MR. LINDGREN: Your Honor, on behalf of the Staff of the Public Utilities Commission, Ohio Attorney General Richard Cordray, by Thomas G. Lindgren, Assistant Attorney General. The address is 180 East Broad Street, 9th Floor, Columbus, Ohio 43215.

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you.

You're Mr. Leisure?

MR. LEISURE: Yes.

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: And you are proceeding without counsel; is that correct?

> MR. LEISURE: Yes.

24 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: All right. 25 this time, Staff, you may call your first witness.

5 1 MR. LINDGREN: Thank you, Your Honor. The 2 Staff calls Alvin Holscher. 3 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: You may come up 4 here. Raise your right hand. 5 OFFICER ALVIN W. HOLSCHER, б being by the Hearing Examiner first duly sworn, as 7 hereinafter certified, testifies and says as follows: 8 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: You may be 9 seated. Before we get started, Mr. Leisure, you will 10 be allowed to ask any witness factual questions; okay? 11 MR. LEISURE: Okay. 12 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: After counsel 13 finishes his questioning. 14 Proceed. 15 DIRECT EXAMINATION 16 By Mr. Lindgren: 17 Good morning, Mr. Holscher. Q. 18 Morning. Α. 19 Would you state and spell your full name O. 20 for the record, please. 21 My full name is Alvin W. Holscher, 22 A-l-v-i-n, middle initial W, last name is Holscher, 23 H-o-l-s-c-h-e-r. 24 And what is your business address? 0. 25 Α. 1275 Experiment Farm Road, Troy, Ohio.

- Q. And where are you employed?
- A. State of Ohio, Motor Carrier Enforcement
 Inspector. It's Post 12, and I'm assigned to
 District 5.
 - Q. Is that part of the highway patrol?
 - A. Yes, sir.

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- Q. And what is your position?
- A. I'm a Motor Carrier Enforcement Inspector.
- Q. What are your duties in that job?
- A. My duties are to inspect commercial vehicles, to enforce the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration rules and regs., stopping trucks for the intent of doing an inspection for obvious violations.
- Q. What sort of training have you received for your position?
- A. I have -- I've gone through North American Standards training, basic hazmat, hazmat bulk, and motor coach training, and I've been certified every year for those.
- Q. Are you trained in the application of the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations?
 - A. Yes, sir, I am.
 - Q. Do you hold any certifications?
- A. I have a certification for North American

 Standards as an inspector, hazmat inspector, and motor

1 coach inspector.

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- Q. Thank you. Do you recognize the driver here today, Mr. Leisure?
 - A. Yes, sir, I do.
- Q. And do you recall inspecting a truck operated by him on April 1st of 2008?
 - A. Yes, sir, I do.
 - Q. What caused you to initiate this inspection?
 - He had an obvious violation. He had a Α. lighting violation. I was stationary at the 60 mile marker, watching westbound traffic when he passed my location. As he passed my location, I seen an ID light out, so I came out of the crossover. I initiated the traffic stop. I got him stopped at the 58 mile marker on the westbound side. I approached the vehicle, started the interview process with Mr. Leisure. After I got his driver's license and his medical card and found where he was coming and going to, I noticed that there was a cooler, like a -- something you chill your beverages in, setting in close proximity to Mr. Leisure. I asked him what he had in it. For my safety reasons, I didn't want to have a gun or anything in there. He told me he had water, and I asked him if he'd care to open it up, at which time he did, and when

8 1 he opened it up, he did have bottled water, but he also 2 had a can of Bud Light in there. 3 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Can I ask a 4 clarifying question? 5 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. 6 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: You said you 7 were at a certain mile marker. On what --8 THE WITNESS: Interstate 70, Interstate 9 I was working in Clark County that day. 10 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you. 11 Go ahead. Where was this cooler located in the cab? 12 Q. 13 Next to the driver, in between the driver Α. 14 and passenger seat. 15 Was it within the driver's reach, then? Ο. 16 Yes, sir, it was. Α. 17 Q. Thank you. You said you saw a can of Bud Light? 18 19 Yes, sir, I did. Α. 20 Is Bud Light a brand of beer, to your Ο. 21 knowledge? 22 Α. Yes, it is, sir. 23

And did you do anything to determine if Ο. 24 the can was full?

25

Α. Yes, sir, I did. I went and got my camera

- to take pictures of it so I could document it. As it
 was laying there, I had to pick it up to get a picture
 of the top, see if it was intact, and at the time I

 picked it up, it was a full can of beer, sir.
 - Q. Thank you. Did you ask the driver anything about this can?

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- A. I asked the driver what it was in there for, and he said he had been working on his vehicle that weekend. I said well, this is a violation. He says we can take care of that now. He says I'll just dump it out here, and I informed him that he couldn't do that. I was just going to write it for having alcohol in a commercial motor vehicle at that time.
- Q. Did you take any photographs in the course of your inspection?
- A. Yes, sir, I did. I took a picture of the truck, the ID light that was out. He also had a violation --

(Discussion off the record.)

- A. He had several violations besides the can of beer inside the vehicle.
- HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: You just need to slow down a little. She's writing down everything.
- A. He had an ID light out. I took a picture of that. He also had an exhaust leak that I took a

- picture of, and I took several pictures of the can of beer and the cooler inside the vehicle.
- Q. Mr. Holscher, do you have the photographs that you took with you? Do you have a set of those?
- A. I have them with me over there.
- MR. LINDGREN: May I approach the

1 PURPOSES.) 2 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Let's go back on 3 the record. While we were off the record we marked the 4 pictures, exhibit numbers on the pictures. 5 You can proceed. MR. LINDGREN: Thank you, Your Honor. 6 7 Mr. Holscher, do you recognize these Ο. 8 pictures? Yes, sir, I do. These were pictures I Α. 10 took during the inspection. 11 Do they accurately reflect what you saw Ο. 12 during that inspection? 13 Α. Yes, it does. 14 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Can I just stop 15 you for a second? The pictures you're talking about, 16 are these the Exhibits 1A through 1G? 17 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. 18 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you. 19 Let's first take a look at Exhibit 1A. O. 20 Can you briefly explain what that depicts? 21 1A depicts one of three center ID lights 22 that's not working, and that was the reason for my 23 stop. 24 Thank you. So this was the front end of Ο.

the vehicle operated by Mr. Leisure?

- 1 Yes, sir. Α. Ο. Can you explain what Exhibit 1B depicts? 3 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Before we go to 4 1B, 1A, the center ID lights, are these the lights 5 above the windshield? 6 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. 7 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: The one in the 8 middle of the windshield, your testimony is it is --The ID light. THE WITNESS: 10 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Was out? 11 THE WITNESS: Right. It was inoperative, 12 not working. 13 Thank you. HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: 14 Let's now turn to Exhibit 1B --Ο. 15 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Let me stop you 16 again. And that is the reason why you stopped --17 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. That is a --18 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: That's the cause 19 for the inspection? 20 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. 21 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you.
 - Q. Turning to Exhibit 1B, can you explain what that depicts?
- A. Just -- that's a picture of the license

 plate that was on the commercial vehicle that I stopped

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- when I stopped it. I wanted to make sure that I had a clear picture of that.
 - O. Exhibit 1C?

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- A. The side of the truck. It's the operating authority that he was running under at that time, USDOT number. He worked for Transinternational System.
 - Q. Thank you.
- A. That also shows a picture of the hood latch, which is a violation.
 - O. Where is the hood latch located?
- A. Right in front of the passenger door. If you look at the Freightliner sign there, there's a latch. It's supposed to go on that hood to secure the hood down.
- Q. So that was another violation you noted?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Turning to Exhibit 1D, can you explain
 what that depicts?
- A. That's the cooler that was setting inside the truck next to Mr. Leisure.
 - Q. Thank you.
- HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: And is the -
 there appears to be, on the top left side of the

 picture, a blue -- it looks like denim, a piece of

 clothing?

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                THE WITNESS: That's what it appears to
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2 be, sir.

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3 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Is that where

4 the driver's seat is?

5 THE WITNESS: No, sir. That would be in 6 the sleeping compartment. If you look to the top 7 right, up here, I believe that would be Mr. Leisure's 8 leg (indicating).

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Okay. So you're taking this picture from the passenger side?

THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. I always approach a commercial -- never approach from the driver's side. I always approach from the passenger side for my 14 safety.

15 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Okay. Thank 16 you.

- Turning now to Exhibit 1E, can you explain Q. what that depicts?
- It depicts what was inside the cooler. Α. Again, I asked him, since it was so close to him, what he had in there that day. He told me bottles of water, and I asked him if he would mind opening it up for me just for my safety, and at that time he opened it up, and that's what I saw.
 - Q. Thank you. Now, did you do anything with

the contents of the cooler after you opened it?

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- A. Well, once I seen what it was, I went and got my camera. I obviously started taking the pictures, but I picked the can up to see if it was an empty can, and that's why I took a picture. If you'll look at 1F, the top of that can is still intact, and when I picked it up to set it upright, that can was full and there was nothing leaking out of it.
 - Q. So is 1F a picture of the can after you turned it upright?
 - A. Yes, sir, it is.
 - Q. Okay. And what about Exhibit 1G?
 - A. That's an exhaust leak. At the rear of the cab, you're not allowed to have any leaks, also made to have -- or allow the exhaust, and I took a picture of that to show the exhaust, where it had been burning.
 - HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: On 1G there's a pipe that curves at a 90-degree angle?
- THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
- HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Then at the curve there is a darker spot. Is that what you're saying is the leak?
- THE WITNESS: That's the exhaust leak
 right there. That exhaust pipe, which is exactly what

- that is, it's a 90-degree upturn to go to the stack.
- 2 That has a -- I wrote that up as a crack lengthwise in
- 3 the exhaust system.
- 4 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: How long is the
- 5 crack?
- 6 THE WITNESS: Sir, I couldn't tell you
- ⁷ that.
- 8 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: You couldn't
- ⁹ guess at all?
- THE WITNESS: No. I didn't put a tape
- 11 measure up to it.
- 12 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Okay.
- Q. Inspector Holscher, what did you do with
- 14 these pictures after you took them?
- A. I submitted them with the inspection
- report to the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio.
- Q. Do these pictures appear to have been
- 18 altered at all from the time when you sent them in?
- 19 A. No, sir.
- Q. Thank you. Did you prepare any reports in
- the course of your inspection or following your
- 22 inspection?
- A. Yes, sir, I did.
- MR. LINDGREN: May I approach the witness
- 25 again?

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Yes.

MR. LINDGREN: Let the record reflect that

I'm handing the witness what has been marked as Staff

Exhibit 2.

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Thank you.

- Q. Mr. Holscher, do you recognize this document?
 - A. Yes, sir, I do.
 - Q. And can you explain what it is?
- A. This is my inspection report. After making my initial traffic stop and doing an inspection of the vehicle, I did what was called a Level II inspection, which is a walk-around. It involves driver credentials and the vehicle.
- Q. Did you note the violations you found in the inspection on this report?
 - A. Yes, I did. There were four.
- Q. Can you explain what those violations were?
 - A. First one was a driver violation,
 possession, use, or under the influence of alcohol
 within four hours prior to going on duty, and the
 description was, "In possession of alcohol in cooler
 inside cab of truck, one 12-ounce Bud Light." The
 second violation was one of three center cab ID lights

- inoperative at the time of inspection. The third
 violation was hood not securely fastened, right side
 hood latch not fastened at the time of inspection. The
 last violation was inspection, repair and maintenance
- of parts and accessories, exhaust leak on 90 degree elbow to stack, crack is lengthwise.
 - Q. Thank you. Does this report accurately reflect the results of your inspection of the vehicle operated by David Leisure?
 - A. Yes, sir, it does.

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- Q. What did you do with this report after you prepared it?
 - A. I -- I gave Mr. Leisure a copy of it, and I placed him out of service. Then I transmitted this electronically to the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio.
 - Q. Does this report appear to have been altered at all since the time you transmitted it?
 - A. No, sir, it does not.
 - Q. Thank you. What did you do after you observed the can of beer in the cooler and took those pictures?
- A. I contacted Trooper Mica Hatcher, Unit

 O726, to conduct a field sobriety test on Mr. Leisure

 because I did not want to have to move him -- because I

- was going to place him out of service for that alcohol
 being in the truck, and I did not want him to be moving
 or driving that vehicle if he was impaired, and Trooper
 Hatcher came out and gave him a field sobriety test at
 that time.
 - Q. Did he pass that test?
 - A. Yes, sir, he did.
 - Q. So after that was he allowed to proceed?
 - A. I escorted him back to Exit 59 and placed him out of service for 24 hours for having alcohol in his truck.
- Q. Thank you. I have no further questions.

 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: After you placed
 him out of service, you escorted him to an exit?

THE WITNESS: Yes, sir, I did. I escorted

him to an exit and put him off in a truck stop. I put

him in a safe location and said he was out of service

at that time for alcohol in a commercial vehicle.

19 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Then what

20 happened?

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THE WITNESS: Then I went back to work.

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: You left him

23 there?

THE WITNESS: Yes, sir, I did.

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Okay. That's

20 1 all I have. Do you have any questions? 3 MR. LEISURE: Yes. 4 CROSS-EXAMINATION 5 By Mr. Leisure: 6 Of course, I'm not a lawyer, so I don't Ο. 7 have -- I don't know some of this stuff. When you 8 first pulled me over, you pulled me over for the light; right? 10 Α. Yes. 11 We agree on that. When you come up to my Ο. 12 passenger side, like you said, I always do -- you 13 always do the passenger side. You seemed to know 14 everything that happened or remember from a year ago. 15 Do you remember what you first told me you was going to 16 give me a violation for? 17 Α. No, sir, I do not. 18 Q. Okay. When you first pulled up there, you 19 tried to open my door on the passenger side, and it was 20 locked. 21 Α. Okay. 22 Do you remember that? Q. 23 Α. Yeah. 24 And then I told you that door was hard to 25

I tried to open it a couple of times to get it

open.

- unlocked, to get it open, and you said that's a violation right there.
 - A. It is.

- Q. Well, it seems to me like you was looking
 for some kind of a reason just to put me out of
 service.
 - A. No, sir, I was not.
 - Q. I mean, once the beer can was found, you forgot all about this other stuff.
 - A. I didn't forget about it because it's noted on this inspection report. All vehicles -- in a commercial vehicle, if that vehicle was manufactured with a door, it has to operate, okay, and if you can't open the door, then it's a violation, and I'll write that up, and I've wrote it up multiple times for doors that can't open. If you're involved in an accident and that's my only access to get to you to save your life and I can't get in, then there's a problem. So at the time when you said it doesn't open or doesn't open very good, at that point, if it doesn't open, I will write that violation.
 - Q. But you didn't remember that?
- A. No, sir, I did not, because it's not on the report.
 - Q. So you're going to offer the report, not

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1 memory?
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- A. Pardon?
- Q. You're going to offer what you wrote down on the report, not memory?
- A. It's wasn't a violation because you got it open.
 - Q. I'm talking about the whole situation.
 - A. No. I remember the whole situation.
- 9 Q. But you didn't remember that part about 10 the door?
- A. It wasn't a violation, so I didn't write
 it.
- Q. You just said it was a violation if it didn't open.
- A. If it did not open. If you look at the pictures, on the one -- starting with 1D, I'm standing at the passenger door with it open, so it's not a violation.
- Q. No. I got the door open.
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And I told you, I said I can get the door open. It's hard to open. It takes a few minutes.
- Well, that's a violation, that's the way you put it.
 - A. No. You told me it did not open.
- Q. No. I said it was hard to open.

A. If I told you that I was going to write you a violation for the door not opening, it would have been because you said the door didn't open. I said if you can't get it open, then I'll write it as a violation so you can get it fixed.

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Q. Okay. That was just something I was curious about, because after -- like I said, after the beer can was found, nothing else is mentioned about the door, and later on in the process I did get the door open. Yes, I understand why that was dropped, okay, why you didn't take anything else about that.

You keep saying that it was a full beer, and the only reason that can was in there was because it was empty. There was a hole in the bottom of it. When I was working on the truck, it was a joke, the guy handed it to me, and that's why it was left in there. I noticed it on the floor a couple of days later.

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: If you want to make your case when it's your turn, but right now you have the opportunity to ask him questions.

MR. LEISURE: Oh, okay.

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: You can testify later on to what you want.

MR. LEISURE: Okay.

 - Q. Thank you. What is your business address?
- A. Public Utilities Commission of Ohio,

 Transportation Department, Compliance Division, 180

 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio 43215.
 - Q. Are you employed by the Public Utilities Commission?
 - A. Yes, sir.

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- Q. What is your position there?
- 12 A. I am a Compliance Officer.
 - Q. How long have you been in that position?
- A. Roughly four years.
- Q. What sort of training have you received in connection with your position?
- 17 Α. I'm a certified inspector. I've received the North American Standards vehicle and driver 18 19 inspection, hazardous materials inspection, cargo, 20 tank, and other bulk package training, radioactive 21 Level 6 training, compliance review, inspector 22 training, and I've attended numerous in-services that 23 the Commission puts on in reference to inspecting 24 vehicles. I've also been trained by a mentor on how to 25 properly assess roadside violations and reviews for

- 1 | civil forfeiture reasons.
- Q. What are your duties as a Compliance
 Officer?
- 4 Α. I assess violations from inspections that 5 are uploaded through either the highway patrol or the 6 Public Utilities investigators. I assess violations 7 from compliance reviews that are uploaded from the 8 Public Utilities Commission investigators. I answer technical calls from motor carriers, shippers, and 10 drivers, reference the regulations, testify in 11 hearings, and I perform enough inspection to keep my 12 certifications current.

- Q. Mr. Forbes, do you recognize this
- 22 document?
- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Can you explain what it is?
- A. It is a Notice of Preliminary

Determination letter that was sent to Mr. Leisure at his Jeffersonville address. A Notice of Preliminary Determination letter is sent to a Respondent, carrier, shipper, or driver, after they've had an opportunity for conference and did not come to a resolution at the conference, the case was not settled at the conference level. In this case, the case was not settled at the conference level. This letter was sent to Mr. Leisure with an instruction sheet that explains how to request an administrative hearing or to pay the forfeiture, whichever he desired.

- Q. Thank you. What is the forfeiture amount stated in this Notice?
- A. The original forfeiture amount stated in the Notice of Preliminary Determination was \$500 for possession, use, or under the influence of alcohol. The computer generates the fines on motor carrier violations. It generates them off of the code violation Section 392.5A in this case. Both possession and use are under that one code section, and for compliance reasons, possession is \$100 fine, and use or under the influence is a \$500 fine. Initially, the computer sends out all violations for this code site as a \$500 fine. If you look at Page 2 of Staff Exhibit 3, at conference this fine was reduced to \$100 because it

- was a possession violation, not an under the use or influence of alcohol violation.
 - Q. Based on your experience, is \$100 the correct forfeiture amount that should have been assessed for this violation?
 - A. Yes, sir.

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- Q. Are you familiar with the standards for forfeitures of the Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Alliance?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Is this \$100 amount consistent with those standards?
- A. Yes, sir.
 - Q. Is this amount of \$100 the amount that would typically be assessed against a driver for the same violation?
- A. Yes. It would be reduced to 100. The initial assessment would be 500, and then at conference it would be reduced to 100.
 - Q. Thank you. Is the forfeiture of \$100 the amount you would recommend that the Public Utilities

 Commission assess against this driver?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Thank you.
- I have no further questions for this

1 witness.

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Is there any other penalty associated with this violation such as loss of license?

THE WITNESS: No, sir. This is not -possession is not a disqualifying offense for Mr.
Leisure's CEO. The violation does go on the company
safety record, though.

CROSS-EXAMINATION

By Mr. Leisure:

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- Q. So what you're saying is, like in my situation, if I would have had the alcohol in my truck and I was guilty and I was going to pay the fine and I sent that \$500 check in, I only owed \$100?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. And I would have paid \$500?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And I would have had to pull teeth from the State of Ohio to get my \$400 back?
 - A. We do make reimbursements, refunds on a regular basis. Sometimes carriers pay twice or a violation is overassessed initially, and the State of

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Ohio makes refunds. It's not a large deal. You
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- 2 | contact us and let us know that the mistake was made.
- We investigate it, and we notify our division to cut
- 4 you a check.
- Q. Okay. I'm just curious how many times that has happened.
- HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Do you have a guesstimate on how often that happens?
- THE WITNESS: No. I work on some of the
 refunds. I would estimate two to three times a month,
 but that's strictly an estimate. I don't have an exact
 number.
- HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: But it does happen?
- THE WITNESS: It does happen, yes. I've processed --
- Q. These people always get their money back, the extra money?
- A. Yes. If we became aware of a mistake, we correct it.
- Q. The Code 392.5A, can you tell me exactly what that -- the definition of that is?
- A. I would have to have the book in front of me. If it's okay, if I use Mr. Lindgren's book --
 - Q. Sure.

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Just for the record, can you identify what you're looking?

THE WITNESS: Yes I'm looking at the

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: You may be seated. Please state your name and address for the record.

THE WITNESS: David W. Leisure, D-a-v-i-d, initial W, L-e-i-s-u-r-e.

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: All right.

DIRECT TESTIMONY

THE WITNESS: My whole point is here I was just -- the officer was on the stand, and I just wanted to see if he remembered everything that happened during that, and obviously he didn't. He didn't remember about the door not opening, and he was going by his report on a lot of it, on a lot of what happened, and I just wanted to make that -- how do I say this? I just wanted to make my point on he couldn't remember everything that happened there because he's making stops every day and every day, and he's not making reports, that they wind in together and he can't remember who was who and what was what.

My main thing is this can was empty. was working on my truck the weekend before, and I had -- laying on the floor, I had my hands up underneath the dash, working on wiring, and my friend that was helping me, he pulled out this can and handed it to me, and it was empty. It had -- I don't know what happened in shipping or something. There was a very small crack in the bottom of it, and it had leaked out. He handed it to me. We had a little laugh, and I thought well, I'm going to keep this can, it's pretty neat, but I had it sitting in the truck. Well, a couple days later I was driving down the road, and there was something rolling around, and I realized that's what it was, that can in there rolling around; so I picked it up and threw it in the cooler and forgot about it, and that's why the can was in there. was empty. If he couldn't remember about telling me that it was a violation for that door not to open, how can he remember if that can was empty or not? All he done was took his fingers and set it up to get the picture of it. The other officer that read the law says there's no law against having an empty can, and it was an empty can. I think that's all I got to say. HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: All right. Do you have any questions?

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MR. LINDGREN: Yes, Your Honor.

CROSS-EXAMINATION

3 By Mr. Lindgren:

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- Q. Mr. Leisure, you don't deny that there was a can labeled Bud Light in the cooler; right?
 - A. Right.
 - Q. Do you make a practice of throwing trash or discarded items in the cooler?
 - A. Well, no, I don't throw trash in my cooler. I keep water in my cooler, and to keep it from rolling around and underneath the brake pedal or something, I set it in there. It was the safest place to put it rather than pulling off the side of the road or throwing it under the bunk or something.
- Q. You could have put this somewhere other than the cooler; right?
- A. I could have threw it out the window. Is that what you're asking?
- Q. No. You could have put it in an empty bag or something like that?
- A. I didn't have an empty bag beside me going down the road.
- Q. Well, you'd agree with me that normally
 the purpose of putting something in a cooler is to keep
 it cold; right?

- A. That's what they're for, yes.
- Q. Okay. Mr. Leisure, do you recall asking Inspector Holscher if you could dump out the contents of this can by the side of the road?
- A. No, I didn't say that. I didn't say
 that. I remember him saying that up here earlier that
 I said that, but, no, I did not say that. My comment
 to him was that it was an empty can. He said I don't
 care. It's a violation. You're out of service.
 You're done.
 - Q. Thank you. I have no further questions.

 EXAMINATION
- 13 By Examiner Farkas:

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- Q. Mr. Leisure, do you have the can with you?
- 16 No, I don't. I don't. When he put me out Α. 17 of service and he escorted me to that truck stop, I was 18 out of service. I couldn't drive the commercial 19 vehicle. I called a friend of mine who had a CDL. 20 come from where he lives in Washington Court House up 21 to the truck stop there at 41 and 71, and we dropped my 22 trailer, because the company was coming to get it so 23 they could get that load delivered, and he climbed into 24 my truck and drove it to my house, and I climbed in his 25 pickup truck and drove it, and that's how we got out of

In the process of waiting on him to get there, I threw it in the trash can at that truck stop so he 3 wouldn't get in trouble.

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- Ο. Okay. So the can, you just threw the can away?
- I should have had it. I should have Α. kept it, but my thought was my friend is coming up to drive this truck. I don't know if he's sitting around the corner waiting on me to leave, see if I'm going to take off and leave, get me for a violation again, or somebody else is going to pull him over and see that can in there and him having to go through the same thing that I'm going through now. At that point in time the can -- I wanted to keep the can, but at that point in time the can wasn't important to me. looking at losing my job for this.
- Did it ever occur to you, when the officer Ο. picked up the can, to show him the bottom of the can or where you're saying there was a leak or a hole in the can?
- I told him the can was empty, and he just grabbed it, like, with a couple of fingers and set it He took a picture, reached in there and took a couple fingers and stood it up, took another picture. I said what's the big deal. It's an empty can.

- said I don't care. He said you're done, and that's the
- way he put it, you're done, you're shut down.
- HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: All right.
- 4 Let's go off the record. Let's take a recess for about
- 5 | 10 minutes.
- 6 (Recess taken.)
- 7 HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: You didn't have
- 8 any more questions for Mr. Leisure?
- 9 MR. LINDGREN: That's correct, Your
- 10 Honor.
- 11 By Examiner Farkas:
- Q. Mr. Leisure, I had one last question for
- 13 you. Was there any liquid in the cooler, water or
- 14 anything like that?
- A. Water, yes.
- Q. I mean other than bottles of water, was
- there water in the bottom of the cooler or was it just
- dry, holding the bottles of water?
- A. Unless there was -- I mean, I didn't
- 20 actually pour any water in there. I don't know if
- there might have been any moisture in there or not. I
- 22 don't know. I don't remember.
- Q. Okay. There seems to be, like, a plastic
- bag or something in the cooler, if you look at the
- ²⁵ pictures.

- A. I think that is what the bottles of water came in.
 - Q. Okay.

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(Discussion off the record.)

- Q. Is that -- the plastic, is that from a convenience store?
- A. I actually think I got that bag from my house. We buy that water by the case, and I think I actually threw some of the water in that thing to carry, to put in my truck.

MS. HUSSEY: Basically, though, that's

just a white plastic bag you get from maybe a grocery

store or something to that effect?

THE WITNESS: Yes, yes.

MS. HUSSEY: Okay.

- Q. Again, when the -- after you were -- after the pictures were taken of the can, you did not say to the officer -- you had said to the officer that the can was empty; correct?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Did you pick it up and show it to him?
- A. No, because when he opened that cooler and looked in there, he saw that and he said you're done.

 I said why. He said you got alcohol in this truck.
- There's a beer can right there. I said it's an empty

can. He said you're done, you're shut down. He said
don't touch it, and that's when he went to get his
camera, came back and took pictures. He told me not to
touch it. I done what he told me. I didn't touch it.

- Q. And after he took pictures, you said you threw the can away?
- A. After he escorted me to the truck stop and put me out of service, then I threw that away, along with some other trash that was laying on the floor, threw it all away in the trash can at the truck stop.
 - Q. Okay.

(Witness excused.)

HEARING EXAMINER FARKAS: Do you have anything further you want to offer as evidence or anything else?

MR. LEISURE: No. I wish I had the can, but like I said, I didn't want my friend getting in the truck and driving it home and having the same problem, you know. I wasn't thinking I was going to need the can as evidence. I just -- I don't know. I don't know what I was thinking. I was upset, and I wasn't thinking that I was being shut down for an empty can and out of service and possibly losing my job over it, and I wasn't thinking of keeping the can. I threw it in the trash.
