1	Tuesday Afternoon Session,
2	August 5, 2008.
3	
4	EXAMINER FARKAS: I'd like to start the
5	hearing since it's 1:30.
6	The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio
7	is assigned for public hearing at this time and
8	place, case numbers 07-829-GA-AIR, 07-830-GA-ALT,
9	07-831-GA-AAM, 08-169-GA-ALT, and 06-1453-GA-UNC
10	which are captioned: In the Matter of Application of
11	the East Ohio Gas Company d/b/a Dominion East Ohio
12	for authority to increase rates for its gas
13	distribution service and other related matters.
14	My name is Scott Farkas. I'm an Attorney
15	Examiner with the Commission's legal department and
16	will be conducting this hearing.
17	At this time, I'd like to announce that
18	there are commission personnel representing our
19	service and monitoring enforcement division. They

- 20 are out at the table, out in the front, Tammy
- 21 Mitchell and Andrea Smith, and these PUCO staff
- 22 members are available if you have a question
- 23 concerning a utility matter other than the
- 24 applications which are the focus of today's hearing.

- 1 I'd like to take appearances on behalf of
- 2 the parties now. On behalf of the Company.
- 3 MR. CAMPBELL: Thank you, Your Honor
- 4 Andrew Campbell on behalf of Dominion East Ohio with
- 5 the law firm Jones Day.
- 6 EXAMINER FARKAS: Okay. On behalf of
- 7 OCC.
- 8 MR. REESE: Yes. Thank you, Your Honor.
- 9 On behalf of the residential rate payers, Dominion
- 10 East Ohio, and the Ohio Consumers' Council, Janine L.
- 11 Migden-Ostrander, I'm Assistant Consumers Counsel,
- 12 Rick Reese.
- 13 EXAMINER FARKAS: Okay. Thank you. And
- 14 there are other parties in this case that aren't here
- 15 today, including the Ohio Partners for Affordable
- 16 Energy, The Neighborhood Environmental Coalition,
- 17 Interstate Gas Supply, Integris Energy Services,
- 18 Inc., Dominion Retail, Inc., Stand Energy
- 19 Corporation, the Utility Workers Union of America,

- 20 the Ohio Oil and Gas Association, the City of
- 21 Cleveland.
- Dominion filed the rate case proceedings
- 23 application on August 30, 2007.
- 24 The local public hearings scheduled in

- 1 this case are only one aspect of the process in this
- 2 case. We have had public hearings in Youngstown,
- 3 Lima, Cleveland, Geneva, Akron, Canton, today,
- 4 Marietta.
- We're also going to have additional
- 6 hearings in Cleveland, Youngstown, and Akron.
- 7 There is a court reporter present who is
- 8 sitting to my left. She will be recording in
- 9 typewritten fashion the statements made under oath
- 10 today.
- 11 When you arrived, you were offered the
- 12 opportunity to sign up to testify. If you missed
- 13 that opportunity, you may still add your name to the
- 14 list at the -- in the front as you walk in.
- 15 At this time, I'll begin calling
- 16 witnesses forward who wish to give statements for the
- 17 record.
- 18 Before you begin your statement, I'll ask
- 19 for your name, and address, and your testimony will

- 20 be considered part of the official record of this
- 21 case to be reviewed by the Commissioners before they
- 22 make their final decision.
- Before presenting sworn testimony, I will
- 24 swear you in, swear or affirm, that the testimony you

- 1 give will be the truth, and attorneys for the company
- 2 and/or OCC or myself will ask you questions if they
- 3 want to.
- 4 Should you decide you do not want to
- 5 testify when I call your name, you are perfectly
- 6 within your decision not to testify. You can simply
- 7 pass to the next witness.
- 8 Once you finish testifying, if you're
- 9 just in attendance to observe the hearing, you may
- 10 leave at any time you wish.
- 11 And since today's hearing is being
- 12 transcribed, I'd ask that if you plan to testify,
- 13 please speak plainly and clearly so that the court
- 14 reporter can accurately reflect your comments on the
- 15 record; and if you have a prepared written statement,
- 16 it would be helpful for you to provide a copy to the
- 17 court reporter.
- So I appreciate your participation in
- 19 today's hearing, and I want everybody who wishes to

- 20 make a public statement to be able to do so.
- 21 So at this time I'll begin calling
- 22 witnesses forward, and I'd ask that just if you would
- 23 come up to the podium here and give your testimony
- 24 from there.

1	The first person I have is Mary Jane
2	Williams.
3	
4	MARY ANNE WILLIAMS
5	presented herself as a public witness, and being
6	first duly sworn, testified as follows:
7	DIRECT TESTIMONY
8	EXAMINER FARKAS: Please state your name
9	and address.
10	MS. WILLIAMS: It's Mary Anne Williams.
11	My address is 221 Smith Drive, Marietta, Ohio 45750.
12	EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you.
13	MS. WILLIAMS: You're welcome. Good
14	afternoon. My name is Mary Ann Williams, and I
15	appreciate the opportunity to speak in opposition to
16	the proposed Dominion East Ohio gas rate hike.
17	The Office of Ohio Consumers' Counsel has
18	done an excellent job in laying out many of the
19	reasons to oppose this increase.

- As a private citizen and a candidate for
- 21 public office, I would like to focus on the impact of
- 22 this proposed increase on the citizens of Washington
- 23 County, many of whom are on fixed income, a low
- 24 income, or unemployed.

1	Many of our individuals and families are
2	being stretched to the breaking point. Gasoline
3	price increases have resulted in higher costs for
4	almost everything. The price of our most basic
5	necessity food has skyrocketed. The clothing
6	that we need costs more. The costs of medication
7	have gone up. The cost of back to school supplies
8	has gone up.
9	Many of our citizens today are already
10	being forced to choose between food or medication or
11	gas to drive to work.
12	Many of our citizens are already at their
13	breaking point, and now we hear that our electric
14	company wants to increase its rates too.
15	I believe that if this proposed rate hike
16	by Dominion is allowed to go through, many of our
17	citizens will be very cold this winter, or worse yet,
18	they could lose their homes due to fires caused by
19	make-shift heating.

- Every day we hear on the news what we
- 21 need to cut -- that we need to cut back and become
- 22 more efficient with our resources. My question to
- 23 Dominion East Ohio is "What are you doing to cut back
- 24 to become more efficient?"

1	This proposed rate increase comes at an
2	unreasonable time. There are some who might not
3	understand how, for many of us, every single dollar
4	must be stretched for life's necessaries such as
5	food, clothing, medicines and shelter.
6	I oppose this proposed rate increase. It
7	is unfair, ill timed, and piles on additional costs
8	to consumers at a time when we are all trying to find
9	ways to conserve and cut back.
10	I urge Dominion and the Public Utilities
11	Commission to oppose this rate hike.
12	I also want to add to what I did not have
13	prepared here that as I look around here today, I
14	don't see very many people here. And I was sitting
15	here thinking it is especially our elderly people who
16	would be affected the most by this rate hike, and I
17	wonder if maybe a better location for this hearing
18	would maybe have been, like, the O'Neil Senior Center
19	which has wonderful facilities and would have been

- 20 able to accommodate many of our elderly people. This
- 21 is a wonderful place right here, a perfect place for
- 22 something like this, but I wonder if maybe another
- 23 location would have been more accessible to the
- 24 people who are really being affected by this rate

1	increase. Thank you.
2	EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you. Jack Brown.
3	
4	JACK BROWN
5	presented himself as a public witness, and being
6	first duly sworn, testified as follows:
7	DIRECT TESTIMONY
8	EXAMINER FARKAS: Please state your name
9	and address.
10	MR. BROWN: Jack L. Brown, 357 Briggs
11	Hill Road, Belpre, Ohio 45714.
12	EXAMINER FARKAS: Okay.
13	MR. BROWN: I'd like to thank you very
14	much for the opportunity to make this statement which
15	will be short.
16	The lady in front of me here is one
17	that's covered most questions that so many people in
18	my position in our county face. Myself, I'm 82 years
10	old I'm on a fixed income and I have hills like

- 20 everybody else. I believe in companies making fair
- 21 profits on their products.
- The thing that I can't quite understand
- 23 is the fact that should I want to do something in my
- 24 house, my farm, and so on, I have to take the money

1	that I have saved through my pension and what I have
2	worked and saved for over the years and for I'm
3	sure that this company does similar things, but
4	and they should make a fair profit, but my one
5	question is this, after this is all over, over this
6	period of time with all the excess fees that we are
7	going to have, are any of them, after the
8	infrastructure is finished, are we going to get any
9	reduction from these fees or are they going to be an
10	add-on to the gas or our services we have at that
11	time.
12	Thank you very much. That's about all I
13	have to say.
14	EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you. David
15	Brightbill.
16	
17	DAVID BRIGHTBILL
18	presented himself as a public witness, and being

19 first duly sworn, testified as follows:

- 20 DIRECT TESTIMONY
- 21 MR. SPEAKER: State your name and
- 22 address.
- 23 MR. BRIGHTBILL: David E. Brightbill. My
- 24 home address is 347 Main Street, Lower Salem, Ohio.

- 1 EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you. 2 MR. BRIGHTBILL: My name is David Brightbill. I'm the Executive Director of Washington-Morgan Counties Community Action. For those of you that don't know, we're a two-county agency serving low income families in a whole variety of ways. My testimony today will be brief. I'm 8 here to express concern over Dominion East Ohio's proposed rate increase. I support the position of Ohio Consumers' Counsel particularly on the area of 11 the flat rate customer charge. It negatively impacts consumers who try to conserve, and subsidizes people 14 who are high users. 15 Once -- with that fixed rate, no matter what I use, as I lower my usage, the percentage that
- The more I use, the less a percentage of

I have to pay of my bill, that fixed rate impacts

18 negatively.

- 20 my total bill that is, and I think in today's era of
- 21 conservation, that's exactly the opposite direction.
- 22 You should be encouraging people to conserve not
- 23 discouraging them.
- I certainly see this working against the

- 1 families that we serve as mentioned before me. These
- 2 are people that are struggling to pay their bills
- 3 now. This increase just adds to the difficulty of
- 4 doing that.
- 5 So hopefully the Commission will reject
- 6 their staff's position on this issue and maintain the
- 7 base rate that is currently in regulation.
- We also agree with the Consumers' Counsel
- 9 that Dominion East Ohio should increase a proposed
- 10 investment in energy efficiency.
- 11 Specifically we encourage an increase in
- 12 Housewarming which is the weatherization effort
- 13 funded by Dominion rate payers to at least 9.5
- 14 million.
- 15 Housewarming is a comprehensive approach
- 16 to reducing energy use particularly for low income,
- 17 low and moderate income families, and, as we all
- 18 know, conservation is the best way and the least
- 19 expensive way to reduce our use and dependence on

- 20 natural gas.
- Our agency is a provider of Warm Choice
- 22 Services, and there are certainly more people
- 23 interested in this service and interested in having
- 24 their houses either weatherized or an inefficient

1	furnace replaced by an efficient furnace, than there
2	are funds available to do that.
3	I appreciate the opportunity to speak
4	today, and thank you very much. I can answer any
5	questions if there are any.
6	EXAMINER FARKAS: Any questions.
7	Kara Wright.
8	
9	KARA WRIGHT
10	presented herself as a public witness, and being
11	first duly sworn, testified as follows:
12	DIRECT TESTIMONY
13	EXAMINER FARKAS: State your name and
14	address please.
15	MS. WRIGHT: Kara Wright. Actually I'm
16	going to give you my work address. P.O. Box 370,
17	Reno, Ohio 45773.
18	I'm here on behalf of the Area Agency on
19	Aging which runs the Passport program. On behalf of

- 20 more than 750 in-home passport consumers across an
- 21 eight-county region that we cover, the Area Agency on
- 22 Aging is very concerned with the proposed dramatic
- 23 increase of flat rate consumer charge. Our consumers
- 24 are already at risk and frail and live on very fixed

1 incomes. 2 Such a change in the rate structure would also negatively impact consumers who attempt to conserve energy, and ultimately result in low-use consumers subsidizing high-use consumers. 6 In addition, adding more Dominion's cost into a fixed consumer charge limits the ability for a consumer to control their monthly bills by being more energy efficient. 10 With consumers' budgets stretched thin, and a higher flat-rate customer charge, means consumers would at least pay \$17 per month regardless of how much gas they use. 13 14 Ohio Passport consumers on average statewide are 76 years of age. The majority of them are on food stamps or HEAP. 16 17 Last year HEAP served a record number, and the Ohio Department of Development has already

projected short falls for this coming year's budget.

- 20 In 2007, over 400,000 households were
- 21 supported by HEAP funds and most of the funds were
- 22 gone by December. 60,000 households also were on the
- 23 PIP program, and these are the concerns that we have
- 24 at the Area Agency on Aging for the consumers that we

1	have. Thank you.
2	EXAMINER FARKAS: Gretchen Otto.
3	
4	GRETCHEN OTTO
5	presented herself as a public witness, and being
6	first duly sworn, testified as follows:
7	DIRECT TESTIMONY
8	MR. SPEAKER: State your name and
9	address.
10	MS. OTTO: My name is Gretchen Otto. I
11	live at 627 Fourth Street here in Marietta. I notice
12	everybody had a prepared statement, and I don't
13	prepare statements.
14	It's been a long time since I have talked
15	in front of any group in a microphone. I think now
16	that all Marietta Times subscribers know that
17	Gretchen Otto turned 70.
18	I want to represent myself personally. I
10	find these prepared statements excellent because the

- 20 are dealing with facts, and they are dealing with
- 21 issues, and I would like to get even more personal
- 22 and represent all the people in the room who are not
- 23 here, all the empty seats in the room. God, I just
- 24 love a microphone.

1	I had a very successful professional
2	career. I'll need about 12 minutes. I had a very
3	successful professional career. Born and raised
4	or born and reared in Marietta.
5	My career was on the east coast in a
6	private psychiatric hospital mental health
7	services.
8	I was a rehabilitation and guidance
9	counselor, and, after burnout, once every 13 years,
10	though I loved my career, I thought I needed to do
11	something different.
12	So assessing my skills, I decided to go
13	to the other side of people's needs and become a
14	concierge for Marriott Corporation.
15	I worked at three different Marriotts,
16	and to work with people falling through the cracks in
17	private psychiatric or in state mental hospitals, and
18	then who are needy, and it is much easier today

19 than it was in the '50s or '60s for them to come in

- 20 and ask for and receive treatment. Then to move to
- 21 the hospitality field where, I suppose you could say,
- the guests are also needy, they are also demanding,
- 23 and it is a totally different side of the coin.
- To work with those who run the risk, if

- 1 we don't correctly diagnose and don't correctly
- 2 treat, and don't correctly verify our treatment, they
- 3 run the risk of falling between the cracks. To those
- 4 who check into hotels, Marriotts, Sheratons,
- 5 Renaissance, and they don't fall between the cracks
- 6 because the cracks for business managers from all
- 7 over the country who come to these hotels for
- 8 industrial parks and live in other cities, they
- 9 simply -- the cracks close for them, or they simply
- 10 step over them.
- Now, the reason I mentioned this is
- 12 because I wanted you to know a little bit about my
- 13 background. I never thought with the successful
- 14 career that I had for 30 years with hospitals, almost
- 15 ten years in the hospitality field, I never thought
- 16 that I would run the risk of falling between the
- 17 cracks. I just -- it isn't that I didn't think it
- 18 could happen. I didn't think I could let it happen.
- 19 But now I find myself -- I returned to

- 20 Marietta in 2002. I find myself retired, and that
- 21 was fun for a long time. I miss my work, but I found
- 22 myself retired and that has been a new challenge for
- 23 me.
- 24 But I also find myself struggling and

- 1 struggling hard for the first time. I think the last
- 2 time I really struggled was in the 1970s when I got
- 3 in line and was maybe 85th in line of people buying
- 4 gasoline, and you got up at 4:00 A.M. to do that, and
- 5 then you got your tank of gasoline, you know, if you
- 6 could stay awake long enough in that line to move
- 7 your car forward, then you go home and go to bed,
- 8 set the alarm so you can get up and go to work.
- 9 That was the last time that I really remember a
- 10 struggle.
- I didn't live lavishly, and I don't live
- 12 lavishly now. I live comfortably. In fact, my
- 13 sister, Mimi, who lives in Florida wants me to move
- 14 down there to live with her and that we might pool
- 15 expenses.
- Well, personally in our family that
- 17 wouldn't work because all four of us children, each
- 18 of us wanted to be the boss one day. So we went out
- 19 into the world as leaders, but now to come back

- 20 together and live with family where everybody wants
- 21 to be the boss, I don't think that's going to work.
- I live in four rooms in a house on Fourth
- 23 Street, and these rooms are like 15 by 20. They are
- 24 adequate size rooms, but let me tell you what has

1	happened.

- 2 The one thing the newspaper didn't
- 3 mention was when I said I have to rethink my
- 4 priorities, I have to reorder my priorities at this
- 5 age.
- 6 Is it time for me to go and see J.C.
- 7 Estates, tour J.C. Estates? Is it time for me to
- 8 look into Norwood Green that is being built out on
- 9 Colgate? I don't know yet. I think this meeting and
- 10 this year will help decide that for me, but what the
- 11 paper didn't say, I'm paying close to \$300 a month
- 12 for gas.
- I drive a '91 Mercury Marquis. I haven't
- 14 even figured out how much gas that uses. I'm sure
- 15 it's not a gas economy car by a long shot. It's more
- 16 like a love boat. It's big and it's old.
- 17 My furnace was a clunker, and that might
- 18 account for a good bit why I'm paying \$300 a month
- 19 for gas.

- But on the other hand, the landlord at
- 21 the end of the winter replaced it because when I
- 22 smelled gas, and the gas company came, they said,
- 23 well we tagged this a year ago. Who took the tag
- 24 off?

1	Well, there is an electric company here
2	in town that took the tag off. I didn't know what
3	the tag was about. He really didn't explain it to
4	me. I read the large print. I didn't have my
5	glasses on, and I Xeroxed both sides and gave it to
6	my landlord. This year, not only would they not turn
7	the gas on, they red tagged it again.
8	Now, I just explained to you that I
9	thought I did very well with my career, and I thought
10	that I was living comfortably, and I thought that
11	things were going to go along smoothly in my
12	retirement, but all these empty seats, a lot of these
13	people who are not here today, if I'm not living
14	comfortably, then what is someone who has an income
15	of 50 percent of what I have?
16	I have Social Security. I have
17	retirement. I have some savings left. I don't live
18	in the areas where you would say these are the
19	streets, and these are the places and the parks in

- 20 the county in Marietta where people are not living
- 21 comfortably where people speak up, but it's in the
- 22 line at the supermarket to the person behind them
- 23 where they speak up to their neighbors. It's not
- 24 always comfortable for people with lesser education

- 1 to speak up and share their personal struggles in a
- 2 nonemotional way.
- 3 And I think that they are -- we -- now
- 4 I'm a part of them -- are sometimes intimidated by
- 5 people who address the issues in the sophisticated
- 6 auditorium. This is a very sophisticated auditorium.
- 7 I see many, many people in suits. I see many well
- 8 dressed people. I think we all are well dressed, but
- 9 we all our uncomfortable, and we could become even
- 10 more uncomfortable. My sister tells me I live in
- 11 genteel poverty, and I say there is a book title
- 12 there.
- Now, I'm going to get even more personal.
- 14 The truth of the matter is that at the end of winter,
- 15 they were not allowed to relight my furnace.
- The risk of carbon monoxide became
- 17 increasingly great. The landlord put in a new
- 18 furnace, and I thought, well, this is really going to
- 19 make a big difference in my life, and it has. But

- 20 owing \$300 a month and not being able to afford \$300
- 21 a month because of all the other expenses that are
- 22 arising, my gas bill began to accumulate into an
- 23 IOU.
- Now, I've talked with Dominion on the

- 1 telephone, and they never hang up on you, and they
- 2 are trained not to hang up on you. I'm sure every
- 3 other gas company is trained to be cordial and polite
- 4 to the consumer.
- 5 But I find them detached. It's not the
- 6 job of the person on the phone to correct your
- 7 problems or even address them. There are other
- 8 offices and avenues for that. So I would imagine
- 9 that their job is becoming increasingly tough too.
- 10 My gas was shut off the first week of June.
- Now, having been a concierge for
- 12 Marriott -- for those of you who may not know what a
- 13 concierge is, a concierge makes magic for the guest.
- 14 If the guest has just won a -- some kind of a boat or
- 15 something, while they are in Baltimore, Maryland, and
- 16 they have won one of these wind sailing things, which
- 17 a young married couple won, and then came to me
- 18 because it was 20-foot long.
- 19 It was in their hotel room, ran from the

- 20 door to the air conditioner on the opposite wall.
- 21 They were not water people, and they didn't know what
- 22 to do with this thing.
- So they came to see if I could help them
- 24 with that. They had been offered 450 at the

- 1 nightclub where one of them won the limbo contest,
- 2 but here they had this 20-foot thing, this monster in
- 3 their room.
- Well, I happen to know a few people, and
- 5 the few people knew more people, and they had an
- 6 avenue for me to pursue, and within ten hours, I had
- 7 their wind surfing rig sold to a former lifeguard
- 8 that I had hired at the hospital who was into that
- 9 kind of equipment, and for \$750 they went away in
- 10 their little Renault. Could you imagine that tied on
- 11 top of a Renault. They went away very happy.
- 12 At the nightclub they had been offered
- 13 \$400. So this is what a concierge does. Makes
- 14 magic.
- Now, I can't make magic for myself, and I
- 16 can't make magic for you, and I can't make magic for
- 17 all the empty seats in this room.
- So back to my gas being turned off the
- 19 first of June. I take that back. It was not the

- 20 first of June. That was not a lie. It was not the
- 21 first of June. Yes, it was.
- One of the things that I found having
- 23 been a concierge and being resourceful and having a
- 24 gas stove and oven is that if you heat hot water in

- 1 the coffee maker like you're going to make hot tea,
- 2 and if you use your crock pot, plug it in first thing
- 3 in the morning, go back to bed. Let the dog out.
- 4 Let the dog in. Sleep some more, and also if you
- 5 heat water in your microwave, you can get enough
- 6 water, one basin at a time, to have a very adequate
- 7 sponge bath one section of your body at a time. And
- 8 this is what I have been doing. It's working.
- 9 I go to friends' homes to shower. I
- 10 never thought I would be showering at a friend's home
- 11 unless I was a guest in their home for a weekend.
- 12 This is what I'm doing. I'm making do with what I've
- 13 got, and it's working, but not everybody in these
- 14 empty seats can make do with what they've got and
- 15 have it work for them, and some of them cannot think
- 16 that way, because they weren't trained that way.
- 17 So what's my point? I must be nearing 12
- 18 minutes. What is my point? My point is I find this
- 19 neither embarrassing nor heartbreaking, nor even

- 20 frustrating. I find it disgusting. I find it
- 21 totally disgusting.
- I'm not going to repeat what Mary Anne
- 23 Williams came up here and said because I think she
- 24 spoke for all of us. And I think each of you who

- 1 preceded me have spoken to the facts of the issue for
- 2 all of us.
- 3 I wanted to speak for those who are not
- 4 here because I'm fast becoming one of them, but as
- 5 long as I can be resourceful, I think I'm going to
- 6 make it. I'm paying the gas and electric company
- 7 \$200 a month for the IOU. My gas is off. I go out
- 8 and about in public feeling clean. I wash my clothes
- 9 in cold water, but then most all of us do that now
- 10 anyway.
- I don't know how long I can keep this up.
- 12 They told me if I paid half of what I owe them, which
- 13 would have been \$600, they would turn my gas back on,
- 14 but then they told me there's a \$135 reconnection
- 15 fee. So June they got \$200. July they got \$200. I
- 16 had a whole collection of basins. All sizes. In
- 17 August they will get another \$200. And when I talked
- 18 to them on the telephone the last time, this is
- 19 Dominion I'm speaking of, they said, well, we can't

- 20 turn it on now because, you know, you owe another
- 21 \$600. Even though they had told me when I paid half
- 22 of it, they would turn it on with a connection fee.
- I have that new furnace. I'm hoping it
- 24 works when October or November first comes. I'm sure

1	it will. I'm not sure how much is going to be left
2	in my till, but I'm eating a lot of fruits and
3	vegetables, and I steam a lot on the two burner
4	electric.
5	I just wanted those of you present, and
6	I'm sorry those empty seats are not here to hear
7	this, to know what consequences are of something
8	getting very out of hand that at one time you thought
9	you had control over and would not pose a situation.
10	I'm now in a situation.
11	I think I'm going to make it, but all the
12	people who are not here today, I don't know if they
13	are going to make it with the rising costs of
14	everything. I wish them well. I wish all of us
15	well. Thank you.
16	EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you. Thomas
17	Vukovic.
18	
19	THOMAS VUKOVIC

- 20 presented himself as a public witness, and being
- 21 first duly sworn, testified as follows:
- 22 DIRECT TESTIMONY
- 23 EXAMINER FARKAS: State your name and
- 24 address.

- 1 MR. VUKOVIC: My name is Thomas Vukovic.
- 2 I am a resident at 115 Flintwood Drive here in
- 3 Marietta. I'm also a Fourth Ward City Councilman,
- 4 and I represent a substantial number of retirees on
- 5 fixed incomes and residents who are low to moderate
- 6 income who are unable to get additional assistance to
- 7 pay their gas bills.
- 8 My concern is that the cost that we're
- 9 facing, the increased cost, a transportation cost of
- 10 an additional -- or of a total \$210 per year at the
- 11 \$17 rate, the infrastructure cost of \$13.44 per year,
- 12 and the electronic meter reading of \$3 per year for a
- 13 total of \$227.44, if you take a look at
- 14 transportation costs now at \$68.40 which means that
- 15 my constituents and I will be paying just in costs
- 16 before we get any gas \$159 plus.
- 17 That concerns me because the rate
- 18 increase, this \$17 increase, represents basically a
- 19 200 percent increase over the next year or when it is

- 20 implemented, and that as a City councilman, that
- 21 concerns me because in our budget, our local income
- 22 tax budget, we're basically flat, which tells me that
- 23 people who are working in this community who are wage
- 24 earners and paying, of course, municipal income tax,

- 1 basically are not getting any kind of increases that
- 2 can easily afford this kind of increase.
- 3 Also the kind of jobs that we're looking
- 4 at here in Marietta are not the kind of jobs that are
- 5 manufacturing and high paying jobs. We have an awful
- 6 lot of low income kind of jobs. You take the locally
- 7 owned restaurants, we have low income -- or we have
- 8 lower paying production kind of jobs, but we're not
- 9 the kind of community here that earns major dollars
- 10 and can afford -- easily afford that plus a
- 11 retiree -- I'm also a retired teacher, and my
- 12 increase this year that -- I just finished my first
- 13 year -- I got a three percent increase. I'll be
- 14 facing that same three percent increase with the same
- 15 amount of money for the rest of my life. So those
- 16 kinds of -- this particular increase, I feel, has
- 17 really -- will have a really detrimental impact on
- 18 this community and on the people that live here.
- 19 I'd also like to say that as a City

- 20 official, one of the things that we have been looking
- 21 at is electronic meter reading for our water
- 22 department. In determining whether or not we're
- 23 going to do that, we have determined that this
- 24 system, if we're going to implement it, will pay for

- 1 itself, but it's not going to be borne on the backs
- 2 of consumers.
- 3 My question to the PUCO is how is it that
- 4 this cost is being passed on, and where are the
- 5 savings from this particular kind of program going
- 6 to? How is that going to benefit the users of this
- 7 service?
- 8 Again, the gentleman who raised the issue
- 9 earlier about the cost and that cost being passed on,
- 10 is it going to be passed on forever? There's no
- 11 determination made in this proposal, and I think that
- 12 needs to also be dealt with.
- I'm also -- I've done everything that I
- 14 possibly can in my own personal life to make my house
- 15 as energy efficient as possible. You know, my August
- 16 bill for gas was \$4.24. Okay. That -- I'm sorry.
- 17 That's incorrect. My total cost for gas was \$4.24.
- 18 My total bill for August was \$11 -- for July was
- 19 \$11.15. What I'll be facing is that charge, that \$17

- 20 charge which will be more than the cost of me using
- 21 gas, and I feel that that is grossly -- that's
- 22 grossly disproportionate, and I have real a problem
- 23 with subsidizing larger users of gas, and I --
- 24 personally, I think that's a real serious problem.

1	My historical background in terms of gas
2	use is very low. I, like a lot of other people, keep
3	my temperature my thermostat at 65 degrees, and I
4	have done everything I possibly can I wear lots of
5	sweaters in the wintertime also to be able to keep
6	that bill low.
7	I think that this particular proposal is
8	going to cause problems for the users of this of
9	Southeastern Ohio, and I think that it needs to be
10	reviewed and rejected, and I urge the PUCO to not
11	allow this increase. Thank you.
12	EXAMINER FARKAS: Mike Joyce.
13	MR. JOYCE: I have nothing to say, sir.
14	EXAMINER FARKAS: Okay. Robert Huffman
15	
16	ROBERT HUFFMAN
17	presented himself as a public witness, and being
18	first duly sworn, testified as follows:
19	DIRECT TESTIMONY

- MR. HUFFMAN: As far as I know. I'm not
- 21 exactly positive that some of the statements I make
- 22 are exactly, perfectly correct, but I'm going to try
- 23 to be as close to accurate as I can.
- 24 EXAMINER FARKAS: Okay. Thank you.

- 1 State your name and address.
- 2 MR. HUFFMAN: My name is Robert Huffman,
- and my address is 110 Sunset Lane, Marietta, Ohio.
- 4 I think that it's a crying shame that
- 5 these people want to raise any cost at all,
- 6 considering the gasoline cost, the food cost going
- 7 up. I saw a 10-pound bag of potatoes was 7.99 at
- 8 Kroger's the other day.
- 9 The tremendous budget deficit that we're
- 10 incurring because of the war in Iraq and the money
- 11 that we're borrowing from the Communist Chinese to do
- 12 it would buy the layer trailing our ships and
- 13 submarines in the Persian Gulf, and they -- in no way
- 14 are they going to let us steal all the oil in the
- 15 mideast without having a nuclear war with us.
- And also the home mortgage problems where
- 17 so many people are losing their homes, and so many
- 18 people are just walking away from their homes because
- 19 their homes are worthless than they are paying for

- 20 them actually because the value of the homes has gone
- 21 down, and at the same time, the mortgage interest
- 22 rates have gone up. They were fluctuating.
- This inflation is caused by greed and the
- 24 worship of money. CEOs should take pay cuts and

- 1 learn how to stick to a budget and sacrifice for once
- 2 to help us.
- These continual price hikes and tax
- 4 increases are immoral. I'm a member of the Ron Paul
- 5 campaign group, and we have discovered that there's
- 6 something called a comprehensive annual finance --
- 7 financial report, and we have discovered that at the
- 8 same time our State is crying that they have to raise
- 9 taxes, and they don't have money, they have
- 10 approximately \$33 billion stashed in slush funds, and
- 11 if they would release this money to the people of
- 12 this state, we could turn this whole economy around,
- 13 and we could come out of the recession. We could use
- 14 that money to -- we could use that money for the poor
- 15 people to save money which is the way a country gets
- 16 ahead when the people are able to save money, and
- 17 then they invest their savings in businesses that
- 18 help produce American-made products, and that's the
- 19 true way a country gets ahead, not from buying all

- 20 their stuff from China. Thank you. God bless you
- 21 guys for showing up.
- 22 EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you. That's the
- 23 list of people that signed up. Is there anyone that
- 24 wants to testify?

2	ROSE MARIE THOMAS
3	presented herself as a public witness, and being
4	first duly sworn, testified as follows:
5	DIRECT TESTIMONY
6	EXAMINER FARKAS: Please state your name
7	and address.
8	MS. THOMAS: Rose Marie Thomas, 117
9	Woodcrest Drive, Marietta 45750.
10	I'm one of those older people, and I'm
11	retired, have been. I worked until I was 70. I
12	tried to plan for my retirement as best I could.
13	My life had many ups and downs, but I too
14	had been at a successful job, but never worked long
15	enough to be vested in pensions because, as we
16	mother's did, we went home, and took care of our
17	kids, and so forth. And then there were some
18	changes, but, anyway, when I first retired, the IRAs
19	were earning me. like, 12 percent interest, and I

- 20 locked them up for ten years.
- Now, of course, when you try to get any
- 22 savings, you don't -- there isn't very much, and the
- 23 longer you live, of course, the longer your life
- 24 expectancy. So that presents a lot of cause for

- 1 thought as I can appreciate Gretchen Otto's
- 2 situation.
- 3 I'm 84, and I invested -- two years ago,
- 4 I invested in a 97 percent efficient furnace so that
- 5 I could have better, you know, gas bills, and I
- 6 insulated -- added some insulation to my home, and
- 7 I'm trying to do everything I can to conserve both,
- 8 you know, not spending and investing so that I will
- 9 have lower bills.
- But this will really hurt the seniors if
- 11 they put that flat charge on, and I don't -- that is
- 12 not really what Dominion has asked, but it's what the
- 13 PUCO has asked.
- So that concerns me, and I feel it should
- 15 really -- that it is unfair to those of us who are
- 16 trying to save on our expenses to have that large
- 17 cost be the consumer charge, and I mean from, you
- 18 know, whatever -- I can't remember what it is, how it
- 19 is termed on the bill. Let me see what they call it,

- 20 the monthly service charge and the gas transportation
- 21 charge.
- Well, if you reduce your bills, you have
- 23 less gas for transportation charges, but this is
- 24 going to all be one large amount as Tom Vukovic said.

- 1 This month my total bill was \$12.37, and 7.16 of that
- 2 alone was the monthly service on the gas
- 3 transportation charge. Only \$5.22 was for actual
- 4 gas.
- 5 So it really will be very
- 6 disproportionate, and I really feel it should be
- 7 reviewed and some other plan worked out.
- 8 I don't deny that Dominion, you know,
- 9 needs some reimbursement for some of their expenses,
- 10 but it is really hurting the older population, and,
- 11 you know, even though we try, as Gretchen said, those
- 12 who didn't even have the assets that some of us may
- 13 have been fortunate enough to have saved for our
- 14 retirement, it still does present a problem.
- I mean it's going to be a greater problem
- 16 for them. I really don't know how they will handle
- 17 it, and then it becomes a problem for the whole
- 18 community.
- I mean, you know, everybody will have to

- 20 help subsidize people who need additional help.
- So I thank you very much.
- 22 EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you. Is there
- 23 anyone else?
- MS. THOMAS: My grandson -- this is

1	beside the point. He always makes he jokes about
2	me being the little old lady in tennis shoes, and
3	here I am with my cane and now my tennis shoes.
4	EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you.
5	Is there anyone else that wants to
6	testify?
7	Seeing that there is no one and hearing
8	no one There is. Okay. Thank you.
9	
10	JOHN POLING
11	presented himself as a public witness, and being
12	first duly sworn, testified as follows:
13	DIRECT TESTIMONY
14	EXAMINER FARKAS: Please state your name
15	and address.
16	MR. POLING: My name is John Poling,
17	P-o-l-i-n-g. I live at 123 Brentwood Street,
18	Marietta, Ohio.
19	When I look at my gas bill and see all

- 20 the charges other than the cost of the gas itself,
- 21 it's way higher than the cost of gas, and I think
- 22 going from \$5.70 a month base charge to 17 something
- 23 is ridiculous, and I hope that the Commission will
- 24 not allow it. Thank you.

1	EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you. Okay. Is
2	there anyone else that wishes to make a statement or
3	give testimony? Okay.
4	If there are no more witnesses, this will
5	conclude the public hearing, and the testimony will
6	be submitted on the record for the Commission's
7	consideration in this case, and I thank you all for
8	coming.
9	(Thereupon, at 2:30 p.m., the hearing was
10	concluded.)
