1	MS. PIRIK: On the record.
2	Can everyone in the back, before we go on the
3	record, can you hear me?
4	Okay. On the record. The Public Utilities
5	Commission of Ohio has assigned for public
6	hearing at this time and place case number
7	07-1224-GA-EXM, which is captioned "In the Matter
8	of the Application of The East Ohio Gas Company
9	d/b/a Dominion East Ohio for Approval of a
10	General Exemption of Certain Natural Gas
11	Commodity Sales Services or Ancillary Services."
12	My name is Chris Pirik. I am an attorney
13	examiner and deputy director in the Commission's
14	Legal Department, and I have been assigned to
15	hear this case. In addition, there are
16	Commission personnel representing our service
17	monitoring and enforcement department, Kelly
18	Tucker and Cindi Mack. They are these staff
19	members are here. If anyone wishes to testify,
20	please see them. They are providing the names of
21	individuals that are interested in participating
22	in the hearing today.
23	Also, my understanding is that the company,
24	Dominion, has personnel here from their offices.
25	If you have specific questions that we won't be

- 1 addressing in this hearing, I am sure they will
- 2 be happy to speak with you about those issues.
- 3 At this time, I would like to take
- 4 appearances on behalf of the parties. On behalf
- 5 of Dominion?
- 6 MR. CAMPBELL: Andrew Campbell,
- 7 with the law firm of Jones Day for Dominion East
- 8 Ohio.
- 9 MS. PIRIK: Could you give
- 10 your address, also, for Jones Day?
- 11 MR. CAMPBELL: It is 325 John H.
- 12 McConnell Boulevard, Suite 600, Columbus, Ohio,
- 13 43215.
- 14 MS. PIRIK: Thank you. On
- 15 behalf of the office of Consumers' Counsel?
- 16 MR. SERIO: Thank you, Your
- 17 Honor. On behalf of the residential utility
- 18 customers of East Ohio Gas, Janine L. Midgen-
- 19 Ostrander, by Joseph P. Serio, 10 West Broad
- 20 Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215.
- 21 MS. PIRIK: Thank you. There
- 22 are other interveners that have entered into this
- 23 case, and I would just state them for the
- 24 record: The Ohio Partners for Affordable Energy,
- 25 Integrys Energy Services, Industrial Energy Users

- of Ohio, Dominion Retail, MXenergy, Northeast
- 2 Ohio Public Energy Counsel, National Energy
- 3 Marketers and the Ohio Gas Marketers Group. Each
- 4 of these parties represent various constituencies
- 5 in this case before the Commission.
- 6 Dominion filed this case on December 28,
- 7 2007. The local hearing scheduled in this case
- is only one aspect of the Commission's review and
- 9 process in this case. Interested persons could
- 10 have submitted comments in this docket by
- 11 February 11, 2008, and there are also
- 12 evidentiary -- there is also an evidentiary
- 13 hearing scheduled to commence on April 7th. We
- 14 do have two additional local hearings, one in
- 15 Cleveland and one in Canton on April 3rd.
- The purpose of this public hearing today is
- 17 to receive comments from the public concerning
- 18 the application that is presented before us
- 19 today. As you may have noticed, we have a court
- 20 reporter who is present. I am probably speaking
- 21 too fast for her, but she is very professional.
- 22 She will be writing down everything that is said
- 23 at this hearing today. And then I will be taking
- 24 that back to the office, that information, and
- 25 that will be considered part of the record in the

- 1 Commission's consideration of this case.
- When you arrived, you were offered the
- 3 opportunity to testify. It is fine if you have
- 4 not signed up. I will ask for anyone from the
- 5 audience, if they would like to testify. So you
- 6 can either go see the two ladies at the door, or
- you will have your opportunity if you wish to
- 8 testify.
- 9 However, prior to receiving the public
- 10 testimony, I would like to call upon someone from
- 11 Dominion to give us a short summary of exactly
- 12 what this application is about. I would note
- 13 that Dominion does have a pending rate case
- 14 before the Commission, case number 07-829-GA-AIR,
- 15 and there are other case numbers. That is the
- 16 primary rate case number. That is not the case
- 17 that is before us today. And someone from the
- 18 company will explain to us exactly what this case
- 19 before us today is about. And then I will open
- 20 it up to the public testimony at that point in
- 21 time.
- Mr. Campbell, do you have someone here who
- 23 you would like to present as giving a summary?
- MR. CAMPBELL: Yes, Your Honor.
- 25 Jeff Murphy.

- 1 MS. PIRIK: Mr. Murphy, if you
- 2 could just step up to the microphone. State your
- 3 name and the spelling of your name for the
- 4 record, as well as your title and your business
- 5 location.
- 6 MR. MURPHY: Sure. My name is
- 7 Jeffrey A. Murphy. I am a director of rates and
- 8 gas supply for Dominion East Ohio. And my
- 9 business address is 1201 East 55th Street,
- 10 Cleveland, Ohio, 44103.
- 11 MS. PIRIK: You can turn --
- 12 yes, that is fine.
- MR. MURPHY: Well, back in
- 14 August of 2006, the Public Utilities Commission
- of Ohio approved a pilot program whereby Dominion
- 16 East Ohio would change the way we buy natural gas
- for those customers that still purchase gas from
- 18 us.
- 19 Through our Energy Choice Program, customers
- are given the opportunity to purchase their
- 21 natural gas from either East Ohio or one of the
- 22 sub-suppliers -- actually at this point now we
- 23 have 18 suppliers who will provide commodity
- 24 services to them at their own rates and terms and
- 25 conditions.

- 1 The new rate that we offer as a result of
- 2 this change and the way in which we purchase
- 3 natural gas is referred to as the Standard
- 4 Service Offer. And that Standard Service Offer
- 5 will replace the prior gas cost recovery rate
- 6 mechanism that we use to price our natural gas
- 7 for sale to customers.
- 8 Under the GCR mechanism, Dominion East Ohio
- 9 was not allowed by law to make a profit on the
- 10 natural gas portion of its bill. We recover our
- 11 costs and make a profit through what is called
- 12 the distribution rate, or the transportation rate
- 13 charged to the customers. But on the natural gas
- 14 commodity portion of the bill, once again, by
- 15 law, we were not able to make a profit on that
- 16 particular component, and the same held true that
- 17 went into the Standard Service Offer product, if
- 18 you will.
- The major reason we made that change was
- 20 because we have approximately two-thirds, about
- 21 800,000 out of our own two million customers
- 22 buying gas from other suppliers. We wanted to
- 23 make sure that we had a competitive marketplace
- 24 for our customers. And the intent of the SSO
- 25 rating was to have a rate that was more

- 1 reflective of the market conditions.
- Well, the Public Utility Commission approved
- 3 that pilot program through August of this coming
- 4 year, 2008. And, therefore, East Ohio had to
- 5 provide information, make an application on what
- 6 would happen after August of 2008. So we -- in
- 7 this particular application, we propose several
- 8 changes.
- First of all, if a customer is unable to
- 10 participate in the Energy Choice Program because
- of other reasons or, perhaps, because they are in
- 12 a particular payment program, a Percentage of
- 13 Income Payment Program, we will continue to
- 14 purchase the gas in the same way we have
- 15 currently. In other words, we will conduct an
- 16 auction to establish the suppliers that we will
- 17 buy gas from and set a rate at the lowest
- 18 possible price.
- 19 However, for Choice-eligible customers who
- 20 today are purchasing their natural gas from East
- 21 Ohio, we would propose to continue buying the gas
- 22 but designate the specific supplier providing the
- 23 natural gas to the customers on their bill. So
- 24 whereas today, a supplier provides gas to us as a
- 25 part of a larger pool, if you will, of natural

- 1 gas supplies. In the future, we would identify
- 2 the specific supplier providing the gas to that
- 3 specific customer.
- 4 The proposed change would not have any
- 5 impact on existing Energy Choice customers or
- 6 customers that are purchasing natural gas as part
- 7 of a governmental aggregation program.
- 8 Our goal in the program is to allow
- 9 customers to buy gas from us, but to help them
- 10 understand that another supplier is actually
- 11 providing their natural gas. And it is our
- 12 belief that that will make a competitive market
- 13 today even more competitive, and prepare us for
- 14 the possibility that East Ohio may at one point
- 15 no longer sell natural gas.
- Our primary goal in the business, as it
- were, is to transport or distribute the natural
- 18 gas through our pipelines. There are many other
- 19 parties that can provide natural gas. And if we
- 20 ultimately do not sell gas, customers would
- 21 simply buy it from other suppliers.
- However, before East Ohio does anything
- 23 whatsoever, the Public Utility Commission will
- 24 have to approve this application or some other
- 25 type of approach. And even with the proposed

- 1 change, the company will still handle emergency
- 2 calls plus other customer service calls just as
- 3 it has before.
- We are discussing with other parties,
- 5 including the Consumer Advocates' office, as well
- 6 as the Public Utility Commission staff, ways in
- 7 which we might be able to make this change so as
- 8 to provide a smoother transition for customers
- 9 potentially beyond August of 2008.
- And so as a result, the final program to be
- 11 approved by the Commission may be somewhat
- 12 different from the application that we filed. So
- 13 that is a short description of what we have
- 14 proposed and the timing in which it might be
- 15 implemented.
- 16 MS. PIRIK: Thank you, Mr.
- 17 Murphy. At this time, I will begin calling
- 18 witnesses. So far we have one individual who has
- 19 signed up to testify. But like I said, I will
- 20 give everyone the opportunity if they wish to
- 21 testify. I apologize upfront for the mis-
- 22 pronunciation of any names. My name is a very
- 23 difficult name to pronounce. But I also wanted
- 24 to state that what I will ask you to do is state
- 25 your name and the spelling of your name and your

- 1 address for the record. And then I will ask
- 2 witnesses to take an oath on the record as to the
- 3 truth of the statement. That is a normal process
- 4 that we do in these types of hearings.
- 5 Should you decide not to testify and I call
- 6 your name, that is not a problem. You can just
- 7 pass and we will move on with the hearing. We do
- 8 appreciate your attendance at today's hearing and
- 9 your participation. And at this time, I will
- 10 begin calling witnesses.
- 11 The first individual that I have is John
- 12 Zordich. Mr. Zordich, just come on up to the
- 13 podium. And if you could state your name and the
- 14 spelling of your name and your address for the
- 15 record, that would be greatly appreciated.
- 16 MR. ZORDICH: My name is John
- 17 Zordich, Z-o-r-d-i-c-h, 236 East Judson Avenue,
- 18 Youngstown, Ohio, 44507-1936.
- 19 It is not included in the statement, but
- 20 contrary to what you said the hearing may be on,
- 21 distribution charges are not provided, but your
- 22 bill doesn't separate that out, either. When
- your bill comes due, everything that East Ohio
- 24 Gas does is on that one bill.
- We in Youngstown welcome the PUCO to the

- 1 Mahoning Valley of Youngstown, the place that
- 2 everyone but God has forgotten. Despite the
- 3 promises of former mayors like Vukovich, Ungaro,
- 4 McKelvey and present Mayor Williams -- and
- 5 presidents like Carter, Reagan, Bush I, Clinton
- 6 and Bush II -- nobody has stepped up to bring any
- 7 major manufacturing facility to our valley to
- 8 fill the void of Black Monday that cost us 50,000
- 9 jobs.
- 10 Bedpan and McBurger jobs haven't
- 11 accomplished much toward that end. As reported
- in The Tribune Chronicle, January of 2008 figures
- 13 for unemployment for the U.S. stands at 4.9
- 14 percent, Ohio is at 5.5 percent, starting to
- 15 incline. Warren is at 7.6 percent. And
- 16 Youngstown is at 8.3 percent. And we are still
- waiting for the fulfillment of campaign
- 18 promises.
- 19 I would extend a warm welcome to Dominion
- 20 East Ohio, but the reason we are here is because
- 21 they are playing the part of a very bad neighbor,
- 22 again, or as usual. Take your pick. But instead
- of borrowing tools never returned or loud music,
- 24 we're stuck with a company who not only wants to
- 25 keep us broke, but does not want to bear the

- 1 responsibility of providing gas. They want all
- 2 of our money for merely being a middleman. A
- 3 snippet in The Vindicator on March 5th advised us
- 4 that Dominion East Ohio was raising the price of
- 5 gas by 10 percent. But the article only mentions
- 6 the price differences of 15 percent and 16
- 7 percent. Do we really expect their numbers to
- 8 jive?
- 9 Like First Energy or Ohio Edison or whatever
- 10 pseudonym they choose, Dominion East Ohio always
- 11 tried to place the burden of high costs of gas
- 12 usage on the backs of consumers. You must
- 13 conserve to save money. But let's take a look at
- 14 what -- excuse me -- at what conservation gets
- 15 you. These three graphs were made up in all
- 16 different formats, but they all present the same
- 17 thing. The usage line is almost flat. Every
- 18 chart you look at, the usage line is almost
- 19 flat. The usage line is almost flat regardless
- 20 of which chart you look at. But let's look at
- 21 the cost. Up, up, up -- oh, here is '91. It
- 22 went down. But mostly up. And it is the same.
- The point I am trying to prove is that
- 24 nothing will keep Dominion East Ohio from getting
- 25 a bill to you through rain or snow or gloom of

- 1 night to advise you that "You owe us money."
- 2 I guess their next option will be starting up a
- 3 finance company for third mortgages, or your
- 4 firstborn.
- 5 The fourth chart is a combination that shows
- 6 results and, if you will, a cause. The top part
- 7 of the chart shows when actual meter readings
- 8 were done and when the guesstimates were done.
- 9 2005, they did eight estimates for the year, but
- 10 only four remote readings. And you can see that
- 11 they are taking money without reading the
- 12 meters.
- 13 This bottom half of the chart shows
- 14 historical usage for 19 plus, give or take a few
- 15 thousand cubic feet. In 1980, I used 19.1 MCF.
- 16 It cost \$63.39. And yesterday, guess what? I
- 17 got a bill from Dominion for 19.2 cubic feet,
- one-tenth more. 63.39 and yesterday's bill,
- 19 \$208.40.
- If they can make their money without even
- 21 reading the meters, shame on you for allowing
- 22 them. How often does Wal-Mart or K-Mart or
- 23 JCPenney send out bills to consumers for
- 24 something that they may have bought in 2000 but
- 25 hadn't been back to the store since? That is

- what they do by not reading the meters.
- Now I can show you some differences because
- 3 I have saved my gas bills -- 1977. I can show
- 4 you usages and costs since 1977. And these
- 5 numbers, I am not pulling them out of my head.
- 6 The East Ohio bill itself, I contacted the
- 7 Ohio Consumer Counsel in February of 2001 and
- 8 received their reply from an investigator named
- 9 Barbara Mullins. And she was gracious enough to
- 10 provide me with a copy of section 4901 of the
- 11 Ohio Revised Code. Because I couldn't make my
- 12 bill jive. Adding up all the elements that they
- provided on the bill, I was \$29.80 short. And
- 14 that is why I contacted the Ohio Consumer
- 15 Counsel. And they sent me -- they were nice
- 16 enough to send me a Customer Choice sheet. And I
- found some pretty interesting numbers. And that
- is why I made up this larger sheet to make it
- 19 easier for you to read it.
- The customer charge is included on a bill.
- 21 And the law says anything on gas consumption must
- 22 be included on a bill. But these things on the
- OCC rider, the PIPP, the Energy Choice migration
- 24 rider, the gross receipt tax rider, the current
- 25 gas cost and the GCR adjustments are not all

- 1 included on the bill. They are not itemized on
- 2 the bill. And they should be.
- I apologize. But, you know, pictures make
- 4 things a lot easier to understand. The
- 5 exorbitant cost of prescription drugs is forcing
- 6 some seniors on fixed incomes to choose between
- 7 food or medicine. Now Dominion and all the other
- 8 utilities are more than willing to make those
- 9 same seniors decide whether or not these
- 10 prescription drugs or food will be pried from
- 11 their cold, dead hands.
- 12 It would have been nice, in some respects,
- 13 to remain the unforgotten valley. But the forces
- 14 of charge, charge, which are unpopularly
- 15 known as Dominion East Ohio, First Energy/Ohio
- 16 Edison, Youngstown Water Department and AT&T know
- 17 where we all live. And much like the begging
- 18 letters from different charities that we get in
- 19 the mail asking for money, when you do send in
- 20 money, you get an immediate reply. "Thanks.
- 21 Send more. And more. " Each charity
- 22 feels that their entity is the most important
- 23 entity in the universe. And so it is with the
- 24 monopolistic utilities that I just named before.
- These icons provide a true representation of

- 1 the dilemma that Ohio consumers face in dealing
- 2 with the monopoly of utility companies. Now,
- 3 these are -- these are my interpretations. This
- 4 is the utility companies. And these are the
- 5 consumers. (Indicating.)
- 6 And that analogy is not intended to offend
- 7 the PUCO representative, but is a result of the
- 8 Ohio Edison hearings held in Austintown. Several
- 9 speakers questioned why real, live PUCO
- 10 commissioners didn't show up at rate hearings
- 11 anymore. To consumers like us, it is a lot like
- 12 the curtains slowly parting on a stage for a
- 13 ventriloquist act, and the only thing on stage
- 14 is the dummy sitting in a chair with the
- 15 ventriloquist nowhere to be found. No offense,
- 16 ma'am. Because the commissioners have neither
- 17 the testosterone nor the estrogen to face the
- 18 consumers of Ohio on prior energy decisions they
- 19 have made. That is the commissioners.
- If they are going to operate their company
- 21 like the postal service -- I just got my magazine
- from the postal service. The Board of Governors
- 23 and the Postal Rate Commission are the two groups
- 24 that govern the cost of postage. As we all
- 25 heard, it is going up in May. The Board of

- 1 Governors grants a negotiated service agreement,
- 2 NSA, with The Bank of America for special rates
- 3 on some mailings. But the PRC concludes that the
- 4 postal service could lose \$45 million if the NSA
- 5 is implemented. But then the PRC justifies the
- 6 agreement to lose the money -- is justified under
- 7 the Postal Accountability and Enhancement Act.
- 8 The law says they can do it, so let them do it.
- 9 The postal service, as I said, has already
- 10 announced the need to raise rates. East Ohio
- 11 wants to get out of buying gas.
- 12 Mark Twain painted for us a vivid picture of
- 13 the world to come when he wrote the "Fence"
- 14 portion of "Huckleberry Finn" in the 1800s. Ol'
- 15 Mark gave us the USPS/Dominion East Ohio
- 16 connection.
- 17 The postal service has advised that the
- 18 American Postal Workers' Union that -- it intends
- 19 to issue a request for proposals that could lead
- 20 to the outsourcing of some bulk mail centers.
- 21 They will be called "BMC."
- 22 And guess why we are here this evening?
- 23 Dominion East Ohio has filed to outsource the
- 24 providing of gas to Ohio consumers. And it is my
- 25 belief that all the companies that would provide

- 1 gas to Ohio consumers would pay a fee or stipend
- 2 to Dominion East Ohio for the privilege of doing
- 3 so -- my belief -- much like Huck conned the kid
- 4 into whitewashing the fence so that he could reap
- 5 the benefits. Does it sound familiar? They are
- 6 going to be making a whole batch of money just by
- 7 sitting back and letting somebody else do the
- 8 work.
- 9 If Dominion East Ohio wants to get out of
- 10 providing gas, I say we let them. The State of
- 11 Ohio should then confiscate all their equipment
- 12 and property because they are not able to perform
- 13 the functions of a monopoly utility, and put said
- 14 equipment and property up for public sale to an
- 15 entity willing and able to provide all the gas
- 16 utility services such a utility should and must
- 17 provide to the consumers of Ohio. The new entity
- 18 would keep the present workforce minus all the
- 19 management personnel who all would be given a
- 20 golden parachute of a buck and a quarter.
- 21 As ol' Pogo would say, "Woe is us! This
- 22 rate increase must not be granted." Thank you.
- 23 MS. PIRIK: Thank you, Mr.
- 24 Zordich. Just so I am clear, I am going to -- I
- 25 have numbered the pages of -- the items that you

- 1 have given me, and I am going to mark them as Mr.
- 2 Zordich's statement for the record, so we will
- 3 have that marked as such. But did you at all
- 4 refer to the very last two pages of this? I just
- 5 want to be sure, if you did, that we put this in
- 6 also.
- 7 MR. ZORDICH: Well, I did in a
- 8 roundabout way.
- 9 MS. PIRIK: Okay. Then I will
- 10 number it.
- 11 MR. ZORDICH: That is to show
- 12 you the gas usage of the 19 plus MCF where it
- 13 goes from \$63 to the present bill -- yesterday's
- 14 bill of \$208.
- 15 MS. PIRIK: Okay.
- 16 MR. ZORDICH: For the standard
- 17 usage.
- 18 MS. PIRIK: Again, I will go
- 19 ahead and mark these. Now, at this time, Mr.
- 20 Zordich, if either the company or the office of
- 21 Consumers' Counsel wishes to ask you questions,
- 22 they can do so. Mr. Campbell, do you wish to ask
- 23 Mr. Zordich questions?
- MR. CAMPBELL: We have no
- 25 questions.

1 MS. PIRIK: Mr. Serio?

2 MR. SERIO: No questions, Your

3 Honor.

4 MS. PIRIK: Thank you very

5 much for testifying this evening. This

6 information -- like I said, I will mark it as

7 part of your statement. And that way the record

8 will reflect exactly what you are referring to.

9 Again, I would like to mention that perhaps

10 within the month the Commission will be issuing

11 an entry in the rate case hearing, and you may

12 want to look for that, also. Because some of

13 your statements may be relevant to that.

14 MR. ZORDICH: Okay. That is why

15 earlier I said everything is intertwined. There

16 is no such thing as separation.

17 MS. PIRIK: Right. I just

18 wanted to be sure. I know you know that. And

19 you are very informed. But the information that

you are providing in this docket will not

21 transfer over into the rate case docket. And we

22 will probably be up here in the next month or so

23 having a hearing on the rate case. So I just

24 wanted to be sure that that was clear on the

25 record. Thank you very much.

MR. ZORDICH: Thank you.
MS. PIRIK: All right. Is
there anyone else who would like to testify this
evening with regard to the matter before us?
Okay. If there are no more witnesses, Mr.
Campbell or Mr. Serio, do either of you have
anything for the record?
MR. SERIO: No, Your Honor.
MR. CAMPBELL: No, Your Honor.
MS. PIRIK: Okay. We will
continue this hearing on Thursday in Cleveland
and Canton. But we will close this hearing for
this evening. Thank you all for coming. Again,
if you have questions this is off the record.
(Thereupon, the meeting was
concluded at 6:40 p.m.)





NSA Approved - PRC Says It Could Cost USPS Millions

The USPS Board of Governors approved a Negotiated Service Agreement (NSA) on Dec. 11 that had been sharply criticized by the Rostal Regulatory Commission (PRC).

In a ruling issued Oct. 19, 2007, the rate commission concluded that the Postal Service could lose more than \$45 million if the proposed agreement with Bank of America were implemented. Despite the potential losses, the PRC decided that the proposal could be justified under the Postal Accountability and Enhancement Act.

The APWU had opposed the NSA, arguing in proceedings before the commission that USPS predictions of savings were based on obsolete data. The agreement would compare current "read and acceptance rates" for Bank of America mail to the average read-and-acceptance rates throughout the USPS in 1999, and reward the bank of America for exceeding those rates, the union noted.

The union contended that the 1999 figures could not provide a valid baseline for the NSA because read-and-acceptance rates have improved significantly since then.

Although the commission did not reject the NSA as the APWU requested, its criticism of the agreement echoed

arguments and analysis made by the union.

In its ruling, the PRC strongly cautioned the USPS board: "(S)everal significant financial concerns related to this Agreement have come to light. This independent evaluation should be used by the Governors to inform their decision on whether or not to proceed."

The Postal Service had estimated that the NSA with Bank of America would produce a cost savings of \$5.5 million. But in a dissenting opinion in the PRC review, Vice Chairman Dawn Tisdale wrote, "It is too certain that the Postal Service will lose money, and certain that the losses will be too substantial, between \$25 million and \$45 million, for me to recommend this agreement."


The PRC also noted that if the NSA proves profitable, other mallers may be required to adopt similar malling practices without receiving similar incentives.

Negotiated Service Agreements are special rate and service arrangements between the USPS and a maller. The USPS-Bank of America proposal was the first NSA considered by the PRC since the Postal Accountability and Enhancement Act became law on Dec. 20, 2006.

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




