in 12 years now.
This community has, you know, brought me to where I'm
at. I really care about the community.

With that being said, I'm here tonight to voice my concerns for not just our community, for all other communities as well. I'm not against the fact of having solar directly behind my property. I believe landowners have the right to do what they want with their land. My concerns are not esthetics and the change of view from my back porch. My concerns are known unknowns and the unknown unknowns for the community, the township and the county. For these reasons, I cannot be on board with the solar fields currently.

It was stated by the Licking County commissioner in the Newark Advocate, the article was published on the 26th of February 2021, that "There was no aspect of this that was negative." I don't know if this is true or not. But I do know I have several concerns.

Is Union Ridge fully funding this project on their own? Is any part of government money assisting Union Ridge in constructing this project? Is there a tax credit if Union Ridge -- Union Ridge for completing the project by the end of 2022? Does making this entire process go smooth and quick for Union Ridge without resistance allow them to better qualify for this tax credit? This raises questions and concerns for me. Why would you need to expedite a project of this size and complexity?

My first concern is: What does the future look like for our schools, our parks, our fire department, et cetera, after taking this in lieu of tax money? Does the community have a thought process of: If these organizations are making this money that's being paid to them, why do they need another levy? Is this going to be hard for the community to vote for another levy? Are levies going to be harder to pass now? These are thoughts that all community members and leaders should have.

Every positive project, no matter what, comes with a baggage of potential negatives. The community is growing, and I don't want to see the -- I don't want to see the community miss out on

future income because we took a lump sum of money for a solar field to be built. I don't feel this project should be rushed without looking at the whole picture.

My next concern is: Will there be a subsidy to our electric bill to cover any additional costs created by these facilities into the future? I think this question is extremely hard to answer because nobody can predict the future, and I don't think anybody in this room right now can promise you that there will not be a subsidy in the future.

And I ask Union Ridge to guarantee us, as a community, that no matter what will happen in the future, consumer charges for the entire lifespan of this major energy infrastructure does not come back us to.

Another concern is property values. Will property values around this infrastructure reduce?
Will they stay the same? Will they drop during the first year of construction? Will they start to decline years from now? Again, I don't think anybody in this room really, truly has the answer to that and what it looks like for a major power facility, and that's what concerns me.

Tied to this question is what accountability does Union Ridge have to maintain the perimeter of these facilities to keep them remaining pleasant for our community, and who enforces those?

Who can call them up and tell them and hold them to a standard, and who decides whether it's pleasant or abrasive?

My last question concerning our community is the fact that the solar field is in our township. If we will be housing this major facility, why will our township get such little proceeds from this from in lieu of taxes payout? Pretty sure there was talk in the Newark Advocate that the county commissioners might kick back some extra money for our township because we're hosting this facility. Not sure if this is a question for the Siting Board or for the Licking County commissioners. But this was also published in the Newark Advocate on the 26th of February, 2021.

And lastly, if this green energy project is so great for our community, why can't we as residents, our schools, our public buildings purchase this energy and utilize it for ourselves?

In conclusion, I think my biggest concerns

are the unknown unknowns beyond the known unknowns. What does this actually look like in the future for our community, bringing this major generation facility into our township? I stand with hesitation to support this project because I do not think seven months from when we were notified is long enough for the community to fully grasp the intensity of this project and any negative long-term effects that could come with it.

I also urge the Ohio Power Siting Board do carefully review this project, take no shortcuts and take your time on your decision and don't rush it just to make a deadline for a tax credit that could happen in 2022. Thank you for your time. Thank you. And I would -- Can I add one more --

ALJ SEE: Go ahead.

MR. GORDON: -- that I -- So this question came up to me after watching everybody. The problem I have is the people that stand up and expose their feelings for having this project come to our community, every single one of those people are receiving money from Union Ridge. My check and balance to that is: I encourage the superintendent of the schools, the township trustees, the

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commissioners, everybody go and take a look at other
communities, making sure you're calling them, making
sure that existing facilities that are up, everything
is working out. And maybe you guys have done that,
and that's why you're standing up here talking.
if you're standing up here talking just because
you're receiving money, I -- I don't believe in that.

What I would like to talk directly towards the Siting Board tonight is: There 10 is Ohio Revised Code that requires a certain 11 percentage of not only renewable energy in the state 12 of Ohio, but also specifically solar energy in the 13 state of Ohio. I believe, if I recall correctly, 14 that it's 1 percent by 2026 directly related to solar 15 powered generation. 16 So my question is that -- I guess my 17 question is situated around customer/consumer energy 18 And is there any commitment from the Ohio Power Siting Board or, for that matter, the State of 19 20 Ohio, that electric grids, in fact, will not be 21 affected by this alternative energy, especially in 22 our direct community? There are multiple articles 23 from other parts of the country where the local 24 consumer eventually starts seeing consumption

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increases for the operation and maintenance of a
facility like this, and those consumer costs increase
substantially. That would make all of the generous
donations and school monies seem much less appealing.

consumer costs in terms of our energy bill are not

JONES: I reside in Harrison Township and Licking County. ALJ SEE: Go ahead with your testimony. MR. JONES: Good evening, folks. apologize. I don't have a prepared a speech. I intended actually on not saying anything. But feelings have gotten to me, and just I feel like I need to say it. I don't have anything against solar energy. I like to think I'm a good old red-blooded American. And I can't stop anything from doing something that they want on their own property. That being said, I recently moved back to Pataskala. Ι lived here when I was a young man, going through middle school and high school at Watkins Memorial just two miles from my home currently. The property that I recently purchased, there is -- there are two sides of my property that will be directly facing the Union Ridge project. And, in fact, my bedroom window is less than 50 feet

from my property line where I will be staring directly at the solar panels through the lovely shrubbery that they plan on doing.

The folks at Union Ridge have been very responsive, very easy to talk to. I have nothing but respect for the folks that I have communicated with about this project.

I do have some very strong opinions against the project. A lot of it is the esthetics. I purchased my home staring out at the field directly next to my home. I had intentions of living in the home that I have. Signed a 30-year mortgage. I'm committed to this that property at this point. There's no going back on that.

That being said, the property I purchased during that process, at no point in time did the previous owner or the real estate agent inform me of this project happening directly next to my home. My only guess to that, as I'm sure some of you guys can imagine, is it would make it harder to sell.

They didn't put, you know, in the advertisement "Soon to be next to a solar field."

Does that sound appealing to anybody? Does anybody look at that as a value to their home? No.

I am committed to living in the property I have now because if I were to sell it currently, I would disclose that information to somebody, and I know that I would not get the same value out of my home that I just put into it.

I am currently making improvements into my home. I just put \$8,000 worth of carpet in. I just put \$3,000 worth of money into updating the pole barn that's behind my house for electricity so I can have lights and things. I'm glad to pay for that sort of stuff. I'm trying to add value to my home.

I intended on moving to Licking County, specifically to the school system that I used to attend, because I wanted to provide that kind of a lifestyle for my children that I enjoyed in Pataskala. And most of my nights as a young man in high school learning to drive on those roads in Pataskala, I enjoyed driving through, staring at cornfields, having a good time, enjoying the slow country living.

I don't live in New York City for a reason. I don't like the traffic. I don't want to stare at highrise skyscrapers, things like that. I listened to a young man who is part of the family

that owns that property directly next door to my home. It sounds like it is a bother for them to bring their equipment up here and farm that field. I understand that. I would like the opportunity to purchase the area immediately around my home. I think that's a reasonable solution as to why I shouldn't have to stare at that.

They want to sell the property to Union
Ridge for 30 years to do solar panel stuff. There's
about six acres directly around my home I would love
the opportunity to purchase, and I believe I have a
couple neighbors who would be willing to chip in on
that sort of thing. I think that that is a
reasonable solution for some of the folks who don't
want to stare at this.

I drive down 70 all the time, and I stare at fields that line 70. I don't know about you guys. But I'd rather drive down my road that I live on and stare at a cornfield or something of that nature and drive down the freeway and look at solar panels. All we're looking at is billboards and blacktop anyways. I don't understand why we can't look at alternative places to put this particular solar panel field where it would be less of a nuisance or less of a bother to

these folks.

The other concern I have is: Being a homeowner on that property, there is going to be an increase of traffic going down that road because of the folks putting together this property. There's going to be dust. There's going to be noise, things like that. I understand that it's not long-term. But it is something that I'm going to have to live with on a daily basis.

I also, when learning about this project, took it upon myself to drive two and a half hours away to visit a -- the only place I could find that had a solar field of any size that wasn't just a standard homeowner. And I parked my truck as close as I could get to that property, rolled my windows down, turned the engine off and sat there.

It wasn't silent. There was a nice "mmmmmm" going on the whole time. I'm going to have to listen to that every day.

There are folks that stood up here today in support of Union Ridge. And I applaud that Union Ridge is putting money into the community, updating the pool, things like that. That's fantastic. This project is a 30-year project. Did anybody hear them

say that they signed on to support that pool for 30 years?

MR. MUNCY: No.

MR. JONES: It's the immediate sale, right, "Let's do the bright and shiny things. Let's help them immediately." I haven't heard anybody say anything about long-term commitment to the community other than providing electricity, which, by the way, I get no benefit of even though I get that in my backyard right next door to me. Our prices aren't dropping. My property value will.

My desire to live in my home will also drop. I've decided the property -- The project is supposed to be up and running by 2023 if I read the timeline correctly. That gives me two years to enjoy my home. I will find out if I can live with that project next door to me. If not, I'm hoping that the updates I do to my home make it so that I can walk away from my house with nothing but my tail between my legs and a little bit of loss of pride.

I -- I think that it's interesting everybody who is in support of this project does not have an address where it is directly behind them, directly next door to them, directly outside of their

bedroom window. I think there should be some weight to that. Those who would be directly affected by the project should have a greater say in what's going on than the small benefits going around.

I understand the solar company has provided money to fix up the school or the pool or what have you. I provide that money too, folks.

MR. MUNCY: Yes, sir.

MR. JONES: I work a lot of hours. I put a lot of money into this community with my tax dollars. I would like to have that treated with some level of respect. It's great the solar company has done that. I've been doing that and will continue to do that for as long as I live in this area. And I think that that has some weight to it.

I appreciate your time, folks. Hopefully we can treat each other with respect. And no disrespect to anybody here. It is just purely something that we as homeowners are going to have to live with in this area, and I don't think that there is anything that can be done to outweigh the costs of the negative effects that we're going to see long-term in property values and the unfortunate site that's going to be outside of our windows every day.
