Pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (16 U.S.C. § 470f) and 36 C.F.R. Part 800, the staff of the Indiana State Historic Preservation Officer ("Indiana SHPO") has conducted an analysis of the materials dated April 5, 2007, and received on April 9, 2007, for the above indicated project in Vermillion, Parke, Putnam, Hendricks, Morgan, Johnson, Shelby, Decatur, Rush, and Franklin counties, Indiana.

In terms of the archaeological report (Maymon, 04/02/07), we concur with the conclusions and recommendations. Out of the 86 archaeological sites identified during this part of the survey for the proposed project, the following 73 sites do not appear eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places: 12P637, 12P639, 12P640, 12Pm326-12Pm334, 12Pm337, 12Pm338, 12He292-12He294, 12He297-12He308, 12Mg340-12Mg343, 12De685-12De693, 12De695-12De699, 12De703-12De712, 12De714, 12Fr306, 12Fr309, and 12Fr311-12Fr322. Therefore, no further archaeological investigations are necessary for these sites.

However, six sites (12P638, 12Pm325, 12De701, 12De713, 12Fr307, and 12Fr310) appear potentially eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places. These sites must be avoided by all project activities or subjected to further Phase II archaeological investigations. A plan for the Phase II archaeological investigations at these sites must be submitted to the Department of Natural Resources for review and comment prior to initiation of fieldwork.

There is currently insufficient information regarding the eligibility of the remaining seven sites (12Pm335, 12Pm336, 12Pm339, 12Pm340, 12He295, 12He296, and 12De694). These sites must be avoided by all project activities or subjected to further archaeological investigations. Please note that additional survey (subsurface) may be sufficient to aid in determining eligibility.

The archaeological report was well written and organized. However, we have the following concerns:

- 1. Site numbers 12De700 and 12De702 did not appear in the report. If these numbers have not been used, then they need to be used for the other portions of this project or returned to our office.
- 2. Thank you for the electronic versions of the site forms in the bound volumes. We will await the original card stock version of the state site forms for our files.
- 3. If landowners would wish to retain ownership of any of the artifacts which are recovered and not placed into permanent curation at a qualified curational facility, additional and more detailed analyses and documentation of the artifacts will be necessary. The archaeologist must consult with the Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology regarding these additional analyses and documentation. All original notes, records, photographs, artifacts not retained by the landowner, etc. from the site will be curated at a qualified curational facility. Copies of the documentation may be given to the landowner.

We realize that the proposed route is not in its fixed location yet. We will await further information regarding the locations of the route, archaeological surveys for the other portions of the project route (including previously recorded site locations), cemeteries, and the geomorphological deep testing.

This is in response to correspondence from your office dated April 10, 2007 (received April 11) regarding the above referenced project. The comments of the Ohio Historic Preservation Office (OHPO) are submitted in accordance with provisions of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended (16 U.S.C. 470 [36 CFR 800]).

The correspondence transmits the report titled "Phase I Archeological Survey for the Proposed Rockies Express East Pipeline Project, Butler, Warren, Clinton, Greene, Fayette, Pickaway, Fairfield, Perry, Muskingum, Morgan, Guernsey, Noble, Belmont, and Monroe Counties, Ohio" dated April 2, 2007, by Michael Hornum, R. Christopher Goodwin & Associates, in five volumes. Our comments here are from our review of Volumes I through IV. Comments on deep testing (Volume V) will be sent under separate cover.

The report documents portions of an ongoing intensive archaeological survey. The project involves the construction of a large diameter gas pipeline. Much of the construction will be accomplished through the use of open cut trenching. This survey includes background review, pedestrian walk-over, and shovel testing. The OHPO previously reviewed the survey strategy, and we continue consultation to consider modifications as needed to the survey strategy. The completed portion of the survey resulted in the identification of 204 archaeological sites (see Table 1, attached below). Based on the information recorded during the survey, the archaeologists are recommending additional investigations at 30 archaeological sites.

We concur with the recommendations presented in the report. We do not disagree with the recommendations for additional work or avoidance at the 28 sites where testing or avoidance is recommended (see Table 2, attached below). The archaeologists recommend additional Phase I survey, with shovel testing, at sites 33-PE-796 and 33-PI-95. Unless there are relatively large changes in the right-of-way that move the project to some distance from these two sites, we agree that additional testing is needed at these two sites given the preliminary findings and the current alignment of the project in close proximity to these sites.

The remaining 174 sites (of the 204 after selecting the 30 listed in Table 2 for testing or avoidance for the portion of the project that has been subject to an archaeological survey) produced generally modest to small assemblages. A large number of sites produced 1 to 6 lithic artifacts. We agree that these sites do not warrant further investigations at this time and that they do not meet National Register eligibility criteria.

Of the sites recommended for testing or avoidance, there are sites that appear to extend well outside of the right-of-way. In particular, we agree that avoidance where feasible at these sites is preferable and that avoidance may involve a number of treatment measures to minimize disturbance.

Although few in number, there are sites that have produced substantial, and at times, remarkable, assemblages from the Phase I survey work conducted for this project or from this project and one or more other identification-level surveys. Examples of sites that seem to be producing substantial archaeological information from Phase I survey efforts include 33-PE-175, 33-PE-176, 33-PE-184, 33-BU-1019, and 33-BU-1039. Where the total information from a site begins to suggest that the site may be recognized for inclusion in the National Register, we recommend considering a shift in the consultation to encourage the development and implementation of research designs that serve more along the lines of mitigation than those serving more narrowly as eligibility assessment.

Finally, we observe that interpretation and recognition of significance of sites is a cumulative science. Sites identified during ongoing survey work should be evaluated within a context of information obtained from previous work. Although this project represents a narrow transect across Ohio, it is possible that we may begin to see some shifts in evaluations and recommendations in subsequent reports.

I already sent out the letter the day you emailed. The unanticipated discovery plan looks good. I just had two comments:

1. If human remains are found, the coroner's office, our office, and law enforcement need to be called (coroner first if possible) and we usually call a conservation officer as law enforcement. If the project manager calls us first, we can coordinate with the coroner and CO. (and will have to for a site visit), but it is the responsibility of the person/company who disturbs the remains to call. We usually put a more generic statement of all three need to be called (to make sure it's covered). Having the numbers in there is a good idea. It will come to me for review, but any of the archaeologists here can take the call and leave a message for me. Also, we should be notified if it is after 1940 (usually it is not necessarily known at the begining), and if the coroner says that it is his/her domain then we work with them or stay out. And remember no one (including law enforcement or archaeologists) should move the remains before the coroner gives the ok.

I have prepared two letters that are being sent by surface mail providing comments on the deep testing and on the unexpected discovery plan. The correspondence conveys our concurrence with the deep testing research designs and with the post review discovery plan. I believe that the unanticipated discovery plan fulfills a FERC requirement.

The unexpected discovery plan provides with somewhat standard language some process steps to deal with any post review discovery of historic properties or unanticipated adverse effects to historic properties, or the identification of human remains. For discovery that doesn't involve human remains (or items of cultural patrimony), I try to emphasize that concerns need to be focused on major findings - archaeological deposits that are very likely to be significant. There is no harm if you bring in an archaeologist to look at a finding of a few artifacts that turns out to be a diffuse, ephemeral, scatter of only a few plowzone artifacts. But I don't encourage the idea that the construction crew should be reporting everything that they see.

I have a couple of questions and suggestions regarding the unexpected discovery plan. The plan doesn't always lead to closure. You may want to take another look at the plan and consider adding some language to make sure that findings ending any brief post review consultation are presented to everyone. This is especially important if human remains are found. The most common sequence of events (from a few cases in Ohio) is that something that looks like bone and may be human is identified. Then, as specified in the plan, everything stops at that location and the coroner is called. It isn't uncommon for the coroner to misidentify the finding when there is only a bit showing in a messy construction zone. If the coroner needs more information or believes that the remains may be less than 100 years old, then what? I don't see provisions for providing information to the OHPO and other consulting parties that the coroner's investigation is continuing. I'm not sure where the 100 year provision comes

from. From Ohio law, the coroner has jurisdiction if there is a crime scene. There is probably case law in Ohio that has established a sort of rule-of-thumb that if it is older than 100 (or 125) years then it can't be a crime scene. But I'm not sure of where this is established. I think that it might be helpful to specify that the OHPO and other consulting parties will be notified when the coroner's investigation has concluded and what the end result was. If something really big is discovered, then the plan establishes the consultation process, however you may wish to consider some clarification for situations where the identification isn't clear cut. There are situations where it isn't clear if the remains are human (or even mammal) but it is prudent and good common sense to give them a good examination. In these cases, do you want your first telephone call to go directly to the Ohio Historic Preservation Officer (Rachel Tooker)? You may wish to consider a provision to keep OHPO staff informed of efforts to identify interesting findings. Especially when it turns out not to be human or a significant archaeological deposit, it may work better to let us know at the staff level the outcome without raising lots of red flags.

The deep testing research designs stipulate efforts directed by qualified professionals to look for buried cultural horizons especially in areas likely to contain alluvial deposits. This isn't my area of expertise, but regardless, I think that state historic preservation office reviewers should try to find a constructive role that minimizes intrusions. It is important here to keep a perspective that allows for flexibility and provides a balance with other parts of the field work efforts to identify historic or otherwise important properties.

Hope these informal, just-me-thinking-out-loud, comments are helpful.
