HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Let's go the record. The Public Utilities Commission of Ohio has called for hearing at this time and place Case No. 10-501-EL-FOR, that being in the matter of the long-term forecast report of Ohio Power Company and related matters; as well as Case No. 10-502-EL-FOR, that being in the matter of the long-term forecast report of Columbus Southern Power Company and related matters.

My name is Jeffrey R. Jones. Joining me when this hearing commences at a later point in time will be Greta See. We are Attorney Examiners with the Legal Department of the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio and we've been assigned to hear this case.

At this time, I'm going to take appearances on behalf of the parties. On behalf of Ohio Power Company and Columbus Southern Power.

MR. SATTERWHITE: Thank you, Your Honor. Matthew Satterwhite, One Riverside Plaza, Columbus, Ohio 43215. Also appearing throughout the case will be Steven Nourse.

1 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. On  
2 behalf of the Public Utilities Commission.

3 MR. MCNAMEE: On behalf of the Staff of  
4 the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio, Michael  
5 DeWine, Attorney General of the State of Ohio;  
6 William L. Wright, Chief Public Utilities Section;  
7 and I am Thomas W. McNamee, Assistant Attorney  
8 General, trial counsel in this case. The address is  
9 180 East Broad Street, Columbus, Ohio.

10 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you,  
11 Mr. McNamee. On behalf of the Office of the Ohio  
12 Consumers' Counsel.

13 MR. ETTER: Good morning, Your Honor. On  
14 behalf of Ohio's residential utility customers, the  
15 Office of the Ohio Consumers' Counsel, Janine L.  
16 Migden-Ostrander, Consumers' Counsel. We are at 10  
17 West Broad Street, Suite 1800, Columbus, Ohio 43215.  
18 I am Terry L. Etter, Assistant Consumers' Counsel.

19 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. Are  
20 there any other parties to the case who have filed  
21 motions to intervene? Yes, sir.

22 MR. ALEXANDER: On behalf of First Energy  
23 Solutions, Trevor Alexander from Calfee, Halter and  
24 Griswold, 21 East State Street, Suite 1100, Columbus,  
25 Ohio 43215.

1 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. Any  
2 other parties that I've missed?

3 MR. OLIKER: On behalf of Industrial  
4 Energy Users of Ohio, Joseph Olikier of the law firm  
5 of McNees, Wallace & Nurick, 21 East State Street,  
6 Columbus, Ohio 43215, and I'm also entering an  
7 appearance for Sam Randazzo. Thank you.

8 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. I  
9 understand that's all the parties who have moved to  
10 intervene in the case and I also understand that  
11 there are public witnesses here who would like to  
12 testify today. And if that is the case, I will ask  
13 them to come up however they want to. The first  
14 person can come up and take a seat and we'll swear  
15 you in and let you give your testimony.

16 MR. SATTERWHITE: Go first and get it out  
17 of the way.

18 MS. MARIDA: You ready for us now?

19 MR. MCNAMEE: Yes. It's painless,  
20 really. (Laughter.)

21 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Yes.

22 I will ask you to raise your right hand.

23 - - -

24 PATRICIA MARIDA

25 being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, was

1 examined and testified as follows:

2 - - -

3 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. You  
4 may be seated. Please give your name and address for  
5 the record.

6 MS. MARIDA: Okay. Yes. My name is  
7 Patricia Marida. It's M-A-R-I-D-A. And I live at  
8 1710 Dorsetshire Road in Columbus.

9 And so today I came to say that I'm  
10 really happy to see that AEP has been working to  
11 upgrade its efforts with renewable energy to comply  
12 with the provisions of Ohio's Energy Bill. And I am  
13 in full support of Ohio's Energy Law, Senate Bill  
14 221. It's important that the PUCO require all  
15 utilities to meet the full provisions of this law.  
16 So renewables are essential for controlling  
17 greenhouse gas emissions and minimizing global  
18 warming.

19 We await a frightening future if we  
20 continue to burn fossil fuels at the rate we are now  
21 consuming them. Coal burning is destroying  
22 mountains, filling in streams with slag, destroying  
23 natural areas and ruining local people's lives. It  
24 is also causing dangerous mercury and particulate air  
25 pollution. Every body of water in Ohio is under fish

1 advisory for mercury, which recommends limiting the  
2 number of meals of Ohio fish that we eat. It has  
3 been shown that wind and solar energy are now cheaper  
4 than new nuclear and efficiency is the cheapest  
5 source of energy of all. And all these things come  
6 without radioactive accidents and pollution, not to  
7 mention, the radioactive nuclear waste that will  
8 haunt generations to come.

9           The cost of nuclear power is far more  
10 than the cost of building a reactor. Billions of  
11 public dollars will need to be spent to clean up  
12 radioactive contamination from current nuclear plants  
13 and Wall Street will not fund nuclear so tax payers  
14 are being asked to pony up huge amounts of money for  
15 these energy dinosaurs. And the cost of fossil fuels  
16 is on the rise as they are becoming more scarce and  
17 more difficult to obtain. In the meantime, renewable  
18 energy has seen only a fraction of government  
19 research and development funding. If the massive  
20 handouts for nuclear and coal in the past had been  
21 shifted to renewables such as solar, wind and  
22 geothermal, we would be able to say goodbye to coal  
23 and nuclear by now.

24           So Ohioans, we want clean energy. And  
25 even with minimal support, solar and wind are

1 creating jobs and bringing innovations and innovators  
2 to Ohio. Ohio has an enormous wind resource and  
3 solar has been shown to be an important resource as  
4 well, even considering Ohio's cloudy days. In order  
5 for our energy providers to make the switch to  
6 renewable, they need to be able to make a fair profit  
7 from renewables. At the same time, if utilities can  
8 make far more money supplying energy with coal and  
9 nuclear, it is likely that they will continue to  
10 promote those.

11 Let me now say a word about centralized  
12 energy. Centralized coal and nuclear plants need  
13 out-sized, unsightly, transmission lines to carry the  
14 power from source to user. Solar and wind are almost  
15 everywhere and can be adapted to what we would term a  
16 humanscape. If the wind is not blowing somewhere, it  
17 is probably blowing somewhere else. The same can be  
18 said for the sun in the daytime. If the solar panel  
19 stops functioning, it will not cause a blackout to an  
20 entire region. Centralized electric power also lend  
21 itself to centralized political power in ways that  
22 endanger America's democratic process.

23 The PUCO can aid the transition from  
24 dirty energy that comprises our health to clean  
25 renewable energy and the PUCO can do this by



1 enforcing the law and promoting and protecting clean  
2 energy and seeing that utilities can make a fair  
3 profit in the process. And we thank AEP for  
4 continuing their work on solar and wind and other  
5 renewables.

6 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. Any  
7 questions?

8 MR. SATTERWHITE: No.

9 MR. MCNAMEE: No questions.

10 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Seeing none, you  
11 may step down. Thank you for your testimony.

12 MS. MARIDA: Thank you.

13 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Next. Would you  
14 please raise your right hand.

15 - - -

16 YANG XING

17 being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, was  
18 examined and testified as follows:

19 - - -

20 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you.  
21 Please be seated and give your name and address for  
22 the record.

23 MR. XING: My name is Yang Xing, my  
24 address 6410 Busch Boulevard, Apartment 487, Columbus  
25 Ohio 43229.

1 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. You  
2 may proceed with your statement.

3 MR. XING: I am an AEP customer and the  
4 last year I think I attend all the hearings for the  
5 Duke Energy and I was happy to learn that AEP is  
6 setting a good example for the standard required by  
7 the energy efficiency and not like to -- well, from  
8 that hearing, I learned like AEP is doing work with  
9 job keeping up with the standard required as the PUCO  
10 on not trying to build a new nuclear plant, so I'm  
11 happy to know that. And I think I have got letters  
12 from AEP saying they are installing some meters to my  
13 apartment, which will help to reduce like -- I mean,  
14 it will help to monitor the electricity using, so  
15 that's a good way to try to increase the efficiency.  
16 And I encourage AEP to come in to inspect that. And  
17 I think as we can see the fossil fuel become more  
18 expensive these days and I strongly recommend AEP to  
19 consider increasing the efficiency before going to  
20 build a new coal plant for the energy use here. Yes.

21 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Does that  
22 complete your statement? Is there any questions?

23 MR. MCNAMEE: None.

24 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Seeing none, you  
25 may step down. Thank you.

1 MR. SATTERWHITE: Thank you.

2 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Would you please  
3 raise your right hand.

4 - - -

5 BEN WICKIZER

6 being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, was  
7 examined and testified as follows:

8 - - -

9 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you.  
10 Please state your name and address for the record.

11 MR. WICKIZER: Ben Wickizer, last name is  
12 spelled W-I-C-K-I-Z-E-R, 850 Mohawk Street, Columbus,  
13 Ohio.

14 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: You may proceed  
15 with your statement.

16 MR. WICKIZER: I'd simply like to say  
17 that over the past two years AEP has done an  
18 excellent job in meeting the efficiency and renewable  
19 standards resulting in reductions in pollution,  
20 increased financial savings for customers and new  
21 jobs. And as a customer, I'd like to see AEP  
22 continue these efforts so that Ohio can begin to  
23 transition off coal to a cleaner, green energy  
24 economy. That's it.

25 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Okay. Thank

1 you. Any questions?

2 MR. MCNAMEE: No questions, Your Honor.

3 MR. SATTERWHITE: Thank you.

4 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. You  
5 may step down.

6 Would you please raise your right hand.

7 - - -

8 ASHLEY ROHRBACH

9 being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, was  
10 examined and testified as follows:

11 - - -

12 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. You  
13 may be seated. Could you please give your name and  
14 address for the record.

15 MS. ROHRBACH: My name is Ashley  
16 Rohrbach, last name R-O-H-R-B-A-C-H. I live at 30  
17 East Lane, Apartment 304. I am a student at Ohio  
18 State, Fisher College of Business and recently, I  
19 have been doing quite a bit of study into this issue  
20 of the transfer to clean energy and what AEP has been  
21 doing, as well as other energy companies in Ohio and  
22 I'm actually quite impressed. It's a very, very  
23 difficult thing to completely switch over from what  
24 you've been doing; completely different business  
25 model, different things to consider. I would like to

1 see that continued.

2 Coal, as from what I understand, we have  
3 a lot of it, but it gets to be dirtier and dirtier  
4 because of in Ohio I know created the sea water so  
5 you have a lot of issues with Mercury. That concerns  
6 me particularly. I don't like the thought of things  
7 that cause birth defects being put in large  
8 quantities into our land and water. We've been  
9 seeing rises in birth defects as well as things like  
10 autism rates that I know Mercury contributes to and  
11 that kind of strikes home, so I really would like to  
12 see more clean energy investment.

13 I think that's the steps that America  
14 needs to take to become a stronger economy and to --  
15 I mean, we are leaders in this world and we should be  
16 leading this revolution. Right now Germany and China  
17 are completely overtaking us and I think we have the  
18 ability to step it up, so thank you.

19 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. Are  
20 there any questions?

21 MR. SATTERWHITE: Thank you.

22 MR. MCNAMEE: No, Your Honor.

23 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. You  
24 may be seated.

25 MR. LEARD: Good morning.

1 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Good morning.  
2 Would you please raise your right hand.

3 - - -

4 JEROME LEARD  
5 being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, was  
6 examined and testified as follows:

7 - - -

8 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Please be seated  
9 and please give your name and address for the record.

10 MR. LEARD: My name is Jerome Leard,  
11 L-E-A-R-D, 2287 Indiana Avenue, Columbus, Ohio 43202.

12 Good morning. I'd like to make some  
13 comments about the AEP electrical demand  
14 requirements. I'm an AEP customer and I would rather  
15 have my electricity provided by renewable energy than  
16 by the current and future technology for the coal and  
17 nuclear. And the reasons for that is the clean coal  
18 technology sounds like a good idea but there isn't  
19 any practical way of doing it right now and the  
20 recovery and transportation of the fuel is not clean  
21 so they never talk about that, but the technology to  
22 burn it might work some day and probably will cost a  
23 whole lot more than what they expect it to cost. And  
24 the nuclear part of the clean aspects of the AEP  
25 portfolio, that doesn't appeal to me at all, so I

1 prefer to have my electricity from solar or wind.  
 2 And the Senate Bill 221, the benchmarks in the Bill I  
 3 think ought to be exceeded, the 25 by 25. I think  
 4 that would be a better solution to our electrical  
 5 needs than trying to do the other forms of clean  
 6 technology.

7 And another good thing about the clean  
 8 electrical supplies from solar and wind is that the  
 9 jobs that they provide are new businesses. It would  
 10 be job growth rather than trying to extend the fossil  
 11 fuel industry another generation. It's going to go  
 12 anyhow, you know, you're going run out of that stuff.  
 13 The renewable aspects of generating electricity for  
 14 me as a customer, as an AEP customer, I would prefer  
 15 to come from renewable energy.

16 And there was a technical conference  
 17 yesterday for AEP, the 11-346, the 11-348-EL-SSO and  
 18 they already have in the workings the aspects of  
 19 clean energy. Mr. Nelson, he talked about the  
 20 generation resource rider where the customers, they  
 21 can, you know, send money to AEP to, I think what  
 22 they were saying, was to build and make their own  
 23 electricity from renewable sources, the green rider  
 24 part of it. And there's also the renewable energy  
 25 credit financing that they talked about, which would,

1 if the customer had renewable energy systems on their  
 2 property, that would help pay for it. So AEP is  
 3 doing the right thing with those two rate cases. And  
 4 that's what I'd like to see happen. So you know,  
 5 those rate cases go through and have the new -- we  
 6 need electricity, there's no doubt about that.  
 7 You've got to have that or standard of living would  
 8 just go right down the tubes, so I'd rather have it  
 9 from renewable energy than from the technology our  
 10 grandfather's had.

11 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. Any  
 12 questions?

13 MR. MCNAMEE: No questions. Thank you.

14 MR. SATTERWHITE: No. Thank you.

15 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Seeing none, you  
 16 may step down.

17 Would you please raise your right hand.

18 - - -

19 SARAH TURNER

20 being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, was  
 21 examined and testified as follows:

22 - - -

23 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you.  
 24 Please be seated. Give your name and your address  
 25 for the record, if you would, please.



1 MS. TURNER: My name is Sarah Turner. I  
2 live at 456 East Sycamore Street, Columbus.

3 I just wanted to say that I think that  
4 looking at the economics of furthering investing in  
5 old coal plants makes a lot less sense from an  
6 economic standpoint than investing in energy  
7 efficiency and renewables, and that any future  
8 investments in energy or the transfer of costs for  
9 these investments to customers should be moving  
10 steadily towards renewable energy and not pumping  
11 more into the plants that have already sucked up a  
12 lot of investment to be maintained. That's it.

13 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Any questions?

14 MR. SATTERWHITE: Thank you.

15 MR. MCNAMEE: No.

16 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Seeing none, you  
17 may be seated. Thank you.

18 Would you please raise your right hand.

19 - - -

20 JENNIFER MILLER

21 being first duly sworn, as prescribed by law, was  
22 examined and testified as follows:

23 - - -

24 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you.

25 Please be seated and give your name and address for

1 the record.

2 MS. MILLER: My name is Jennifer Miller,  
3 422 East Whittier Street in Columbus, Ohio. I'm a  
4 German Village homeowner. I'm a proud daughter of  
5 Ohio. I've lived in Ohio my entire life. I'm a  
6 mother of a 12-year-old. No, I don't really look old  
7 enough for that. Thanks for that compliment.

8 (Laughter.)

9 And this is basically what I want to say  
10 is, I have family in First Energy's territory, I have  
11 family in Duke's territory and in AEP's territory and  
12 I even have some family in some municipals that have  
13 their own coal plants, and I want to say that I'm  
14 really glad that AEP is working hard at meeting  
15 Senate Bill 221. I'm pleased at how seriously the  
16 company is taking its efficiency and renewable  
17 investments. I think that that's really good for our  
18 environment, but I think it's good for their bottom  
19 line as well as our bottom line as customers.

20 I'm also glad to see that AEP is idling  
21 and also shutting down some of its oldest and  
22 dirtiest and most expensive coal plants. But I want  
23 to say that I am concerned about some of the filings  
24 that there's a clean coal rider in the IRP. And for  
25 me, coal, you know, carbon is just one of the

1 concerns with coal, that coal truly is not clean.

2           And one example I'd like to give from  
3 Ohio is that last year there was a massive, massive  
4 coal slurry spill in Southeastern Ohio by Murray  
5 Energy. It was at least the tenth spill of its kind  
6 in Southeast Ohio by this company, over a quarter  
7 million tons of thick, black sludge coated one of the  
8 cleanest creeks in Southeast Ohio. It killed fish.  
9 It killed crawdads. It polluted waters that a  
10 community was relying on. The community that lived  
11 around that area couldn't possibly move away from  
12 this mine, so it was just constantly -- because of  
13 economic reasons, so we're talking about a community  
14 that's just always experiencing significant pollution  
15 from some dirty mines. Coal mining also destroys  
16 mountains. In Appalachia it causes black lung in our  
17 workers.

18           And so I just want to say that AEP has  
19 been a pretty bold leader on this and I want to ask  
20 that AEP continue to be even bolder. You know that  
21 efficiency and renewables are cheaper today; they're  
22 cheaper in the long run than any form of coal  
23 generation and certainly any form of nuclear power.  
24 And so I just ask that, you know, the PUCO and AEP  
25 really look at the full costs and also look at the

1 entire life cycle.

2 And I think that Senate Bill 221 was  
3 designed to create jobs and I think it was designed  
4 to protect consumers and designed to protect the  
5 environment and I think that the best way we can do  
6 that in the long-term is, of course, efficiency, but  
7 also renewables. Thank you.

8 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. Any  
9 questions?

10 MR. SATTERWHITE: Thank you.

11 MR. MCNAMEE: None.

12 MR. ETTER: No.

13 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Thank you. You  
14 may step down.

15 Are there any other public witnesses at  
16 this time?

17 Seeing none, do we have any procedural  
18 issues to take up as far as going through the  
19 evidentiary portion of this case at this time?  
20 Mr. McNamee?

21 MR. MCNAMEE: No. I'm aware of nothing  
22 at this point. It was my motion that caused the  
23 hearing, I suppose I should speak to this now.

24 (Laughter.) But no, I'm unaware of anything. I  
25 would simply ask that the case be continued in order

1 to allow us the usual opportunity to try and work out  
2 whatever issues may crop up and even to investigate  
3 the case essentially.

4 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Okay. And I  
5 assume with that you're including in your motion that  
6 would notify the Bench when you are prepared to go to  
7 hearing on this.

8 MR. MCNAMEE: Oh, certainly.

9 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: -- or we need to  
10 reschedule this evidentiary hearing portion of this  
11 case?

12 MR. MCNAMEE: Certainly.

13 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Any objection or  
14 comments from counsel for the parties upon  
15 Mr. McNamee's motion?

16 MR. SATTERWHITE: No, Your Honor.

17 MR. ETTER: No objection.

18 MR. ALEXANDER: No objection.

19 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: If not, the  
20 Bench will grant Staff's motion for continuance of  
21 the evidentiary portion of this hearing.

22 MR. MCNAMEE: There is one other thing.

23 HEARING EXAMINER JONES: Okay.

24 MR. MCNAMEE: I sort of feel constrained  
25 to do one other thing. I'd like to, you know, on

1    behalf of actually all the parties here and the  
2    Bench, too, I'm sure, who appreciate all of you  
3    coming down to give testimony this morning.  It's,  
4    you know, it's a burden, but participating in  
5    governance, participating in regulation is vital to  
6    making America what it is and we appreciate you  
7    coming.

8                   THE PUBLIC:  Thank you.

9                   HEARING EXAMINER JONES:  Thank you.  Mr.  
10   McNamee, you did steal my thunder.  (Laughter.)  So  
11   with that, we will grant the Staff's motion for  
12   continuance in this matter.

13                  MR. SATTERWHITE:  One thing that the  
14   publications, as evidenced by people showing up, are  
15   already filed in the docket.

16                  HEARING EXAMINER JONES:  I did see and  
17   thank you for mentioning that?  So if there is  
18   nothing further, we will stand adjourned at this  
19   time.  Thank you.

20                  MR. SATTERWHITE:  Thank you.

21                  (Thereupon, the proceedings concluded at  
22   10:27 a.m.)
