For the past 8 months or so we have filed numerous comment letters with FERC regarding the REX-East project. We have expressed our concerns about the need for this project, we have purposed valid alternate routes and route variations, and we have expressed our disgust with the conduct of the Rockies personnel and their business practices. I have been assured by numerous FERC representatives, including project manager Laura Turner, that these comment letters are taken very seriously and their content considered when making decisions regarding such a project. As a taxpayer this is the only venue made available to us to make our voice heard so we have utilized it, playing by the rules unlike the Rockies Express organization. In addition my husband and I have attended site visits and numerous public meetings trying to assure that as American citizens and taxpayers our thoughts, concerns and pertinent suggestions were heard regarding this project. Since currently there is no system in place to offer any kind of feedback from these comments, we could only take the FERC representatives word that they were indeed considered.

WHAT A DISSAPOINTMENT then to read Ms. Rowe's recent submission and learn that all of our efforts could very well be an exercise in futility. The fact that Ms. Lykens wasn't even familiar with the document submitted by the Ohio Power Siting Board, (another government entity), with its recommendations regarding this project, (including the use of the Mowrey alternative), is absurd. The fact that Mr. Doug Sipe while conducting a public meeting in Ohio regarding this project, indicated he was not familiar with the project or the taxpayers comments regarding it, lends further credibility to our concerns that the taxpayer, who funds your very job, and whose well being is at risk, is not really part of the equation when making decisions regarding these projects. It leads us to believe that perhaps all of these interactions with the citizens are no more than a talisman.
