THE WITNESS: My name is Kevin Crowley, and the address is 138 Johnson Drive, that's Delaware, Ohio.

Ma'am, if I could, I just want to read a letter quickly and then maybe just share a couple of statistics that might put that into context. I can be very brief.

I would like to thank you for this opportunity to express my appreciation for the financial assistance and community partnership provided by AEP Ohio and the American Electric Power. I also appreciate the opportunity to describe how that assistance has benefited People in Need, Incorporated, of Delaware County, Ohio, and more importantly, the low-to-moderate income families and individuals we serve.

For more than 25 years PIN served the community from a century-old, three-story residential

home in Delaware. As the need for our services grew, we outgrew the space and the house was no longer adequate to serve the needs of the community.

2.2

In May of 2009, we publicly launched The Campaign for Possibilities, an \$850,000 capital campaign to assist with the purchase and renovation of the new facility, to buy the needed equipment, and to generate additional operating revenue. Although this was not an opportune time to start a capital campaign with the nation in an economic downturn, we determined we must forge ahead as the need for services was steadily increasing.

When AEP stepped up as a lead donor with a generous \$150,000 three-year pledge, other businesses and individuals felt confident enough in our efforts to also invest in the community by supporting the capital campaign.

We found a suitable building and entered into a short-term mortgage and were able to move into the facility in August of 2009 and begin operations while continuing with the capital campaign. Before moving into the new facility our maximum output of food topped out at nearly 51,000 meals in our last year at the old building. Moving into our current facility has increased food distribution to over

70,000 meals in the first year and a projected increase to over 85,000 this year.

2.2

Our new facility allows us to accept windfall donations and purchase food in bulk from Mid-Ohio Foodbank and other sources thereby increasing our buying power. We have also been able to implement efficiencies that increase our capacity to serve the growing numbers of Delaware County residents who turn to us in their time of need.

AEP played a significant role in this endeavor by investing in our mission to serve the LMI families and individuals in Delaware County not today but also in the future as well.

And just to make this very brief when I compared January to May of our last year in the home and compared that to the same timeframe this year, we have been able to increase our number of families served by over 60 percent. We have increased the number of meals by more than 59 percent. And the new facility has allowed us to accept, and these are things we couldn't do in the old facility, 9,000 pounds of baked goods and 13,000 pounds of fresh produce that we have been able to distribute so far this year.

We have a case load in the food pantry of

more than 2,300 households, and we are currently adding one new family every day.

The Community Shelter Board is a

24 public/private partnership tasked with leading the

community's plan to end homelessness. Our job is to

bring together many organizations to work as a system focused on ending homelessness.

2.2

AEP has been investing in the Community Shelter Board since 1995. They take philanthropy very seriously and have chosen to invest in programs that get real results for central Ohio citizens living in poverty.

This past year we've seen a massive increase in the number of families and individuals seeking emergency shelter. This is a direct effect of the deep and lingering recession. We will continue to see the sustained need in our community for the next few years. AEP is partnering with us to focus on real solutions to address the root causes of homelessness. They are a major investor in the Community Shelter Board's work and they are an amazing partner.

AEP's impact is deep and far-reaching. With their current annual support, here are just a few examples of their impact and investment in the Community Shelter Board and our community. Their support helps 75 individuals or 30 families to access emergency shelters and resolve their housing crisis as quickly as possible. The typical family is a young mom less -- young mom with two young children

less than 7 years of age.

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AEP's support helps fund outreach and engagement services for 125 individuals living on the streets, offering them needed services and helping them get into stable housing.

Over the course of their involvement and support we estimate that AEP has helped 555 individuals and family members move from homelessness to housing.

We're talking about a responsible corporation. We support AEP's Electric Security Plan, and we applaud their engagement and support of their neighbors. Thank you for your time.

THE WITNESS: Members of the Commission, thank you for allowing me the time to address you today. My name is Brandon Feller. I am the President of the United Way of Delaware County. I'm here to neither support nor oppose the proposed ESP. Rather as a not for profit and community leader in Delaware County I will share my experience as a community partner and corporate citizen.

I have personally coordinated with AEP and its representatives to identify community needs and solutions that were funded through the use of AEP grants. Some of these projects include purchasing medical equipment and medications for our local free health clinic, funding a program to provide rent assistance to families on the verge of being evicted and becoming homeless, and supplying multiple agencies with infant formula, diapers, and wipes that are for families that are struggling. Most recently, this summer, kids from low income families in the Delaware City School System that have significant

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mental health issues and require access to clinical assistance during the school year will now have access to that same service during the summer break as a result of a grant through AEP's Foundation.
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2.2

The programs that I have described are just in the last two years and only represent those with which I have been directly involved. As an engaged member of the community, I am aware of many more investments AEP has made in Delaware County during that time. Among those organizations that have benefited include the Andrews House, Habitat for Humanity of Delaware County, Delaware Area Career Center, American Cancer Society, Strand Theater and Cultural Arts Center, Delaware Rotary Club, Grady Memorial Hospital Foundation, the Arts Castle, and there are many others.

It has been my experience that AEP invests in the communities with which it does business and I personally have seen evidence of their commitment to supporting local organizations that are providing vital services. Thank you.

Good afternoon and thank you for the opportunity to testify here today. My name is Noel Williams, and I am the president for the Columbus NAACP, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People. Again, thank you for the opportunity to testify today regarding my organization's concerns about AEP Ohio's Electric Security Plan. I'm here today to speak in opposition to this specific proposal because it is not prudent, either in the way AEP Ohio recovers cost or determines future investments.

Specifically our concerns are regarding two major components of AEP Ohio's proposal: No. 1, the numerous nonbypassable riders to collect

generation -- I'm sorry, generation-related charges from all customers regardless of whether they are receiving their electricity supply from the utility or a competitive retail electric supplier and, 2, guaranteed cost recovery for investments without any mechanism to ensure AEP Ohio has made the most economical choice.

2.2

Furthermore, nonbypassable charges for generation-related costs will supply -- will simply lead to uneconomical investments that will be paid for by all Ohio consumers.

As proposed, AEP Ohio wants customers to bear the multi-billion dollar financial risk of its investment decisions with no assurance that the investments are the most economical solution for the consumers of Ohio. Ohio AEP's proposal to give guaranteed recovery of costs through nonbypassable riders will not only significantly increase customer costs but will sharply erode retail electricity sharp -- shopping in Ohio AEP.

Customers that choose to purchase their electric supply from a competitive provider will be forced to pay twice, first, for the electric supply they have purchased from a competitive provider and, second, for Ohio AEP's generation-related costs

through nonbypassable riders.

2.2

This structure eradicates competitive suppliers from the market thereby decreasing the competitive pressures that keep costs down and spur investment and innovation.

Customers must maintain the opportunity to reduce their electric bills by obtaining supply from a competitive provider.

Competition and customer choice provide businesses with the ability to attain the most competitive prices and innovative products that suit their specific needs and help them to better manage and control electricity costs.

The bottom line is AEP Ohio's proposal is wrong. AEP's proposed Electric Security Plan will place Ohio consumers at a long-term disadvantage precluding future viable competitive options.

Considering these facts the Columbus NAACP stands opposed to AEP Ohio's proposed Electric Security Plan.

I am here to testify in favor of AEP Ohio's Electric Security Plan. AEP has been a long-time employer of the operating engineers. I will keep it kind of simple today. Our -- I am talking on job aspects of what AEP does for Ohio. AEP's facilities around Ohio have created thousands of high paying jobs with full benefits for our

members and many other trade unions for decades.

We feel the tradeoff for a few dollars a month extra compared to the U.S. jobs created and tax base is well worth the investment by our membership and members of our trades.

An example of this is similar to our membership does a lot of highway work, building work, utility work. We also support a gas tax today when there is \$4 gas out there, hovering around \$4. We also support a 10 to 15 cent gas tax to keep this nation's infrastructure moving so commerce can keep moving in this nation.

We seem to allow more jobs and more jobs to move out of this country. Well, some of these employers like AEP and some others are what keeps this country strong.

So with that we also support AEP's commitment to Ohio and the workforce and its workforce. And this is good for all Ohioans.

Our mission is to recruit companies from across the world, primarily a set of economic-based companies here, many of which are manufacturing companies where energy is critically important to their operating costs. We are also trying to retain the companies we do have in the critical economic base of manufacturing companies that already exist in Ohio and across central Ohio, and we are trying to

have entrepreneurs particularly in the energy -field of energy and energy innovation and having a
flexible and innovative energy environment is very
critical to that for jobs here in central Ohio.

2.2

I have recently moved here within the last year from North Carolina from a very different regulated environment and in a state that competes with Ohio on a regular basis and having a flexible and teamwork approach to the regulatory environment in recruiting companies and keeping companies is very critical of that environment.

We support AEP's plan. Over 50 percent of the companies that we are currently working with are from the manufacturing sector. And we see this not only holding steady but probably growing in the future as we see a renaissance in advanced manufacturing across -- across the U.S. and across the country.

We think that this is critical for a couple of reasons. We believe that this is the economic base of so many of the 10 counties that we represent and represents thousands and thousands of jobs not only across our region but across all of Ohio, in fact, was what much of our region was built upon. No. 1, we think that continuous investment in

infrastructure is critically important in power generation so that we continue to have reliable and cost competitive energy in Ohio. No. 2, we think flexibility of the plan and continued commitment in our communities is critical.

And, finally, I would applaud AEP's corporate citizenship and leadership in the communities, in particular with the economic development community and the economic development organizations across our region. It's critical that this continue and increase if we are going to grow our economy, grow jobs, and remain competitive in this very intense environment.

And the interesting thing you have to put into this, you know, when we hear the testimonies today, we realize that AEP is a tremendous community citizen, that they truly care about the needs of the community, and they do try to give back and take a real corporate role. But beyond that I think they have great vision for the state of Ohio.

They, in turn, back in those days were part of the old Ohio Power system and they have comported with part of the Rhodes Raiders team that was united up until even the last year or two, we used their -- AEP's electronic format for the placement of prospective businesses and so on throughout the state, so they have been a strong partner in economic development.

They have great vision in that area, and I think the ESP -- the people concentrate only on the

small rate increase for the residential, but it's a much bigger picture because it truly is looking at the guaranteed availability of rate. Today -- today we are -- electricity, you know, it is -- it is -- it doesn't matter where it comes from, AEP or Duke Energy, from any other company. It's basically a commodity. We just want to make sure it's there, it's there on a regular supply, and it comes at a rate that you can depend on.

And I think that is an important part of having a plan on file that gives you an ongoing rate that we can sell to customers. The actual proposed rate for many of our industries actually will reduce it in our particular area, so it's not a negative for that, but the goals beyond that that AEP have committed to, the goals of partnering again with the state of Ohio and Jobs Ohio and putting forth money out of the corporate earnings to be a strong part again as they were 40 years ago to make this state great. That is very important.

Their vision of solar energy, you know, when you are down where we are, we're in truly southern Ohio, Lawrence County, you don't have flat land. You have to create it. You fill valleys. You knock hilltops off to create flat land. We don't

    have wind. We never worry about the tornadoes

    Ohio. I am the Economic Development Director for

    Scioto County which is in the very southern part of

    the state. That county has had major competition for

    a lot of years. We were a major industrial base and

     then the steel mills and the shoe factories and the
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foundries moved out. We have worked desperately as communities in southern Ohio to try to be more competitive with neighboring states just as West Virginia, Kentucky, Indiana, to address, attract economic development opportunities to Ohio and especially to southern Ohio. AEP has always been an extremely valuable partner in that, but we have seen a difference in the -- since the new rate structure that seems to have caused them to have a lot less confidence in the long-term rate of return.

We have seen less investment by a lot of companies. I used to be an industrial engineer for Western Electric out here on East Broad Street, for North American Aviation. I was an engineer for the Fruehauf Corporation. We now look at those types of corporations as prosperity lost because those companies could not sustain a rate of return that it took to keep those thousands of jobs in place.

Our steel mills that used to be in New Boston, Ohio, employed 5,000 people, the market took that away, took it offshore to -- eventually to China. We are very much in support of the energy saving plan as proposed by AEP because we see this as a tremendous opportunity to bring corporate development and job creation back to Ohio.

We see Ohio as a net loss state in job creation. And it concerns us very deeply. I'm a life-long resident of Ohio. I've seen many companies come and go. And if they can't be competitive with their cost of doing business, then they will be going someplace else. They are always shopping as I would if I were in their position.

I do not believe that the current regulatory structure -- it not only discourages investment by economic development prospects it discourages investment in electric power generation that has been a cornerstone of Ohio's economy. The generation stations built up and down the river and by the lakes and what have you provide thousands and thousands of workers and has been billions of dollars of investment to Ohio's economy. The current volatile structure does not justify long-term investor risk which will be a development detriment as Ohio becomes a net importer of electricity, if we do not go with the energy savings plan. That is my total concern is what will happen to Ohio.

We highly value the expertise that AEP
Ohio has to assist us with job creation
opportunities. However, we have seen access to that
expertise shrink because they cannot justify

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long-term investment based on short-term rate guarantees in my opinion.
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It is my opinion that the proposed AEP Electric Security Plan provides stability and financial comfort to businesses to increase job opportunities in Ohio. It also provides the incentive for AEP to increase investment in power generation that will make Ohio competitive by keeping rates at a reasonable level attracting new customers and maintaining current operations. Thank you.

And I ask that this be considered, to think about a basic necessity for many families which

THE WITNESS: As I said, my name is Harry Pape, and I am the Director of Habitat for Humanity and a Board Member of the Family Resource Center at Woodward Elementary in Delaware, Ohio.

My comments pertain to my experience with AEP's corporate citizenship and not specifically on the rate request. Energy has a true cost, and as you work to determine its value, I ask that you consider AEP's efforts for conservation and their direct financial support of low income customers. Habitat serves families whose income falls between 30 and 50 percent area median income.

In addition to our traditional model of building and selling homes, Habitat is starting a program to help low income families maintain their existing homes through weatherization, landscaping, exterior repairs.

Our program called a Brush with Kindness is designed to help families reduce their energy and resource consumption. AEP was the first donor to make a major investment in this program allowing us to start the Brush with Kindness program in Delaware

County and to serve the first dozen customers.

In my three years on the Board of the Family Resource Center, an umbrella of the social service agency, we have helped hundreds of families through AEP's neighbor-to-neighbor program. The Family Resource Center's mission is to help families deal with all those things that negatively impact a child's ability to learn. Through AEP's neighbor-to-neighbor program we have been able to help families remove one more hurdle to a better education.

Nonprofits rely in part on corporate stewardship. In my experience AEP has invested wisely in efforts that directly impact the cost of energy for low income families and in programs that strengthen our community. Thank you for your time.
