MEMORANDUM IN SUPPORT OF MOTION TO INTERVENE

Ohio Partners for Affordable Energy ("OPAE") should be permitted to intervene in this matter pursuant to Section 4903.22.1, Revised Code, and the Commission's Rules and Regulation contained in Rule 4901-1-11 of the Ohio Administrative Code. The above-referenced matter concerns the proposal of FirstEnergy Service Company ("FirstEnergy") to modify its participation in a regional transmission organization ("RTO"). The Commission has requested that interested parties file comments on this proposal made by FirstEnergy.

In determining whether to permit intervention, the following criteria are to be considered: the nature of the person's interest; the extent to which that interest is represented by existing parties; the person's potential contribution to the just and expeditious resolution of the matter; and, whether granting the intervention will unduly delay or unjustly prejudice any existing party. OPAE meets all four criteria for intervention in this matter.

OPAE is an Ohio corporation with a stated purpose of advocating for affordable energy policies for low and moderate income Ohioans. Additionally, OPAE includes as members non-profit organizations located in FirstEnergy's service territories. As such, OPAE has a real and substantial interest in this matter. OPAE members advocate on behalf of FirstEnergy's low- and moderate-income customers. OPAE members also manage bill payment assistance

programs to ensure access to essential utility services and provide weatherization and energy efficiency services to low income customers of FirstEnergy. OPAE members are also ratepayers of FirstEnergy's operating companies. ¹ Moreover, many of OPAE's members are community action agencies. Under the federal legislation authorizing the creation and funding of these agencies, originally known as the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, community action is charged with advocating for low-income residents of its communities.²

OPAE's primary interest in this case is to protect FirstEnergy's low and moderate-income customers from unjust and unreasonable rate increases that may arise from FirstEnergy's proposal to modify its RTO participation. OPAE

The purposes of this subtitle are--

⁽¹⁾ to provide assistance to States and local communities, working through a network of community action agencies and other neighborhood-based organizations, for the reduction of poverty, the revitalization of low-income communities, and the empowerment of low-income families and individuals in rural and urban areas to become fully self-sufficient (particularly families who are attempting to transition off a State program carried out under part A of title IV of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 601 et seq.)); and

⁽²⁾ to accomplish the goals described in paragraph (1) through--

⁽A) the strengthening of community capabilities for planning and coordinating the use of a broad range of Federal, State, local, and other assistance (including private resources) related to the elimination of poverty, so that this assistance can be used in a manner responsive to local needs and conditions;

⁽B) the organization of a range of services related to the needs of low-income families and individuals, so that these services may have a measurable and potentially major impact on the causes of poverty in the community and may help the families and individuals to achieve self-sufficiency;

⁽C) the greater use of innovative and effective community-based approaches to attacking the causes and effects of poverty and of community breakdown;

⁽D) the maximum participation of residents of the low-income communities and members of the groups served by programs assisted through the block grants made under this subtitle to empower such residents and members to respond to the unique problems and needs within their communities; and

⁽E) the broadening of the resource base of programs directed to the elimination of poverty so as to secure a more active role in the provision of services for--

⁽i) private, religious, charitable, and neighborhood-based organizations; and

⁽ii) individual citizens, and business, labor, and professional groups, who are able to influence the quantity and quality of opportunities and services for the poor.

also intends to address any other issues that may arise during consideration of this matter.

For the above reasons, OPAE has a direct, real and substantial interest in this matter. The disposition of this matter may impair or impede the ability of OPAE to protect its interests. No other party to the matter will adequately represent the interests of OPAE. OPAE is a rare organization that serves as an advocate, service provider and nonprofit customer group. No other party represents this group of interests.

OPAE's participation in this matter will not cause undue delay, will not unjustly prejudice any existing party, and will contribute to the just and expeditious resolution of the issues and concerns raised in this matter.

Therefore, OPAE is entitled to intervene in this matter with the full powers and rights granted by statute and by the provisions of the Commission's Codes of Rules and Regulations to intervening parties.
