## ■ 1997 deficit 27% ahead of last year

WASHINGTON — The federal government recorded a budget surplus in January for the second consecutive month, but the deficit for fiscal 1997's first four months still was larger than the same period of 1996.

The January surplus totaled \$13.4 billion, the Treasury Department said Monday, reducing the deficit for October through January to \$46 billion. That was 7 percent higher than the red ink recorded during the first four months of the previous year.

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NEW YORK (AP) — The Empire State Building was fitted with an airport-style baggage scanner and two metal detectors Monday, a day after a Palestinian gunman went on a fatal shooting rampage. The mayor blamed the shootings on laws that allowed the man to buy a gun just weeks after he came to America.

Seven tourists were shot Sunday, one fatally, on the 86th-floor observation deck of the famous landmark, long a symbol of romance and tourism. The gunman, Ali Hassan Abu Kamal, then

killed himself.

That Abu Kamal — a 69-year-old Palestinian in the country only two months — could buy a Beretta semiautomatic handgun "is totally insane," Mayor Rudolph Giuliani said at a news conference.

Police Commissioner Howard Safir described Abu Kamal as "one deranged individual working on his own."

An anti-terrorist task force was still part of the investigation, Safir said, but so far it had found no evidence that Abu Kamal was aligned with any terrorist group.

### Hitting is wrong

I am Stacy Sczruba, 25 year-old-mother of Joey Sczruba. My son attends JCAC Head Start at the Bantam Ridge Center. Teaching non-violence in my home is very important to me. I was a victim of domestic violence. It is a horrible cycle that if not broken, will continue. I feel that children will do as they see and know.

Children are so easily influenced by movies, TV, and other people. I teach my son that hitting is wrong, hurting someone is wrong, even when it is done to you first. Nobody deserves to be hurt in any way. There is no reason or no excuse for violence.

Any type of violence causes low self-esteem, unrealistic guilt, inadequacy, feelings of worthlessness, shame and many others. It's not fair to the victim.

There are a lot of violent shows on television. I monitor every single thing my son watches. When he plays with other children, I try to teach him to be kind, caring and considerate of others and their feelings. It's hard to protect your child from everything they see, or hear or do. My favorite way of teaching my son non-violence is hugging, caring for, loving and nurturing him. I try to keep lines of communication open. He is given the love and respect he deserves. If you respect yourself and others, you'll always come out on top. Respect means everything and is the key word when it comes to this issue.

Throughout the years, I have been a client at the A.L.I.V.E. shelter. It felt so good to walk there this summer and ask to volunteer my time to help other victims of violence. When I go home after a shift, I hug my son and feel so lucky to have him on top. My 3-1/2-year-old son knows and feels my happiness. Non-violence means a lot to us in our home.

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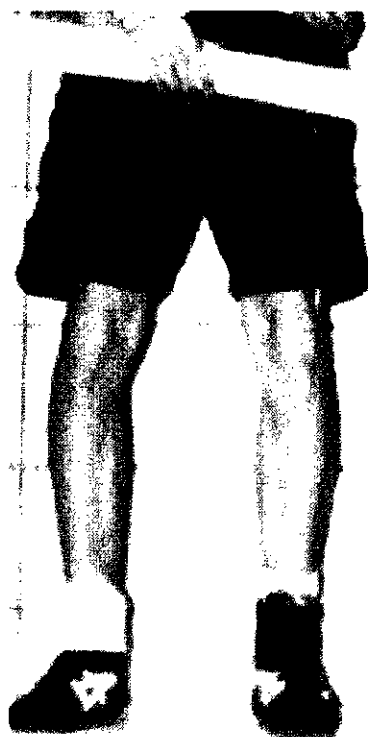
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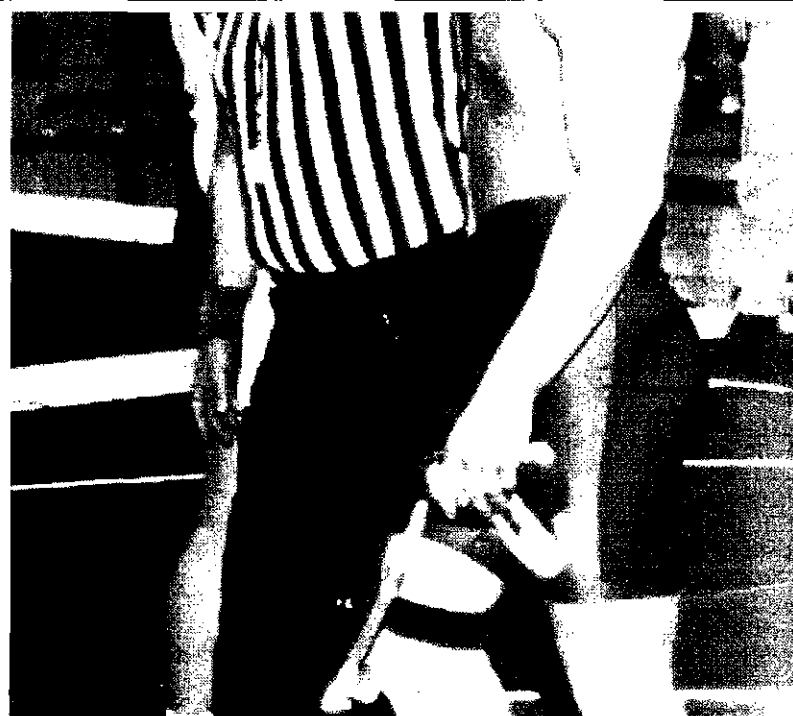

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ment reached Saturday between the state and the 38,000-member Ohio Civil Service Employees Association sets the tone for other state contracts as far as pay goes, but that's all, Regan said.

When Regan's union begins negotiations for a new contract on March 6, subcontracting will be the major issue on the table, he said. The SEIU represents about 4,400 doctors, nurses and other health care workers.

"All those issues are open for negotiation. They've never been set by OCSEA," Regan said.

The \$39.6 million is what the state would have saved had it hired full-time doctors and others instead of paying more for the same services in the private sector, Regan said. The savings would have come even if the agencies paid full benefits and pensions, something it does not do for most outside contracts, he said.

"That \$39 million represents work that could have, should have and normally would have been performed by members of District 1199," Regan said.

The Department of Administrative Services, which is responsible for contract negotiations, had not seen the union's study and could not comment, spokeswoman

**ELECTRIC POWER SUPPLY FACILITIES**

The Company's electric power supply facilities -- including power generating plants, major transmission facilities and interconnections with neighboring electric utility systems -- are adequate to provide reliable electric service to its customers. During 1996, excluding temporary power sales to other utility systems, generating-capacity reserves of the American Electric Power (AEP) System, of which Ohio Power is a part, were approximately 15 percent (or more) of load. Margins are expected to be somewhat less at 14% or more throughout 1997 and into the peak load period of next winter (1997-1998).

Generating-capacity reserves are required in order to meet unexpected increases in system load, to provide for an effective program of preventive maintenance of generating facilities and to allow for random shutdowns and loading curtailments of generating units.

**ELECTRIC ENERGY SUPPLY**

Approximately 87% of the AEP System's power generating capacity is coal-fired, 9% is nuclear and the remainder is oil-fired or hydroelectric. The Company believes that its coal supplies are adequate to enable it to meet the anticipated electric energy requirements of its customers during the year.

The new guidelines, which are so extensive and detailed that they will be released on a computer disk, calls for asthma patients to work with their doctors to develop specific personal plans for controlling the disorder.

Murphy said the personal plans would include the daily medicines and what to do if there is an asthma crisis.

The plans for some patients will include daily lung-capacity tests and specific directions on what medications to use to "rescue" themselves in a breathing crisis, she said.

Also included are methods to diagnose and start treatment of asthma at a very early age. Murphy said experts now know that early control of inflammation helps to preserve lung function later in life.

The new guidelines are an update of ones first issued in 1991 by the National Asthma Education and Pre-

flammation, and the use of inhaled ment plans for each patient.

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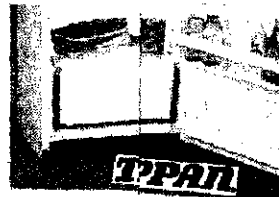
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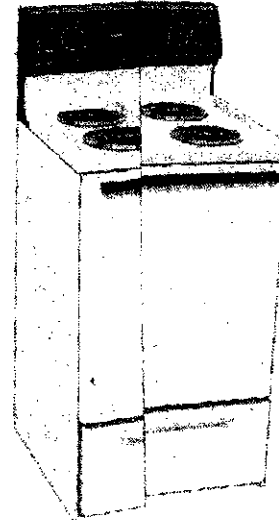
