To whom it may concern,

I was told by Ray Strom of the Ohio Power Siting Board to write you about my concerns of the Rocky Express Pipeline. He felt it was the best way to have an effect concerning the pipeline and how they have treated us so far. The men who contacted us have not listened to anything we wanted from them, in fact they don't listen at all. They only tell us what they are going to do and that is it. Here is what we feel should be done,

Not crossing this over our farm at all.

As those we talk to have told us, we can't stop it if they want to do it. So —

They go the path they first told they would do. That is parallel and as close as possible to the existing southern most gas pipeline of Texas Eastern Pipeline. From the entering in at our western property line until they exit our farm on the eastern property line they stay the same parallel distant from the existing pipeline. We at the very first told them we would agree to this path. The next time they came back John Ree of Rocky Express Pipeline said some agency (I didn't write the name down) would not let them tear our barn down because it was an historical barn. As we lived here since 1955 we have never heard of the barn

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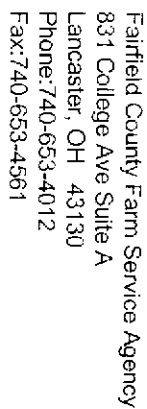
having such a title, nor anyplace in the township. We are retired and rent out the land. The year 1963 we sold all our cattle and none has been in there since. The only thing of value stored in the barn is a 1964 Ford 2000 tractor. I think this man is lying!

Their next plan was to go thru our place south of the house and north of our southern line fence. This would be disastrous as far as value of adjoining land.

Then they came back again and said they had to cross to the north of Texas Eastern line two farms west of ours. So they said they would be coming across our place north of Texas Eastern lines. That would be taking the most valuable land we own. To top that off when they got past our barn they would cross back to the south side of Texas Eastern lines. They go east because they had to be on that side of Texas Eastern lines to miss a house east of us. In doing this they would be ~~taking~~ ^{stealing} the best of our field to the east of our house.

This farm has greatly increased in value since we bought it in 1955 and it will be the large part of our nine children's inheritance. So that is why we are so concerned about where the line goes. Since we can't stop it. At the same time why should this pipeline company make us shoulder all the cost and they sail on?
