When we met back in January, we discussed the possibility of restricting the construction right-of-way to 75 feet when crossing eligible sites 23P11365 and 23P1294. This 75 foot area would encompass a 50 foot permanent essement and 25 feet of temporary workspace for equipment. Rockies Express also proposed the use of a 25 foot travel lane that would be used during the data recovery, which would allow construction equipment to move up and down the right-of-way without having to completely move around the data recovery sites. This 25 ft travel lane would be positioned within the Panhandle Eastern Pipeline's permanent easement in an area that has been previously, and continuously, disturbed by Panhandle Eastern during construction and ongoing maintenance of their pipeline. The attached diagram also depicts the 75-ft wide area where Rockies Express would complete data recovery at sites 23P11365 and 23P1294.



Rockies Express and its subcontractor, i.e., the University of Iowa, Office of the State Archaeologist (OSA), are assisting the FERC in meeting the requirements of Section 106 for the Rockies Express Pipeline-East Project (REX-East) project. In this supplemental report, Rockies Express has completed an additional 0.66 miles of archaeological surveys where permission to survey was obtained from the landowner (41.6 miles were previously reported). In addition, the results of surveys for additional temporary workspaces, access roads, and one contractor yard that total approximately 38.5 acres are included in this discussion. To date, approximately 100% of the project corridor has been surveyed and reported.

The report will be submitted to the FERC with the stipulation that it be considered privileged and confidential. Thank you for submitting information on the above referenced project for our review pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (P.L. 89-665, as amended) and the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation's regulation 36 CFR Part 800, which requires identification and evaluation of cultural resources.

We have reviewed the March 2008 report entitled Third Supplemental Phase I Cultural Resources Survey of the Northeastern Missouri Segment of the Proposed Rockies Express Pipeline-East (REX-East) Project Corridor, Audrain, Ralls and Pike Counties Missouri by University of Iowa Office of the State Archaeologist. Based on this review it is evident that a thorough and adequate cultural resources survey has been conducted of the project area. We concur with the investigator's recommendation that archaeological site 23Pl1398 is not eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places. There will be no historic properties affected and we have no objection to the initiation of project activities within the additional .66 linear miles (16 acres) surveyed during this supplemental study. We do require that a pdf copy of the report be submitted to this office.

Please be advised that, should project plans change, information documenting the revisions should be submitted to this office for further review. In the event that cultural materials are encountered during project activities, all construction should be halted, and this office notified as soon as possible in order to determine the appropriate course of action.

Meeting Minutes

The purpose of this meeting was threefold: to discuss ways to reduce the scope of the data recovery effort in Illinois for the project; to discuss the use of a travel lane for the movement of equipment through the data recovery sites; and to seek ways to expedite the approval of the project.

Krause provided a copy of the presentation that was given at the FERC technical conference on Rockies Express Pipeline-East Project (REX Project) on February 20, 2008. This presentation provided the following information: a summary of the total number of sites that had been identified on the project as of February 15, 2008; an update on the status of the cultural resources surveys; and, a reporting schedule.

Thompson provided a brief summary of the last meeting that was held with the Illinois Historic Preservation Office (IHPA) on January 31, 2008, regarding the REX-East Project for Anne Haaker and Ryan Childs who were not present for this meeting. Thompson stated that he sought the IHPA's assistance in developing ways that REX could meet its construction schedule, while also fulfilling its Section 106 obligations. REX is expecting a certificate on April 17, 2008 with Notice to Proceed (NTP) for construction of discrete facilities (compressor stations, meter stations, contractor yards, and horizontal directional drill (HDD) locations) within the week. REX is then expecting NTP on mainline (full pipeline corridor) by June 1, 2008.

Definition of Data Recovery Area and Use of a Travel Lane through Data Recovery Sites

Thompson distributed three cross-sections that depicted the layout of REX's construction corridor and the proposed area for data recovery (see attached figures).

The first figure (Figure A) depicted a 50-ft permanent easement that would be the focus of the data recovery efforts. Topsoil stripping would be limited to this 50-ft area. The 50-ft area would be flanked on one side by a 25-ft heavy equipment travel lane, which would

be located within the adjacent, permanent easement maintained by Panhandle Eastern Pipeline (Panhandle). The 50-ft data recovery area would be flanked on the other side by a 25-ft equipment lane that utilized a weight distribution mat placed on the original ground surface, and a 25-ft wide workspace for topsoil storage.

The second figure (Figure B) was the same as Figure A except that it depicted areas where the proposed REX pipeline was not collocated with the Panhandle pipeline. In this scenario, the 25-ft matted equipment lane would be used for both construction and heavy equipment travel during data recovery.

The third figure (Figure C) depicted a 75-ft permanent easement that would be the focus of the data recovery efforts. Topsoil stripping would be limited to this 75-ft area. This 75-ft area would be flanked on one side by a 25-ft heavy equipment travel lane, which would be located within the adjacent, permanent easement maintained by Panhandle Eastern Pipeline (Panhandle). The 75-ft data recovery area would be flanked on the other side by a 25-ft wide workspace for topsoil storage. In this case, the 25-ft equipment lane between the 50-ft permanent easement and the 25-ft topsoil storage area would be subjected to data recovery.

Thompson focused his initial discussions on the first two figures (Figure A and B). He explained that in those cases where the data recovery sites are collocated with the Panhandle pipeline, REX proposed to use 25-ft of Panhandle's permanent, disturbed, easement for equipment travel while the Phase III excavations were in progress. Both Haaker and Halpin concurred that this would acceptable.

Haaker asked if REX could move the travel lane further over into Panhandle's easement and, possibly, shift the construction equipment lane over to Panhandle's easement as well. Thompson explained that this would not be feasible due to integrity issues with Panhandle's pipeline and other pipeline safety regulations. Thompson also noted that although the agreement to use Panhandle's easement had not yet been finalized, REX anticipated that they would receive approval for the use of the easement.

Thompson further explained that, as depicted on figures A and B, REX was proposing to only strip topsoil from the 50-ft permanent easement, to mat the adjacent 25-ft area and to use this area for the passage of construction equipment, and to store topsoil within a 25-ft area adjacent to the construction equipment lane. REX believed that the matting of the equipment lane would provide sufficient protection to the site so that the portion of the site beneath the mats would not be disturbed by construction. In addition, Thompson provided an example of an as-built drawing that depicted the portion of the site outside of the permanent easement as a sensitive resource that was precluded from future maintenance activities. Thompson noted that since REX would only be maintaining the 50-ft permanent easement, there would be no reason to access the portion of the site outside of this easement unless new construction was planned.

Thompson also requested the use of the 25-ft equipment lane depicted on Figure B for the travel of heavy equipment in those areas where REX was not collocated with the Pandhandle pipeline. As noted above, REX would not be removing the topsoil from this "equipment lane." In addition, mats placed on the ground surface would prevent adverse effects to the site. The use of the travel lane across the data recovery sites would allow REX to build its pipeline more efficiently and maintain its aggressive construction schedule.

Both Haaker and Halpin agreed that REX would not be required to conduct data recovery on the 25-ft area for topsoil storage as long as this area would not be subjected to stripping prior to construction and if REX could assure the IHPA that the area would not be disturbed during the removal of the topsoil. With regard to the travel lane, Halpin noted that mats had been effectively used at other sites to limit compaction and rutting. However, Haaker was unfamiliar with the use of mats and hesitant to approve their use prior to data recovery. Halpin also expressed concern that mats would be ineffective on sites with steep slopes, since Rockies would need to level the slopes to permit construction.

Halpin recommended that REX conduct data recovery on the proposed equipment and travel lane within the data recovery sites prior to its use. Once the data recovery of the travel lane had been completed, then this area could be used for the passage of equipment, while the archeological crews continued to excavate the remaining 50-ft of the right-of-way. This would amount to the data recovery of a 75-ft corridor as depicted in Figure C. Halpin further noted that he might consider allowing REX to conduct data recovery on the travel lane following construction. However, REX would need to conclusively demonstrate that the use of a matted travel lane would not impact the data recovery sites.

Thompson asked if the IHPA would allow REX to move equipment over the lane and if there was no affect to site, why would REX need to come back after construction to complete data recovery on that portion of the site? He could also foresee potential problems with the landowners if additional work was conducted at the sites after construction was completed. Haaker noted that the travel lane formed part of the area-of-potential effect of the project and could be subjected to disturbance not only during, but also after construction of the pipeline. Therefore, this area required mitigation. Haaker also stated that if the excavation of the travel lane was deferred until after construction, the excavation of the travel lane would need to be completed immediately following the installation of the pipeline - not months later - to ensure that the work was completed. Haaker noted that the IHPA previously had problems with pipeline companies not fulfilling their obligations following construction. This was another reason why she preferred that the travel lane be excavated prior to construction.

Berkin noted that since the MOA for the project represented a legally binding document, REX would need to complete all of the requirements for the project as specified in the treatment plan. Berkin also explained how the environmental compliance program would work for the project. He noted that the compliance monitors would closely regulate the use of the travel lanes to ensure that no impacts occurred to the data recovery sites.

Expedited Reviews and Treatment Plan

Berkin explained that FERC had agreed to implement a phased identification and evaluation program for the project. This would allow REX to initiate a first round of data recoveries prior to the completion of the Section 106 process. REX would then complete any outstanding data recoveries following the completion of the surveys on those tracts where access previously had been denied by the landowners.

Haaker asked about the number of sites that REX anticipated would be subjected to data recovery during the initial phase of treatment. According to her current understanding of the project, to date only a few sites had been determined eligible by the IHPA. Robertson explained that so far only one Phase II report had been reviewed by the IHPA. However, a second report would be submitted for review in April. This second report would discuss the result of Phase II testing on 25 sites. He anticipated that 14 of these sites would be included in the treatment plan. Of these 14 sites, 11M245 and 11SG1344 would be avoided by reroutes, and reroutes would reduce the amount of impact to 11PK1595 and 11PK1599.

Krause stated that REX also was worried about the review schedule for the forthcoming reports and asked if IHPA could provide any assistance with this. Haaker stated that if CCRG could submit short summaries or draft write-ups of each of the eligible sites that Rockies Express expects to present in the Treatment Plan, then Halpin possibly could review them quickly. Halpin agreed that he could expedite the review of such draft reports to only a couple of days. Robertson stated that he could prepare a site-specific draft reports immediately.

The Use of the HDD to Avoid Eligible Sites

Krause provided a preliminary drawing of the HDD at the Illinois River that would avoid 11PK326. The drawing indicated that the drill would extend into the underlying shale as was requested in the previous meeting with IHPA. Krause also provided a brief update on the status of the proposed HDD at Hwy 96 near Atlas, IL. REX is still examining the feasibility of this drill. REX will provide site-specific drawings of this HDD to IHPA as soon as its design is completed. Haaker stated that the use of a drill to avoid the eligible sites would be the best for all cases.

The Scope of the Data Recoveries at Deeply Buried and Wooded Sites

Robertson noted that there are three sites (11PK326, 11PK1591, and PK1702) that have deeply buried components. If impacts to these sites would be limited to the near-surface and to the trench line only, would there be a need to mitigate the portion of these sites under the travel lane? Halpin stated he had no specific objection to only excavating 100% of the permanent easement for buried sites, but would need to more thoroughly review the information on these sites in the forthcoming Phase II reports before making a final decision on this matter.

Robertson also noted that REX had grave concerns about the amount of time that it would take to excavate 100% of some of the larger eligible sites, especially those sites or portions of sites that were located in wooded areas and thus would require hand excavation. He therefore asked if there was any way to reduce the amount of work required at these sites. For example, due to the nature of wooded areas, e.g., deadfall and tree roots, there really is no way to excavate 100% of sites in wooded areas. Robertson suggested excavating a random sample of the wooded portion of these sites and focusing the sample on areas not disturbed by trees and roots.

Thompson also asked if excavation of the travel lane would be required at sites in wooded areas if REX agreed to cut all trees to ground level, put mats over the stumps, and refrain from any additional disturbance of this area. Haaker stated that the travel lane in these cases might not need excavation. However, she worried that if the trees were removed then the landowner might clear-cut the ground in this area and use it for farmland or pasture. Therefore, REX's clearing of the wooded area would directly result in an adverse effect to the site. REX would need to demonstrate that the travel lane in wooded areas would revert back to woods before IHPA would agree that the travel lane through sites in wooded areas would not need to be excavated.

Alternative Mitigation

Berkin noted that REX had already spent a considerable amount of money on archaeology in Illinois as part of its compliance efforts and had greatly enhanced the archaeological database for the state as a result of its fieldwork to date. He further noted that REX could spend an additional 60 million dollars if required to excavate a 100% percent of each of the data recovery sites in Illinois. He therefore wondered if the IHPA would consider the possibility of directing some of the funds for the data recoveries to support other "alternative mitigation" projects in the state in exchange for reducing the scope of the data recovery work for the project. The Advisory Council recently added a section on alternative mitigation to its website and there are precedents for the implementation of alternative mitigation projects in other states. Perhaps, some of these funds could be used to sponsor educational programs about archaeology or to upgrade some of the state's archaeological facilities?

Haaker noted that there was a precedent for this in Illinois. In one case, a developer actually had purchased a portion of a site adjoining its project area and turned it into a conservation zone. The area was fenced off and precluded from future development. Childs noted that REX typically does not purchase property. Rather, the pipeline company purchases an easement and the landowner retains the property and can continue to use the area as long as it does not pose a risk to the safety of the pipeline. If REX actually purchased the land, then the landowner would not retain its use.

Haaker said that alternative mitigation could be considered for historic sites, but was more problematic for prehistoric sites. The issue was that prehistoric sites would not necessarily produce redundant information. In particular, we can never be certain of what we will find at prehistoric sites, especially at newly recorded prehistoric sites, until the sites actually are excavated. She would much rather see Rockies Express find ways to not affect the sites, than consider ways to reduce the 100% excavation requirement. However, she stated that she would keep an open mind about alternative mitigation and let REX know if something appropriate came along.

Points of Agreement and Action Items

The IHPA agreed to an expedited review of short reports on eligible sites in order to allow CCRG to include these sites in the treatment plan. CCRG will send a draft version of a short report with a sample of the associated figures for Halpin's initial comments.


The IHPA agrees that sites containing only deeply buried components should not be adversely affected by the use of a 25-ft wide matted equipment lane. Therefore, data recovery of this 25-ft travel lane might not be required. The IHPA will need to see the individual discussions of these sites in the Phase II report in order to make a final decision on this matter.


The IHPA agrees that data recovery of the 25-ft equipment lane might not be required in sites located in wooded areas. The IHPA will need to see the individual discussions of these sites in the Phase II report in order to make a final decision on this matter. In addition, REX would need to demonstrate that these cleared areas would revert to woodlands and not be subjected to further development by the landowners which would affect the eliqible sites.


The IHPA will consider options on the timing of data recovery of the 25-ft equipment travel lane through sites in agricultural fields that are not collocated with other pipelines.


The IHPA will consider the possibility of alternative mitigation for the project.



Our staff has reviewed the archaeological Phase I recommaissance report performed for the above referenced project. The Phase I survey and assessment of the archaeological resource appear to be adequate.



The Rockies Express Pipeline-East Project (REX-East) project will be approximately 639.1 miles in length and will cross portions of Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, and Ohio. The enclosed cultural resources report is in support of Rockies Express Pipeline Company's, L.L.C. (Rockies Express) application to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) under Section 7(c) of the Natural Gas Act (15 USC 717) and is intended to provide a portion of the information required by the FERC to comply with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act.

Rockies Express has completed archaeological and landscape surveys of all tracts along the pipeline route where permission to survey was obtained from the landowner (approximately 187.4 miles or 96% of the project corridor). Rockies Express will complete surveys on previously inaccessible tracts once survey permission is obtained.

The enclosed reports cover archeological and geomorphological testing across the state conducted between October 2007 and February 2008, including:

- Phase I survey of approximately 18.3 miles of mainline corridor and reroules, 3 contractor yards, 4 meter station and laterals, 77 extra workspaces, and 29 access roads:

Draeger called to clarify her position as expressed during the FERC technical conference on the Section 106 process. She re-iterated that her office would agree to allow construction to begin prior to completion of the Phase I and II surveys; however, the MOA would have to clearly define all conditions of construction to ensure the protection of the resources. The MOA would also need to discuss the protection of the resource should there be any future repair or replacement of the pipe within the eligible site.

She stated that a rapid review of surveys completed after construction began on "variances" as described during the 2/5/08 meeting and in reference to the Letter of Agreement would be rejected. She said that her office could complete faster reviews – less than a week – as long as all of the information was clearly presented and a map was included.

Whitewater Canal – Draeger stated that the information provided by REX on the bore depth would be adequate and would constitute an avoidance of the feature.

HDD of sites - Draeger indicated that her office was unlikely to agree that an HDD could be considered an avoidance measure, unless REX could install "sheeting" above the drill and for the length of the drill to protect the underside of the resource.

Phase III area of potential effect – Draeger also mentioned the "travel lane" proposed by REX at the 2/5/06 meeting. The REX team asked at the meeting for a 25 ft travel lane for construction equipment within the site area if the ground surface was protected by mattes. Today, Draeger stated that the IN SHPO would need more information on compaction and vibrations from heavy equipment, as well as the site type. Her reluciance to agree to the travel lane would depend on if the site had a surface component only with coramics that could be crushed by the equipment versus and deeply buried component of just lithics. She requested site-specific information on site type, artifact type, depth of cultural material, and REX crossing methods before a decision could be made.

I called to get clarification on the process to allow Phase 3 excavations. Specifically, if one company drafts a treatment plan which is approved and finalized as part of a MOA, then can a second company conduct the fieldwork. Draeger advised me that the second company would have to besically copy the data recovery plan from the treatment plan and submit that with a request to begin fieldwork. The IN SHPO would use that document to issue the excavation approval.

Draeger requested one document containing the treatment plans of both JMA and LBG.

Draegar asked for an update on the headstone identified in Hendricks County. I informed her that LBG raked the underbrush looking for depressions, conducted close interval shovel testing, and has completed archival research but still failed to identify a cemetary or possible family plot where the headstone might have been removed from. LBG is expected to present a summary of their work and request additional guidance on how to proceed. Draeger agreed that only two choices remained — stripping probable areas that are clearly identified or monitoring during construction. She will wait on a decision until she reviews the summary.

I called Draeger to apprise her of the results of Phase II testing at Site 12De745 in tract DC-070.000. Historic features consisting of burned earth, ash, and brick had been identified in the Phase I, and Phase II unit excavation and stripping has revealed at least two complexes of flues apparently associated with brick clamps. Individual flues are about one meter wide and two meters long with one complex containing three flues and the second four flues. Each complex is being explored with a 1x1m or 1x2m units, but are not necessarily being fully bisected. The size of features preclude being able to fully excavate them at the Phase II level. Also present is a possible sheet midden where the absence of domestic refuse suggests this may be an industrial size. Draeger is unaware similar sites in Indiana and site this will stand in good contrast with the industrial brickworks encounter by Milner in cestern Indiana.

We discussed the possibility that this may represent a cottage industry, or perhaps simply a spot where someone manufactured bricks for use in constructing their own home. The site is about ½ mile south of the community of Springhill and it is possible that the brick manufactured at the site went to buildings in that community.

Draeger agrees that the site should probably go to a Phase III, recognizing that while there may not be a lot of data in the archaeological deposits themselves; that, combined with background research in deed and perhaps consus records (to be initiated as part of the Phase II work), can provide important information on the local economy. We discussed the use of remote sensing to identify any additional flues or other features, with machine stripping to fully expose the features in plan and bisoction of the features to show the profile.

Phase III: Research question ideas

Specific theories or hypotheses about past human behavior and history should be developed in relation to anthropological and theoretical perspectives, historical contexts, and current issues and study problems in archaeology, anthropology, and history. They need to incorporate intrasite and regional components and be used to guide the course of investigation. The research questions may be developed in regard to material, evolutionary, social (social, political, economic organization), subsistence, symbolic, technological, trade, communication, demographics, environment, ecology, ideology, beliefs and values, settlement, and other perspectives.

(as stated in the draft archaeological guidebook) An adequate research design identifies legitimate research problems, specifies the objectives for the current study, presents a discussion of any background literature relevant to the problem and its development, addresses the formulation of hypotheses, and outlines the level of field and laboratory analysis that will be necessary to address the research problem. The research design needs to ensure that the analytical framework is appropriate to the level of the investigation and that problems addressed are relevant to the temporal period, size of the projet, and geographical location.

Research questions need to be more than answering site function such as "What are the activity areas used at the site?" Instead, one can look at activities areas as a means to the end addressing questions related to seasonality, subsistence, settlement, social organization, or the relation of this site type to the surrounding sites and/or the environment. Same goes for detailed analyses on lithic tools, pottery, archaeobotanical, faunal, habitation patterns, etc. Below are not specific research questions but more topics or ideas that can be incorporated into them or ideas that need to be addressed at the Phase III level.

Pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (16 U.S.C. § 470f) and 36 C.F.R. Part 800, the staff of the Indiana State Historic Preservation Officer ("Indiana SHPO") has conducted an applying of the materials dated on February 27, 2008 and received on February 28, 2008, for the portions of the above indicated project in Johnson and Franklin counties, Indiana.

We appreciate the levels of effort for identifying and evaluating cultural resources for this project. However, we do not concur with the recommendation of exclusion for the two proposed tracts. Flat uplands are environmentally suitable settings to contain archaeological resources, especially in well drained soils in Franklin County and even in semewhat poorly drained soils in Johnson County. Many sites have been recorded with these soil characteristics. Both of these areas do have water sources in the nearby vicinity. Piease be advised that the project locations on Map 2 on the aerial and on the topographic map did not match. A recommissance level archaeological survey will be required to determine the presence or absence of archaeological resources for these areas. The survey must be done in accordance with the "Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Archaeology and Historic Preservation" (48 F.R. 44716). A description of the survey methods and results must be submitted to the Division of Historic Preservation and Archaeology for review before we can comment further.

We look forward to continuing our review for this project.

Mr. Reynolds has three Phase II sites on several tracts. Two Phase II sites (12FR324 and 12FR323) have been completed in January and early February 2008. LBG assessed both sites as not eligible, no further work is recommended. There is one Phase II site remaining to be tested (12FR355) on tract IN-FR-019.502. LBG feels that additional fieldwork, including shovel testing, test units, and mechanical stripping, needs to be completed in order to properly assess the eligibility of the site.

Reynolds has spoken to LBG over his concerns that if the Phase II determined the site eligible, it would be listed on the NRHP. We provided him information that the landowner must be in agreement with the listing, and that the process will not proceed without it. Regardless, Rockies Express would be unlikely to support the effort involved in listing the property.

The court case the lawyer is referring to, concerns Rockies Express' efforts to be granted survey access to properties where owners have denied access. This effort is being made prior to the start of the official condemnation process that will likely start in April after they receive the Certificate from FERC. There are approximately 20-25 landowners involved in the lawsuit. The Court is suppose to rule tomorrow if Rockies Express has the right to complete surveys on their properties.

Snyder indicated that he had just spoken with Ellen St-Onge of FERC about the treatment plan and the status of consulting parties. Both issues were mentioned briefly during the 2/20/08 technical conference between FERC and REX.

Treatment Plans – Initially Snyder wasn't expecting a single document containing both the treatment plan for all sites with notes for construction restrictions and the data recovery work plans, but agreed that REX could present it as such. He is concerned about the distribution of the document to those who shouldn't see the location information. The treatment plan should be simple with most of the information presented in a table format. However, the data recovery section should be very detailed and should include research questions, calculations of excavation, and justification for that excavation method. He also envisions lots of revisions of the draft before a final version is agreed upon; therefore, he may keep a three-ring binder where he can replace pages as needed throughout the process. He also understands that REX expects to present two treatment plans, one in March, and the second in August.

Consulting Parties — Snyder made it clear to St.-Onge that he fall the Tribes should be informed of the impacts of the project to identified resources. He wanted all Tribes notified of the survey results, regardless of their wish to be a consulting party. St.-Onge indicated that FERC doesn't usually do this and she may suggest that NRG follow-up with the Tribes. Snyder envisioned a one page letter discussing the proposed resolution of adverse affect and to update the Tribes on the status of the Treatment Plan and MOA.

Snyder also wanted the FERC to consider landowners of the eligible sites as a consulting party to the MOA process because they would have to agree to the disposition of artifacts and the process that REX and FERC are agreeing to. He thought that St.-Onge was unlikely to agree to this condition.

Report Review Status - Snyder advised me that he was in the middle of reading ASC's Phase II report and that he would move on to the remaining Phase I reports by both companies. He had concerns about the eligibility statements presented in ASC's report and

would like them revised. For instance, changing "the portion of the eligible site within the project corridor is not eligible for the NRHP," to something like "the project corridor would have no adverse affect on the portion of site within the area of impact." He wanted to see findings of "no adverse affect" or "no affect," since site boundaries are ill-defined due to the nature of this project corridor and determinations on partial sites are problematic.

Snyder was concerned that the Phase 2 report did not really have developed research questions and but appeared to be structured for field guidance. He would expect more research-oriented questions at this level and especially at the Phase 3.

Krause informed Snyder that RCGA would be sending in a management summary on the sites identified along the Nolt Reroute in Perry County, as mentioned in the 2/8/08 meeting. REX is hoping to include these sites in the first treatment plan, pending Snyder's concurrence that the sites are eligible.

The Rockies Express Pipeline-East Project (REX-East) project will be approximately 639.1 miles in length and will cross portions of Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, and Ohio. The enclosed cultural resources report is in support of Rockies Express Pipeline Company's, L.L.C. (Rockies Express) application to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) under Section 7(c) of the Natural Gas Act (15 USC 717) and is intended to provide a portion of the information required by the FERC to comply with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act.

Prockies Express and its subcontractors, i.e., The Louis Berger Group, Inc (LBG) and John Milner Associates, Inc. (JMA), are assisting the FERC in meeting the requirements of Section 106. Rockies Express has completed archaeological and landscape surveys of all tracts along the pipeline route where permission to survey was obtained from the landowner (approximately 155.3 miles or 93% of the project corridor). Rockies Express will complete surveys on previously inaccessible tracts once survey permission is obtained.

The enclosed reports cover archeological, architectural, and geomorphological testing across the state conducted between October 2007 and February 2008, including:

- JMA is reporting on the Phase I survey of approximately 10.4 miles of mainline and 2.7 miles on the Wabash Reroute, 1 compressor station, 3 contractor yards, 1 meter station and lateral, 96 extra workspaces, and 3.24 miles of access roads;
- JMA is reporting on 18 archeological sites and the Warren County Canal;
- JMA is recommending additional testing for site 12HE294 (work plan enclosed);
- JMA's Phase Ic geomorphological studies for the Wabash Rerouts:
- Submittal of JMA's final report of architectural surveys on pipeline right-of-way and the Wabash River Reroute; and
- LBG's Work plan for Phase to and II at eight sites as recommended by IHPA on February 1, 2008.

The report will be submitted to the FERC with the stipulation that it be considered privileged and confidential. The reports are labeled "Contains Privileged Information—Do Not Release," and they will not be made public at any time. The report will be filled

with the FERC on April 15, 2008. In addition, copies of the survey results for Indiana will be submitted to the Wea Indian Tribe and to the Iowa Tribe of Kansas and Nebraska, who have asked to be consulted on the project.

The Rockies Express Pipeline-East Project (REX-East) project will be approximately 639.1 miles in tength and will cross portions of Missouri, Illinois, Inciana, and Ohio. The enclosed cultural resources report is in support of Rockies Express Pipeline Company's, L.L.C. (Rockies Express) application to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) under Section 7(c) of the Natural Gas Act (15 USC 717) and is intended to provide a portion of the information required by the FERC to comply with Section 108 of the National Historic Preservation Act.

Rockies Express has completed archaeological and tandscape surveys of all tracts along the pipeline route where permission to survey was obtained from the landowner (approximately 225.1 miles or 96% of the project corridor). Rockies Express will complete surveys on previously inaccessible tracts once survey permission is obtained.

The enclosed reports cover archeological, architectural, and geomorphological testing across the state conducted between October 2007 and February 2008, including:


